Statements by General Authorities of the Church describing the influence of faithful parents on wayward children have been and continue to be a source of great familial comfort. However, the interpretation of these statements by some members of the Church has contributed to a measure of doctrinal misunderstanding. The confusion derives from the apparent inconsistency of these interpretations with the doctrine of the Atonement of Jesus Christ and the principles of moral agency and individual accountability for sins and transgressions. A review of truths emphasized repeatedly in the standard works, of clarifying teachings from modern apostles and prophets, and of relevant evidence from Church history records can sustain hope while addressing the misunderstanding. Whitney are construed by some members of the Church to mean that wayward children unconditionally receive the blessings of salvation because of and through the faithfulness of parents. In the more complete set of notes recorded by Howard and Martha Coray, Joseph Smith is shown to have qualified his statement to make the promised blessings conditional upon the obedience of the children: And this is the Oath of God unto our Father Abraham and this doctrine shall stand forever. This understanding also is in accordance with numerous examples in the standard works. For instance, Alma explained to his son Corianton: Samuel the Lamanite declared to the Nephites: A number of additional scriptures likewise substantiate the principle that men and women are agents blessed with moral agency and are accountable for their own thoughts, words, and deeds. Whitney, and others, they agree on the fact that parents who honor temple covenants are in a position to exert great spiritual influence over time on their children. Faithful members of the Church can find comfort in knowing that they can lay claim to the promises of divine guidance and power, through the inspiration of the Holy Ghost and the privileges of the priesthood, in their efforts to help family members receive the blessings of salvation and exaltation. Such an influence cannot override the moral agency of a child but nonetheless can invite and beckon. Ultimately, a child must exercise his or her moral agency and respond in faith, repent with full purpose of heart, and act in accordance with the teachings of Christ. Faust, former Second Counselor in the First Presidency, provided the most comprehensive explanation of this eternally important concept: If the repentance of the wayward children does not happen in this life, is it still possible for the cords of the sealing to be strong enough for them yet to work out their repentance? There he was welcomed back into the family, but his inheritance was spent. Repentant wayward children will enjoy salvation and all the blessings that go with it, but exaltation is much more. It must be fully earned. The question as to who will be exalted must be left to the Lord in His mercy. It may very well be that there are more helpful sources at work than we know. The influence of parents who honor covenants and obey commandments indeed can have a decisive spiritual impact upon children who stray by activating the tentacles of divine Providence in ways that have not been revealed fully and are not understood completely. Faithful parents may find strength to endure as they follow the examples of other righteous parents with disobedient children. In the Book of Mormon, Father Lehi consistently and constantly encouraged his wayward sons to turn to the Lord. O that thou mightest be like unto this river, continually running into the fountain of all righteousness! O that thou mightest be like unto this valley, firm and steadfast, and immovable in keeping the commandments of the Lord! This remarkable experience was due in part to the

prayers of Alma—whom the angel twice recognized as a servant of God. Thus, faithful parents can invite the power of heaven to influence their children. Nevertheless, those children remain agents unto themselves, and the choice to repent or not ultimately is theirs. Alma the Younger did repent of his sins and was born of the Spirit see Mosiah Acting in accordance with the teachings of the Savior invites spiritual power into our lives—power to hear and heed, power to discern, and power to persevere. John was speaking of those he had taught and brought to Christ. But who is not concerned about their own beloved and dear children? What people on earth would we be more interested in being faithful to God and on their way to heaven than our blessed children? Our lesson on how to keep our children faithful is not to present a checklist where you do one thing, then the second, then the third, etc. There are many elements that are involved in rearing children properly, but you do not do one thing, set that aside, and then do the next. These many elements have to be done in concert, brought along together as a combination, in proper balance, with a mixing and blending of all pieces. Like growth, everything