Can you afford to properly feed a chimpanzee and get it the regular veterinary care it needs? These questions are just the tip of the iceberg when considering any primate for a pet. Chimpanzees do not make good pets and there are many people, even current owners of chimps, that can attest to that.

But you live in reality, and most likely, you already know that having a primate as a pet is a bad idea. You may be aware that the systems in place to breed pets do not have the best interests of animals at heart, resulting in much trauma to the creatures involved. Even the day-to-day minutiae of life as a pet causes naturally social and inquisitive primates to suffer physically and mentally. You probably wish to avoid the illnesses that can be passed between pet primates and their human owners, such as Herpes B, Ebola, monkey pox, tuberculosis, shigellosis and Hepatitis A and more. You may be concerned with animal rights in general and believe inherently that primates should not live the confined, solitary and sedentary life of a pet. But did you know that the process of buying a pet primate can be dangerous to you too? If you are really determined to buy a monkey or ape or you are really foolish, your legal purchasing options vary depending on what state you live in. Thirteen other states require some sort of permit to own a primate pet, and the remaining seven states have some regulation in terms of proper animal care in general but otherwise have no jurisdiction over pet primates. Life with an unhappy pet primate can be miserable, if not downright life-threatening, for the human owner. Courts are recognizing this and the window of states which allow the sale of primates is closing. The breeders who supply primates to the pet industry are highly unregulated and rather cunning. They breed their animals to turn a profit, and try to circumnavigate laws affecting their business. Primates bred in the United States are taken from their mothers at infancy, as younger pets are considered more desirable. In the wild, they would enjoy maternal nurturing for years, and so the pets that are denied this chance often exhibit aberrant behavior involving compulsive self-injury, rocking, and aggression. Breeder education to the buyer is often little to nonexistent when it comes to properly caring for the needs of a new primate pet. As veterinarian Thomas J. I can say with certainty that two hours is barely enough time to realize that you will never know everything you need to know about monkeys. Do you still want a pet primate? If you live in a state that prohibits the sale of exotic pets, a person with the right amount of dedication and cash could procure a pet monkey on the Internet without much trouble at all. And then “surprise! Underground trade in wildlife is a multi-billion dollar industry worldwide. Illegal exotic animal dealers operate under all radars, meaning the animals they breed and sell have no guarantees when it comes to their health, manageability and upkeep. What is promised to the buyer may be completely false at worst, and unrealistic at best, often leaving the buyer stuck with an uncontrollable or ill animal and no protections to get his money back. Owners are often reluctant to report aggression, injury or find veterinary care for primates they illegally harbor in their home. This happened again in Arkansas in early Such dishonesty and extortion is not an isolated incident. In October, a parking-lot exchange over the sale of a capuchin monkey turned dangerous when the potential buyer pepper-sprayed the woman selling her pet before he grabbed the pet and stole him. This occurred in Colorado, where private ownership of capuchins is illegal. These nonprofit organizations, like NAPSA member Primate Rescue Center, provide life-long care to primates, many of whom were rescued from deplorable situations where they were kept as pets. Primate sanctuaries need your help! Demand for sanctuary care grows with every year because increasing numbers of pets are either rescued or voluntarily handed over when their owners can no longer properly care for them. These pet owners either did not heed warnings like those in this article, or unwisely thought they would beat the odds. In the end, both they and their pets suffered as a result. Do not support primate breeders and do not buy pets from illegal pet vendors. Focus your attention instead on making that unicorn ride through a rainbow come true.

2: Marmosets as pets - Marmoset Care Sheet

Are you ready to care for a monkey as a pet? Being a monkey owner is NOT for everyone, it is for a rare type of person. I do not recommend anyone to obtain a primate, unless they have done the proper RESEARCH.

