Planting for Color in All Seasons Click thumbnail to view full-size These alliums are planted among daylilies. When the allium foliage is fading, it will be hidden by the daylily leaves. Source Chrysanthemums flower in late summer or early fall. Source Lilies flower in the summer months, adding beauty and a wonderful scent to the garden. Source Add plants like evergreens for winter interest: Source Crocus bloom in early spring, and add some beautiful color to an otherwise gray landscape. Source Gardening in Four Seasons Spring The spring garden is often filled with flowers " from bulbs to early blooming perennials. Make the most of this season by under-planting bulbs beneath perennials and adding a spring-blooming specimen tree like a Magnolia Stella or weeping cherry to the garden. Summer The summer garden may suffer from heat and lack of water. Plant lilies, liatris, and annual plants to see this season through. Look to foliage for color, too: Hostas and coral bells come in many variegated shades. Annual plants like elephant ears can add a dramatic, tropical look to the summer garden. Fall Sedums and chrysanthemums bloom in the late summer and early fall season. Grasses are a wonderful addition to the garden, as their seed heads are as beautiful as some flowers and add both color and texture to the landscape. Deciduous bushes like Burning Bush add brilliant scarlet leaves to enhance the fall garden. Winter Add interest to the winter garden with plants that have interesting bark texture, color, and with garden ornaments. River Birch has a beautiful, peeling bark that stands out against the winter landscape. Corkscrew Hazel has an unusual branch structure that adds winter interest. Add a gazing ball, garden benches, or statues to enhance the winter landscape. Part Shade Garden Plan This garden plan uses hydrangeas, hostas, and lamium for a part-shade location. Source Free Garden Plan: Part Shade This garden plan utilizes three main plants: Endless Summer hydrangea is a beautiful flowering plant that produces blooms all summer long. The flower color will be pink or blue, depending on the acidity of the soil. To encourage blue blooms, maintain an acid soil - for pink, add small amounts of lime to raise the soil pH. This plant will grow to feet in height and has the same breadth. The foliage turns bronze in the fall: Hosta Guacamole has an absolutely beautiful chartreuse foliage. It grows feet in height and has beautiful flower spikes in mid-summer. Unlike most hostas, Guacamole blooms with fragrant flowers. Its large green leaves contrast beautifully with the hydrangea. Lamium is a low-growing ground cover for shady locations. It grows inches tall and produces pink flowers throughout the growing season. The foliage is silvery and really lights up shady locations. Free Butterfly Garden Plan This garden island will attract butterflies in droves. Buddleia butterfly bush , purple coneflower, verbena, rudbeckia, and liatris are all loved by adult butterflies. Source Sample Garden Plan: Butterfly Garden Island Attracting butterflies to the garden is simple, and the flowers that attract butterflies are vibrant and beautiful. This garden plan uses the following plants: Buddleia Black Knight also known as Butterfly Bush: This large, central shrub is filled with dark purple blossoms in the summer. Bloom time can be prolonged by cutting off faded flowers. Butterfly Bush may die back over the winter, but will rebound in the spring. Like all the other plants in this plan, this shrub requires full sun. Buddleia will attract adult swallowtail butterflies and monarch butterflies, among other species. This gorgeous perennial is hardy in zones and attracts adult butterflies in addition to songbirds. It is also deer resistant! Rudbeckia is hardy in zones Liatris Spicata also called Blazing Star is 2 feet tall and about 10" wide, making it a tall, narrow plant. Butterflies and bees are drawn to its spikes of purple flowers in the mid summer. Liatris is hardy in zones Butterfly Weed Asclepias tuberosa is easy to grow from seed, but does not transplant well due to the formation of a long taproot. This plant has a long blooming season from May to September and features brilliant orange flowers. The plants are " tall, slightly smaller than the Liatris. Butterfly weed attracts adult butterflies and also supports Monarch and Queen caterpillars. Grow this plant in zones Verbena "Blue Princess" is a hardy perennial ground cover that grows to a height of 6". This plant produces beautiful, blue-purple flowers that are highly fragrant. Grow in zones , or in colder areas as an annual.

