Hollywood is capitalism at its best: Paul Johnson, in his "History of the 20th Century", says all the great crimes are committed by intellectuals. He says intellectuals love power and we get tired of sitting on our asses. As a child of the s, I accepted as an article of faith that government is corrupt, business is exploitable and people are generally good at heart. But these cherished precepts, I realised, had over the years become increasingly impracticable prejudices. We are not and never have been the villains that some of the world and some of our citizens make us out to be, but a confection of normal greedy, lustful, duplicitous, corrupt, inspired - in short, human individuals living under a spectacularly effective compact called the constitution. Before the US [] mid-term elections, my rabbi was taking a lot of flak. The congregation is exclusive-liberal, yet he is a self-described independent read "conservative" and he was driving the flock wild.