grows at the same time. We have our children but a few precious years at the longest. We soon learn that the years go swiftly by, and soon, before we realize it, our children reach maturity and are gone from our daily guidance. We have but one opportunity to provide for them what is our duty to provide. If we miss that window of opportunity it does not return. God also wants children to be reared in homes where Christ reigns supreme. You should consider the possibility of your children in the selection of the one you marry. So that your home can be one where the will of the Lord is the guiding force and marry a Christian. How can the Lord rule when either the husband or wife, father or mother, is not a child of God? A divided home in the matters of greatest importance presents a serious handicap to children. We Really Cannot Do It It may seem strange in a lesson that teaches how to keep your children faithful to have to admit at the very start that we cannot do it. Even God does not keep His children faithful, that is, without the cooperation of the children. So it is with us and our children. We cannot obey the gospel for them, nor, once they have obeyed, can we be faithful for them. They must keep themselves faithful. We may help or we may hinder. Some are faithful in spite of their parents, and some are unfaithful in spite of godly parents. Some have been blessed to have had parents that assisted them to be faithful. But the bottom line is that each child is answerable to God for himself or herself. That is not so. The passage presents three stages in the life of the child, two explicitly, and one implicitly. There is the youthful stage when the parent must train. There are the older years when the child has matured to old age and holds firm to his convictions. But there are also the middle years, years in which the child must walk the way he has been trained. Whether they do that or not is their responsibility. This being true, to keep our children faithful we must teach our children they are responsible before God. Standing before the judgment seat of Christ Second Corinthians 5: Giving an account Romans They will answer for their own words, deeds, and know the consequences. We would not want them to have a borrowed faith, that is, believing just because we believed. We want them to have their own deep-seated convictions that will guide them after we are gone. Otherwise, they will never be strong and stable. Having their own faith does not mean having a faith that differs from our faith. When the parent follows the truth, and the child follows the truth, they will follow the same thing. But each is following the Lord for himself. Emphasizing how we must teach them to bear their own responsibility does not lessen or minimize parental duty. Children must learn that the parent is doing what God expects the parent to do when the parent teaches, guides, disciplines and instructs the child. Parents must launch the children on to the sea of life as fully prepared as they can make them. Rearing children is somewhat like a coiled spring. When the child is born the spring is pressed beneath the hand of the parent and under the control. In time, the hand necessarily must be removed from the suppressed spring. Will it be removed at one bound and quickly, only to see the spring lunge in most any direction? Or will the hand be lifted slowly, and when removed, to see the spring stand just where it is supposed to stand? The time is coming when our hand will be lifted, our training time will be over, and the child will stand or fall. Consider what we must do that they may stand. We have mentioned two matters of importance already: It is the duty of father and mother to teach the child of the existence of God and the evidences of His existence. He has left His footprints in nature Romans 1: The child must learn that God is powerful, a God of love, grace, mercy, but also a God of justice, wrath, and holiness. To be sure, He is aware of all sin. But, thankfully, God watches over us as a mother watches over the child;

not to find fault, to punish, to scold, but to protect, provide, supply the needs. He provides for the godly Psalm Our children need to know of the terror of the Lord Second Corinthians 5: How else will they come to respect God unless they have a knowledge of His nature? If your child learns about God it is up to you to see to it. Our children must know of the verbal inspiration of the Scriptures, concerning Christ, the plan of salvation, the way to worship, what godly living involves, about the church or kingdom. How else will they come to know right from wrong unless taught? How else will they know what God expects, approves, and disapproves unless you teach them? That is the parental duty. We are concerned, rightly so, about the education of our children, but education in what? Will they be educated in what matters most? Will they know the great Biblical accounts of the servants of God, the events that have framed the scheme of redemption, the revelation