Contact Skunk living under my shed or deck Skunks are excellent diggers, and like to make their dens in holes underground. Skunks are excellent mothers and will move their babies to a new den site when frightened, but evicting a mother skunk always runs the risk that she might abandon or become separated from her babies. What to do if a skunk is living under the shed or deck Be patient with a mother skunk Your first option is to do nothing at all. Skunks typically live in dens for short periods. Skunk babies are independent by the end of summer, when they leave the den and disperse from their family group. If you make the den not dark, not quiet, and not safe using light, sound, and smell, the skunk can be convinced to leave your property and take her babies with her. Light Place a bright light outside the den entrance. Sound Tune a radio to a talk station and place it near the den entrance. Smell Soak some rags in Apple Cider Vinegar or ammonia, and put them in a plastic bag. Poke holes in the bag to let the smell escape, and hang it next to the den entrance. You can use dirty kitty litter in a plastic bag the same way. Patience and persistence Keep all of the above going for at least 3 days and 3 nights. Paper Test When you think the skunk is gone, make sure with a paper test: Wait another 3 days and nights. If the paper is still in place, the skunks are probably gone! Make sure any animals already living under the shed or deck have left or been evicted first! Relocated mother skunks leave behind babies which are then orphaned without a mother to care for them. A mother skunk relocated with her babies will mostly likely abandon them when faced with a new, unknown territory. In Ontario, it is illegal to relocate any wild animal more than 1km from where it was found. Every year, Toronto Wildlife Centre receives hundreds of calls about baby skunks orphaned because well-meaning people trapped and relocated their mother. One-way doors Many humane removal companies will recommend putting up one-way doors so the skunk can get out but not get back in. One-way doors are a good option between September and December, when tiny baby skunks are unlikely, and the ground is still thawed enough for a skunk to dig a new den. Between April and September, one-way doors can exclude a mother skunk and leave baby skunks trapped inside; in the wintertime, a skunk evicted in this manner may not be able to find or dig a new den. How to Get rid of them: The primary approaches are trapping, prevention, or repellents, as outlined and discussed below in detail. Trapping is always an option for wildlife removal. Much of the time, simple trapping does not solve the problem. The majority of cases of do-it-yourself raccoon trapping have gone awry. You want your raccoon problem to go away - if the coon is tipping your garbage can, pooping in your pool, killing your ornamental fish or birds, or whatever. But if you trap, you want to be sure to get the right animal, in the right way, and do it legally. It must be done correctly, with the right type of trap - one at least 12x12x32 to hold raccoons, and sturdy steel or solid-wall. Raccoons are very strong and crafty and have a way of breaking out of traps. Novices just get so many things wrong. It took me years of trapping to learn to always get it right. So many little factors go into successful trapping. For more information read my raccoon trapping guide. You have to be conscious of the safety and welfare of the animal, and relocate it at least ten miles away, in an acceptable location. A properly licensed trapper, who knows wildlife and has experience, is vaccinated against rabies, and who can do it safely and legally, is the best option. Raccoons in the Attic: If you trap and remove the mother, you will have a BIG PROBLEM on your hands, and you will likely cause further house damage, noise, suffering of cute little raccoons, and a terrible odor as the babies die and decompose. Secure your garbage can and strap the lid down with bungee cords. If you want to get rid of raccoons in your house, make sure your house is secure, with no holes or openings into the attic. If they are getting under the house or under the deck, you can install an exclusion barrier of steel mesh. If the raccoons are in your attic, inspect your house to identify the entry points. When raccoons live in your attic or any part of your house, it is almost always a female raccoon with a litter of babies. Be sure to remove the babies as well as the adult. You can sometimes intimidate a female and it will leave on its own with the young. Accomplish this via physical harassment and the use of raccoon eviction fluid. Remove the litter of baby raccoons by hand, place in a pillow case, and use them as "live bait" to lure the mother into a cage trap, in the back of a trap with a divider mechanism. When trapping, use a large sturdy steel cage trap, at least 12"x12"x32". Always set the trap in the shade, to prevent overheating. Make sure the trap is on a solid, level surface. Bait is not terribly important. Location of trap, and a sturdy set with proper tension matters more. However, avoid meat-based baits to prevent the capture of stray cats. If a raccoon is tipping over your garbage cans, either bring the cans indoors, or strap the lids down with bungee cords. If a raccoon is eating pet food or bird seed, you will need to temporarily remove these attractants from the outdoors for a period of weeks, until the raccoon gives up. If a raccoon is pooping in a swimming pool or trampling a garden, a physical deterrent, such as a board with nails pointing up, fencing, water sprayer, or shock track can keep them away. If it is legal for you to trap raccoons, and relocate them in your state, bring them at least ten miles away from the capture site to prevent them from returning. Raccoons are talented animals, and very well-adapted to live in almost any setting with ample food and water sources - including urban and suburban areas. Raccoons have a variety of skills that allow them to exhibit a variety of behaviors, most revolving around the basics: Regarding the former, raccoons are omnivores, and opportunistic. They will eat from garbage cans which they open the lids of or tip over and

