

1: How do I shrink the page size of a PDF?

Standard x 11" page size ensures that any included images will be at least large enough for the iPad. If you were to send us a document that you'd formatted to mimic a common eReader screen size (like 4 x 6, 5 x 7, or 6 x 9), most of your images will be too small for larger eReader/tablet devices.

The good news is that, with a few clicks of your mouse, you can convert your manuscript directly into an e-book. Since Word is the most commonly used wordprocessing program and the program in which most e-publishers will expect your document, this column will focus on formatting in Word. Since this article was written, newer versions of Acrobat have become available that greatly expand the options of creating e-books. These are often bundled free with other programs or hardware, such as scanners. Adobe now prefers to "lease" this program on a monthly basis; you can purchase the program outright on Amazon. At best, it will look amateurish; at worst, it will be difficult to read or "navigate. E-books are typically between 5x7 and 6x9 with 5. It will also enable you to save them at a lower resolution, thus reducing file size. If you plan to use a lot of illustrations, you might want to consider using a desktop publishing program. When laying out photos or illustrations, be sure to leave an ample margin between the image and the surrounding text, and, where appropriate, include captions. A title page A copyright page. Avid readers with a large library can quickly fill up the device space on smartphones and tablets, leaving little room for other apps and, of course, more eBooks. Additionally, eBooks that use large, uncompressed images can crash out a device—the iBooks app being a notorious offender. However, the biggest concern with large eBooks from a publisher or author perspective is the dreaded Amazon delivery fee. This can eat into your income very quickly, so it is important to keep the eBook file size as small as possible. Unlike print editions, eBooks do not need to have the highest-res images possible. This will cause major device lag and also eat into your well-deserved royalties at Amazon. With the exception of fixed-layout eBooks, we have never encountered a situation where the image had to be greater KB. For DIYers, we strongly recommend getting a decent image manipulation program like Photoshop or Gimp which is free and wonderful! If you are converting your eBooks from Word, Pages, or another word processing program, embed the image in the document after reducing the file size with a program like Gimp. The cover in the MOBI file is an exception to the rule. The cover embedded inside the eBook file and uploaded as the marketing image does not count toward the Amazon delivery fee. Therefore, please feel free to upload large covers for the marketing image and embed high-res covers inside the eBooks please note: Fonts are another culprit that can bloat an eBook. Many traditional publishers and InDesign users embed fonts for the actual body content rather than just headings and special content like text messages. BB eBooks typically advises against this practice because 1 many readers select their own font to use, 2 every eReading device comes equipped with its own selection of fonts that the user can choose, and 3 if a font like DeJaVu Sans or Charis SIL is embedded that has a massive set of glyphs to cover multiple languages, it can create close to 1MB of overhead. If you do intend to use a font face with a huge number of glyphs, try to subset them to have only the glyphs you need for the eBook itself. Font Squirrel has a great app to reduce the size of font files. BB eBooks uses its own proprietary methods for our clients to reduce the size of font files. Smaller is better, but your books and images should be the size that is right for your book and no smaller. The only time you might worry about the file size is if you are participating in the Amazon 70 percent royalty option.

How you change the type size varies slightly depending on the type of Kindle you have. At the time of publication, some models have keyboards, some have buttons and some have a touch screen. Changing the type size is only an option for books or documents on the device.

Kindle With Keyboard Open any book, magazine or document on the Kindle. The text-formatting options are displayed over your current page. The current text size is underlined. Press the "Right Arrow" on the 5-way controller key to select a larger text size. The text on the page changes immediately. Each time you press the right arrow, the text increases in size until you get to the largest text setting.

Kindle Without Keyboard 1. Open a book, magazine or other document on the Kindle. The text size options are displayed with the current size underlined. Press the right arrow on the 5-way controller to increase the font size. Place your thumb and finger, or two fingers, close together on the screen. Slowly drag your fingers away from each other. The font menu appears on the screen. Drag your fingers further apart. The font size increases. Drag your fingers closer together to decrease the font size. Lift your fingers from the screen, and the font menu disappears.

Ed: Trim sizes in this post were updated on January 30, As soon as you get serious about self-publishing a book, you are confronted with the choice of what size your book ought to be.

Book formats[edit] In the hand press period up to about books were manufactured by printing text on both sides of a full sheet of paper and then folding the paper one or more times into a group of leaves or gathering. The binder would sew the gatherings sometimes also called signatures through their inner hinges and attached to cords in the spine to form the book block. Before the covers were bound to the book, the block of text pages was sometimes trimmed along the three unbound edges to open the folds of the paper and to produce smooth edges for the book. When the leaves were not trimmed, the reader would have to cut open the leaf edges using a knife. US Letter is added for comparison. Those made by printing four text pages on each side of a sheet of paper and folding the paper twice to form a gathering containing four leaves or eight pages are called quartos fourths. Similarly, books made by printing eight pages of text on each side of a sheet, which was then folded three times to form gatherings of eight leaves or sixteen pages each, are called octavos. The size of the resulting pages in these cases depends, of course, on the size of the full sheet used to print them and how much the leaves were trimmed before binding, but where the same size paper is used, folios are the largest, followed by quartos and then octavos. These terms are often abbreviated, using 4to for quarto, 8vo for octavo, and so on. The octavo format, with eight leaves per gathering, has half the page size of the quarto format before trimming. Smaller formats include the duodecimo or twelvemo , with twelve leaves per sheet and pages one-third the size of the quarto format, and the sextodecimo or sixteenmo , with sixteen leaves per sheet, half the size of the octavo format and one quarter the size of the quarto. The vast majority of books were printed in the folio, quarto, octavo or duodecimo formats. For example, folios were rarely made by simply binding up a group of two leaf gatherings; instead several printed leaf pairs would be inserted within another, to produce a larger gathering of multiple leaves that would be more convenient for binding. Bibliographers still refer to such books as folios and not octavos because the original full sheets were folded once to produce two leaves, and describe such gatherings as folios in 8s. Similarly, a book printed as an octavo, but bound with gatherings of four leaves each, is called an octavo in 4s. For example, to print two leaves in folio containing pages 1 through 4, the printer would print pages 1 and 4 on one side of the sheet and, after that has dried, print pages 2 and 3 on the other side. If a printer was printing a folio in 8s, as described above, he would have to print pages 1 and 16 on one side of a leaf with pages 2 and 15 on the other side of that leaf, etc. The arrangement of the pages of type in the press is referred to as the imposition and there are a number of methods of imposing pages for the various formats, some of which involve cutting the printed pages before binding. Modern book production[edit] As printing and paper technology developed, it became possible to produce and to print on much larger sheets or rolls of paper and it may not be apparent or even possible to determine from examination of a modern book how the paper was folded to produce them. For example, a modern novel may consist of gatherings of sixteen leaves, but may actually have been printed with sixty-four pages on each side of a very large sheet of paper. Modern books are commonly called folio, quarto and octavo based simply on their size rather than the format in which they were actually produced, if that can even be determined. Scholarly bibliographers may describe such books based on the number of leaves in each gathering eight leaves per gathering forming an octavo , even where the actual number of pages printed on the original sheet is unknown [4]: Other terms for book size have developed, an elephant folio being up to 23 inches tall, an atlas folio 25 inches, and a double elephant folio 50 inches tall.
