

## 1: Ten Fun Youth Group Games | Youth Group Activities, Resources for Youth Ministry

There are games that convey a positive message, as well as a life lesson, that let kids learn while still having fun. **Blind Journey** If you are running a religious youth group, this is an activity about faith in God. Have all of your students wear blindfolds and have them separate and try to make it back to a certain location. After a few minutes, try the same activity in pairs with one partner wearing the blindfold and one not. The seeing partner can guide their blindfolded partner but only using their voice. This will show the difference between walking in faith with God and walking blindly. Have each of them conduct a little interview with their partner in pairs and then have them come back and present their findings to the rest of the group. Make sure to ask the question "what surprised you about so-and-so? **Whatever It Takes** This is a good game to show that discrimination is wrong. Pick five or so people to be the outcasts and have five groups huddled together. The object of the game is for the outcasts to try to get into the groups however they can, by pushing, shoving and pleading. The groups are supposed to try to resist. Keep switching around until everybody has had a chance to try to get inside. **Song Spot** Have everybody gather in a circle ready to sing. You suggest a word and then a person jumps into the middle and starts singing the first song they can come up with. When the people in the circle recognize the song they can start singing along right away. When someone in the circle thinks of another song, they can bail out the person in the middle by tagging them and singing a new song. The pattern continues until everybody runs out of songs. Try to encourage the "wallflowers" of the group to sing as much as they can. This game shows that when someone puts themselves out there boldly, you should support them as much as you can. ## 2: Circle Dodgeball | Youth Group Games

In the following article, we give you some easy games for a group of kids to play. Plentifun Staff Group games aim at developing the qualities of co-operation, team spirit, hard work, and leadership. When kids play in a group, they understand the importance of sacrificing their personal interests for the larger interests of the team or the group. They understand that collectively winning is far more important than their individual performance. Here are some easy and simple games for kids.

**Indoor Games**

**Singing Game** This can be one of the best games for kids who are interested in singing and music. This game requires the knowledge of the latest as well as old songs. You can form two groups and have four or five kids in each group. One player from any one of the teams sings a song and a player from the other team has to sing a song starting from the last alphabet of the song. If the other team fails to sing the song, the first team can try it. For every correct song, ten points are added to the score of the teams and for every failed attempt, three points are deducted. The team that has more points at the end wins the game.

**Storytelling Game** This game has always been one of the most interesting, innovative, and fun-filled for kids. Again, like the singing game, you will be required to form two groups of four or five kids. Both the groups are given various topics, such as hobbies, nature, science, arts and literature, sports, business, or politics and are asked to prepare a story or a speech on the topic. Once the topics are allotted, all the members of the groups jot down the points by discussing the facts among themselves. There will be a time limit, of say one hour, for both the teams. One member from each team will read out the content and the judge will give away the prize to that team whose story was better. The player who reads out the story should be the one who has the best reading skills in that group as the way of presentation reading will also have points.

**Outdoor Games**

**Playing Football** Football is definitely one of the best outdoor games that kids enjoy. This game tests the coordination between the players and their energy levels and reflexes. Form two teams of equal number of players and appoint one player as the captain who will instruct the players on the ground and implement various strategies to win the game. Have an experienced referee who will ensure that the rules and regulations of the game are being followed.

**Obstacle Race** This game will again need two teams and a proper infrastructure with four obstacles in the running track. One player of both the teams will stand at every obstacle, and will start running the moment he gets a clap on his hand from the player starting the game. Now, this particular player has to run fast through the next obstacle and give a clap to his team member before the opponent player. This continues until all the obstacles are over. The group whose player reaches the end line first wins. Group games can inculcate useful values in kids which will prove to be valuable in their later lives. These games will also expand the social circle of kids by helping them make more friends.

