Reached at her home in Texas, the former student confirmed the incident, but declined to go on the record with her account. When I went in, he was sitting on a couch, wearing only an undershirt. Last year, Ward, who is now married with the last name of Gracen from her first marriage , told an interviewer she did have sex with Clinton but said it was consensual. She says she screamed loud enough for the Arkansas State Trooper stationed outside the hotel suite to bang on the door and ask if everything was all right, at which point Clinton released her and she fled the room. When she reported the incident to her boss, he advised her to keep her mouth shut if she wanted to keep working. Miss James has since married and left Washington. Zercher said later in an interview that White House attorney Bruce Lindsey tried to pressure her into not going public about the assault. Kathleen Willey, a White House volunteer, reported that Clinton grabbed her, fondled her breast and pressed her hand against his genitals during an Oval Office meeting in November, Willey, who told her story in a 60 Minutes interview, became a target of a White House-directed smear campaign after she went public. In an interview with Capitol Hill Blue, the retired State Department employee said he believed the story Miss Wellstone, the young English woman who said Clinton raped her in I filed a report with my superiors and that was the last I heard of it. She said she would not go public with further details of the attack. Afterwards, she changed her phone number and hired a barrister who warned a reporter to stay away from his client. After reading the Broaddrick story Friday, however, she called back and gave permission to use her maiden name, but said she had no intention of pursuing the matter. I guess he moved on. 5: My Days by R.K. Narayan

Women have been charging Bill Clinton with sexual assault since his days as a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford 30 years ago. It was while they were living at East Knoyle that all their children were born; Mary, Catherine and Susan were all born by but then several children were born who died within a few weeks of their birth. It was a tough time in his life, but one which would go on to have a significant impact upon his later works. His drawing was put to academic use in providing many of the anatomical drawings for the anatomy textbook of the brain, *Cerebri Anatomie*, published by Thomas Willis, which coined the term "neurology". It is anachronistic to imagine that he received scientific training in the modern sense. The Wilkins circle was a group whose activities led to the formation of the Royal Society, comprising a number of distinguished mathematicians, creative workers and experimental philosophers. He was provided with a set of rooms and a stipend and was required to give weekly lectures in both Latin and English to all who wished to attend; admission was free. Wren took up this new work with enthusiasm. He continued to meet the men with whom he had frequent discussions in Oxford. They attended his London lectures and in , initiated formal weekly meetings. He undoubtedly played a major role in the early life of what would become the Royal Society; his great breadth of expertise in so many different subjects helping in the exchange of ideas between the various scientists. In fact, the report on one of these meetings reads: Memorandum November 28, And after the lecture was ended they did according to the usual manner, withdraw for mutual converse. In addition to being a founder member of the Society, Wren was president of the Royal Society from to His scientific works ranged from astronomy, optics, the problem of finding longitude at sea, cosmology, mechanics, microscopy, surveying, medicine and meteorology. He observed, measured, dissected, built models and employed, invented and improved a variety of instruments. Making a trip to Paris in , Wren studied the architecture, which had reached a climax of creativity, and perused the drawings of Bernini, the great Italian sculptor and architect, who himself was visiting Paris at the time. A week later, however, the Great Fire destroyed two-thirds of the city. Wren submitted his plans for rebuilding the city to King Charles II, although they were never adopted. Wren was personally responsible for the rebuilding of 51 churches; however, it is not necessarily true to say that each of them represented his own fully developed design. This honour was bestowed on him after his resignation from the Savilian chair in Oxford, by which time he had already begun to make his mark as an architect, both in services to the Crown and in playing an important part in rebuilding London after the Great Fire. He retired at the general election the following year. In the year-old Wren married his childhood neighbour, the year-old Faith Coghill, daughter of Sir John Coghill of Bletchington. Gilbert, born October, who suffered from convulsions and