2: A Guide to the Business Analysis Body of Knowledge (BABOK) - A Book Review

The Business Analysis Body of Knowledge (BABOK) is a repository of knowledge maintained by practicing business analysis professionals. It details what are currently deemed to be accepted practices within the profession.

Note; BABOK is not intended to give guidance upon the responsibility and role of a person working with the job title business analyst. Instead its function is to define and describe the actual discipline of business analysis and the methodologies and techniques used in its implementation. Whilst it does outline the knowledge, tasks and activities which a business analyst would need to know about, it does not teach or offer any perspective upon how to perform business analysis. It is a repository of knowledge, not a teaching aid. However, they do provide information detailing what a business analyst would need to know in order to utilize a given methodology. Whilst the knowledge areas do seem to follow a progressive sequence, this should not be taken as an indication that it should be used as a step-by-step guide to performing the job of a business analyst.

Business Analysis Planning and Monitoring - This knowledge area contains information on how we determine exactly which activities we employ in order to perform a specific iteration of business analysis. Covered in this section is the selection of the business analysis technique to be employed, identification of stakeholders and the process which will be used to manage requirements as well as how assessment will be performed.

Requirements Management and Communication - This knowledge area covers the fundamentals of how we manage any conflicts or problems which arise, and ensure that both the project team and the stakeholders remain in agreement when issues occur and solutions are put forth. This knowledge area also covers considerations for projects which are using a complex methodology, which may require formal signoff on scope changes, version tracking of requirements documents and timeline auditing.

Enterprise Analysis - This BABOK knowledge area defines how we start with a business need, and clarify this definition, until we reach a stage where we can begin to scope out a proper solution. Feasibility studies, business cases and definition of scope are covered in this knowledge area.

Elicitation - This knowledge area covers the way in which a business analyst needs to interface with stakeholders. How to find out exactly what their needs are and how to ensure that we have understood these needs entirely.

Requirements Analysis - This area of knowledge contains a description of how to refine and elaborate on a solution to ensure that the project team will be able to deploy a solution that will fill the needs of stakeholders exactly. This involves taking the stated requirements of the stakeholder, and analyzing them, to form an assessment as to whether the stated needs are valid for the business as a whole.

Solution Assessment and Validation - In this knowledge area we switch to discussing the role of business analysis once the project team have a proposed solution on the table. It covers the assessment of a solution to determine if it suits the needs of the business, and to discover any shortcomings or omissions, specifying changes if needed. Additionally, this knowledge area covers how we assess the success of solutions which have been deployed, and to discern if they have fully met the requirements of the stakeholder.

Underlying Competencies - This knowledge area discusses tertiary knowledge, methodologies and behavior which either support or affect the process of business analysis.

BABOK in Conclusion BABOK makes a huge range of information and knowledge available not only to business analysts, but anyone who finds themselves such as stakeholders involved in the process of business analysis. Although BABOK cannot be considered to be anything akin to a textbook, it does contain a wealth of strategically valuable information.

Business analysis is the set of tasks and techniques used to work as a liaison among stakeholders in order to understand the structure, policies, and operations of an organization, and to recommend solutions that enable the organization to achieve its goals.

Bielza Laurence described the reference book as containing precious guidelines in how to conduct business analysis. Chapter 1 provides the introduction, divided into eight sections. This chapter discusses what the BABOK is, what business analysis is, its key concepts, knowledge areas, tasks, and other topics. Chapters 2 to 7 discusses the six knowledge areas of BA planning and monitoring, elicitation, requirements management and communication, enterprise analysis, requirements analysis, and solution assessment and validation. Chapter 8 discusses the underlying competencies such as analytical thinking, problem solving, behavioral characteristics, etc. And finally, Chapter 9 discusses the techniques such as evaluation criteria definition, benchmarking, and brainstorming, among others. The presentation of the topics is straightforward. Terms are defined and topics are divided into sections, subsections and short paragraphs, with appropriate headers. Some readers struggle with the language, but understandably, familiarization of the topics is needed before reading. This is not an introductory book about business analysis but a reference for those who have working experience as analysts. Certified business analysts as well as project managers performing BA functions will find this a handy reference that can remind them of the baseline knowledge they should have and refresh them with best practice standards they should apply. For example, there is emphasis on what the BABOK Guide actually is; business analysis as a profession; the relationship among knowledge areas, tasks, and techniques; and other underlying competencies that are required to be a successful business analyst. Chapter two begins digging into the knowledge areas with Business Analysis Planning and Monitoring. In fact, I believe that this knowledge area will only make sense after several of the other knowledge areas are read. Nevertheless, the chapter provides a good introduction to the six tasks of Business Analysis Planning and Monitoring. Chapter three is the chapter that I would recommend starting with because it covers the Elicitation knowledge area. Elicitation is an iterative process that occurs throughout the business analysis lifecycle. As such, its tasks are extremely vital. Chapter four is another iterative knowledge area, Requirements Management and Communication. Requirements Management and Communication is another knowledge area that spans the entire business analysis lifecycle, and its five tasks enable the business analyst to ensure that all of the requirements are managed effectively and that they are appropriately communicated throughout an organization. Chapter five is a great chapter that relates to the Enterprise Analysis knowledge area. During this knowledge area, the business analyst completes five tasks to ensure understanding of a business need so that a business case can be created. Personally, I have found this to be one of the best chapters in the BABOK Guide, and the five tasks can apply to any kind of business need. Chapter six is my favorite chapter; however, it is one of the most complex chapters. It covers the Requirements Analysis knowledge area. It is during Requirements Analysis that a tremendous amount of business analysis work is completed. Chapter seven covers the final knowledge area, Solution Assessment and Validation. Once a solution has been built and during its construction, a business analyst still has a lot of work to complete. There are six tasks in this knowledge area: Chapter eight presents a collection of underlying competencies. I greatly enjoy this chapter; however, I wish there were even more information presented. Of course, each of the six underlying competencies could be its own book! Finally, chapter nine includes details about all of the general techniques that are referenced throughout the six knowledge area chapters. A general technique is one that could be used by any number of tasks in various knowledge areas. Because of their wide applicability, they are all listed in their own chapter alphabetically. There are 34 general techniques defined by IIBA. While I wish that they were integrated more tightly with the individual tasks that use them with more specific examples of how they could be used for the tasks, I understand why they are placed in their own chapter. Incidentally, there are also 15 specific techniques. Each one of these relates to only one task in the entire BABOK Guide, so they are described when they are encountered in each chapter. For anyone interested in effective business analysis, this book would be an excellent addition to your library.