## 3: Indoor Group Games | Great Group Games

Youth group games are so popular because they include everyone and work for large groups of teens and kids. These are some of our favorite games for groups. They can be used as easy party games anytime you are entertaining a crowd! You can adapt many of these games into Bible games. The skit game listed below is a good example. To make this a theme game, give each group a Bible story or verse and have them each come up with a skit for the verses set in today. The multiplayer games listed here a great for any size group. Most importantly, remember to play safe! With that in mind here are Easy to access forms to download, print and customize for the important needs of your youth group. Each team tries to come up with something which begins with each letter of the alphabet by looking thru their suitcase, purse, pockets, etc. Back to Back - Divide everyone into pairs, with each player sitting back to back. Teams have to try to stand up without using their hands. Combine teams and try again, then combine teams again, etc. Try to see how many players you can get to stand up together as a group without using their hands - it takes teamwork! This is a great youth group game because you can have many groups going at the same time. Balloon Pass Smash - This is a great group game for getting people to sit in new spots and with new people. Always good to mix up those little groups that form. Beforehand, blow up a balloon for each person have extras. Inside each balloon have a coin of different value, different dates, etc. Get everyone together in a circle, then, while music plays, pass a few balloons around. When the music stops, anyone holding a balloon has to pop it and keep the coin. After everyone has had a turn popping a balloon, then have everyone sit according to their money value of coin, year of mint, etc. For fun, pass the balloons different ways each time - such as over your head, between your legs, etc. Banana Game - This is a fun multiplayer game! Divide into pairs to make teams. Give each team a banana that has been peeled and cut in half. Then, give each team five minutes to try to put their banana back together! They can use tape, pins, whatever you wish. The best banana wins! Capture the Flag - Probably one of the most popular party and outdoor group games of all time, Capture the Flag is a great game to play for any large group! Have players for this group game earn the fake money by doing tasks throughout the evening - it can be a fun dare such as a stunt having them sing, dance, act, tumble , or having them do tasks stacking chairs, cleaning tables, etc. Different tasks and dares can be worth different amounts of money if you wish. At the end, have an auction where players can use their fake money to buy things. Find the Leader Game - With the Find the Leader Game which is similar to the next group game, called the "Guessing Game", everyone tries to figure out who is the leader. Guessing Game - Fun for smaller groups - pick someone to be "It" and have them leave the room. While gone, pick something that "It" will need to do when they come back. They clap louder and faster as he gets closer to doing the right thing. A fun example is getting someone to take off their shoe. It has to be something a person can figure out! Gather everyone in a circle and put the grocery bag in the center of the circle. Let each person have a try to pick up the bag in their teeth while standing on one leg and not using your hands. If they are successful, have them tear off a piece of the bag and let the next person go. The more that gets torn off, the harder it is to do it! Youth Group Games Photo by: These groups should form circles, and place their hands in the circle. Mingling Icebreaker - Play music and have everyone move about the room. When the music stops, everyone must find another person and shake their hand. The leader calls out a question for each set of players who shaking hands to answer for each other. For ideas of questions, visit our conversation starters list. Let each team make their own, and once they are made, have teams lay down on their backs with the tops of their heads touching. Then they get to eat from this position laying down, head to head , while feeding each other. One of the favorite funny games and also one of the favorite messy games! Mouse Maze - Youth groups can pretend they are mice with the fun mouse maze game. Before playing this for your group games, create two identical mazes by laying rectangular tables on their sides the table tops become the walls. Divide players into two teams. This will be a blindfolded relay race thru the maze. At the end of the maze, each racer should get a treat such as an oreo, cracker, etc. As each person arrives have them