died at about 18 months old, and Christopher, born February The younger Christopher was trained by his father to be an architect. Faith Wren died of smallpox on 3 September She was buried in the chancel of St Martin-in-the-Fields beside the infant Gilbert. Robert Hooke, who often saw Wren two or three times every week, had, as he recorded in his diary, never even heard of her, and was not to meet her till six weeks after the marriage. Jane Wren died of tuberculosis in September Wren was never to marry again; he lived to be over 90 years old and of those years was married only nine. Holder had been a Fellow of Pembroke College, Oxford. An intellectual of considerable ability, he is said to have been the figure who introduced Wren to arithmetic and geometry. Although Wren was appointed to the Fifty New Churches Commission in , he was left only with nominal charge of a board of works when the surveyorship started in On 26 April, on the pretext of failing powers, he was dismissed in favour of William Benson. On one of these trips to London, at the age of ninety, he caught a chill which worsened over the next few days. On 25 February a servant who tried to

Elected from Wadham into fellowship of All Souls Professor of Astronomy Gresham College London Surveyor General till April President of the Royal Society According to Parentalia pp. He contrived an artificial Eye, truly and dioptrically made as large as a Tennis-Ball representing the Picture as Nature makes it: Wren also studied and improved the microscope and telescope at this time. He had also been making observations of the planet Saturn from around with the aim of explaining its appearance. His hypothesis was written up in *De corpore saturni* but before the work was published, Huygens presented his theory of the rings of Saturn. Immediately Wren recognised this as a better hypothesis than his own and *De corpore saturni* was never published. In addition, he constructed an exquisitely detailed lunar model and presented it to the king. In , he found the length of an arc of the cycloid using an exhaustion proof based on dissections to reduce the problem to summing segments of chords of a circle which are in geometric progression. As Savilian Professor, Wren studied mechanics thoroughly, especially elastic collisions and pendulum motions. He also directed his far-ranging intelligence to the study of meteorology: Although this is incorrect, it was at least founded upon observation and may mark a new outlook on medicine: Another topic to which Wren contributed was optics. He published a description of an engine to create perspective drawings and he discussed the grinding of conical lenses and mirrors. These results were published in In subsequent years, Wren continued with his work with the Royal Society, although after the s his scientific interests seem to have waned: Robert Hooke had theorised that planets, moving in vacuo , describe orbits around the Sun because of a rectilinear inertial motion by the tangent and an accelerated motion towards the Sun. Halley took the problem to Newton for advice, prompting the latter to write a nine-page answer, *De motu corporum in gyrum* , which was later to be expanded into the *Principia*. He also studied other areas, ranging from agriculture, ballistics , water and freezing, light and refraction, to name only a few. Since the early years of the 17th century it was not unusual for well-educated young men virtuosi to take up architecture as a gentlemanly activity, a pursuit widely accepted as a branch of applied mathematics. This is implicit in the writings of Vitruvius and explicit in such 16th century authors as John Dee and Leonard Digges. In English Medieval tradition, buildings had been constructed to the needs of the patron and the suggestions of building professionals, such as master carpenters or master bricklayers. In he was approached by his cousin Matthew with a royal commission, as "one of the best Geometers in Europe", to direct the re-fortification of Tangier. Wren excused himself on grounds of health. By this time, Wren had mastered and thoroughly understood the principles of architecture. Unlike several of his colleagues, who regarded it as a set of rules and formulas for design, he had acquired, understood, and exploited the necessary combination of reason and intuition, experience and imagination. The second was the design of the Sheldonian Theatre in Oxford , completed in This, the gift of Archbishop Sheldon to his old university, was influenced by the form of the ancient Theatre of Marcellus in Rome, thus achieving a combination of classical and modern empirical design. His association with it spans his whole architectural career, including the 36 years between the start of the new building and the declaration by parliament of its completion in Wren had been involved in repairs of the old cathedral since It was accepted in principle on 27 August Wren was most likely at Oxford at the time, but the news, so