*The Global Teacher Prize is a US \$1million dollar award, presented annually to an exceptional teacher who has made an outstanding contribution to the profession. The Varkey Foundation established the prize in , to recognise and celebrate the impact that teachers have around the world - not only on their students, but on the communities.*

Teachers have the power to make or break lives. A great lesson can inspire a passion for a subject that lasts a lifetime, while lacklustre teaching can kill any desire for learning. To engage her students, Salima believes that classroom activities should correspond closely to real-life situations. Salima has made a major contribution to teacher training, instructing more than 7, teachers across her province, and 8, more throughout Pakistan. If he were to win the prize, he would use the funds to support charitable work improving computer science education in the UK and Africa. Wemerson da Silva Nogueira â€” Brazil Science teacher Wemerson began his career in a suburb with a very high crime rate. If he were to win the prize, Wemerson would use the money to create a foundation supporting the training of young teachers. The participatory and collaborative nature of her sports project has helped refugee children in Germany from countries like Iran integrate more readily into German society. If she were to win the prize, Marie-Christine would use the funds to develop online services to enable mentoring and partnering between students in developed and developing nations. She left school to train as an automotive technician. Training other mechanics gave her a lifelong love of teaching. In her first teaching role she took a group of boys who had been written off educationally. Tracy-Ann transformed their performance and ambitions. One went on to become head boy, others joined the school choir. She also started and oversaw a programme for her class to feed street people, launch a junior automotive club and work on the school magazine. Maggie has worked as a teacher in a village called Salluit, the second northernmost Inuit community in Quebec. Initiatives include her students running a community kitchen, attending suicide prevention training and partnering with the day care centre. In addition, Maggie has created a life skills programme specifically for girls to combat the complex gender issues in the community: If Maggie wins the prize she will establish a non-profit to support youth engagement, culture preservation and global citizenship. In his lessons Ken uses a variety of multimedia projects together with integration of wider issues such as environmental science and sustainability. If he wins the prize, Ken will use the funds to devise a training program for teachers in developing countries. Home to , people, Kibera is an unlikely setting for a ballet school. Mar 11, 6: The interview went well, and she was soon flying a world away to Salluit, Que. A teacher, a coach, a mentor Salluit is a picturesque, windswept spot not far from the Hudson Strait, the second-most northern community in the province. Not long after she arrived, MacDonnell was joined by the man who is now her husband, Abdullah Kafashe, a strapping Tanzanian. He was the only African and only Muslim in Salluit. Students from Salluit win big at national science fair Maggie MacDonnell says her husband, Abdullah Kafashe, has been an important part of her success. But her involvement quickly went beyond the classroom. MacDonnell became the fitness coordinator for the village and started a running club in Salluit. Local police force Capt. The space needed a good cleaning and a paint job. But the biggest challenge was getting fitness equipment to the remote community. Not to be deterred, the community hired local hunters to bring the fitness gear back. MacDonnell and her husband coach the team. But for six months MacDonnell just rolled her eyes. She finally agreed when he reframed his proposition, arguing her nomination could bring awareness of issues facing Indigenous youth. She prefers to see her work as a team effort with her students, colleagues and husband. If MacDonnell wins, she plans to use the prize money to help "reawaken a love for the land" among Inuit youth with an environmental stewardship project. She hopes to create a kayak program so Inuit can access the land more easily, affordably and counter some of the effects of colonialism. Statistics Canada says family, education important indicators for Inuit health Maggie MacDonnell left helped build a fitness centre in Salluit, Que. She believes making them more available will encourage Inuit youth to become environmental leaders. But, she added, if we "expect Indigenous youth to be activists and protectors of the land we need to build programs to help support them, building it with them, of course. Her school board has agreed to send at least two students with her. MacDonnell and her husband were heartbroken when they learned in February they were being transferred to Kuujuaq, more than kilometres away. Inuit in Northern Quebec look to local solutions to tackle suicide As MacDonnell walked the streets of Salluit before her departure, she was constantly being approached by community members who shook her hand and told her she would be missed. But the fitness centre she established is not going anywhere.

*For 25 years, Nancie Atwell has run a small, independent K-8 school in Maine, where the goal is not just teaching young students, but also teachers.*

In a recent article in *The Atlantic* exploring why a whopping percent of all teachers choose to quit the profession within their first five years in the classroom, the reasons cited range from a lack of respect and professional support, to being underpaid, overworked, and generally burnt out. The symptoms of a crippled American education system are evident throughout our daily news cycles. Yet despite the increasing number of obstacles and frustrations with which public school teachers must contend, there continue to be thousands of educators across the country who remain deeply invested in their work and their students, and are finding creative ways not just to subsist within a flawed system, but to flourish. So why is it that some teachers are succeeding so exquisitely while others struggle? This is the driving question behind my new book *American Teacher: Heroes in the Classroom*, which shines a spotlight on fifty truly outstanding teachers and invites readers into their classrooms to witness their methods, achievements, and impact firsthand. From their example, there is so much to be learned, not just about what it takes to triumph as a teacher, but about the strengths and weaknesses of our national educational system, and about what can be done to make it better. The brilliant educators featured in *American Teacher* represent a wide assortment of backgrounds, academic subjects, experience levels, scholastic environments, and student demographics. Yet regardless of their many outward differences, there are certain shared ideas and principles about teaching that can be gleaned from all their profiles. Of course there are no absolutes when it comes to defining the formula for great teaching see Rule 1 as case in point! Rules are made to be broken. All for one, and one for all. I believe this is just as important as creating an exceptional curriculum. Bring your passions into the classroom. These are critical skills that have the power to open up new worlds of opportunities. My poetry provides an entry point for my students to engage in literature, and empowers them to delve into text when they may have otherwise been hesitant to do so. Never teach to the test. There is no such thing as an un-teachable child. Of course they can learn. Of course they can love school. Of course they can build good relationships. Of course they have a voice. They just need to learn how to use it. Necessity is the mother of all invention. My solution was bucket drumming. I had the idea to go to Home Depot and buy a bunch of five-gallon paint buckets to use as drums. The kids loved it. Produce good people, not just good students. I want them to be decent even though they are growing up in an environment surrounded by indecency and a media that celebrates awful behavior. The future is now. Be the person you want your students to become. I take the time to try to understand each of them personally; I make myself available during lunch hours, free periods, and after school. Through seeing that my motivations lie with their success and not my own track record, the students come to their own conclusions about my sincerity. It is after this realization that I begin to see my students, one by one, meeting me halfway. The magic formula in education is not hiring the right person. Be a student of your students. If you can look at that reflection, you will really learn about yourself. That humbles me and brings me to tears when I talk about it. Because in the beginning, I was scared of what I saw. Kids find the cracks in your armor. It is not that they set out to, they just do. But if you are willing to step back and reflect, you can grow so much. It is a wonderful, unexpected caveat. You think you are going to teach, but boy, do you learn.
