Thoreau, along with 39 of his freshman classmates, signs a petition opposing the student ranking system at Harvard University: To the Honourable Faculty of Harvard University, The undersigned members of the Freshman class, believing it to be the sole object of your honourable body to act in such manner as best to promote the interests of those under your immediate control, and deeming it their duty as well as privilege to make known to your body in conjunction with others their feelings ask leave to present for your consideration their views on the system of rank at present adopted. We have no doubt that the original design of this system was good, But at the present time instead of being as it was probably intended by those who introduced it a consequence resulting from labour with higher and nobler motive in view, it has become in a great degree the primary and sole object and with its attainment, in whatever manner, all exertion ceases. That this system tends to produce envy and jealousy among those whose interests require that they should at least in some degree be united we think is evident. We believe moreover that the time has arrived when literary standing must depend on something more than mere college rank, when a nobler motive must prompt the student to action than the petty emulation of the school-boy, when he must have a higher standard of action than the mere marks of his instructor. Again we think the direct tendency of this system to produce superficial scholars is as strong argument in favour of its abolition. So long as this system of rank is the criterion by which his scholarship is to be judged it will be his endeavour not so much to become thoroughly acquainted with a subject as to study it in such a manner as will best insure his success in the recitation room. Impressed with these views we submit them to your consideration with the request that some measures may be taken for the abolition of that system which has produced so universal dissatisfaction. 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Stone[edit] Marble is not found especially close to Rome, and was only rarely used there before Augustus , who famously boasted that he had found Rome made of brick and left it made of marble, though this was mainly as a facing for brick or concrete. Travertine limestone was found much closer, around Tivoli , and was used from the end of the Republic; the Colosseum is mainly built of this stone, which has good load-bearing capacity, with a brick core. Imports from Greece for this purpose began in the 2nd century BC. Roman brick Close-up view of the wall of the Roman shore fort at Burgh Castle , Norfolk, showing alternating courses of flint and brickwork. The Romans made fired clay bricks from about the beginning of the Empire, replacing earlier sun-dried mud-brick. Roman brick was almost invariably of a lesser height than modern brick, but was made in a variety of different shapes and sizes. Other brick sizes in ancient Rome included 24" x 12" x 4", and 15" x 8" x 10". Ancient Roman bricks found in France measured 8" x 8" x 3". The Romans perfected brick-making during the first century of their empire and used it ubiquitously, in public and private construction alike. The Romans took their brickmaking skills everywhere they went, introducing the craft to the local populations. The use of bricks in southern and western Germany , for example, can be traced back to traditions already described by the Roman architect Vitruvius. In the British Isles , the introduction of Roman brick by the ancient Romans was followed by a " year gap in major brick production. Roman concrete[edit] Example of opus caementicium on a tomb on the ancient Appian Way in Rome. The original covering has been removed. Roman concrete Concrete quickly supplanted brick as the primary building material,[citation needed] and more daring buildings soon followed, with great pillars supporting broad arches and domes rather than dense lines of columns suspending flat architraves. The freedom of concrete also inspired the colonnade screen, a row of purely decorative columns in front of a load-bearing wall. Although concrete had been used on a minor scale in Mesopotamia, Roman architects perfected Roman concrete and used it in buildings where it could stand on its own and support a great deal of weight. The first use of concrete by the Romans was in the town of Cosa sometime after BC. Ancient Roman concrete was a mixture of lime mortar , aggregate, pozzolana , water, and stones , and was stronger than previously-used concretes. The ancient builders placed these ingredients in wooden frames where they hardened and bonded to a facing of stones or more frequently bricks. The aggregates used were often much larger than in modern concrete, amounting to rubble. When the framework was removed, the new wall was very strong, with a rough surface of bricks or stones. This surface could be smoothed and faced with an attractive stucco or thin panels of marble or other coloured stones called revetment. Concrete construction proved to be more flexible and less costly than building solid stone buildings. The materials were readily available and not difficult to transport. The wooden frames could be used more than once, allowing builders to work quickly and efficiently. Concrete is arguably the Roman contribution most relevant to modern architecture.