fantastically relevant to his future, drew him at once to London. Between 5 and 11 September he ascertained the precise area of devastation, worked out a plan for rebuilding the City and submitted it to Charles II. Others also submitted plans. However, no new plan proceeded any further than the paper on which it was drawn. A rebuilding act which provided rebuilding of some essential buildings was passed in It was not until that the pace of rebuilding started accelerating. A second rebuilding act was passed that year, raising the tax on coal and thus providing a source of funds for rebuilding of churches destroyed within the City of London. This plan was accepted, and demolition of the old cathedral began. By , however, this design seemed too modest, and Wren met his critics by producing a design of spectacular grandeur. This modified design, called "Great Model", was accepted by the King and the construction started in November However, this design failed to satisfy the chapter and clerical opinion generally; moreover, it had an economic drawback. Wren was confined to a "cathedral form" desired by the clergy. In he produced the rather meagre Classical-Gothic compromise known as the Warrant Design. However, this design, called so from the royal warrant of 14 May attached to the

drawings, is not the design upon which work had begun a few weeks before. The cathedral that Wren started to build bears only a slight resemblance to the Warrant Design. In , the first service was held in the cathedral when Wren was . There was still, however, no dome. Finally in the cathedral was declared complete, and Wren was paid the half of his salary that, in the hope of accelerating progress, Parliament had withheld for 14 years since . The cathedral had been built for 36 years under his direction, and the only disappointment he had about his masterpiece was the dome: This diluted the hard edge Wren had intended for his cathedral, and elicited the apt parthian comment that "ladies think nothing well without an edging". Among many of his remarkable designs at this time, the monument "76 [32] commemorating the Great Fire also involved Robert Hooke , but Wren was in control of the final design, the Royal Observatory "76 , [32] and the Wren Library at Trinity College, Cambridge "84 [32] were the most important ones. The pinnacles were left bare until , when replica statues were installed. At the age of 50 his personal development, as was that of English architecture, was ready for a monumental but humane architecture, in which the scales of individual parts relates both to the whole and to the people who used them.

Epic narrative allowed poets like Homer no opportunity for personal revelations. There are three explicit references in *Works and Days*, as well as some passages in his *Theogony* that support inferences made by scholars. The former poem says that his father came from Cyme in Aeolis on the coast of Asia Minor, a little south of the island Lesbos and crossed the sea to settle at a hamlet, near Thespieae in Boeotia, named Ascra, "a cursed place, cruel in winter, hard in summer, never pleasant" *Works*. Unlike his father, Hesiod was averse to sea travel, but he once crossed the narrow strait between the Greek mainland and Euboea to participate in funeral celebrations for one Athamas of Chalcis, and there won a tripod in a singing competition. Fanciful though the story might seem, the account has led ancient and modern scholars to infer that he was not a professionally trained rhapsode, or he would have been presented with a lyre instead. The poet is presented with a lyre, in contradiction to the account given by Hesiod himself in which the gift was a laurel staff. Some scholars have seen *Perses* as a literary creation, a foil for the moralizing that Hesiod develops in *Works and Days*, but there are also arguments against that theory. However around 700 BC or a little later, there was a migration of seagoing merchants from his original home in Cyme in Asia Minor to Cumae in Campania a colony they shared with the Euboeans, and possibly his move west had something to do with that, since Euboea is not far from Boeotia, where he eventually established himself and his family. His farmer employs a friend *Works and Days* as well as servants, , , , , an energetic and responsible ploughman of mature years ff. However, while his poetry features some Aeolisms there are no words that are certainly Boeotian. Pausanias asserted that Boeotians showed him an old tablet made of lead on which the *Works* were engraved. However, some scholars suspect the presence of large-scale changes in the text and attribute this to oral transmission. He recalls Aristophanes in his rejection of the idealised hero of epic literature in favour of an idealised view of the farmer. One, as early as Thucydides, reported in Plutarch, the *Suda* and John Tzetzes, states that the Delphic oracle warned Hesiod that he would die in Nemea, and so he fled to