A List of the Mitzvot Commandments Level: Advanced Jewish tradition teaches that there are commandments This is the list of identified by Rambam The order and organization is my own Below is a list of the mitzvot commandments. It is based primarily on the list compiled by Rambam in the Mishneh Torah, but I have consulted other sources as well. The order is my own, as are the explanations of how some rules are derived from some biblical passages. For each mitzvah, I have provided a citation to the biblical passage or passages from which it is derived, based primarily on Rambam. Commandments that cannot be observed today primarily relate to the Temple , its sacrifices and services because the Temple does not exist and criminal procedures because the theocratic state of Israel does not exist. The Story Hour Vol. The son of an Orthodox Rabbi, Mr. Nodel began his illustrious career as a field artist in the army, drawing military maps during World War II. Serving with the United States forces in Europe, he won medals for his courage, and helped in the liberation of Europe from German fascism. During the last twelve years of his life, Mr. Nodel devoted a major amount of his time and energy to illustrating books and magazines specifically for Jewish children, which gave him great pleasure and satisfaction. Nodel began working in the Jewish market in , when he started illustrating for Tzivos Hashem and The Moshiah Times. His talent literally "cornered the market," to the extent that there can hardly be an affiliated Jewish child today who is not familiar with his work. One might well say that Mr. Nodel raised and educated in his own way, a whole generation of Jewish children, with his work appearing virtually all over the world, in America, Europe, Israel, Russia, Australia, and South America. He was a truly special person, whose gentle wit and elegant charm are reflected in the graceful strokes of his drawings. In all his work, one sees the same qualities of modesty, pride in being Jewish, and warmth and affection for others, together with a unique elegance of style, integrity, and even a nobility of character. He was a living example of derech eretz and respect for others. He treated everyone who came to him as if they were the only one he worked for, and as a result, everyone felt that he belonged solely to them. He loved to joke around, and always liked to have the last pun. Nodel worked to the last day of his life, and despite crippling arthritis, he never complained, but rather always put himself out to meet deadlines for all those who counted on him. And he never did. He will be sorely missed by family, friends, and scores of clients who all became his friends, and Jewish children everywhere. She received her undergraduate and masters degree in art education in New York City, and went on to study drawing and painting at the Ecole des Beaux Arts Fontainebleau in France. The illustrator credits her parents and the Bais Chana Institute in Minnesota for imbuing her with a love of Judaism. For over a decade "Morah Rifka," as she is known, has taught preschool at the Lubavitch Cheder in Minnesota. This is her first book for children. Gerber has a son living in Boulder, Colorado, a daughter living in Chicago, and a stepdaughter in Austin, Texas. The artist lives in Grayson, Georgia with his wife. She taught, elementary and middle grade, English for twenty years. Ruby currently lives in Atlanta, Georgia with her family. She has been freelancing for clients in both Europe and the United States for the last two years. Sarah currently resides in Jerusalem with her husband. Rochel and her family went through various Displaced Persons camps throughout Europe and came to the USA when she was four years old. The extended Deitsch Family lived near each other in a small Connecticut town. Bubbe Hinda and Zayde Mendel lived in the apartment above her family while Rochel attended elementary school. The entire extended Deitsch Family moved to larger communities which had Yeshivas and Day Schools to make certain that the children would get religious education. 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To show that no information is lost, we can convert the output back to the original tree like this: Encoding general trees as binary trees[ edit ] There is a one-to-one mapping between general ordered trees and binary trees, which in particular is used by Lisp to represent general ordered trees as binary trees. To convert a general ordered tree to binary tree, we only need to represent the general tree in left-child right-sibling way. The result of this representation will automatically be a binary tree, if viewed from a different perspective. This binary tree representation of a general order tree is sometimes also referred to as a left-child right-sibling binary tree LCRS tree , or a doubly chained tree , or a Filial-Heir chain. It can be converted into the binary tree on the right. The binary tree can be thought of as the original tree tilted sideways, with the black left edges representing first child and the blue right edges representing next sibling. The leaves of the tree on the left would be written in Lisp as: Tree rotations are very common internal operations on self-balancing binary trees. There are a variety of different operations that can be performed on binary trees. Some are mutator operations, while others simply return useful information about the tree. Insertion[ edit ] Nodes can be inserted into binary trees in between two other nodes or added after a leaf node. In binary trees, a node that is inserted is specified as to which child it is. Leaf nodes[ edit ] To add a new node after leaf node A, A assigns the new node as one of its children and the new node assigns node A as its parent. Internal nodes[ edit ] The process of inserting a node into a binary tree Insertion on internal nodes is slightly more complex than on leaf nodes. Say that the internal node is node A and that node B is the child of A. If the insertion is to insert a right child, then B is the right child of A, and similarly with a left child insertion. A assigns its child to the new node and the new node assigns its parent to A. Then the new node assigns its child to B and B assigns its parent as the new node. Deletion[ edit ] Deletion is the process whereby a node is removed from the tree. Only certain nodes in a binary tree can be removed unambiguously. Node with two children[ edit ] In a binary tree, a node with two children cannot be deleted unambiguously. Tree traversal Pre-order, in-order, and post-order traversal visit each node in a tree by recursively visiting each node in the left and right subtrees of the root. Depth-first order[ edit ] In depth-first order, we always attempt to visit the node farthest from the root node that we can, but with the caveat that it must be a child of a node we have already visited. Unlike a depth-first search on graphs, there is no need to remember all the nodes we have visited, because a tree cannot contain cycles. Pre-order is a special case of this. See depth-first search for more information. Breadth-first order[ edit ] Contrasting with depth-first order is breadth-first order, which always attempts to visit the node closest to the root that it has not already visited. See breadth-first search for more information. Also called a level-order traversal. The process continues by successively checking the next bit to the right until there are no more.