Chosen for their intelligence and companionship, it is for these characteristics that a primate is a both challenging and rewarding pet. Younger, more rare and friendlier monkeys tend to cost more. Ferret , Chinchilla What should be included: Monkeys are a labor-intensive pet choice. Homes must be monkey-proofed and care taken when visitors are present in the home, as monkeys are curious, mischievous and, at times, aggressive. Most monkeys must be diapered or cleaned up after; fed, and played with often. Because of their curiosity, monkeys are considered endlessly entertaining and even thought provoking to their owners. Unless a person in the house will spend most of their time at home, primate experts recommend owning more than one, as monkeys are prone to depression if left alone even for short periods of time. Monkey owners say owning a monkey is a rewarding and enriching experience. Squirrel monkeys are easier to handle than other species because they are smaller and not as strong as, for example, the capuchin. On the other hand, squirrel monkeys are less friendly than their larger counterparts, which range from one to two feet tall. Other common pet monkeys include spider monkeys, marmosets and macaques. Price depends on size and durability. A monkey cage should include a nesting box, branches, blankets and toys. Most monkeys eat fruits and vegetables plus some animal protein, such as poultry, worms and insects. Supplement whole foods with a commercially made monkey chow, which is similar to a dry dog or cat food but is specialized for monkeys. Shopping for a pet monkey: Select a breeder carefully, preferably one with a license from the U. Check local ordinances to see if monkey ownership is allowed and whether a permit is needed. Check the laws in different states using [MonkeyMaddness](#). Several states ban owning a pet primate, including most recently Illinois[5]. This is partially because they can pass serious disease to humans, including Herpes B and tuberculosis. Take care to always get the recommended vaccinations for your pet and wash hands after handling it.

Eventually, the chimps left the house and continued through the streets. On that seemingly pleasant fall day, Sueko set fear into the hearts of an entire neighborhood. In the hours that Sueko ran free, the chimpanzee attacked numerous vehicles along Kansas City roads, jumping on the roofs of civilian cars. Sueko was shot with a tranquilizer, which turned out to be ineffective at sedating the chimp.

We really recommend that you pick up your monkey instead of getting it shipped somehow. This will also allow you to see their facility and they can show you how to take care of your new baby monkey. You want what is best for them, right? The seller should provide you with a health certificate. We also recommend that you take your baby monkey to your monkey vet immediately for a full checkup. Make sure to find a vet in your area that treats primates before purchasing your baby monkey. Can you legally keep a monkey as a pet? Some cities have special ordinances that make it illegal for you to keep old world primates while new world primates are permitted, while other counties might actually have a ban even though your state might allow them. Before buying a monkey, make sure that you check your state, county, and city laws. While the state might permit you to keep a monkey, most cities do not allow you to keep monkeys within city limits. Your city clerk should be able to tell you if you can keep a monkey. Loosing your monkey because of legalities can be very traumatic for primate owners and their monkeys since they get really bonded to their social companions.

You have to do a lot of research before fully deciding on getting one as a pet. A monkey is not for everyone or every living situation. Do consider what you have planned in the future and how your monkey will fit in it for some species of monkeys can live up to 40 years. Make sure to check you local and state laws to see if there are any restrictions on having a monkey and if any permits are required for you to obtain one. Call the local vet offices to locate one that will see your monkey for his yearly check-ups and if he is sick. Housing a Monkey Good housing for a monkey would be the largest cage that you can afford money and space wise. A regular parrot cage is not suitable. A cheaper route to go is to build one yourself. You can have a big outdoor cage so that your monkey can enjoy the sun and fresh air. In the cage you should have plenty of enrichment. Enrichment includes foliage, hammocks, ropes, tunnels, bath pan, and toys. You can make your own enrichment like taking a cardboard box and cutting a few holes in it large enough for your monkey to fit his hand in. Fill the box with treats and hang in the cage. There are many foraging toys that you can make with stuff you can find in your owl home. Do rotate the toys and reorganize the cage so that it keeps your monkey from being bored. Also in the cage you will want to include a heating element depending on the temperature in the house or outside. Make sure to keep the cages clean and disinfected at least once a week if not more. This will help your monkey to stay healthy and not get diseases or parasites that can possible pass to you. As the owner, your responsibility is to keep your monkey happy and healthy. You will have to highly supervise your monkey when he is out of his cage. Remember, they have an opposable thumb like us and can manipulate objects. They will figure out how to open the cage door, cabinets, fridge, etc. You have to treat them like a 2 year old that gets into everything. Have a room that is monkey proof for you and him to enjoy time together. You can have a swing hang from the ceiling, ropes from wall to wall, and other toys throughout the room.