Locris, where he was killed at the local temple to Nemean Zeus, and buried there. This tradition follows a familiar ironic convention: Later writers attempted to harmonize these two accounts. Dating[edit] Modern Mount Helicon. Hesiod once described his nearby hometown, Ascra, as "cruel in winter, hard in summer, never pleasant. Thereafter, Greek writers began to consider Homer earlier than Hesiod. The first known writers to locate Homer earlier than Hesiod were Xenophanes and Heraclides Ponticus, though Aristarchus of Samothrace was the first actually to argue the case. An upper limit of 700 BC is indicated by a number of considerations, such as the probability that his work was written down, the fact that he mentions a sanctuary at Delphi that was of little national significance before c. 600. Modern scholars have accepted his identification of Amphidamas but disagreed with his conclusion. The date of the war is not known precisely but estimates placing it around 700 BC, fit the estimated chronology for Hesiod. In that case, the tripod that Hesiod won might have been awarded for his rendition of *Theogony*, a poem that seems to presuppose the kind of aristocratic audience he would have met at Chalcis. *Works and Days*, *Theogony*, and *Shield of Heracles*. Other works attributed to him are only found now in fragments. The surviving works and fragments were all written in the conventional metre and language of epic. However, the *Shield of Heracles* is now known to be spurious and probably was written in the sixth century BC. Many ancient critics also rejected *Theogony*. Moreover, they both refer to the same version of the Prometheus myth. For example, the first ten verses of the *Works and Days* may have been borrowed from an Orphic hymn to Zeus they were recognised as not the work of Hesiod by critics as ancient as Pausanias. Aristotle *Metaphysics* 1026a believed that the question of first causes may even have started with Hesiod *Theogony* 1026a53 and Homer *Iliad*. He seems in this case to be catering to two different world-views, one epic and aristocratic, the other unsympathetic to the heroic traditions of the aristocracy. Despite the different subject matter between this poem and the *Works and Days*, most scholars, with some notable exceptions, believe that

the two works were written by the same man. West writes, "Both bear the marks of a distinct personality: This cultural crossover would have occurred in the eighth and ninth century Greek trading colonies such as Al Mina in North Syria. Works and Days[edit] Main article: Works and Days Opening lines of Works and Days in a 16th-century manuscript The Works and Days is a poem of over lines which revolves around two general truths: Scholars have interpreted this work against a background of agrarian crisis in mainland Greece , which inspired a wave of documented colonisations in search of new land. This poem is one of the earliest known musings on economic thought. This work lays out the five Ages of Man , as well as containing advice and wisdom, prescribing a life of honest labour and attacking idleness and unjust judges like those who decided in favour of Perses as well as the practice of usury. It describes immortals who roam the earth watching over justice and injustice. Modern scholarship has doubted their authenticity, and these works are generally referred to as forming part of the "Hesiodic Corpus" whether or not their authorship is accepted. It was a mythological catalogue of the mortal women who had mated with gods, and of the offspring and descendants of these unions. Several additional hexameter poems were ascribed to Hesiod: Megalai Ehoiai , a poem similar to the Catalogue of Women, but presumably longer. Melampodia , a genealogical poem that treats of the families of, and myths associated with, the great seers of mythology. Precepts of Chiron , a didactic work that presented the teaching of Chiron as delivered to the young Achilles. Aegimius , a heroic epic concerning the Dorian Aegimius variously attributed to Hesiod or Cercops of Miletus. Kiln or Potters, a brief poem asking Athena to aid potters if they pay the poet. Also attributed to Homer. Ornithomantia, a work on bird omens that followed the Works and Days. The paraphrase survives only as a fragment. Thus for example Theocritus presents catalogues of heroines in two of his bucolic poems 3. It has been identified by Gisela Richter as an imagined portrait of Hesiod. In fact, it has been recognized since that the bust was not of Seneca, when an inscribed herma portrait of Seneca with quite different features was discovered. Comparisons with Homer, a native Ionian, can be unflattering. All three poets, for example, employed digamma inconsistently, sometimes allowing it to affect syllable length and meter, sometimes not. The extent of variation depends on how the evidence is collected and interpreted but there is a clear trend, revealed for example in the following set of statistics.