of things holy and sacred? Not unless parents teach them. But he never told me I was the best one on the field. I already knew better than that, and he would have lost credibility to have said that to me. But he urged me to always do the best that I could do. The child is taught self-esteem when they are taught they are created in the spiritual image of God. Herein lies the dignity of human being and the value of the individual. Here is the basis for the sacredness of life and personal worth. They matter to God and they matter to you because they count. Each child is worth more than all the world because each is a precious soul Matthew This cannot be accomplished by degrading them, humiliating them, constantly finding fault with them, yelling at them. They have a quality like God. He is Spirit John 4: Furthermore, you will not have perfect children. That does not come until grandchildren! So ease up on yourself just a bit and try to relax. There will be times when you will make mistakes, say the wrong things, react the wrong way. But much of that will be covered when your child knows you love him, you seek to provide for him, and care for him. Do not refuse to apologize even to a child when you have done wrong or mishandled a situation. Children are not little adults, and should not be expected to act like adults. Neither should adults act like children! Remember, children have feelings, too. They are not to be badgered about with harsh words, cutting remarks, jerked about. You can hear some of the most awful things come from parents yelling at their children at little league games. The little fellows must be trained, corrected, disciplined, but they must also be treated with respect. It is hard for them to grow from a life of idealism into the world of realism where they learn everyone is not good, where every policeman is not honest, where every Christian is not pure, where every teacher is not fair, where you are not perfect as they seem to think when they are small. From You They Learn to Respect Authority Respect for authority, or the lack of respect, is learned in the home more than anywhere else. Parents are not just another friend to their children but they are parents, the authority of the home, and deserve respect and to be obeyed Ephesians 6: You can be a friend and a parent at the same time, but never to the disposal of your parental position. I want you to pause for a minute and ask yourself: I went back and forth for awhile. Not in practice, anyway. Within the last generation or two, we have become a people averse to faithfulness. Take my grandparents, for example. My grandfather had the same job for thirty years because he was faithful to his company. My grandparents went to the same church for fifty years, because they were faithful to their church. And my grandparents were married for over 60 years, because they were faithful to each other. We float from job to job and church to church, searching for the ones we like best. Our marriages are struggling under the decline in faithfulness as well. All of this begs the question: How do we raise up a generation of children who know how to be faithful to Christ, and each other? Here are two suggestions: We cannot expect our children to understand faithfulness, let alone embody it, if we are not practicing faithfulness ourselves. This means we need to get serious about committing to God and His church. If we bounce from church to church, our children will probably do the same. If we go to church once a month, our children will probably do the same. And if we model a faithfulness to Christ that is inconsistent or hypocritical—such as attending church every Sunday, but neglecting Christ in the details of our lives—our kids will probably do the same. The pull of culture is strong, and faithfulness is not a societal virtue, but we can resist that influence with our own priorities and lives. Second, pray for it. In other words, we cannot produce faithfulness in our children. Faith is always a gift from God Eph. Now, the second point is an important counter-balance to the first, because it relieves parents of a burden we were never meant to bear. On the one hand, we must be faithful stewards of our children, and do our best to model faithfulness to Christ; on the other hand, we cannot make our children faithful. They might reject the faith, and this is not our fault. Even the most faithful Christians have had children leave the faith. We are dependent on Him alone, and all the best parenting tactics in the world cannot disqualify us from needing His mercy. But at the end of the day, surrender your children to God with the knowledge that He alone is the giver of faith, and He is not a stingy giver.

4: Does "faithful children" mean faithful to God or faithful to the parent?

The Faithful Parent emphasizes the importance of a parent's relationship with God. Every Christian parent wants their child to follow Christ, but it is critical that parents remain faithful whether their children do or not.