Feeding a pet monkey There is a commercial primate diet that is available but might have to be specially ordered through a local feed store. Monkeys do enjoy a variety in their diet as they are omnivorous creatures. You can feed him crickets, grasshoppers, and meal-worms along with fresh fruits and vegetables. Some people food can be fed also. Before feeding anything, make sure it is not toxic to your monkey. Below are a few species of monkeys that people have as pets. Old world monkeys - Macaques. These are large and powerful monkeys. There are many different species of macaques. They are long lived, up to 40 years. Their facial skin changes from a cream colored when born to a black by the age of 6 months. Two species of guenons are the vervet and green. New world monkeys - Marmosets and Tamarins. They are the smallest primates being only 6 inches tall and about 1 pound. They pygmy species are smaller in size. These species do have a natural musk smell similar to a ferret. Spider Monkeys These guys have very long legs, arms, and tail. This group does have a true prehensile tail but does not have a thumb. Spiders are long lived, up to 40 years. These are the ones that you see in movies and TV shows. They can live up to 40 years. They use their tail as a balancing pole and as a tool. Squirrels prefer to eat berry fruit. They live up to 20 years.

Chimps as Pets Chimp Haven sometimes receives requests from people who want to buy a chimpanzee to raise as a pet in their private home. We cannot stress this strongly enough - Chimpanzees do not make good pets and in many locations having a chimpanzee as a pet is illegal.