write their own name on an index card and tape it to their back. When everyone arrives, give each player another index card and a pencil. On "Go", have each player try to go around and write down the names of other people getting it from the name card on their back. It is if players try to keep people from seeing the name on their back while gathering names of other players. Have a short time limit determined by how many are playing and give a prize to the person who has gathered the most names. Group Games Photo by: As a matter of fact, as a youth we often got together to play volleyball, croquet or just toss the ball around for fun. Here are things to look for in a fun printable group games. Scavenger Hunt - A Scavenger Hunt is always a hit! Play music, and when the music stops, call out the name of a shape. The teams then race to make the shape that has been called out. Have teams imagine that you are above looking down at their shape - which one can make the shape the best? Dog bone, Tree, Ball, Christmas Tree, etc. Skits - Divide players up into teams of 10 players or less. Give each team a topic and them come up with a skit which uses everyone. You can even give them a collection of odd props that they have to include. After 15 minutes, let each team show their stuff! Divide players into small teams and give each team a bar of soap. Teams race to try to make their soap the smallest piece without breaking it. For small enough groups you can give each person a bar of soap. Spam Carving - Give each player a can of Spam, a paper plate and a plastic knife for carving. Then have a contest to see who can create the best masterpiece! Spin the Compliment Bottle - I love this version of the spin the bottle game, but it needs to be played with a group that knows each other. Divide the kids into groups of 8 to 10, with a bottle for each group. Have players sit in a circle around the bottle. One player spins the bottle. When the bottle stops spinning, the player who spun the bottle will give a compliment to the person the bottle is pointing to. String Icebreaker - Beforehand cut a piece of string for each person, but there should be two pieces of string of each size. Give everyone a length of string yarn works great. Then give everyone a few minutes to try to find their partner with the matching length of string. Toilet Paper Icebreaker - For a smaller group game you can play as a group game for large groups if you divide up. Once everyone has some, tell them that for each square they have taken, they must tell the group one "fun fact" about themselves. Trash Art - Have a collection of odd items - toilet paper rolls, boxes, broken things - anything that would be ready for the recycling bin or clean trash. Divide into teams, with an assortment of "trash" for each team, along with a roll of duct tape. Give each team time to make piece of art out of their trash. Prizes can be for prettiest, weirdest, etc. You can also have teams create an invention with the trash. Trash Fight - Divide the room in half with a team on each side. True or False - Draw a line on the floor or use tape. One side is "true", the other is "false. Everyone then picks a side, either the true side or the false side.

## 4: Large group games and activities for Youth groups, kids and young adults

*I learned something recently: in youth ministry, youth group games are important. I mean really important. My church had vacation bible school two weeks ago and I was teaching the middle school class. That first night I went straight into the lesson and I got crickets and glazed eyes. One thing was.*

One thing was apparent: I had planned a lesson along with some small activities but my quiet group ended up zooming through the lesson and I still had an hour to fill! We grabbed our snack from the kitchen and headed outside to eat it since it was a beautiful evening. We ended up playing different versions of tag, and this group of students who were shy and quiet at first, were suddenly laughing and talking. The games ended up being a major team building exercise. It helped them find things in common and get past the initial awkwardness that can come with meeting new people. They needed the games to break the ice so they could feel comfortable participating in discussions about the lesson. Now I realize games are vital to building community in youth group. So after doing some research, our team has compiled a list of the top 20 youth group games with you. I have a feeling many of these games will help you and your students this week! You can also find more games for youth leaders by downloading your free Youth Group Games! We keep these games updated based on feedback we get from youth leaders like you. So, you can always check back to look for new games. Now, here are some of the best and simple youth group games you can play this week:

**Grog** You take apart a flashlight and hide the parts throughout the play area. One kid is the Grog, which is a monster that can freeze you in place by tagging you. It was a favorite by far.

**Sardines or Christians in the Catacombs** This is the game of sardines, but explain it with the story of how the early Christians met in the catacombs, but they still increased in number. One person hides in a dark place, and then as people find them, they join in hiding, until one person remains.

**Scatterball Dodge ball with a twist.** To start, everyone must have a hand on a nerf ball. Throw the ball up in the air and everyone scatters. Somebody grabs the ball in the air or off the ground. Whoever has the ball can only take two steps. After two steps, the player must throw the ball "dodge ball style" at another player. If the ball hits a player, that player sits down right where they are. If a player is hit by the ball and catches it, then the throwing player sits down. At any time sitting players can snag the ball if it rolls by, and they can throw it at standing players trying to get them out. The game ends when only one player is standing.

**Lifesize Clue** The youth group gathers in the evening when the church is dark. They congregate in one lit room and one person goes to hide a large doll any stuffed animal will work. To make it happen, split your group into as many teams as you have supplies keeping around members in a group. Provide each group with one pack of spaghetti and one pack of large marshmallows. Teams are charged to use their supplies to build the tallest freestanding tower they can meaning that holding the tower up for measuring is against the rules. Give the groups a certain time limit during which they can construct their tower "anywhere from minutes generally works well" and give them a one-minute warning before their time up. The winning team is the one with the tallest freestanding tower, as measured by the game leader. Break any ties by having the teams move their tower across the room and measuring again, not allowing them to fix any breakages. Some teams will get creative and incorporate the spaghetti box and marshmallow bag into their structure. There is no rule against this. We just wanted to equip you with some of our best youth leader resources or keep scrolling for more fun Youth Group Games!

