Religious Philosophy, Religion and Church G. Professor Retired , Dept. I am an adherent of a Calvinistic Church, but as an academician who has to give an objective analysis, irrespective of my own religious persuasions, I am called upon through my own conscience to be objective. Thus, all subjectivity has to be checked by the broader context in which one has to act. It would be misleading if one came forward merely with his own norms, and in any state where religious freedom is allowed this approach could be most dangerous. It holds that Man is inherently a spiritual and immortal being. Or does it seek this in what the Scriptures say about Man and the meaning of his existence? One could practice a religion without asking questions about his existence. On analysing the works of Scientology one has no doubt that it has very definite religious characteristics and that it is in fact a religion. Some Christian theologians have maintained that Christianity is not a religion but a faith. This does mean that they do not belong to the Christian religion. Ron Hubbard says that Scientology is not a religion in this sense. He conveys that Scientology is not merely the repetition of a ritual, or the doing of certain acts called religious. This is one reason an important one why Western Europe has discarded the religion of an apostate church, and this process has even reached some of the more conservative churches. Scientology rightly states that it has been influenced by various sources. Many religions have been influenced in this manner. Hinduism, for example, is the outcome of the Aryan Vedas and the indigenous religions of India. Islam has been influenced by Judaism, Christianity and the indigenous religion of Southern Arabia. Scientology makes an important statement: It is the creator of things. You are YOU in a body. Ron Hubbard has studied many aspects of human existence, and his studies include an analysis of what happens to the human spirit at death: The first of these is that the individual himself is a spirit controlling a body via a mind. The second of these is that the thetan the spirit is capable of making space, energy, mass and time. The third of these is that the thetan is separable from the body without the phenomenon of death, and can handle and control a body from well outside it. The fourth of these is that the thetan does not care to remember the life which he has just lived, after he has parted from the body and the mind. The fifth of these is that a person dying always exteriorises. The sixth of these is that the person having exteriorised usually returns to a planet and procures, usually, another body of the same type of race as before. Similar theories are accepted by many religious people in the West. The Apostle Paul wrote meaningfully of this struggle. In Scientology, there is a great emphasis on the importance of human relationships; L. Although it may appear to the casual observer that few Scientologists have a profound knowledge of Scientology as a body of thought, this is, in fact, not an accurate observation. Is the emphasis in Christianity not mainly on attendance at church services, giving financial aid, getting involved in various activitiesâ€”rather than in understanding and study of the scriptures and in prayer and meditation? Scientology claims to be a religion: In the words of its Founder, L. Anybody who would dare try to make religion into solely a religious practice and not a religious wisdom would be neglecting the very background of Christianity. These people belong to churches and some are even hailed in the West as prominent Christian theologians. Scientology claims to be a non-denominational religion: Its principles are based upon self-evident truths. Acceptance of these truths is left entirely to the free choice of the individual. This is also the case with specific reform movements such as the Divine Life Society and the Ramakrishna Movements. This does not make them less religious. One could mention so-called tolerant Christians reacting against any other form of Christian expression than their own, such as when a Roman Catholic marries a member of the Anglican or Dutch Reformed Churches. Why bring in the argument of a personal God? Pantheism in Hinduism does not believe in a personal God. Neither is this the case in deism. Buddhism identifies the self with Nirvana, the Absolute, which is no personal entity. Scientology is however careful not to go to the extreme of God-realisation, but accepts the metaphysical aspect called the Eighth Dynamic as active in the life of a human being. As regards the use of church

discipline for the correction of sin, Lutherans do not mention it as the mark of the true church. Neither do Anglicans or Methodists. If this Calvinistic definition predominates today, what about , when the Roman Catholic Church will be the most representative Church in South also Southern Africa if developments continue as they revealed themselves from “? The census indicates the following: This is already seen in the non-white churches. On what basis could it be said that the attribute of holiness is not evident in the Church of Scientology? One could enter here into particulars which will reflect badly on some of the established churches and bodies that are accepted as churches. The Quakers do not use the Bible as Scripture but they also can read from it as well as any other scripture. The sermons in many churches are ethical in nature; some are even lessons on economics, other on politics, could Scientology be accused of any subversive political diatribes in their churches? There are many Christian churches which make no allusion to the Bible in many of their sermons. That man is basically good is one of the main accusations against the Creed of the Church of Scientology. What about the many Pelagian Churches in the West? The Scientology naming ceremony had been criticised as not being a Christian christening service. Why should it have anything in common with the Christian Church? Without Christ there can be no