Allow me to begin with a short poem by Michael Hodgins: Child-raising theories did abound, before my children were around. Then one day I had my own, now all those theories I disown. Fortune gone, the fridge is clean, my child has now become a teen! One mother was considering her plight in life. I have a cartoon that shows a young mother asking the reference librarian where to find a book. Last week we talked about being faithful in marriage, and I really tried to approach the subject realistically and compassionately. None of us are perfect parents, and we will never be perfect, but we can aim to be faithful. Some of us are really struggling with this task of parenting, while others are having a much easier time of it. How difficult or easy a time we have in parenting is dependent upon a myriad of things; some we have control over and some we do not. Someone has said that raising children is like cooking. If you want something to come out well, you have to follow the recipe and you must not skimp on the ingredients. I wish it were that simple and straightforward. We all appreciate the fact that if you have a great cake recipe, and are careful to use the same ingredients and follow the same directions, the cake will come out equally as well every time. That is not the case with raising children. Every child is unique, having their own temperaments and we parents are never exactly the same as parents "from day to day and year to year. Therefore, we are always amazed at how kids can grow up in the same home, with the same parents, and yet they turn out so differently and uniquely. Nevertheless, even though parenting is not exactly like cooking, there are some similarities. We do need a good and tested recipe to follow. And we do need to try to be consistent as we follow the directions. The very best directions we have for parenting come from God himself. So, what I would like to do with the rest of our time this morning, is to review some directions for parenting that we find in Scripture. The text that I have chosen to work with today is not a traditional parenting text. You might have expected a text like Proverbs. Obviously, those are wonderful texts, but I would like us to focus on a few verses from 1 Thessalonians 2. Paul wrote these verses to describe the kind of leader that he had been with the Thessalonians. He was not actually trying to give them, nor us, a model of parenting, but that is exactly what he ended up doing.

Bible Study Software Question: When Paul speaks of "faithful children" in Titus 1: Terms in the Bible are sometimes difficult to translate because common words are borrowed and used in ways where the common word takes on deeper meaning than it originally had. For example, one of the early terms for a follower of Christ was "disciple. It is enough for a disciple that he be like his teacher, and a servant like his master" Matthew But because all Christians are students of Christ, the word "disciple" became equivalent to "Christian. And the disciples were first called Christians in Antioch" Acts The result is that each reference to disciple must be examined to determine if we are speaking of students in general or those who have devoted themselves to learning from Christ. Another example is found in the word "servant. In every case, the same basic Greek word is being translated in a variety of ways, depending on how it is being used. Yet even when it takes on specialized meaning, the basic concept remains the same. A minister is a preacher who serves his Master, Christ, by teaching the word of God. A deacon serves the church by looking after its physical needs. A Christian has made himself a slave to Christ to serve His will. What is Meant by Faithful The Greek word pistos means "trustworthy, faithful, or reliable. A faithful servant is one in whom you have complete trust. He will do his assigned task, even if the master is not standing over him to monitor his every move. Joseph exemplifies the faithful servant. When he was serving Potiphar, the Bible tells us: Potiphar had complete trust in Joseph. It is this meaning that Jesus used to illustrate a point, "Who then is a faithful and wise servant, whom his master made ruler over his household, to give them food in due season? Blessed is that servant whom his master, when he comes, will find so doing. Assuredly, I say to you that he will make him ruler over all his goods" Matthew The point is not about master - servant relationships, but an illustration that we as Christians must be faithful servants. Paul draws a similar parallel between a trustworthy servant and a child of God. Moreover it is required in stewards that one be found faithful" I Corinthians 4: Paul continues his point by saying that faithfulness is not judged by human standards, but by the Lord Himself. It is God who sets the standard for faithfulness. God demonstrates His reliability in His care. He insures we are not tempted beyond our abilities I Corinthians We are able to have complete confidence in our God because He will reward his servants I Corinthians 1: Therefore, when I was planning this, did I do it lightly? But as God is faithful, our word to you was not Yes and No. Now He who establishes us with you in Christ and has anointed us is God, who also has sealed us and given us the Spirit in our hearts as a guarantee" II Corinthians 1: God offered salvation as something that could be counted upon. It is filled with statements that can be counted upon e. Hence, Paul described an elder as a man "holding fast the faithful word as he has