Chimpanzees As Pets Has it crossed your mind that having a chimpanzee for a pet would be pretty cool? A pet who looks like you would be cool. Chimps may seem like the ultimate pet but they are not. Television has made us believe that chimpanzees are cute and cuddly creatures that are well behaved. This has made chimpanzees a very popular pet choice with people who can afford them. Chimpanzees in the pet trade are taken away from their mothers at a very young age, just like in the entertainment industry. This will often have disastrous effects on the infant chimp. Chimpanzees will often stay with their mothers for many years, in this time the chimpanzee will learn many things from its mother, including the social skills needed to be able to interact with other chimpanzees. These skills will never be taught to a chimpanzee that is bought as a pet because they were taken away from their mothers at such a young age. Even if two chimpanzees are together in the same house, they may not know how to interact with each other because they never learned the social skills necessary for interacting with other chimps. Mother chimpanzees are there with their young all day, every day, which allows for constant stimulation. Humans cannot give this amount of care to an infant chimpanzee because of other obligations. This lack of stimulation leads to chimps that seek stimulation through any sort of behavior, including behavior that we consider destructive. It is at this age when they grow stronger and become more independent. It is also at this age when chimpanzees are subjected to mood swings, in which, one moment they are calm and the next moment they can become violent. It is during the mood swings that owners are most likely to be attacked. Just like in the entertainment industry, when chimpanzees become too big and dangerous they end up in road side zoos and in laboratories. These chimps once had a life of dress-up and games but will now spend the rest of their lives in cages. They also require a larger living space than the average pet and require special veterinary care. All of the unique needs of owning a chimpanzee as a pet can end up costing an average of 50, dollars per year! But chimpanzees grow up fast, and their unique intelligence makes it difficult to keep them stimulated and satisfied in a human environment. By age five they are stronger than most human adults. They become destructive and resentful of discipline. They can, and will, bite. Chimpanzee owners have lost fingers and suffered severe facial damage. Reality Bites Infant chimpanzees normally receive hour attention from their mothers. Chimpanzee mothers will sleep with one hand on their child so contact is constant. No human can approach this level of caretaking. There are other problems: Bear in mind, captive primates can live 60 years. Furthermore, chimpanzees are likely to rebel when owners come home late from work or have irregular schedules. Space is another obstacle. Homes are not large enough to keep these active animals happy. While infant chimps can be diapered, once puberty hits most chimps resist diapers and clothing. Additionally, chimpanzees can make a mess that will daunt even the most practiced housekeeper. Imagine a toddler having the strength to move tables, pull down curtains and climb to anything put out of reach. It is impossible to train chimps to behave totally like humans. Nonhuman primates are used frequently in medical research because they are susceptible to many of the same diseases as humans such as herpes, viral hepatitis, and measles. These diseases can be transferred easily from them to us and vice versa. Aggression is a natural aspect of chimpanzee behaviour and it is not uncommon for chimps to bite each other in the wild. However much a misguided chimp owner continues to love his or her "child," the chimpanzee will be too dangerous to keep as part of the family. Giving Them Up The day will come when despite all best efforts the chimpanzee must go. The owners often feel betrayed by the animals that they raised and devoted so much attention to. Sadly, they cannot be sent back to Africa. Most zoos will not take ex-pets because human reared chimpanzees do not know chimp etiquette and tend not to fit into established groups. Tragically, many pet chimps end up in medical research laboratories. Because owners are asked not to visit the chimps "so as not to disturb them in their "new-found happiness" " the former chimp owners never realise the horrendous conditions to which they have condemned their friend. Legality It is illegal to own chimps as pets in the UK. Want to raise a chimp? Chimpanzees are meant to live in the wild, not in our homes. Those that have been taken from the forest and their mothers belong in a sanctuary or a high quality zoo. Like human children, ape children learn in a social context, by watching and imitating adults. Chimps that grow up apart from a normal group fail to learn the nuances of chimp etiquette, and are likely to behave abnormally. As adults, chimpanzees have at least five times the strength of humans " too much for any pet owner to manage! Zoos usually refuse to accept pets because they tend not to fit into established groups. Historically, many pet chimps ended up in medical research laboratories. Today they are likely to end up in a roadside zoo. A significant time commitment is also needed just for routine care and cleaning up after a pet monkey. Most importantly, a monkey needs a large amount of social interaction and attention. A pet monkey deprived of your time and attention will only develop severe behavior problems such as screaming and biting but will also develop psychological.

Are you ready to care for a monkey as a pet? Being a monkey owner is NOT for everyone, it is for a rare type of person. If you want a monkey as a novelty item, an attention getter or a cross between a doll and a child, you may be very happy with an infant-but not with a growing or full-grown monkey. Remember, monkeys are different than dogs and cats in that they do not retain "tameness" without a continued investment of time. Even with an investment of time, monkeys naturally progress to behaviors of adolescence and maturity that make them less compatible with most humans and their human households. They are A LOT of work! This page will give an outline of the responsibilities of owning a primate. Research all that you can about primates. Determine which species is right for you, and then research the specifics of that species. Educating yourself beforehand will prove invaluable. Understand monkeys temperaments, characteristic behaviors, and needs.

