Origins[ edit ] The English anatomist Henry Gray was born in In , he approached his colleague Henry Vandyke Carter with his idea to produce an inexpensive and accessible anatomy textbook for medical students. Dissecting unclaimed bodies from workhouse and hospital mortuaries through the Anatomy Act of , the two worked for 18 months on what would form the basis of the book. Their work was first published in by John William Parker in London. An imprint of this English first edition was published in the United States in , with slight alterations. His death had come just three years after the initial publication of his *Anatomy Descriptive and Surgical*. Even so, the work on his much-praised book was continued by others. Keen edited the next two editions, namely: In September , reference to the English edition was dropped and it was published as the Fourteenth Edition, edited by Bern B. McMurrich, who also edited the Fifteenth Edition October There is also an edition dated which does still reference the English edition stating it is "A New Edition, Thoroughly Revised by American Authorities, from the thirteenth English Edition" and edited by T. Henry Vandyke Carter – Henry Vandyke Carter was an English anatomist, surgeon, and anatomical artist most notable for his illustrations of the book, Grays Anatomy. Henry Vandyke Carter was born on 22 May , and was the eldest son of the artist Henry Barlow Carter and he was formally educated at Hull Grammar School before apprenticing as an apothecary-surgeon and taking medical courses at St Georges Hospital in London. In June , Carter became a student in human and comparative anatomy at the Royal College of Surgeons, in December , he earned a Bachelor of Medicine degree at the University of London. He began work for Henry Gray and others in , during this time, he earned his Doctor of Medicine degree at the University of London. The publishers of the first edition wanted to ascribe joint authorship of the book to Carter as his illustrations were just about as noteworthy as the text but Gray objected. In Carter joined the Indian Medical Service and moved to Bombay where he took up the post of Professor of Anatomy at Grant Medical College and he remained in Bombay until his retirement in , when he returned to Scarborough to live near his sister Lily. In partnership with Kingston University, the Faculty of Health and Social Care Sciences has moved St Georges into other areas including Nursing, Physiotherapy, Paramedic Science, the Faculty has been congratulated for its high teaching standards, employment rates and cutting edge research in the Social Sciences. St Georges was the first institution in the United Kingdom to offer a graduate entry Medicine degree based on the program from Flinders University with which it has an exchange program. The first intake was in with 35 students and the course has since been emulated by other universities. Entry to the course is competitive with candidates being required to sit the GAMSAT as part of the application process. Most recently St Georges, along with other London medical schools, has been the setting for new television drama Vital Signs, in , St Georges announced that it planned to merge with Royal Holloway to form a single institution within the University of London. The merger was called off in a joint statement by the two principals on 25 September St Georges intends to keep working with Royal Holloway in the field of health, St Georges, Kingston University and Royal Holloway will continue to collaborate in the field of health and social care as part of the existing SWan healthcare alliance. The St Georges campus is located in the Tooting area of south-west London, and shares a site with St Georges Hospital, teaching facilities at the campus include clinical skills laboratories and a patient simulator allowing students to practice based on real-life situations including surgical and medical emergencies. The university library houses approximately 42, books and subscribes to over 10, journals, there is an on-site sports centre including a sports hall, three squash courts, and weights and fitness rooms. ” A morgue or mortuary is used for the storage of human corpses awaiting identification or removal for autopsy or disposal by burial, cremation or other method. In modern times corpses have customarily been refrigerated to delay decomposition, the facilities contain feet long containers where the bodies are refrigerated, but each of these cost a considerable amount of fuel to run and only have so much space to accommodate the body. Morgue from the French morgue, which means to look at solemnly, morgue is predominantly used in North American English, while mortuary is more common in British English, although both terms are used interchangeably. At these temperatures the body is frozen and decomposition is very much reduced. In some countries, the body of the deceased is embalmed before disposal, which makes refrigeration unnecessary. In many countries, the family of the deceased must make the burial within 72 hours of death and this is why some corpses are kept as long as one or two years at a hospital or in a funeral home. When the family has money to organize the ceremony, the corpse is taken from the cold chamber for burial. In some funeral homes, the morgue is in the room, or directly adjacent to, the specially designed ovens, known as retorts. Some religions dictate that, should a body be cremated, the family must witness its incineration, to honor these religious rites, many funeral homes install a viewing window, which allows the family to watch as the body is inserted into the retort. In this way, the family can honor their customs without entering the morgue, a waiting mortuary is a mortuary building designed specifically for the purpose of confirming that deceased persons are truly deceased. Prior to the advent of methods of verifying death, people feared that they would be buried alive. To alleviate such fears, the deceased were housed for a time in waiting mortuaries. The corpses would be allowed to decompose partially prior to burial, waiting mortuaries were most popular in 19th-century Germany, and were often large, ornate halls. A bell was strung to the corpses to alert attendants of any motion, morgue is used in some science fiction books as the name for the armory aboard ships, when they contain some form of powered armour 7. Thomas Jefferson

” Thomas Jefferson was an American Founding Father who was the principal author of the Declaration of Independence and later served as the third President of the United States from to Previously, he was elected the second Vice President of the United States, Jefferson was primarily of English ancestry, born and educated in colonial Virginia. Jefferson and James Madison organized the Democratic-Republican Party to oppose the Federalist Party during the formation of the First Party System, as President, Jefferson pursued the nations shipping and trade interests against Barbary pirates and aggressive British trade policies. He also organized the Louisiana Purchase, almost doubling the countrys territory, as a result of peace negotiations with France, his administration reduced military forces. Jeffersons second term was beset with difficulties at home, including the trial of former Vice President Aaron Burr, American foreign trade was diminished when Jefferson implemented the Embargo Act of , responding to British threats to U. In , Jefferson began a process of Indian tribe removal to the newly organized Louisiana Territory. Jefferson mastered many disciplines, which ranged from surveying and mathematics to horticulture and he was a proven architect in the classical tradition. Jeffersons keen interest in religion and philosophy earned him the presidency of the American Philosophical Society and he shunned organized religion, but was influenced by both Christianity and deism. He was well versed in linguistics and spoke several languages and he founded the University of Virginia after retiring from public office. He was a letter writer and corresponded with many prominent and important people throughout his adult life. His only full-length book is *Notes on the State of Virginia*, Jefferson owned several plantations which were worked by hundreds of slaves. Most historians now believe that, after the death of his wife in , he had a relationship with his slave Sally Hemings and fathered at least one of her children. Various modern scholars are more critical of Jeffersons private life, pointing out the discrepancy between his ownership of slaves and his political principles, for example. Presidential scholars, however, consistently rank Jefferson among the greatest presidents, Thomas Jefferson was born on April 13,, at the family home in Shadwell in the

Colony of Virginia, the third of ten children. He was of English and possibly Welsh descent and was born a British subject and his father Peter Jefferson was a planter and surveyor who died when Jefferson was fourteen, his mother was Jane Randolph. Peter Jefferson moved his family to Tuckahoe Plantation in upon the death of a friend who had named him guardian of his children, the Jeffersons returned to Shadwell in , where Peter died in , his estate was divided between his sons Thomas and Randolph. Thomas inherited approximately 5, acres of land, including Monticello and he assumed full authority over his property at age 21