dumpsters which they sometimes get stuck in , and they will often steal pet food. Dog or cat food left outside is pretty much an open invitation to a raccoon, as the animal has no fear of any dog or cat, or oftentimes, human. If the pet food is indoors, the crafty raccoon will still get to it - they will rip open a screen to get inside the patio where the food is laid out, and will often find the food storage, and break into that as well. In one case, raccoons were entering the pet door, going through the kitchen, down the hallway, across the living room, into the parlor, and up on the piano to the cat food bowl. Raccoons are primarily nocturnal, so most of this mischief happens at night. Raccoons are common throughout North America. In fact, they are more common in urban areas than in rural areas. They tend to grow larger up north than down south. Northern raccoons, up in the northern US and Canada can reach over 50 pounds. Down in the south, 20 pounds is large. They are well-known for their ringed tail and masked face. They are not really related to any other mammals. They are somewhat distant relatives of bears. They are very strong for their size. They can swivel the hind feet around degrees to descend a tree headfirst, and are excellent climbers. Raccoons usually give birth to young in the spring. They are omnivores, and eat almost anything. They can be described as cute and talented, and are well adapted to survive in both the forest and the city. They get into trouble with people because they are so adaptable, clever, and handy. As with all animals, they usually just do what they need to do to survive. Oftentimes this means ripping a hole in your roof and living in your attic. They will usually rip up the duct work, tear the insulation off of pipes, rip up wires, trample or pull up the insulation, rip off any paper lining, and sometimes even damage wood joists. The bigger problem may be the biohazardous contamination they cause. They urinate and defecate in the attic, and the droppings can contain raccoon roundworm - transferrable to humans, or diseases such as canine distemper, transferrable to your pets. They also may bring in the fleas and other parasites associated with wild animals. They also get into trouble with those nimble hands. Many people seem to believe that all raccoons carry rabies - a disease that is highly misunderstood. First of all, rabies is a virus, contracted in via an infected animal - raccoons are not born with rabies any more than you are. Third, the virus is only transferrable in the very short-lived contagious stage, in which the animal is in the throes of death - walking in circles, hind legs possibly paralyzed, foaming at the mouth, etc. At this time, the virus is transferrable via saliva. Most cases of human infection are due to bats. The most common thing is a raccoon in an attic, or the soffit , which is under the eave around the perimeter of the attic. They will also nest in the chimney , which is like a big hollow tree. They will also commonly live under a shed or porch, and if possible, under a house. Sometimes they just scratch, poop, and sleep on the roof. Other regional laws regarding wildlife trapping may prevent you from self-trapping as well. Second of all, for those that lack experience, mistake abound in raccoon capture. One of the biggest problems I see is that people have a raccoon in the attic, and set a trap on the ground or on the roof, and catch a raccoon, and drive it off to "the woods". The greatest danger in this case is that the raccoon in the attic is a female with a nest of young - in fact, most raccoons in attics are females with young. She may fail and die, or she may make it back, and never enter a trap again. They will either cause damage, or suffer and die, and then cause a terrible stench in your home. The other problem I see from novices is non-target catches. That is, getting the wrong raccoon. Now the raccoon just tears open a NEW hole results in failure or animal cruelty. You have a raccoon problem, you ought to deal with it correctly, for your own good and for that of the animal. Go ahead and try. In many of the jobs that I take on, the customer has already purchased all matter of magic "raccoon-b-gone" or "coon-away" type raccoon repellents. These repellents are usually comprised of either naphthalene moth balls or predator urine fox or coyote or ammonia. Your best bet is to call out a professional. Raccoons in cages become stressed and can injure themselves. A trapped mother raccoon can be separated from its babies, who will then starve to death. Rather than trap, attempt to eliminate whatever is attracting the raccoon to your property.

To get rid of raccoons, secure the lid on your trash can with a lock or move it inside at night so the raccoons can't eat out of it. Also, double bag your trash so it's harder for the raccoons to smell it.