**Photo Scavenger Hunt** Assign points for odd items that students can find to take a picture with around the Church property or within a designated area. Get creative with your lists. The added bonus of this game is you automatically have some great photos of your students that you can put in the youth group room. You can even feature some of them as photos of the week.

**Baby Bird** Two teams of two students compete. On each team, one student acts as the mother bird and the other acts as the baby bird. The team with the most worms in their eggshell at the end of 20 seconds wins. Ties are broken via bird-calling contest. Give them an word and the team has to guess the word they drew. This would be a good ice breaker activity before a lesson if you tie in themes from the lesson into the

drawings. **Four on the Couch** The goal is to get 4 of your team onto the same couch. There must be one less seat than people in the room must have a couch; you can play three on a couch if necessary. Divide into at least two teams and have everyone put their name in hat. But everyone should keep their names a secret. Now the person to the left of the empty seat in the room calls out a name. The person, who drew that name, now moves to the empty seat, and switches names with the person who called out the name. Now the person to the left of the new empty seat calls a name. You repeat the process. So you have to try to get to the empty the couch and call the right names to get folks on the couch. This takes some thinking but is fun and competitive in a non-athletic way. Each person should write down the names of 10 people – either famous people or people everyone in the group knows. Go around and collect them in a basket or hat. You should have quite a few names in the basket. Split into 2 or 3 teams each team having around three or four members. Pick a team to start – one member of that team gets the basket of names, picks out a name, and has to try and describe that person to the other members of his team. Once they guess correctly, pull out another name from the hat and so on. The team has one minute to go through as many names as they can. If they get stuck on a name, they can pass and move onto the next name. Move onto the next team who do the same as above. Similar to Round 1 but you can only use one word to describe the person to your group. The group will be aware of all the names in the basket from round 1 so it is easier than it sounds. Score a point per name guessed as above. Add up the scores at the end to see who wins! Keep some band aids on hand for this one just in case. **Capture the Flag** This one needs no explanation, but feel free to add twists. Include more than one flag, take turns having the teams play offense and defense, play with three or four teams going against each other, etc. **Tug of War** This is another classic, but is always a hit with youth groups. Make it extra fun by doing it once a year and utilizing interesting competitions: The key to a good match-up is to put a small number of the strongest against a large number of the weakest. For example, take a handful senior high boys and place them against 30 middle schoolers. **Ultimate Duck-Duck-Goose** When there are more than 50 students, this game is a lot of fun. Play duck-duck-goose as you normally would, however when a few people get tagged and they go to the middle, then they begin another game of duck-duck-goose. Everyone is in a straight line, with multiple teams doing this. First team that gets to the last person and has the correct word wins. Divide students into teams and have one student face off against another student from the other team. Play five seconds of a popular song from iTunes and have them guess. **Seated Basketball** This one is a favorite because it requires strategy and teamwork. The game is divided up between two teams. The goal is to get a ball into a basket. This can be a basketball hoop, but I have found it just as fun playing it with laundry baskets placed on a table. Each player has their own chair and is played in rounds. At the beginning of a round, the players have a short amount of time to place their chairs in a position. Once placed, they are not allowed to move from their spot. They then must pass the ball to each other, without it getting intercepted by the opposing team. After each round the players become more strategic and shift from focusing on offense and defense.

### 5: Top 20 Youth Group Games - Seedbed

Youth Group Water Games by Krystal Miller ; Updated September 22, When teaching a youth group during hot summer months, plan a variety of water games to help the children beat the heat. From water balloon games to sponge relay races, use your creativity to design games the children will love. Awarding prizes, such as water guns and water toys, to game winners will keep the children enthusiastically awaiting the next game.

**Water Balloon Squash** Divide the children into two or three teams and make 30 water balloons for each team. Have all the teams line up at a starting line about 20 feet away from the plastic tarps. He must place the water balloon on the plastic tarp and sit on it to pop it. When he pops the balloon, he can race back and tag the next player in line, who must do the same thing. The first team to pop all of their water balloons wins the game. To make the game harder, add dish-washing liquid or vegetable oil to the plastic tarps. Have each team stand in a single-file line and have each player stand about 5 feet away from one another. Give the first player in each team line a water balloon. Place a bucket of extra water balloons for the teams in case players drop their balloon. If a player drops the water balloon or the balloon busts, the player must get a new water balloon and start over. The first team to pass the water balloon all the way down their team line wins the game.