Christian church. Methodists say that man is basically good. So did the Remonstrants. So do the Anglicans, and others. Scientology has been criticised as having no transcendental, infinitely compassionate redeemer. Why should Scientology be required to mention Jesus Christ as Liberator from sin? The Church of the Nazarites near Durban does not proclaim Jesus Christ as Liberator from sin, yet they are accepted as a church. Many of the newer religious movements, recognised as churches, emphasise self betterment, and it is emphasised even in some long-established churches. It does not profess to be a Christian church, but it does not oppose or reject Christianity as is the case with some other religions established in this country. As a movement, it has not treated Christianity with disrespect. The view that the truth, in the form of Jesus Christ the Liberator, will set one free is a Christian point of view to which I personally subscribe but which some liberal churches and theologians do not accept. Jesus Christ is considered to be merely an example; he was never resurrected. He died and remained in the grave”cf. Why should Scientologists be required to subscribe to a conservative theology? Hubbard has been accused of trying to usurp the place of Christ, but the whole of secularist philosophy has usurped the place of Christ. Western secularism has done it; it destroys everything spiritual. Hubbard still emphasises the spiritual aspect in a despiritualised, materialistically aggressive world. Hubbard of usurping the place of Christ when there are so many evidences of this problem in Christian churches? How does the existentialist theologian treat truth? Not as an absolute quantity! And their literature is freely read, propagated and practiced in this country. Listen more carefully to what fellow churches say before condemning others who have never indulged in such atrocities. These views float today in respectable churches and church gatherings. Has Scientology indulged in such fantasies? Setting out the ministerial duties of a Scientology Chaplain, comparisons can be made with those of the Christian Chaplain. The duties of a Scientology Chaplain include the following: Some people consider that the attributes essential to all religions have to include revelation and holy scriptures as the source of knowledge of a divine being. This, however, is a non-academic view, for according to these norms, Buddhism will not be a religion”it has no form of revelation and no divine being. Some other people consider that a religion must have a doctrine of sin and of redemption and the need of redemption. Furthermore, there is no redemption concept in Buddhism”only absorption in Nirvana”nor in Hinduism”only freeing from the cycles of reincarnation and entering into the state of Moksha. Confucianism concentrates only on right social relationships. Another view of religion held in some quarters is that it must contain some form of prayer or sacrifice to entreat the favor of the Divine Being and to render homage to him. This again is seeing the question of what is a religion only from the Christian point of view. Many religions have no special prayers to a divine being. Another attribute of religion considered essential by some is some form of eschatology or expectation of things to come. This is also a very limited qualification of what religion is. Even saying that Scientology is a religion without God and without reverence for a higher power is a questionable statement as it is manifestly incorrect, as is evident from what has been said earlier in this paper.

2: Catholic Church in England, History, Timeline, Facts, Protestant

In the early Church, the papacy exercised authority over all Christians. He spoke to them and discovered that these men were from England. After talking to these slaves he was shocked to discover that there were very few Christians living in England. Gregory was determined to change this situation and when he became Pope he sent his friend Augustine and forty monks to England to convert the inhabitants to Christianity. Augustine arrived in England in He made his way to Canterbury, the home of King Ethelbert. Within a few weeks, Augustine had converted Ethelbert and most of his household to Christianity. Pleased by his success, the following year Pope Gregory appointed Augustine as Bishop of Canterbury, and Archbishop of the English people. After he conquered the country he did what he could to spread the Christian religion in England. William accepted that the Archbishop of Canterbury was the leader of the Christian Church in England, but was determined that this post should come under his control. Over the next few years, he rebuilt Canterbury Cathedral on the model of St. Lanfranc also ordered that in future no married man was to be ordained as a priest. However, he allowed existing priests to keep their wives. On the suggestion of Theobald, Henry appointed Thomas Becket as his chancellor. The king and Becket soon became close friends. Becket carried out many tasks for Henry II including leading the English army into battle. The decision angered many leading churchmen. They pointed out that Becket had never been a priest, had a reputation as a cruel military commander and was very materialistic Becket loved expensive food, wine, and clothes. They also feared that as Becket was a close friend of Henry II, he would not be an independent leader of the church. After being appointed Thomas Becket began to show a concern for the poor. Every morning thirteen poor people were brought to his home. After washing their feet Becket served them a meal. He also gave each one of them four silver pennies. Instead of wearing expensive clothes, Becket now wore a simple monastic habit. As a penance punishment for previous sins he slept on a cold stone floor, wore a tight-fitting hairshirt that was infested with fleas and was scourged whipped daily by his monks. Henry was told that, while he had been away, there had been a dramatic increase in serious crime. Those that had