Designing a simple landscape plan requires a careful assessment of the garden site: determine the sun exposure, soil pH, moisture level, and location of the garden prior to selecting plants.

Since we are now entering spring, we will be sharing a lot of gardening talk. We will discuss what will be local in your market if you cannot grow things or just want to fill in the gaps for yourself and how you can support your local farmers more. To begin, I thought I would design a simple raised bed garden plan for any of you who just want a simple at home garden or if you are just getting started with gardening. What I like about this plan is that even if you live in an apartment you can take pieces of it and add them into your lifestyle and cooking routine this year. What zone do you live in for growing: You can check here , but you should know this because this will help you know when to plant each vegetable. Most seeds come with info on the packaging that tells you when to plant based upon your zone on the plant hardiness scale. For instance, we live in 6a. This means we cannot plant until after May 15th or at least not leave the plants out uncovered. What do you want to grow? I would suggest growing things you know you will eat. Where will you be growing? The plan I have put together is perfect for anyone with a small yard in a city to someone living on acreage in the country but wants to have their first garden. If you are in an apartment or only have a stoop or patio for growing, I would suggest using a container system and grouping veggies by their growing season more on that below so you can clear that container and add in later harvest veggies or hearty vegetables that you can pull before winter. If you do have a large enough area, read on! Find a sunny spot on your porch, deck, patio or balcony and you are ready to get started. Here are five easy-to-grow plants to start a garden. Growing Tomatoes Grow Tomatoes in a Simple Vegetable Garden Plant tomatoes in rich well drained soil in full sun, allowing 3 feet or more between plants for good air circulation. Mulch with straw in a wide band around the vegetable garden plants to provide consistent moisture over the growing season and suppress weeds. Tomatoes are easy to grow in containers, or planted directly in the ground in your backyard garden. Choose a smaller variety when planting in containers. Make or purchase a "cage" to support your tomato plant as it grows. Water deeply Tomatoes have extensive root systems and should be watered deeply and often in the first month or two. As fruit begins to ripen, irrigate less frequently. Prune non-fruit bearing branches to encourage more tomatoes to develop and grow on your plant. Vegetables Gardening Advice Harvest as early as 80 days or as late as days after planting, depending on variety and time of year. Growing Lettuce Simple Vegetable Garden with Lettuce and Onions This is one vegetable that will grow well in cooler weather and a shady or semi-shaded location. Plant additional seed or plants every weeks to insure harvest throughout the season. Seed packets containing mixed varieties of lettuce are available, and are a great way to have a variety of fresh colorful leaves for your salads and sandwiches. Seasonal Tip During hot weather, lettuce plants will "bolt" or grow tall and go to seed very quickly. Provide a cooler and shady location for your lettuce plants in mid-summer if possible. Plant smaller-growing bush beans to save space in your garden. Tall varieties will need to have a tee-pee or fence to support the vines as they grow. Green beans grow in all zones. Broad beans thrive in full sun and well drained slightly alkaline soil. A mild growing season is essential. The preferred environment is cool, moist air and adequate water or rainfall. Growing Radish Simple Vegetable Garden with Radish Along with lettuce, turnips, and beets, the radish is one of the oldest grown vegetables in cultivation. Radishes can be planted in all zones, require full sun, and regular watering. Because the vegetables are so easy to germinate, they are often sown as a companion crop to other larger and slower growing plants in the vegetable garden. Plant onions from seeds or "sets", which are small onion bulbs that can be purchased at your local garden center. Onions do not require much space, and grow easily in a variety of soil and climate conditions. Frequent watering will help your onions grow more quickly. Mixed Planting Mixed Garden Planting Tips Carrots are a popular choice to grow with radishes, as row markers and to simplify thinning. Other slow-to-germinate seeds include cabbage, lettuce, peas, and leeks. Consider growing a "salad garden" for your first vegetable garden. Salad gardens can have lettuce, onions, parsley, radish, and of course a tomato plant. The tomato plant will take much longer to produce ripe fruit than the lettuce, radish, and onion, but it is worth the wait! Nothing beats the flavor of a fresh salad from your garden; especially vine-ripened tomatoes!
