We know it when we see it. We know what it looks like. We know what it sounds like. And we cheer when Jesus turns to speak against it. At least nineteen times in the gospels, Jesus takes on people whom he calls hypocrites. The Greek word, you may know, is taken from the theatre. They put on a show, supposedly for the benefit of others. They wear costumes and masks, so their appearance does not reflect who they really are. There is a difference between their outward appearance on stage and who they actually are when nobody is watching. He is warning them against hypocrisy. The illustration is right in front of them – the scribes walking through the temple, expecting honor and privilege and the widow, expecting nothing but giving everything. Jesus is helping his followers distinguish between the reality of faithfulness and all the counterfeits. In a commentary by Tom Long, he notes there are two transformations that must occur if we are ever going to be useful to God or anybody else. First, you have to find the wrong in yourself before turning the spotlight on anybody else. You have to face what you spend your whole life avoiding about yourself. Second, ask God to transform your heart. Only then, says Long, can you move from self-righteousness to compassion. The widow offers all she has – she gives her entire life over to God in the few coins left to her. This is an issue of trust – trusting God enough to take the leaps of faith that make all the difference. Hers is a costly discipleship and stands in contrast to those who consider themselves not just religious, but righteous. Jesus praises her for exemplary faith. They both take a leap of faith – trusting God will catch them. Now about that leap of faith: Fear-based decisions lead to hollow victories at best, endless regret at the worst. Only love-based decisions create lasting happiness. Now, discriminating between fear-based and love-based decisions can be confusing, because leaps of faith are frightening even when the choice to make them is based on love. You can also gain more clarity by letting go of fear through prayer. Spend time asking God what God wants, then relinquish control to God. Take the leap of faith. Conquer your fear with love. Frodo Baggins is the typical hero. Do I look stupid? Or tries to, anyway. The same is true for any leap worth making. If we only ever look at what can be done and never do anything we are not acting in faith. If we believe God is calling us to provide backpacks of food for children who are underfed, we need to do that. If we believe God is calling us to fund campus ministry, we need to do that. If we believe God is calling us to support a missionary in Cuba, we need to do that. Or it may mean as it did for two of my friends, selling your house, all your furniture, your cars and your partnership in a surgical practice and moving to Bomet, Kenya to work as medical missionaries at Tenwyk Hospital. Only you and God know what you are capable of. Some people serve others out of a sense of duty, obligation, or responsibility. Serving others is an imperative and they serve without regard to personal cost or sacrifice. Others serve because serving contributes to the community. They believe living in the world requires them to be needed, trusting that they will be helped in returned. There is a sense of reciprocity in this kind of service. Still others serve for the personal satisfaction. Our congregation puts its faith into practice in very concrete and visible ways. Within the church we serve by leading administrative committees, ushering, visiting homebound members, painting classrooms, and greeting visitors. Mission, however, turns service outwards beyond the walls of the church. Mission connects us with people we do not know to relieve suffering, heal disease, or assist in times of crisis or loss. It places us in situations that will change us as much as we change the circumstances of those we serve. Risk-taking mission and service encourages us to put aside personal convenience and follow Christ into places we would not normally go, doing things we never thought possible, acting with passion, intention and purpose. Ken is a medical technician in his mid-fifties, a husband and father, a tennis player, and a handyman. He belongs to a congregation where he has attended worship for more than 25 years. He first helped with Thanksgiving baskets, gathering canned goods and perishables and delivering boxes to families in need. Then Ken worked with the youth group on a week-long housing rehab project. Later Ken received training and led a work team to Nicaragua where they rebuilt a school damaged by a hurricane. Ken followed a path that fit his gifts and his

passion. None of us can say we have nothing to contribute. We all have something to offer. Some of us are given the gift of music and they sing. Some of us are given the gift of wisdom and they advise. Some of us are given the gift of encouragement and they offer support. Age does not matter. Only faith matters, faith in the power of Christ to work through us to make a difference. While I am writing a sermon, someone else is mentoring a child at University Terrace. While you are making calls to construction companies on behalf of the Trustees, someone else is visiting the sick in the hospital. The body of Christ is truly gifted and diverse and when it comes together with all its varied resources nothing can stop the transformation that takes place. But we need not give up because where there is faith, there is hope. Make a difference with your time, talent and money. What might you, in some small part, do to overcome the evil you see with good? This morning I hope you will take time to stop by the table in fellowship hall and pick up your stewardship letter for . Inside you will find a letter, a brochure outlining our proposed budget for , a financial stewardship card, and a service commitment sheet. Hi guys, happy to see you again, in this video I made guide for a quest called Giving It All We've Got, its a Nightfallen quest to power all ley lines, in the game World of Warcraft Legion.

This woman gave all she had, even though the two coins added up to about a penny! Pennies in our world are almost worthless! If we see one on the ground we often let it lie there. Widows in those days were often in bad situations. There was no Social Security or retirement funds. When a husband died, there was often no provisions made for the surviving wife. It was left to the religious community to care for them. Widows and orphans were often mentioned in the Bible. They were often talked about as the most needy in that society. But this widow approached the Temple Treasury and gave all she had! This is one of those stories we tend to pull out at Stewardship time. This story, like the idea of Stewardship, should be thought of year round! Think about how they make us feel. Because it can be very real. And I think it can help us if we try to understand the attitude behind a person who brings all of themselves to the table. But you know what it means! He wants our best. I think you know that. But why do you think that is? Why would God have such high expectations of us? Is it because God is a demanding and powerful King who exacts a tribute from all his subjects, for his own benefit? He wants us to have that sacrificial attitude toward his kingdom, he wants us to seek his kingdom first, not for his benefit, but for our benefit! To put it another way, God wants the best of us because he wants the best for us! I had Donna put that quote on the bottom of your bulletins. He wants us to know what it means to sacrifice, but even more he wants us to know the life of sacrifice because it inspires devotion. In other words, he wants us to give of ourselves in the best way possible because that leads us to lay our lives before him in devotion and worship and love. Think about the opposite. Think about the other people in this story who were bringing their gifts. Yes, they were giving big amounts. They were giving a token of their wealth. In fact, Jesus may have been telling the people that those gifts were being given to draw attention to the giver! Again, we must take a look at the connection with the previous story. And I believe he was relating that to those who were giving large gifts to the Temple Treasury. Hers showed her complete devotion to God. Theirs was more akin to those who like the places of honor. What is our attitude toward giving? Now, let me say here, that I would incur the wrath of the Stewardship committee, if I even implied that large gifts were being discouraged! In fact, the conclusion Jesus is drawing here about these people giving the large gifts was that they had the wrong attitude. It would have been better for them if they gave like the widow, and that would have meant even larger gifts! Perhaps you recall the place where Jesus said this. Then he says this. Just think what that expression means. He wants our hearts set on him! He wants our hearts to be full of his glory. He wants our hearts to be healed of all the heartache of this world. He wants the hearts of his people to be alive! Remember one of my favorite quoted from St. Who are we like in this story? But it does mean that we remember that Stewardship is not just about what we give, but how we use what we keep. It means that we strive to have the attitude of the widow! Do we so devote ourselves to the kingdom to that extent? We will only find them if we look into our hearts. So, my friends, let us serve God with our whole hearts! Let us give of ourselves sacrificially. Let us know the glory of God through our devotion to him. Let us reach for the highest levels of devotion. We pray that you will help us to think clearly about our place in your kingdom. Help us to devote all of our lives, our time, our talents, and our treasure, to you. Bless our efforts, and increase to your glory the ministry of this Church.