sought the privilege of a trial in a Church court were not exclusively clergymen. Any man who had been trained by the church could choose to be tried by a church court. Even clerks who had been taught to read and write by the Church but had not gone on to become priests had a right to a Church court trial. The king decided that clergymen found guilty of serious crimes should be handed over to his courts. At first, the Archbishop agreed with Henry on this issue but after talking to other church leaders Thomas Becket changed his mind. Henry was furious when Becket began to assert that the church should retain control of punishing its own clergy. The king believed that Becket had betrayed him and was determined to obtain revenge. Archbishop of Canterbury In , the Archbishop of Canterbury was involved in a dispute over land. Henry ordered Becket to appear before his courts. When Becket refused, the king confiscated his property. Becket denied the charge but, so that the matter could be settled quickly, he offered to repay the money. When Henry mentioned other charges, including treason, Becket decided to run away to France. Thomas Becket eventually agreed to return to England. However, as soon as he arrived on English soil, he excommunicated expelled from the Christian Church the Archbishop of York and other leading churchmen who had supported Henry while he was away. Henry, who was in Normandy at the time, was furious when he heard the news and supposedly shouted out: Canterbury Cathedral When the knights arrived at Canterbury Cathedral on 29th December , they demanded that Becket pardon the men he had excommunicated. When Becket refused, they hacked him to death with their swords. In a monk named Martin Luther from Wittenburg in Germany began to criticise the power and corruption of the Pope and the Catholic church. Luther also criticised the Pope for not allowing the Bible to be translated into other languages. Luther argued that as the vast majority of people could not read Latin they had to rely on what the priest told them was in the Bible. Luther was very angry that Pope Leo X was raising money in this way. He believed that it was wrong for people to be able to buy forgiveness for sins they had committed. Luther decided to write down

his views on the subject. He then nailed the paper to the door of the church in Wittenberg. In the 14th century, John Wycliffe and his Lollard followers had said similar things in England. However, with the help of the English monarchy, the Lollard movement had been crushed by the Pope and the Catholic church. Pope Leo X now ordered Martin Luther to stop stirring up trouble. This attempt to keep Luther quiet had the opposite effect. Luther now started issuing statements about other issues. For example, at that time people believed that the Pope was infallible incapable of error. However, Luther was convinced that Leo X was wrong to sell indulgences. Therefore, Luther argued, the Pope could not possibly be infallible. If the Pope could be wrong about indulgences, Luther argued he could be wrong about other things. For hundreds of years, popes had only allowed Bibles to be printed in Latin or Greek. Luther pointed out that only a minority of people in Germany could read these languages. Therefore to find out what was in the Bible they had to rely on priests who could read and speak Latin or Greek. Luther, on the other hand, wanted people to read the Bible for themselves. In orders were given for Luther to be arrested. However, Luther had many supporters in Germany and some of these people helped to save his life by hiding him in a castle. While Luther was there he translated the Bible into German. His supporters, because they were protesting against the way the Church was governed, became known as Protestants. Gradually large numbers of people living in England, the Netherlands today called Holland and Belgium, Switzerland and the Scandinavian countries began to call themselves Lutherans or Protestants. Protestants were no longer willing to accept the authority of the Pope. They argued that people needed to read the Bible if they wanted to find out how God wanted them to behave. Henry feared that criticism of the Church might encourage people to criticise the monarchy. In 1534, Henry made himself head of the Church in England in place of the Pope. Although Henry continued to persecute English Protestants, he was now also hostile to those who remained loyal to the Pope. Henry VIII was particularly worried that he did not have the full support of the monks and nuns in England. In 1535 Henry began arresting monks for high treason. As a warning to others, five monks were publicly tortured before being beheaded. Later that year others were executed, together with several nuns. In 1538 Henry gave permission for an English translation of the Bible to be published in England. He also ordered that a copy of this Bible should be placed in every church in his kingdom. Henry still considered himself to be a Catholic Church, but by taking this action, he began to move the Church in the direction of Protestantism. Edward was too young to rule, so his uncle, Edward Seymour, Duke of Somerset, took over the running of the country. This included the introduction of an English Prayer Book and the decision to allow members of the clergy to get married. Attempts were made to destroy those aspects of religion that were associated with the Catholic church, for example, the removal of stained-glass windows in churches and the destruction of religious wall-paintings. Is England Catholic or Protestant Edward VI was suffering from tuberculosis and as his health deteriorated suddenly, and John Dudley, Duke of Northumberland, tried to persuade the king to alter the succession in favor of his own daughter-in-law, Lady Jane Grey. Queen Mary, who had been brought up as a Roman Catholic Church, now declared that the Pope was the only true head of the Church. This was followed by the execution of Thomas Cranmer, the archbishop of Canterbury and other Protestants