Battered, deep-fried seafood usually cod served with deep-fried potato strips. Typically eaten straight out of the bag it is wrapped in. Cooked potatoes and other vegetables especially cabbage, which are mixed together and then fried. A popular way of using up leftover vegetables. Informal words for a sandwich. Minced lamb in a thick gravy, covered with mashed potato and baked in an oven. A simple meal of bread, cheese or sometimes cold meat, pickles and salad often served with an apple. Meat beef in a thick gravy, topped with pastry and baked in an oven. A small tube of pastry with pork sausage meat inside, baked in an oven. A small pie for one person, with meat, potatoes and other vegetables inside. Popular types of British cheese. Toast, covered with a cheese-based sauce and cooked under a grill. A sweet cake for one person, containing dried fruit and spices, traditionally eaten at Easter. A meat dish combining British and Indian ingredients cream, yoghurt, spices, etc, developed by Indian chefs for British tastes.