You may want to read some of my other opossum articles: These animals are not picky when it comes to hunting food and scavenging. Make sure all lids on the trash cans outside are secured as tightly as possible. Trash cans with side locks work best. Smelly as it may be, fox urine placed in the yard may help to deter them. Some people like to use ammonia to try to keep the opossums away by saturating rags in the chemical and placing them around the yard and perimeters. These homemade methods may work for a short time; however, it is likely that they will only be a short term fix. The best way is to capture the opossum in a live trap so that they can safely and harmlessly be relocated to another area where they can continue to survive; just not in your yard. How to get Rid of Opossums in the Home Opossums do not like light since they are nocturnal so they become active as the sun goes down. Call the Humane Society and get one of the traps and make sure to ask about the local laws for trapping wildlife. Bait the trap with basically anything. Opossums are scavengers and not too picky about their food. Remember, they do tend to carry many diseases and bacteria so wear gloves and use caution when capturing and dealing with these animals. If you know where they are entering the home, try and close off their entry point. Using steel wool to cover the hole is always great. Chewing on the steel tears their gums and keeps them from chewing. Stuf-fit is a copper mesh that also works well. Make sure you search the home really well for those babies. Get rid of their food source by making sure the trash cans have lids that are sealed tightly. Do not leave scraps and other foods such as bird seed around for them to get to. Live traps are the best method so that you can safely capture the opossum and have them relocated to an environment that will allow them to survive without creating problems in your home. How to Get Rid of Opossums in Your Crawl Spaces Getting rid of opossums in your crawl space is not easy since you have limited space to work with. Keep in mind these animals are nocturnal so they do not like light. If possible, make sure there is plenty of light getting into the space. During winter some people will use lights under the home but I caution you to this. Depending on what light you use, it may get too hot. Home fires are very common in winter months. You can use the moth ball approach but once again the fumes can come through the air conditioning unit so be very cautious on this also. Place only a few around if you want to try this approach. Try calling local Humane Society for a trap and ask about local wildlife trapping laws. If your area allows capture and release, then this is the best and most humane way to get rid of opossums in your crawl space. They can be baited with just about any kind of food since opossums like most everything and then once captured, they can be taken away to a place where they can make a new home and survive. Four Key Reasons to Hang Up The reasons to hang up on a customer vary from company to company, and there are certainly more than four. However, Shushil, one of our readers, noted four key reasons which will apply to most contact centres: 1. The caller is constantly making personal insults against the representative 2. The caller is constantly yelling or screaming 3. The caller is being consistently arrogant and completely refuses to listen to logic 4. The caller is making physical threats and other extreme things of that nature. Once you have listed these and any other possible situations, Shushil suggests that you develop an operating procedure for each one. A lot of times, companies will transfer angry customers to a supervisor or manager who will deal with the issue. It really depends on the company and its culture. However, these rules will vary from one scenario to another. This policy was created for handling a call with a customer who is constantly cursing. If a customer is cursing: Explaining this operating procedure, Shushil says: That way when the customer calls back an hour later, the next representative can be prepared for what may happen a rude and angry customer. For general customer service contact centres, there has been a long-standing three-strike rule. However, this rule is difficult for advisors to stick by once the customer goes further than just being rude. For example, what can they do when they are subjected to racist, sexist or homophobic abuse? What about when the advisor receives a threat of violence? Diamond, one of our readers, asks us to think about it this way: The policy should provide guidance to advisors in all possible scenarios, highlighting the difference between an abusive and an angry customer. Any terminated or escalated calls should be listened to afterwards with the team member, as part of ongoing development and support. Tina Till One key scenario that could be included is an escalation process if the advisor believes that the situation can be turned around but is struggling to navigate the situation. This is according to Tina, who says: However, the advisor did not have to wait for the customer to respond to their explanation. This seems to be good practice because the customer is made immediately aware of why their call has been terminated, and the number of customers who called back to demand an explanation for why their original call was cut would, in theory, drop. When the advisor had to deal with heavy-breather calls or calls asking for details of underwear etc. David Payne However, there were one or two exceptions to this protocol. While having these rules in place is deemed in the best interests of advisors, some of our readers believe that highly skilled advisors should be able to turn almost any situation around. Richard Beevers, Director at Customer Plus, shares this belief. David Cerezo This is according to David Cerezo, a customer service manager, who says: Remind the customer that we can only resolve their issues if there is an air of reasonable behaviour. When they simmer down, you may learn what triggered them. As David, one of our readers, says: Their job is to understand the motivations behind the call, their position, and take whatever actions are necessary. For example, perhaps the advisor has given their three strikes, but they still feel comfortable and confident that they can turn the conversation around – hanging up may not be the best decision. Coaching resilience as an important advisor skill and empowering advisors to decide when enough is enough is one way to approach this. Giving advisors a minimum number of warnings to give to an angry customer, after which they can decide whether or not to hang up could be best practice. Charles, another one of our readers, says: However, if the advisor still feels in full control, they can carry on if they wish. For example, why not say: There are a number of reasons why an advisor might hang up a call. For each, it is best to have a set of straightforward operating procedures that advisors understand completely. This will give advisors clear guidance on how to use the operating procedures in practice. However, it might simply be a case of coaching advisors in resilience and empowering staff to trust their own tolerance levels, while ensuring that they are aware of their legal rights. Whatever you choose to do, this is a divisive issue.