Obtaining a Primate It is vital to research where you are planning to get your monkey. If you are dealing with a breeder, ask for references of others they have sold monkeys to. Monkeys are expensive to buy, and maintain. It does not exist! A current primate owner whose life change requires re-homing of their monkey will not give it to a person with no experience. Although an older monkey may be free it is no longer a baby, and needs the care of someone who knows how to handle a monkey. It is a SCAM. I do not know the laws for countries outside the US. I do know that most developed countries follow CITES, and have very strict importation regulations regarding endangered species. Also most developed countries prohibit import of monkeys for use as pets. Canada for example prohibits import of monkeys for pets. I suggest looking at your countries Department of Agriculture page for animal ordinances. If obtaining the monkey from another person IN the United States ask them if you can visit with the monkey first. Ideally, you know the history of the monkey, and can gradually acquaint yourself with that monkey slowly. Generally, the better the care and time given to the monkey the easier the break-in will be. This really applies to any animal. In my case, Sofie was very well taken care of, and very well socialized with both people and animals. She is not a biter. She would only try to bite if I tried to dominate her, because she was not used to me and felt threatened. I was a stranger to her. Two weeks later, I could play with her, grab her around her waste and give her kisses when she was playful. Now she loves me, looks to me for security, and even "protects" me against Joey. It took me about months to fully gain her trust. She no longer wears a tether. She allows me to use her tail to keep control of her when out of her cage, etc. My patience paid off because she is truly one of the most loving animals I have been in contact with. Research the type of monkey you are thinking of getting. Capuchins are more social than other kinds, however, it always depends on the individual personality just as people have. Squirrel monkeys can be very social as well, but may bite more often than capuchins, because they are more nervous small size and are frightened easier. Macaques are also common, however, macaques are larger and stronger. Many animal rights groups and organizations opposed to private ownership say they can carry Herpes B, although with regular testing and proper vet care, Herpes in pet populations is highly unlikely. Herpes B is very difficult to transmit, as the animal has to be under high levels of stress to shed the virus, such as in invasive research. There has never been a reported case in the pet sector. New World primates come from South America. These include capuchins, squirrels, spiders, howlers, and marmosets. They live primarily in trees and are physically weaker than Old World primates, but still very strong in proportion to their size. Old World primates are generally from Africa and Asia. These include macaques, colobus, guenons, and patas. Since these primates also spend time on the ground as well as trees, they have obtained much more physical strength than New World primates. These require extremely large enclosures made of steel in adulthood. Apes can live up to 60 years in captivity. Strength surpasses that of SEVEN men, and if not cared for by a professional animal trainer can be very dangerous as adults. Also, ALL of the large apes are critically endangered with very few left in the wild due to poachers who sell them for bush meat, and habitat loss. It is not fair to take an animal and not

commit to providing it with care for the duration of its lifetime. Primate babies will bond to you immediately and you become their troop. You will be very important to them as they are social animals. They are very dependant on you and will demand from you constantly. It is your decision to own one, so be certain that monkey parenthood is right for you. It is more difficult for an adult monkey to adjust to a new owner, and more difficult to find someone with the experience necessary to "break in" and adult monkey. Learning to read their language and anticipating their moods is essential part of the "break in" and having these skills will stress yourself and the monkey less. In other words, finding someone to properly care for a monkey is not as easy as finding someone to take care of your dog or cat. Vacations will be difficult. You can not travel outside of the country with your monkey under any circumstances. When traveling with them beyond state lines you must have a valid health certificate with you. Also, you must take into account 20 states currently have bans on monkeys. Please be wary of who you leave your primate with, as a very well behaved monkey fetches a high price. Are you willing to make that kind of commitment to an animal? If something were to happen to you, is there someone who would continue to care for them in your absence? Are your children willing to care for your monkey if your monkey outlives you? They need 24 hour companionship to be happy and healthy. If you can not spend the necessary time, are you able to acquire a second primate to keep them company? Monkeys, for the most part, are NOT for persons who work a forty hour week out of home. If you work an 8 hour day five plus days a week a primate is not for you. If you move to another state, will you be willing to move with your primate cage, toys, etc. What if your future spouse does not like the monkey or vice versa? The monkey must come first. Time Monkeys require a lot of time to care for. After the monkey were weaned they either had a mate, or continued to be with the owner at all times. Most owners I know have more than one monkey. Primates are social animals and require constant companionship. That is what it takes. Not only is one on one time needed, but also time to prepare their enclosures and keep a healthy habitat for them. Every morning, I wake up at about 8: I begin by gathering some monkey biscuits and soaking them in water juice has lots of sugar , so that they soften up. I then walk outside to get all their monkey dishes and water bottles to clean. I microwave the veggies in water so that they soften up, and chop them. Next, I cut the fruit in to bite size pieces. They seem to waste less if pieces are bite sized. I then remove from the cage the dirty toys from the day before and replace them with clean ones. Once their cage is ready, I go into my room to get the two of them and put them in their outdoor cage. I then return to my room and I clean out their sleeping cages, so that it is ready for them at night. All of the dirty hammocks and blankets go into a hamper that I clean once a week. THEN I get ready for work. Throughout the day, my housekeeper watches them, and refills their food dishes at certain times. They love to see someone familiar outside, so they enjoy when she has chores to do in the yard and especially around their cage. When I arrive home from work, and my room is monkey proofed, I go get Joey and Sofie. Occasionally, I will take them out for a walk around my block to change their scenery. Once I am home, they follow me wherever I go.

