One of the most difficult tasks that I have in making quilts is the precision one needs to make things go right. This book and style of quilts has changed my whole opinion about quilting.

I worry that novices might view my own quilts or the Finish Line quilts I post of student work and be scared off by their complexity. Why not start with something simple, yet fun, and work your way up to something more involved? Patterns for Sale Maybe you know I sell patterns to be used for fabric collage. Most of my patterns are of fish, bugs, or butterflies, with a few exceptions like a gecko, a turtle, and sun and moon faces. These simple images are intended to be stress-free ways to play with fabric collage. I used to sell paper patterns through the mail. This proved too expensive and time consuming on my part. Now people from all around the world, most who will never make it to one of my in-person classes, have access to them. Experience tells me it can be very helpful in a class to start with a pre-drawn design, especially in short two-day classes. It all depends on the motivation for taking a longer four or five-day class—is it to learn the fabric collage process as thoroughly as possible, or is it to create a portrait of a loved one or a large animal piece? Of course, most successfully push through that stage and are happy with their results. Why not learn the technique on something that is low-stress? Some fish quilts I used to create patterns, from upper left: The pattern for that fish, Fanfin, and two others, Aqua Wrasse and Leaf Peeper, were included in the book. I started out teaching fish classes and even though I encouraged students to draw their own, they liked mine and wanted more choices. At that time I had made literally literally hundreds of fish quilts, so I actually took a few of the finished quilts and traced them to create patterns. See the fish above. This is the reverse way that most people use patterns. Typically they draw the pattern first then make the quilt. Students had more choices and were happy. When people purchase the Fabric Collage Online Master Class , I give them a coupon for a free pattern from my website. This is my way of encouraging them to start simpler, with more fun and less stress. While the Master Class teaches how to create a pattern from any image you choose, I suggest that beginners skip over that part and start with either a spiral, a pre-made design, or both. Patterns NOT for Sale I regularly receive emails from quilters asking for patterns of a quilt of mine they like. Besides, quilting is a culture built on creating and sharing and re-sharing patterns. This is a lovely tradition. Quilting, however, is undergoing a transition. Most of the quilts I make, including the ones listed above, are not to be reproduced. Part of their value as art lies in their uniqueness.

Nothing is the same. Everything is left up to however you want to do it. And so it just lets your imagination soar. And let me tell you what you need to make this. But you could use a pre cut for that also. For an outer border here, this is a little five inch border. So let me show you how to make this because this is so much fun. And everything is made on these squares. This is basically a nine patch. And the easiest way, I played with this several times before I figured out really what I wanted to do with this. Let me grab my ruler here. This seemed to work the easiest for me. This is really up to you. You can put it in as far, you know, until you get so far that you no longer have fabric. So I just lay it across here like that. And we are just going to sew across here. And then I like to just flip it around like this and bring another square over here and do the same thing on the, on the, on the opposite side like this. So you can vary them a little bit so that your, you know, your angles are a little different. Sew that quarter of an inch. Sew off the side. And your piece will look at little like this. Kind of a little funky. And remember that our white piece here is our background. Oop I want to make sure this is ironed down. That background foundation piece becomes our pattern. And this right here, this square becomes your pattern. Because it might be easier for you to see. And so it should remain a five inch square just like that. So there I am with that one. And one more side. And then you should have a piece that looks kind of like this. But these sides now are going to make your bar blocks on the sides. So again you keep your foundation square on the bottom. And you can tilt this. You can turn it. You know, get a little crazy. Go ahead, put those on the sides. So you can see how I have this one on this side. Go the other direction maybe. You want to make sure, like see right here how this comes in. So I just watch that kind of carefully. There seems to be plenty of room if you do it this way. Make sure your white block is flat underneath, like this. Lining up my ruler along the edge. Going to cut that off. Going to trim this off. And trim around this side. Because all of these stay five inch blocks. They all stay five inch blocks. Now you are just going to go ahead and keep doing that until you have a whole stack of them. And then we get to assemble our block. Now assembling the block is just as easy as assembling the nine patch. So you want to lay it out. How about this dark? So you just kind of want to play with them until you get it how you want it. And I think this is the fun part. Because you know it can be something so fun. So how I like to do that is I like to just sew, lay them right sides together and sew these. I just kind of sew from seam to seam. Make sure that they stay nested. See how I did. And this time I just press from the top because I want the whole thing to be nice and flat. Because that will be helpful. These corners look pretty good. And let me show you how you put these together. So let me move these out of the way. So twenty blocks total. These little seams here I mean. And, and just sew them together. So again we sewed four across, five rows of that. We added our five inch border to the outside. And before you know it you have a quilt that is 64 by Great little size of a quilt. So I hope you have fun with this. I hope you, you know, let some of that inner wildness out and make your blocks all different and crazy. This is where those big prints really shine. Take a look at that. So fun on the back.
