For added visual appeal, I have added some easy to find props suggestions to each of these devotionals. Teachers can put their own personalized teaching styles on each of these simple lessons. For quick devotional ideas, be sure to browse our devotional ideas for families. If you prefer, fruit will do too. Hide all the candy except for one piece. Show the kids the candy and talk about how delicious it is. Describe what the candy looks like, how it tastes and how it makes you feel. Open the candy and begin eating it in front of the kids. God is sweet and wonderful like my candy bar but only I got to eat it. If I had shared the candy, everyone could enjoy the sweetness. Before the lesson, place an apple seed in your pocket. Tell kids, you have something in your pocket that can grow to 50 feet tall. Tell them when it gets to be full-sized it will feed many families. Show the children the seed. Explain to the group what kind of seed it is. Point out how small it is today but how it grows secretly in the ground when it is planted. Learning a scripture verse or hearing the Bible preached may seem small like the tiny seed. But when it is planted secretly in the heart, it will grow and give you fruit like joy and peace. Another way to show how important the Word of God is to children is by explaining that it is a gift. Like any gift, it must be opened to be enjoyed. For fun, place a few novelty toys, enough for each child, in a box. Wrap a box with wrapping paper. After everyone has had a turn guessing, set the gift down. Explain to kids that this unopened gift is like an unopened Bible. Hold a Bible to your forehead. Open the gift and share the goodies.

Many of the guidelines for great kids' devotions start with a level of simplicity that we as adults sometimes take for granted. Ten minutes is a great goal for a beginner's devotion time. Consider the following 4 basics when encouraging kids toward establishing a minute devotion time.

In a Cave with a King: All right, this post is for your kids. This is not meant to make a political statement – I wrote this two years ago during a totally different administration – it is simply meant to challenge us to think about our leaders in a Biblical way. Our kids are witnessing so much. We need to be sure as Christian parents that we are teaching them what the Bible says about how we are to treat our leaders. Let this devotional be a starting point for that much needed conversation. Come to think of it, maybe this is a conversation we adults need to have, too. There is No Doorknob in a Cave Everybody does it. Maybe you try really hard not to, maybe you want to be polite so you try to hold it in, but, eventually, there is going to come a point when you can hold it in no longer. You will be sitting in a room full of people when the discomfort becomes too much and you have to let it out. It is a game we call, appropriately, doorknob. Imagine if some of our favorite Bible characters played doorknob. I wonder what that would look like. If you remember, God rejected Saul as king and chose David to be the king instead. Saul was insanely jealous of David, and ended up spending a great deal of time and energy chasing after David in order to kill him. One day David and his men discovered Saul alone. Why was he alone? You know what that means, right? He had to go to the bathroom. Saul never even knew he was there! There is no doorknob in a cave. David would have won and the struggle for the kingdom would have been over. My mom, however, was not impressed. He simply cut off the piece of the robe and left. And then he felt bad about it! God had appointed Saul as king, and David felt that he had no right doing anything disrespectful against the leader of his nation. This respect for leaders is not just in the Old Testament. The New Testament also tells us we are to respect our leaders – even bad ones! For such is the will of God that by doing right you may silence the ignorance of foolish men. Act as free men, and do not use your freedom as a covering for evil, but use it as bondslaves of God. Honor all people, love the brotherhood, fear God, honor the king. Do you think it was hard for David to respect King Saul? Why or why not? Is it hard for you to respect your leaders? What are some ways that you can show respect to your leaders? Spend time today praying for the leaders of your country. Pray for them to have wisdom as they lead and to make decisions based on what God would want. Pray for the future leaders of your country. Pray that God will raise up Christian men and women to serve Him in politics. Draw a picture of David and Saul in the cave. Draw a picture of ways you can show respect to your leaders. 4: Fun Devotion Games | Our Everyday Life

For fun, place a few novelty toys, enough for each child, in a box. Wrap a box with wrapping paper. Pass the "gift" around and allow kids to shake it and guess what's in it.

I had a few requests for simple and quick devotions for kids to do before school, on the drive home from school, during dinner, or before bed. I thought it would be fun to create a short series of devotions based on school supplies – something that we are all very familiar with and have access to during this time of year. There are a few items you will need in order to use these devotions, so make sure you have your supplies on hand before sitting your family down. I hope you and your family know Jesus more through these lessons.

The Pencil Devotion Lesson Show your kids a pencil without a point. Ask them if they can write or create something with the pencil the way it is. When they say no, tell them that life without God would be a lot like this pencil – there would be no point. When we ask Jesus into our hearts, He gives our lives a purpose and a point. Our point is to love God and love others. And the second command is like the first: Show another piece of paper and that represents us. Say that you want these 2 pieces of paper to be super close and stay together forever. But can those 2 papers stick together on their own? Now show a bottle of glue with Jesus written on it. Have the kids put glue on the paper that represents them, then stick that to the paper that represents God. Explain that Jesus makes it possible for us to come close to God.

