

## 1: Alaska's Watchable Whales

Come aboard, meet your crew, and unpack your adventurous spirit. Your course is set for glaciers, and the Tongass—the largest national forest in the U. Grab a hot cup of joe and take it all in from the bow. A lazy harbor seal or two. Layer up with gloves and a warm hat, and hop in a skiff for a better look at the glacier—the temps drop the closer you get. Your expedition guide clues you in to signs of the ice ages that carved this landscape. The geology is fascinating and so is the wildlife. Keep an eye out for mountain goats, bears, and eagles. Make waves for Stephens Passage. The glacial valley is a nesting hot-spot for arctic terns. If tides are low, take a boot-sucking walk to check out icebergs resting on the mudflats. Or test your balance paddle boarding in this quiet cove. Count the many totems on their foot pole. Drop the kayaks in Saginaw Bay or some other hidden cove along the Keku Islands. Black bears are common sights along shore. But so are eagles in the treetops and orange-billed surf scoters paddling nearby. For hikers, your guides have a route in mind. Make for the forest, far off the map. The up-welling of nutrients in the water make it an irresistible feeding ground. At Baranof Island, your top-notch expedition team has the game plan dialed. Tap some of the most untouched wilderness in the Tongass. Head to the woods for an adventuresome bushwhack. Or slide into a kayak for an easygoing shoreline paddle. Its western side is dotted with hundreds of coves and uninhabited islands. This is a prime area for spotting sea otters. The protected beaches are made for exploring the intertidal zones, and spotting bears. So, boot up for a guided hike. End your day with celebration and a toast at a heartfelt Farewell Dinner. DAY 8 Sitka — Disembarkation A last breakfast with new friends, then disembark in Sitka for your transfer to the airport or to your UnCruise hotel stay or land tour. 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Alaska Marine Mammals What is the best time to cruise Alaska to see whales? Luckily this coincides with the best time of year to take an Alaskan cruise. From May through September there are many opportunities to see whales from the deck of an Alaskan cruise ship. For those wanting to get closer and be guaranteed to see whales, there are whale watching cruises departing Juneau that will fill your every wish. Whales begin their migration from the warm waters of Mexico in February arriving in Alaska waters in April. Various species of whales can be seen throughout Alaska during the months of May through September. It is not uncommon for cruise passengers to see whales right from the deck of the ship. However, you will increase your chances of seeing whales by taking a whale watching tour. The smaller boats allow you to get a closer view of the whales and you will most likely receive interesting facts about the local whale pods from your guide. Best time for Viewing Whales in Alaska. They can be spotted as they move to the far north Alaska waters of the Bering Sea by late April. Beluga whales can be seen along Cook Inlet heading south from Anchorage along what is known as Turnagain Arm in the spring through fall months. There are no known known to us dedicated whale watching tour boats operating in the Cook Inlet. During the summer months you will see Humpback whales in the Barren Islands between Homer and Kodiak. June and July are the best months for seeing these enormous whales feeding using bubble-netting. Blue whales can best be seen in the northern and eastern portion of the Gulf of Alaska in July and August. They are more likely seen in open water and rarely near the shoreline. They can be seen near Seward Alaska in the waters of Resurrection Bay. We hope that you found this page helpful in determining the best time to see whales in Alaska.