who refused to accept the Pope as head of the Church. People were also punished if they were found reading bibles that had been printed in the English language. However, the most common cause of heresy concerned something called transubstantiation. Catholics believed that the bread and wine used at communion became the body and blood of Jesus Christ. Protestants who refused to believe this miracle happened during communion were in danger of being executed. When Elizabeth became queen some of her ministers wanted her to execute Catholics who refused to accept Protestant beliefs. Elizabeth refused and was only willing to execute heretics who tried to overthrow her. This included Mary, Queen of Scots. Elizabeth I died without children. As James was a Protestant, Parliament was also in favor of him becoming king. The Roman Catholic Church in England were upset that there was going to be another Protestant monarch. They also became very angry when James passed a law that imposed heavy fines on people who did not attend Protestant church services. All the men agreed under oath to join the conspiracy. The very popular Pope Francis is drawing in large crowds so if you would like to get a good seat you will need to arrive up to 3 hours before the audience begins. The audience lasts for around 1. During the Audience the Pope will give speeches in various languages, the main languages being English, French, Spanish, German, Polish, Portuguese, Italian amongst others. English is usually the third language along and at the very end of the audience the Pope imparts a blessing upon the crowd which also extends to those at home that are sick or suffering an also any religious articles you have with such as Rosary beads etc. You can leave the audience before it finishes but if you wish to receive the blessing you will have to stay until end. Papal Audience Schedule Official Calendar: He will appear from the window of is apartment where he gives a short speech followed by the Angelus and ending with a blessing He may also greet the crowds in various languages and the whole event usually lasts aroundmins. He will impart the Apostolic Blessing at the end of the prayer. Masses with the Pope at the Vatican Papal Masses: Most of the masses from the Papal liturgical calendar at are celebrated at St Peters Basilica. However there are some Masses when the Holy See is expecting a larger number of people and for those Masses they will use St Peters Square. For more details please see " Masses at St Peters Square". For most of the Masses with the Pope you will need to have a ticket. Tickets are always free. If you have a regular ticket to participate in a Papal Mass and you are looking for a good close up picture of the Pope or a location close to the Altar you will need to arrive early to the Mass. We recommend you if you have a regular public ticket and you are looking for a good place to arrive 1- 3 hrs before the scheduled start time. Tickets for masses at St. Peters Basilica with the Pope: If you need between 1 - 6 tickets you can normally get tickets directly from the Swiss Guards usually 1 day before the Mass: If you will need more than 6 tickets for any of the Masses you will definitely need to reserve in advance, and then collect your tickets usually 1 day before the event from the Prefecture of the Papal Household for more detail: Tickets for special guests: Tickets for special guest or reparto speciale: These tickets giving you a special location at the event or Mass with the Pope. Normally these tickets are reserved only for religious guest through a reservation applied though the church or any other religious institution. The tickets will be asked for at the entrance of the Mass. Only your arrival time will guarantee your access so come early.. Masses with the Pope at St. So normally for the seated area you will need a ticket but mostly you can attend standing without a ticket. Again, places will only be be guaranteed according your arrival time. Capacity is limited and it can be very hard sometimes to get tickets for these events so you must book far in advance, no less than 3 months usually. If the number of your request is not very large, lets say a family numbering tickets you will have a bigger chance of getting your tickets. Normally the Vatican will reply to your home address with a letter notifying you that they have received your request and where to take the letter at the Vatican to collect tickets. They will not confirm tickets have been issued until you go to the prefecture office for collection. There you will either receive your tickets or a letter to say there was not enough availability. If you order a large number of tickets such a group or more than 10 tickets we recommend you to send the request together with a letter of your parish or some authority of the church. However, you will find that most people will arrive early to get a good seat. Security opens between 8 - 8. Pope in summer time Holidays Although the Pope holds the Audiences regularly on Wednesdays there are times when he may be on a Pastoral Visit around Italy or overseas or he may be enjoying the Italian holiday period in his summer residence of Castel Gandolfo during the month of August, in which case the Audiences will not be going ahead. certain amount of people so again to get a good seat and to be guaranteed entrance you should arrive when security opens around 8 - 8. They will not permit entrance even with tickets once the Hall is full. Castel Gandolfo is around 1hr outside of Rome, it is possible to reach there by Public transport but both the buses and trains do not run very often. You would need to be at Anagnina by 8am to get a bus early enough to get you to the audience on time as again they run very infrequently, almost every 2hrs. The other option is taking a train from Termini Station and you will need to check the hours but the trains do run more often than the buses. Again, a good way to keep updated is to check the Vatican website, although they do make last minute changes!