been taught, that he may be able, by sound doctrine, both to exhort and convict those who contradict" Titus 1: One particularly interesting faithful statement is found in Titus 3: These things are good and profitable to men. Do not be unbelieving, but believing" John Therefore, those in Christ are referred to as "the faithful" Revelation The name indicates a complete trust in their God. Faithfulness is not limited to one portion of our lives. It must reach every aspect, physical and spiritual. Therefore if you have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon, who will commit to your trust the true riches? In other words, faithfulness is a lifestyle. It is not something you turn on or off as the mood strikes you. All that we do must be done faithfully. Beloved, you do faithfully whatever you do for the brethren and for strangers, who have borne witness of your love before the church. We therefore ought to receive such, that we may become fellow workers for the truth" III John Faithfulness is so important that the term becomes a synonym for a Christian. Letters in the New Testament were addressed to the faithful Ephesians 1: Paul referred to his becoming a Christian as a time when he was made trustworthy I Corinthians 7: Notice the usage of pistos in the following passages: To be described as a faithful servant is a great complement to the Christian. The Lord found Paul to be faithful I Timothy 1: Timothy I Corinthians 4: Faithful Children In looking for men qualified for the eldership, Paul told Titus to find men "having faithful children not accused of dissipation or insubordination" Titus 1: The question is to whom are the children

faithful or trustworthy, to their father or to the Father? It is an important question. Should men be selected for the eldership only if their children are members of the church? Or, can men who run well-disciplined homes, but whose children do not become Christians, also be qualified? As seen from the above discussion, the word *pistos* has deeply religious meaning to Christians. It would be hard to separate the religious meaning from the common usage. Even when used to describe faithful servants, the Lord used the concept to illustrate the behavior of Christians. However, it remains possible that Paul might possibly be using the more shallow definition of *pistos* in this one instance. The question would be similar to asking why Paul used the word "saint" in Philippians 4: There are a variety of words used to describe a Christian: No one word is a complete description of what or who is a Christian, but each emphasizes a necessary characteristic. If "faithful children" is referring to children who are Christians, then the use of the word rules out children who are "Christian" in name only. Of necessity one who is faithful as in "Christian" would be in submission to his earthly father, as such is required by God Ephesians 6: The word "faithful" would also rule out a child who only obeys his father because he must. A child who submits solely because he feels forced into obedience will rebel as soon as he escapes the dominion of his father. A faithful child will remain trustworthy. Comparing Titus to Timothy Some have noted that the qualifications for elders given to Timothy and Titus are very similar. To Timothy, Paul stated that a qualified man is "one who rules his own house well, having his children in submission with all reverence for if a man does not know how to rule his own house, how will he take care of the church of God? Since Timothy and Titus worked in different areas of the world Timothy in Ephesus and Titus in Crete , it is argued that Paul would have had to have given both men a complete list of qualifications in order for them to find qualified men. Therefore, the statements are seen to be roughly equivalent. There are three flaws with the argument. It would be a grave mistake to assume that Timothy or Titus only knew what was written in their respective letters. In fact, we know that both Timothy and Titus were traveling companions of Paul. Take note, as well, that Titus was left in Crete by Paul Titus 1: Second, elders were being selected prior to the writing of the letters of Timothy or Titus. The selection of elders was first mentioned in Acts Yet, we find that Jerusalem had elders before Paul arrived there Acts Timothy did not start traveling with Paul until Acts All of this points out that the brethren knew how to select elders prior to the writing of the letters to Timothy and Titus. Third, the instructions to Titus and Timothy are similar, but they are not the same. Do we conclude that the churches in Crete had no deacons? Though the list of qualifications for elders are similar between Titus and Timothy, they are not the same. Timothy alone mentions that a man must desire the office and that he must be temperate, gentle, and not quarrelsome. Titus alone mentions that a man must be sensible, just, holy, self-controlled, a lover of good, not quick-tempered, and not self-willed. Because of the differences, do we conclude that the elders ordained by Timothy were of a different character than those selected by Titus? No, this does not make sense. It is not ruled out, but it is not necessary to understand them to be the same. Earlier, in I Timothy 2: The same word for reverence is used in I Timothy 2: The letter to Titus tells us that the elder should have "faithful children not accused of dissipation or insubordination. Paul contrasts the righteous man to the lawless and the insubordinate or disobedient in I Timothy 1:
