Plot summary[ edit ] "The Red Wedding" redirects here. For the television adaptation of the scene, see The Rains of Castamere. Finally, Daenerys Targaryen approaches Pentos. Jaime is sent south, escorted by Brienne of Tarth. Catelyn makes this deal without the approval of her son Robb, the King in the North, and is taken prisoner upon its discovery. To secure his authority and atone for these deaths thus preventing the Lannisters from executing Stark prisoners, Robb executes Lord Rickard, losing the support of House Karstark as a result. Brienne is thrown into a bear pit by Hoat, and Jaime risks his own life to rescue her. He also tells her that he had killed the former King Aerys II Targaryen because he planned to burn the city and its inhabitants with wildfire to spite Robert Baratheon. More losses are taken as the army retreats. Meanwhile, the Greyjoys now hold the Neck, having taken Moat Cailin, thus barring Robb from returning to his homeland. The group encounters Sandor Clegane, known as the Hound, who abandoned Joffrey during the Battle of the Blackwater, and offers him trial by battle, which he wins by killing Beric, but Thoros resurrects Beric thereafter. Arya is kidnapped by the Hound for ransom, and they proceed to Riverrun. At the wedding celebration, the Boltons and Freys turn on the Stark soldiers, massacring the Stark forces. Robb is murdered by Roose Bolton, while Catelyn has her throat cut by Raymund Frey and her body is thrown into the adjacent river. Many of the northern lords are killed, and the survivors captured. Edmure, after consummating his marriage, is kept as a hostage. These events become known as the Red Wedding. The combined effect was to kill off the forces of other Northern houses loyal to Robb while leaving the Bolton army unscathed. Arya and the Hound arrive at the outskirts of the castle as the Red Wedding is taking place; to keep her from running inside to her death, the Hound knocks Arya unconscious and takes her downriver. His wound becomes infected, and Arya abandons him. The captain replies "Valar Dohaeris", and they set sail. In the epilogue, a re-animated but decayed and mutilated Catelyn is leading the Brotherhood Without Banners, and she oversees the lynching of two Freys present at the Red Wedding. Stannis survived the Blackwater due to Rolland Storm commanding his rearguard and enabling him to escape to the fleet. Sansa is soon compelled to marry Tyrion Lannister to enable Lannister control of the North and to foil a Tyrell plot to marry her to Willas Tyrell and claim the North themselves. However Tyrion refuses to consummate the marriage against her will. Joffrey gloats that he has "won" the war; whereas the governing Small Council is shocked to learn that Tywin secretly masterminded the Red Wedding. Tyrion warns his father that the defeated Northerners will not quietly submit to Bolton rule, but Tywin dismisses his warning. Later, Tyrion realizes that Joffrey sent the assassin who attempted to kill Bran Stark at Winterfell, and thus set the war in motion. Tyrion is accused of the murder by his sister Cersei Lannister and placed on trial. He tells her to keep her oath to Catelyn, to find Arya and Sansa and return them home. Tyrion is again condemned to death but is freed by Jaime and Varys. Lysa reveals that Littlefinger had convinced her to poison Jon Arryn, her late husband, to prevent her son from being fostered to Stannis Baratheon, and to write to Catelyn that Arryn had been poisoned by the Lannisters, which was the catalyst for the events of A Game of Thrones. Lysa threatens to kill Sansa, thinking she is trying to seduce Littlefinger, but Littlefinger intervenes and, after revealing that he had only ever loved Catelyn, pushes Lysa to her death. The Watch are attacked by undead wights and the Others, suffering heavy casualties; but Samwell Tarly kills one of the Others with a blade of dragonglass. Jon and his captor Ygritte also begin a sexual relationship. Mance seeks the legendary Horn of Winter to shatter the Wall. After climbing the Wall, the wildlings press Jon to murder a homeless man. The approaching wildling army reaches Castle Black and assaults the Wall; but Jon takes command of the defenses and repels several assaults, during which Ygritte is slain. After that, Janos Slynt and Alliser Thorne imprison Jon for treachery and subsequently send him north of the Wall to kill Mance under a pretense of parley. As Jon is talking with Mance in the wildling camp, the army of King Stannis arrives, routing the Wildlings, and Mance is imprisoned. Upon payment, which includes Drogon the

largest and strongest of her dragons , Daenerys orders the Unsullied to turn on their former masters and sack the city. With the help of her maturing dragons, she frees all the slaves of Astapor. Consequently, Daenerys besieges the city to no avail. Daenerys discovers two traitors in her camp: Daenerys offers both men the chance to make amends by sneaking into Meereen to free the slaves and start an uprising. When Daenerys learns that the council she left in Astapor has been overthrown, she decides to rule Meereen to practice for the rule of Westeros. A Storm of Swords, part 1: Steel and Snow—George R. R. Martin's A Storm of Swords is the third part of George R. R. Martin's A Song of Ice and Fire. A Storm of Swords gets going more quickly than the last volume, whose first half, though still interesting from a world-building and character point of view, read more like the set-up for a big climax rather than actual plot development. Though winning his battles, for now, a few foolish moves from Robb and his advisors leave him allies left, right and centre. I enjoyed meeting Margaery, and particularly her formidable grandmother, who befriends Sansa, who needs as many people on her side as possible. Although they know what sort of a person Joffrey is, they act too confident about the wedding. Tyrion is hardly the dashing groom she had hoped for— at least twenty years her senior, malformed and an eyesore. Still, in my opinion Sansa could do much worse: Tyrion may be the one man in Westeros who would actually respect her. And I have a strong sense of foreboding about the marriage ceremony. The Lannisters have not made themselves universally popular, ruling rather by fear than by love. One of the wedding guests, the representative from Dorne, has not shown up, instead sending his brother who wants revenge for wrongs done his family by the Lannister-Baratheon regime. This volume shows another side to the scheming Lannisters. So far, Cersei Lannister has been shown rather as the wicked queen, but this volume depicts her as having no more control of her own fate than Sansa, with her father arranging to marry her off to some nobleman or other for political reasons. Similarly, her twin brother Jaime, for the first time given his own point-of-view chapters, is not the big tough knight that he has formerly seemed. Instead, Martin turns our expectations on their heads, showing this golden knight and kingslayer bested at swordfighting by a young woman, and breaking his resolve not to cry out at injury. Ride with them, eat with them, fight with them, for as long as it takes. Now the Wildlings have breached the Wall and invaded Westeros, unbeknown to the feuding kings, who would be better off uniting to save their kingdom. Part one of A Storm of Swords ends with reader frustration as two sets of characters who have been parted from early on in the series, come this close to being reunited—but have no idea that who else is near, and pass each other by. Arya has the most chapters, yet they are taken up mostly with travelling, falling in with different people for a little while. But she does overhear an old woman talking of her dreams, which are almost certainly prophetic in nature. I dreamt of a man without a face, waiting on a bridge that swayed and swung. On his shoulder perched a drowned crow with seaweed hanging from his wings. I dreamt of a roaring river and a woman that was a fish. The first dream is fairly straightforward: The stag is the badge of the House of Baratheon. And she has reason to weep tears of blood, believing her sons Bran and Rickon to have been violently murdered. But the fish was dead—and yet opened its eyes with terrifying effect. Crazy suggestion, I know, with nothing else in the text to support it, but after all, the Wall has been breached, and the north of the kingdom will be the first to fall. Where the Wildlings go first, the Others could follow in their path. Perhaps part two will hold the answers—or, more likely, pose twice as many questions.

Awaiting any further news concerning the Wildlings, while fear of the Others grows more and more palpable. Still one of my faves! Living in the nest of vipers that is Kings Landing. Keeping his secrets and plots. Another one who gets his own POV in this book! Thrown together with Brienne of Tarth to cross the country with Kings Landing as the ultimate goal. I love Davos, the underdog that he is! Still loyal to Stannis Baratheon, and recovering from the battle of the black water. He helps Stannis plan his next move, keeping his hatred of the red priestess Melisandre to himself. Last but absolutely not least! Dany is growing in her power and becoming more Queen-like every day! Her army is growing and she is as ruthless as ever.