**Fill the Bottle** Have the children get into pairs and give each pair a 20 oz. One player on each team must lie on the ground and hold the plastic bottle on his forehead. Give the other player a 4 oz. Fill a large bucket of water for the teams to use to fill up their cups. Tell the players to race to fill up their plastic soda bottle using only the 4 oz. The first team to fill their plastic soda bottle wins the game.

**Drip, Drip, Splash** Tell the children to sit in a circle and play a game of drip, drip, splash. Select one player to go first and give her a cup of water. That player must chase her around the circle and try to tag her. If he catches her, that player is it again.

## 6: Group Games for School-Age Kids

*19 GAMES - FOR JUNIOR OR SENIOR HIGH YOUTH GROUPS Active Games Alka-Seltzer Fizz: Divide into two teams. Have one volunteer on each team lie on his/her back with a Dixie cup in their mouth.*

Written by Vivene Grant Here are 10 fun games you can play with your youth group! Want even more youth group games and activities? This game is played in teams. When the game begins, each team's first player runs to the youth leader to get the first word and runs back to their team to draw the word. When the team has successfully guessed the word, the next player runs up to the leader and repeats the process. This is a simple biblical twist to a classic game of charades. In preparation, think of different actions to act out and write them out on separate cards. You can put them into different categories such as Bible characters, events in the Bible or Bible verses. A player will then choose a card and act it out. The other players must try to guess what they are acting out. Remember, the player cannot speak at all during the acting. A player must talk for 1 minute on a specific topic chosen by the group members. They cannot pause, repeat phrases or use fillers eg. Whilst a player is speaking, another player who thinks they have hesitated or repeated a word can challenge them. If the challenge is successful then the challenger is given a point and must continue speaking on the same subject for the remainder of the minute. If 1 minute is too difficult feel free to shorten the time to 30 seconds. Write the names of different Bible characters on a Post-it note and stick it on the forehead of each person. Players then have to guess who is on their forehead by asking only yes or no questions. Whoever correctly identifies their character first is the winner. If you want to make this game a bit more competitive add a pointing system. Two players stand in the centre of the room whilst the rest of the group watches. Choose one of these players to be Jacob and the other to be his wife Rachel. The aim is for Jacob to locate and catch his wife Rachel just by following the sound of her voice. Rachel must do her best to avoid being caught. Different group members can take it in turn to play. See Genesis chapter 29 for the story of Jacob and the pursuit of his wife Rachel - this is the story behind the game. All players stand in a circle, one person is nominated as "splatter" and stands in the middle. The person in the middle then randomly points at someone and shouts "Splat! The person they point at must duck, then the two people either side of them must "splat" each other, by pointing at the other and yelling, "Splat! The last one to do so is out. This continues until there are only two active people left in the circle. The two remaining in the circle stand back to back, the person who was in the middle counts from 1 - With each number the two remaining competitors must take a step away from one another. Once the countdown has started, it cannot be stopped and the players must continue to throw the ball to one another. Whoever has the ball when it explodes is out of the game. Keep repeating this process until you are left with a winner - the last player standing. Each player is given the name of an object, a name and a place. The player has a maximum of 3 minutes to tell a story using the object, name and place. The next person in line must continue the story using the names they were given. In the end you should have created an interesting and funny story! The aim of the game is to find a Bible verse and read it out before your opponent. The youth leader will call out a scripture i. The first person to find the scripture in their Bible AND have their finger on the verse, will stand up and start saying the scripture, if they are right, they get one point. Play until you have a winner. Board Games are a great way to get everyone involved. Here are a few of my favourites to play in a group: Outburst - Bible edition.

## 7: Youth Group Games - Free List of Youth Group Games

No more duck, duck, goose for this crowd. School-age kids are more sophisticated than preschoolers when it comes to games. They can play more complex games, juggle multiple roles, and enjoy the challenge of figuring out strategies. Getting Started Some kids will take as much active play as they can get, while others enjoy less. Grade school is a time of building identity and self-esteem, so encourage every kid in your group to enjoy the game and find ways to make sure that everyone is able to participate.