Activity Have kids make their own pages that say God and their names and use the Jesus glue to stick them to God. And that one death paid for your sins. He was not guilty, but he died for those who are guilty. He did this to bring you all to God. Ask your kids what it would be like if all of the colors in the box were brown? We need all of the different colors to create a beautiful picture. In the same way, God created everyone different. Some people are loud and funny, and some are quiet and shy. Some can sing and paint, and some are good with numbers and knowledge. Altogether we can make something beautiful! How can you help make a beautiful picture with the other crayons in the world?

Activity Draw a rainbow using one color. Draw another rainbow using all of the colors. Discuss which one looks better. So be good servants and use your gifts to serve each other.

The Calculator Devotion Lesson Calculators help us count things. When we want to figure out how to add big numbers quickly, we can use a calculator. He just knows how many. For example, God knows how many hairs are on your head. He counts each one – and He can keep up with that number even when hairs fall out! God also counts the stars in the sky. Do you know how many stars there are? The number 1 with 24 zeros after it! Astronomers got that number by calculating the number of stars in a galaxy by the number of galaxies there are in the universe. And there are even more stars than that! He knows everything at all times – without any help.

Activity Try to count the hairs on your head using the calculator. When it gets too hard, think about how great God is that He knows! Turn the calculator upside down. What does it say? The Eraser Devotion Lesson There once was a little girl who was in 2nd grade. Whenever she made a mistake at school, the teacher would write her name on the board and put a check mark next to her name. If she made another mistake, the teacher would put another check mark next to her name. Then another check mark. The little girl kept looking at those check marks and felt horrible. Nothing she did could make them go away. Just as school was about to end, there was a knock at the classroom door. The door opened and in walked Jesus. Then He drew a big red heart around her name. From then on, no one could put a check mark by her name because the big red heart was her protection.

Activity Give each child a piece of paper. Have them write their name in the middle. Brainstorm a few examples of ways they had sinned or fallen short that day. When they say them out loud, have them draw check marks next to their name. Then tell them the Bible verse below and have them erase the checkmarks and put a big red heart around their name. Then your sins will be wiped away. The time will come when the Lord will make everything new. Discuss how sometimes our sin can feel like a Sharpie – permanent and not going anywhere. Take the marker and slowly go back over the Sharpies lines. The Sharpie lines should disappear.

When we were little kids trotting off to Sunday School with our parents, they gave my younger sister and me dimes to put in the offering. As we got older we gave quarters; then it was a dollar each. Back then, that was a LOT of money. We had to do it because "God said so. After all, Dad was the church janitor. It was his full time job he had three or four side jobs. We benefited directly from the offerings given each week. We had everything we needed. Our car was old but it got us from point A to point B, most of the time. We rode our bikes or walked; after all it was a tiny town. We had a house. Sure it was old. Cold air came in from the cracks in the floor and through the poor fitting windows and doors. But there was always plastic to put on the screens in the winter and fans for the summer. Sure there were mice and bugs. We got rid of them the best we could. We had nice clothes. Mom was a terrific seamstress and could whip up more clothes in a week than most people could in a month. Every year, my younger sister and I earned our way to church camp. Mom made new summer wardrobes for us. Mom made everything from scratch. Her pies and cookies were the BEST! So how much does a person have to receive before they recognize it as a blessing? It took me a LONG time. On more than one occasion, we had no heat, no water or no electricity. We owned a house for a while, but it went into foreclosure. When friends brought bags of groceries, I was ashamed instead of thankful. That generosity was a God thing. Then the unthinkable happened. My marriage fell apart, and I had two young children to support. Friends took us in until I could get work. My family saw to it that I had money for gasoline, insurance and to help our friends offset the cost of housing us. I was far too dependent on others and felt ashamed. God furnished our apartment. When we were given clothing or the church gave us Thanksgiving food or Christmas gifts, He was blessing us. Our rent was paid on time every month. We had food, electricity, water and a car that worked well, most of the time. Is that God or what? Always my biggest concern. Something big was stirring in my heart. I held myself accountable to a good and very confrontive friend. If I wavered at all about fulfilling my promise, I called her. Now it is almost like a game between God and me. I am keeping score —" tithes and offerings vs His blessing. I cannot begin to describe how good it is to give with a cheerful heart. Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. Even when I think I am "low on dough" I give. The blessings come back to us in many forms, and we are continually being enriched. I can honestly say that if I have to stay in the apartment forever, I will do so gladly, as long as I can keep giving. About 4 years after I wrote this article, I bought a home. Giving is still a joy. God is WAY ahead!.