*Book Three, Part One of A Song of Ice and Fire. The Seven Kingdoms are divided by revolt and blood feud. Winter is approaching and the wildings are poised to invade the Kingdom of the North.*

They are pursued by Tully bannermen, but evade them. Jaime spends most of his time insulting Brienne, despite her great size and strength with a sword. They are forced to abandon the river and take to the countryside, but are waylaid by mercenaries from the eastern continent known as the Brave Companions in the service of the Starks, having swapped sides from the Lannisters and taken to Harrenhal, which is now under their command. Despite his wound, Jaime is able to lend aid to Brienne and kill the bear. This strikes both of them as a highly unusual thing for a loyal Stark bannerman to do. As he leaves, Jaime off-handedly says, "Send Robb Stark my regards. Catelyn is horrified when Robb reveals that he has married Jeyne Westerling of the Crag, violating his oath of betrothal to House Frey. The situation of the Stark and Tully armies is not good, with the combined Tyrell-Lannister host far outnumbering their own and the Greyjoys barring the way home, not to mention the loss of the footmen in a suicidal attack on Duskendale. Nevertheless, Robb has a new plan to outflank and take Moat Cailin from the Greyjoys and allow them to return to the North. Unfortunately, the Riverlords will have to fight on for themselves. Catelyn agrees to this plan, but it hinges on winning the support of the Freys once more, which they are now unlikely to give. Robb is angry that Catelyn let Jaime go, but cunningly uses her guilt at this in order to get her to agree to him naming Jon Snow, his half-brother, as his heir. Arya Stark and her friends encounter a group of men known as the Brotherhood Without Banners, who are a freeriding organisation defending the smallfolk of the war-torn Riverlands, led by Lord Beric Dondarrion and the red priest, Thoros of Myr. Beric was originally sent out by Eddard Stark to put down the Lannister raids, but they believe that they have a grander destiny now. He wins, killing Lord Beric, and is set free. Arya eventually tires of following the Brotherhood around and tries to break free, but is captured by Sandor Clegane instead. Clegane decides to take her back to her family in exchange for service, and they head north. Frey agrees to forgive Robb on the condition that Lord Edmure Tully weds one of his grand-daughters in his place. Walder Frey, known for his tetchiness, could easily have forced Edmure to marry a lackwit or an ugly girl instead. The wedding celebration is held and a great party takes place afterwards. Suddenly, the musicians produce crossbows and proceed to fire into the Stark supporters. The Boltons and Freys produce arms and cut down many of the Stark bannermen present, killing Dacey Mormont and Smalljon Umber among them and taking the Greatjon captive. Many of the northern lords are either killed or taken prisoner, but there are two missing: Arya has a strange dream that she is actually her long-missing direwolf, Nymeria, who now leads a huge pack of wolves in the Riverlands. She dreams of Nymeria finding a corpse floating in the Green Fork south of the Twins and pulling it ashore, only to flee as a group of men approach. There is a fight and the freeriders are killed, but Sandor is wounded. Arya leaves him dying under a tree and goes to the nearby port town of Saltpans, on the Trident. She finds a ship from the Free City of Braavos there, but they refuse to take her north. He is found by bannermen loyal to Stannis and taken back to Dragonstone. Upon his arrival he is immediately locked up for treason: Melisandre saw his intent in her flames. She also tells him that there are not seven gods but two: Stannis releases Davos and asks him to serve as his Hand. Davos agrees and begins to learn to read and write to better fulfil his office. King Joffrey agrees to set aside his betrothal to Sansa Stark, daughter of a House attainted of treason, and promises to marry Lady Margaery Tyrell instead. Tyrion was badly injured in the battle, losing his nose and suffering other wounds to his face, but he treats Sansa gently and refuses to sleep with her against her will. Tyrion himself is unimpressed with the turn of events, particularly as his father has taken up his role as Hand, reducing Tyrion to an advisory role, although he is later made master of coin to replace Littlefinger who has been named Lord of Harrenhal for his role in securing the Lannister-Tyrell alliance. Despite the victory, the Tullys and Starks remain a threat in the north, but Robb Stark has erred in sending his footmen down towards Duskendale to threaten the capital. Balon Greyjoy, styling himself King of the Iron Islands and the North, sends an offer of an alliance to Tywin, but Tywin spurns it, as he has another plan that does not involve selling off half the realm. He refuses to tell

Tyrion what he is plotting. Stannis rejects this decision and instead gives some of his blood to the fires instead, naming the names of three men that he wants dead: Suddenly Joffrey starts choking and dies in a fit on the floor. He throws the goblet away, but is seen by several witnesses. His sister Cersei has him arrested and put on trial. Sansa Stark is smuggled out of the castle by Littlefinger, who has been hiding in the city for days after he was supposed to have left for the Eyrie. Davos Seaworth learns to read and write with the aid of the maester at Dragonstone, who gives him official letters for him to practice on. Davos is disturbed by the letter. However, Davos smuggles Edric to safety. Stannis prepares to execute Davos for treason, but Davos is allowed to read the letter that lately arrived from the Wall. The news stuns Stannis and, more importantly, Melisandre. She is thrown in a dungeon. Jaime takes up the rank of Lord Commander of the Kingsguard and finds that his journey and the loss of his hand has made him more willing to fulfil his duties. He rejects her advances, deciding to remain true to his vows. Tyrion decides to risk all in his trial. Tyrion chooses trial by battle and Cersei appoints Gregor Clegane as her champion. The battle is fought and Oberyn apparently emerges victorious after knocking the giant Gregor down with a poisoned spear. Unfortunately, he spends too much time gloating and Gregor kills him. Tyrion is condemned to death, but escapes with the help of Jaime and Varys. He tells her to fulfil the oath he gave to Lady Catelyn, to find Arya and Sansa and return them home. He carried out his most infamous act to save the innocent, not that anyone would believe him. Brienne departs on her quest. At the Eyrie, Sansa lives in fear of her increasingly psychotic aunt, who eventually tries to kill her, convinced Sansa is planning to steal Littlefinger away from her and inadvertently revealing that Littlefinger told her to poison Jon Arryn and blame the Lannisters, sparking the entire war. In the epilogue, Merrett Frey leads a small party to a parley with a group from the Brotherhood Without Banners, who have taken several Freys captive and are demanding a ransom. During the parley the Brothers reveal that they have hanged and killed the other Freys. They point out to the panicking Merrett that he was at the Red Wedding and helped in the murder of the guests. He demands that they prove it by providing a witness. In response a battered figure appears and points at him. Merrett Frey is hung next to the corpses of his family, whilst the broken form of Catelyn Stark watches, and broods. Three blasts means something not heard in nearly eight thousand years: The Watch comes under attack by wights and the ice demons of ancient history, but manages to withdraw in something approaching good order. Jon Snow is taken to Mance Rayder and is able to convince him that he has truly turned his cloak but making out that he was jealous of his lowly position at Winterfell and the Starks meant nothing to him. He learns that the Others have returned and are driving the wildlings south towards the Wall. Mance has been seeking the legendary Horn of Winter which will shatter the Wall when sounded, but has been unable to find it. Jon is unsure of this story. Eventually, Jon is sent south on a mission to scale the Wall, circle around, and attack Castle Black from the south to allow the wildlings through the gates. Jon instead flees from the wildlings and reaches Castle Black to warn them of the threat. With many of the other Watch members dead or missing, Jon is forced to command a skeleton defence against the wildlings, but nevertheless defeats them. They reach the Wall at the abandoned castle of the Nightfort, but cannot pass it. Suddenly the gate opens and they meet Samwell Tarly and Gilly. Sam guides them to Coldhands, who will take them north, whilst Sam returns to Castle Black, agreeing to keep the truth of their survival a secret, even from Jon. The wildling army, over forty thousand strong, reaches Castle Black and assaults the Wall at that location. Jon leads a tenacious defence which sees thousands of wildlings killed, but it seems that the Watch must be overrun. As one of the betrayers of Eddard Stark, Slynt takes an instant dislike to Jon Snow and accuses him of being a traitor. He has Jon sent out to parley with Mance Rayder. Jon expects to be killed immediately, but Rayder is understanding of his situation and spares him for a time. Jon is shocked to learn that Rayder found the Horn of Winter after all and is preparing to use it to bring down the Wall, although he is reluctant to do so since the Others would then be able to invade Westeros as well. Suddenly horns are heard in the east and a great strength of cavalry attacks the wildling army, plunging it into chaos and putting it to rout. Rayder is captured and imprisoned. Stannis resolves to forge a new kingdom out of the shattered, leaderless North. Meereen, Astapor and Yunkai. The Unsullied agree to serve her, whilst Daenerys has the slaves of Astapor set free. However, the lords of Meereen choose to antagonise Daenerys by killing of their slaves and leaving each corpses staked at every mile along the road to the city. Daenerys

besieges the city to no avail. Daenerys discovers two traitors in her camp: Ser Jorah Mormont and Arstan Whitebeard. However, the nature of their treachery is very different. Mormont was selling information about her to Robert Baratheon up until they reached Qarth. Barristan wanted to right the ancient wrong of accepting Robert as his king by finding the true Targaryen heir to Westeros, but wanted to make sure the taint of madness had not affected her as it had her father and brother Viserys. 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The story is told from the perspective of 12 different characters, though 10 tell the majority of the story. Their tales occur simultaneously, as the chapters cycle among their perspective, though here they are recounted one at a time. The novel opens with a prologue. But before he can carry out his plan, a vast army attacks the Wall, a massive structure designed to repel northern invaders. Chett fears that the invasion may be successful, for the first time in generations. At the end of the previous novel, he was involved in a massive battle in which he showed great courage and was seriously wounded. As he recovers, he tries to win the favor he feels his family owes him, but to little effect. His father, Tywin, continues to disparage him, and his sister, Cersei, despises him as much as ever. Tyrion does little to hide his disapproval of his family and the reign of King Joffrey, his nephew. Meanwhile, Tyrion has been carrying on a secret relationship with Shae, a prostitute he has disguised as a castle maid. The relationship becomes complicated when Tyrion, for political reasons and much against his will, is married to year-old Sansa Stark. Tyrion refuses to consummate the marriage with the terrified young Sansa, who for some time has been a hostage to the Lannisters and subjected to endless mistreatment. During this time, King Joffrey has been engaged to marry Margaery Tyrell in order to create an alliance between their two houses. But on the night of his wedding, Joffrey is poisoned, and Tyrion is immediately accused of the crime. He chooses trial by combat, but his champion is killed, condemning Tyrion to death. As he waits in jail, Shae quickly forgets him. Then, just before his execution, his recently returned brother, Jaime, rescues him. Jaime admits to having lied to Tyrion in the past about a woman that Tyrion once married, but who Tywin in disapproval had his soldiers rape to drive her off. Tyrion is furious and swears revenge. He finds Shae there. He strangles her first, then discovering his father in the bathroom, kills him with a crossbow. There, Sansa is betrothed to the sickly young Robert, her own cousin. One day, as Sansa builds a snow castle during a snowstorm, Baelish tries to kiss her. Lysa becomes suspicious, and when she angrily confronts Baelish, he murders her. Arya Stark, having escaped capture by the Lannisters, is trying to get to Riverrun, but she is soon taken captive by a band of outlaws. When they capture Sandor Clegane, a vicious former henchman of the Lannisters called the Hound, Arya wants him killed, but after winning a trial by combat, the Hound is freed. Arya runs away from the group, but the Hound finds and kidnaps her, taking her with him. The Hound takes Arya to an inn. In a drunken quarrel, the Hound kills the two men but is critically wounded himself. He begs Arya to kill him, but she abandons him to die. She rides to Saltpans, a seaside town, where she boards a ship for the city of Braavos. His ship having sunk in the massive battle that concluded A Clash of Kings, Ser Davos Seaworth begins the novel stranded on a small island until a passing ship rescues him. When he arrives at Dragonstone, where his king, Stannis Baratheon, has made his seat, Davos tries to kill Melisandre, a cunning priestess whom Davos blames for the disastrous battle that sunk his ship and killed his sons. She freed Jaime with the understanding that he would return her daughters, Sansa and Arya, to her, so Robb forgives her. Everyone knows it was a disastrous lapse in judgment. Three days after her death, Catelyn reappears, horribly scarred, unable to speak, and seething for vengeance. Jaime and Brienne come to respect one another despite being adversaries. It is a tremendous blow to Jaime, who has shaped his whole life and identity around being a skilled swordfighter and knight. They are taken to the court of Lord Bolton, who releases Jaime to win favor with the Lannisters. As Jaime is leaving, he sees Brienne fighting unarmed against a bear for the amusement of her captors and rescues her. When Jaime returns to the House of Lannister, he is restored to the Kingsguard and has a dramatic change of heart about himself. Previously selfish and uninterested in honor, he now wishes to change his legacy. He shows concern for Brienne and Sansa Stark, his relationship with his twin sister and lover Cersei falls apart, and he betrays his family by rescuing Tyrion from execution. At the end of the previous novel, Jon and his commander were captured by the wildlings, and Jon was instructed to feign joining them to gather information. He learns that a horde of undead creatures called the Others has begun moving south, which is why the wildlings are heading toward The Wall. He also starts a