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They defeated the Sabines near Tibur , and received a triumph. Consul again in BC, he defeated either the Aurunci or the Sabines, and received either a second triumph or the first ovation. He was consul in Albus Regillensis , consul in BC, and subsequently one of the ambassadors sent to study Greek law. He was a member of the first decemvirate in As a legate in , he commanded the center of the Roman line in an important victory over the Aequi and Volsci. Albus Regillensis , consul in BC, fought against the Aequi. On a subsequent occasion he was sent as an ambassador to the Aequi, but was treated with contempt. Albus Regillensis , consular tribune in BC. Albinus Regillensis , consular tribune in BC, was killed in a mutiny after refusing to distribute the spoils of the town of Bolae , which the soldiers had been promised. Albinus Regillensis , censor in BC, imposed a fine on men who did not marry before they were elderly. Consul for the second time in , during the Second Samnite War , he and his colleague were trapped at the Battle of the Caudine Forks , and their entire army forced to go under the yoke. Albinus, became Rex Sacrorum circa BC. The Pontifex Maximus forbade him to leave Rome in order to participate in the war, on the grounds that he was the Flamen Martialis. He was censor in Albinus , consul in and BC, fought against the Illyrians. He was elected consul for the third time in , but slain by the Boii before entering into office. Albinus , consul in BC, the year that the senate took action to prohibit the worship of Bacchus at Rome, following a general panic over the secret and allegedly terrible rites. Albinus Luscus , consul in BC, fought against the Ligurians. As censor in BC, he and his colleague expelled nine members of the senate, and degraded a number of equites. He was sent on a number of diplomatic missions, and was one of the commissioners sent to assist Lucius Aemilius Paullus Macedonicus restore order to Macedonia in Albinus , praetor in BC, was assigned the province of Hispania Ulterior , where he defeated the Vaccei and Lusitani , and received a triumph. Consul in BC, he restored the Floralia , and dealt with land disputes in Campania. Albinus , as curule aedile in BC, gave the Megalesia. He was consul in , but died shortly after leaving Rome. A rumour circulated that he had been poisoned by his wife. As consul in , he was imprisoned by the tribunes of the plebs for pursuing the levy with too much vigor. Later an ambassador to Greece, where he was well received, he wrote extensively in Greek, including a history of Rome, which was poorly regarded by other writers. He was consul in BC, and during his year of office, much of the city was destroyed in a great fire. Albinus, triumvir monetalis in BC. Albinus , consul in BC, had command of the war against Jugurtha , but took no offensive action, either through indecision, susceptibility to the deceptions of the Numidian king, or, some alleged, bribery. He was subsequently condemned by the lex Mamilia, a law punishing those who had aided Jugurtha. Albinus , propraetor in BC, was placed by his brother, the consul Spurius, in command of the Roman army in Numidia, but was tempted into an ambush and defeated by Jugurtha, and forced to submit, together with the survivors of his army. Albinus , an orator praised by Cicero, was consul in 99 BC. When Sulla took charge of them, he made no effort to punish the killers. Albinus, triumvir monetalis in 81 BC, was a grandson of Spurius, the consul of Caesar placed him in command of his fleet during the Civil War, but Brutus would become one of his assassins. Postumii Megelli[edit] Lucius Postumius S. Consul for the second time in , during the Third Samnite War, he defeated the Samnites and the Etruscans , and received a triumph. In his third consulship, BC , he captured Cominium, but made a number of enemies through his conduct, and was fined a previously unheard-of , asses. He was condemned despite considerable support from the other publicani and one of the tribunes of the plebs , but went into exile before sentence could be passed. He also sought out fugitives alleged to have celebrated the Bacchanalia , after the panic attending the discovery of the rites at Rome. Postumius volunteered to be placed in chains, and put to death if he proved mistaken. He may be the same Postumius who refused the command in Sicily in 49 BC. Caesar sent him to Italy in order to arrange the passage of his army. Antonius had him murdered. He was the master of Gaius Cocceius, who after receiving his freedom built the temple of Augustus at Puteoli.

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