**Snake in the Gutter** Number of kids: How the game is played: Depending on the number of kids, make at least three kids the snakes. Have the snakes form the gutter by standing in a line with wide spaces between them, facing the rest of the kids, who should be at a distance. The adult in charge or a child yells, "Snake in the gutter! Those who get tagged are now snakes and stay in the gutter. Those who make it through can make another run through the gutter. But anyone who was tagged must join the snakes. Continue the game until everyone has been caught. If a child is fearful of making a run through the gutter, help him or her brainstorm a way to get through or partner two kids up to make a plan. What the game teaches: Giants, Wizards, and Elves

**Number of kids:** This is a whole-body game based on Rock, Paper, Scissors. Before you begin, explain these rules to the players: To be a giant, raise your arms high above your head. To be a wizard, make a triangle with your arms over your head like a wizard hat. To be an elf, place your hands alongside your ears with index fingers extended. Divide the kids into two teams with a space of about 4 feet between them. Direct each team to retreat a few feet for a huddle to decide which they will be: In their huddles, each team decides what they will be, plus a backup choice. Then they come back to their 4-foot-apart stance. On a count of three, each team yells what they are. If one team yells "Elves! Anyone who is tagged becomes part of the opposing team. If both teams yell the same creature, they do it over using their backup choice. A simpler version of this game, called Crows and Cranes, works well for younger children. In this variation, the adult designates one team as Crows and the other as Cranes. The teams line up in the same fashion as above. The adult chooses the chaser team by yelling either "Crows! Agility, listening skills, teamwork. The children partner up, and one kid in each pair is blindfolded. The partner who can see leads the blindfolded partner by the arm. The object of the game is to get the blindfolded partner to throw the ball at another blindfolded player, then to get the second blindfolded partner to pick it up and throw it at another blindfolded player. If a player is hit twice, the pair is out and heads to the sidelines to watch the game. Kids can help their blindfolded partners defend by telling them when to duck or move in a particular direction. Before playing, remind kids that safety is important. Have the blindfolded kids walk with hands up in front of them for "bumpers" to avoid collisions. Demonstrate how to lead a partner by the arm and direct him or her to the ball: Now squat down and reach out with your left hand. For a fun variation, have kids lead partners without touching, only with the voice. This game can also be played by a group of adults! What this game teaches: Teamwork, listening, motor skills. You can use these variations for anywhere from four kids to larger groups.

**Blob Tag** How the game is played: When the tagger tags someone, they join hands to form a tagging pair. They now chase while holding hands, moving as a "blob. The members of the tagging blob have to work together to keep moving in the same direction to achieve their goal. Break up groups of four into two-person blobs to minimize confusion and stepped-on toes.

**Tunnel Tag** Tunnel tag is a variation on freeze tag. When a tagger approaches a child in this game, he or she must squat down and say the name of a vegetable or fruit for protection. If the tagger gets you first, you also become "it.

**Band-Aid Tag** How the game is played: In this variation, when a child is tagged, he or she places a hand on the spot that was tagged. The child must keep a hand on that spot for the rest of the game. If the child gets tagged a second time, a hand must be placed on the second spot. Now the child has used up all the band-aids. If tagged a third time, the child must go to the "hospital" the sidelines and do five jumping jacks to "get well" and rejoin the game. Motor skill, agility, and teamwork.

**Bottle Bowling** Number of kids: Line the bottles up in a row. Divide the group of kids in half, one group standing on either side of the bottles at a distance. Each team gets a chance to

try and knock down the bottles as quickly as they can. The adult times the kids and names the winner. Another version of this game uses clear bottles and green bottles. The team on one side tries to knock down clear bottles, and the other team knocks down the green ones. Kids may add their own rules to this game, such as a penalty for knocking down the wrong color. Go with the flow, making sure everyone understands any additional rules that pop up. Scavenger Hunt Number of kids: Gather some easily recognizable objects and hide them around a couple rooms of the house. Give each child a list of items to look for and clues to help them find the objects. You can pair kids up or assign teams to play. This game also works well outdoors provided you set some boundaries the edges of the yard, certain spots in the park for the kids to work inside.

### 9: Youth Group Water Games | It Still Works

*This game can be played inside or outside but the boundaries for the playing field must be clearly communicated to the group. Have one, two or three be "it" depending on the size of the group. Cut a styrofoam pool noodle in half or use two pieces of foam pipe insulation available at any hardware store.*