relationship with Ygritte, a wildling woman, and falls in love with her. When the invasion comes, Jon bravely helps lead the defense, but a faction of the Watch with a personal grudge against him accuses him of being a traitor and imprisons him. He is told he can only prove his loyalty by killing Mance Rayder, which is essentially a suicide mission. While the wildlings continue to siege The Wall, King Stannis arrives with his forces and drives the wildlings off. Stannis has Jon freed and offers to make him the Lord of Winterfell, a title Jon could never have held because he was a bastard. At the same time, he is chosen by his brothers as the new Lord Commander of the Watch since the previous one has died, and he must decide whether he wants to rule over Winterfell or remain in the Watch. He is on a ranging expedition with his brothers in the Watch when their company is attacked by undead creatures referred to as the Others. The cowardly Sam manages to kill an Other with an obsidian blade and he realizes they are vulnerable to obsidian and fire. Sam escapes with Gilly, whose newborn baby he has sworn to protect. They are chased by Others and are ultimately rescued by a mysterious undead man called Coldhands. Having escaped from Winterfell in the last novel, Bran Stark, meanwhile, is on the run with his caretakers Hodor, Meera, and Jojen. He feels driven to head north to The Wall because of a recurring vision he has. While they march, Bran, who is a warg, or skinchanger, spends more and more time inside the mind of his wolf, Summer, as his supernatural abilities continue to grow stronger. Ultimately they arrive at The Wall and meet the mysterious Coldhands, who takes them through it via the ancient Black Gate. In the east, Daenerys Tagaryen needs to raise an army to invade Westeros and reclaim her crown. Immediately after buying them, she turns them against their former masters and has all the slaves in the city set free. Lastly she turns to Meereen, and as they approach the city they find the Meereenese have nailed a slave child to a post every mile along the road. The city has massive walls though, and there is no obvious way to take the city. While they are encamped in front of it, Daenerys learns that her closest aides, Arstan Whitebeard and Ser Jorah Mormont, have lied to her. Whitebeard is actually Ser Baristan Selmy, a former knight of the Kingsguard who sought out Daenerys as the rightful ruler of the Seven Kingdoms. Ser Jorah, on the other hand, had been selling information on her to spies from Westeros, though he stopped some time ago. Daenerys offers them a chance to redeem themselves by sneaking into Meereen through the sewers and opening the doors. Reports come back that a new ruler has taken over Astapor, and that he is more brutal to the slaves than those who ruled before.

I have to admit to not enjoying Clash of Kings overly, something I discovered placed me in a minority. Looking back I feel that I was a bit lazy when reading it, characters are thrown at you at a not inconsiderable rate of knots and you can either use the handy cast of characters at the beginning of the book to refresh your memory when you get lost or you can do what I didâ€¦ carry on regardless hoping that everything will become clear in time. I was determined not to let this confusion happen again and to use the glossary, maps and personae dramatis to ensure that I knew what was going on, where it was going on and to whom it was happening. This effort was fully rewarded and I began to realise just why George RR Martin is held in such high esteem. A Song of Ice and Fire is told through the eyes of characters who are sometimes hundreds or even thousands of miles apart from one another. Some chapters cover a day, some only an hour; others might span a fortnight, a month, half a year. With such a structure, the narrative cannot be strictly sequential, sometimes important things are happening simultaneously, a thousand leagues apart. In the case of the volume now in hand, the reader should realize that the opening chapters of A Storm of Swords do not follow the closing chapters of A Clash of Kings so much as overlap them. A note on chronology Who were the main characters? Martin creates fantastic characters, rich in detail and emotion; quite how he manages to avoid making mistakes and contradictions is beyond me. The characters are many and varied but rich in detail and realistic. George RR Martin strength is the way in which the characters evolve, both in terms of maturity and emotionally. This all goes together to create a very fast-paced and extremely enjoyable story, the chapter structure really works. There is, of course, always the risk that the flow of the story may be lost by continually switching the perspective between so many characters but Martin manages to avoid this by overlapping the individual storylines very cleverly. The land of Westeros is described in excellent detail, much of it war-ravaged and damaged and the author paints a rather desolate picture of a land being destroyed by civil war. The feelings and attitudes of the main characters are described in depth and each takes on a life of their own. A Song of Ice and Fire is a wonderful story with the author drawing inspiration from the annals of history. The Others beyond the Wall, Daenerys and her dragons, Melisandre and her dark magic, Beric Dondarrion and his apparent immortality. These are the parts of that lift the book from a tale of political intrigue and battles and into the wonderful realm of fantasy. Not seven, not one, not a hundred or a thousand. Do you think I crossed half the world to put yet another vain king on yet another empty throne? The war has been waged since time began, and before it is done, all men must choose where they stand. Ours is not a choice between Baratheon and Lannister, between Greyjoy and Stark. It is death we choose, or life. The great ruby at her throat seemed to pulse with its own radiance.