Facts about the Capuchin Monkey Capuchin monkeys are a particular type of new world monkeys, more intelligent as compared to their peers. This is the reason humans like them as companions, and have been keeping them for a long time. Some interesting facts are listed below. These monkeys are classified under the genus *Cebus*, a part of the larger Cebinate family which includes squirrel monkeys, spider monkeys, and woolly monkeys. Their habitat includes places in north and central America like Brazil, Peru, Honduras, and Paraguay, and they are mostly found in forests. They are lean and agile, and weigh between 3 to 9 pounds. Usually, their fur is cream or light-tan in appearance around the neck, face, and shoulders. The remaining body fur is dark-brown in color. Their height can be anywhere between 30 to 55 cm, and their tails are equal to the length of their bodies. They are arboreal and diurnal. Thus, they spend most of the day on trees looking for food, take a short afternoon nap, and sleep on tree branches at night. When it comes to diet, these monkeys are omnivores. They eat fruits, seeds, buds, and nuts, apart from spiders, insects, small vertebrates, and bird eggs. They have a tendency to harm humans. In certain places, they are used as service animals, and are trained to help quadriplegics in the same way as mobility-assistance dogs are used. They mostly stay in groups of 8 to 40 members, comprising both males and females. They soak their hands and feet in urine to mark their territories. Life expectancy is about 15 to 25 years, though some of them have even been known to survive for 40 - 45 years. Caring for a Capuchin Monkey Keeping these monkeys as pets requires a long time commitment. The following instructions should be useful. Municipal Corporation Conformation Before you get a pet monkey home, it is better to check with the local municipal corporation if it is legal to keep one in your locality. Some areas are very strict when it comes to animals and pets, and to avoid any court trouble later on, ensure that your area does not have any such restrictions. The Cage The cage you build for your monkey should be at least 6 feet tall. There are risks involved in keeping the monkey free at home, as it can create havoc. Although you may want it to run around in your presence, it is a bad idea when there is nobody at home. Thus keeping it in a cage is more an act of kindness than harshness. Diet Keep changing and monitoring its diet regularly. It can also be fed insects like mealworms, grasshoppers, and crickets. Include some vitamin supplements in the diet as well. Toys and Outdoors Provide the monkey with a variety of toys. Those that are suitable for babies and toddlers are good enough. Keep it on a leash while taking it outdoors. More often than not, monkeys prefer sitting on shoulders but in case it tries going where it should not, you can always hold it back. Health Check Your pet will need a total health checkup once every year which will include a blood test, a TB test, and a parasite checkup. Take it to a good and recognized veterinarian, even if it requires you to travel a little farther from your locality. Find a vet who specializes in monkeys, and if you are unable to, then contact a zoo in your locality to help you with the same. Think properly before you decide to keep a Capuchin monkey as a pet. Looking at the instructions should give you an idea of the kind of care they require. These monkeys are extremely smart in getting away from captivity, so you will need to take adequate precautions.
