He and his five brothers and six sisters were called Titans. Ouranos named them Titans because they quickly demonstrated their complete lack of restraint. The Titans not only brought about their own demise, they were also responsible for the demotion and mutilation of their father, Ouranos. The role and title of Hyperion is somewhat confusing. There are many instances in the ancient Greek literature where Hyperion is named as the Sun but most translators ignore the reference and substitute the name of Helios instead. There is also a bit of confusion as to who the mother of Helios, Selene and Eos actually was. The Titans were the first generation of Immortals without some sort of grandiose destiny. Before the Titans were born, the Immortals were responsible for, and took the bodies of, the Earth, the Heavens, the Seas, the Mountains and the dark Pit under the earth Iapetos - the father of Prometheus, Atlas, Epimetheus and Menoitios. Koios - the father of Leto and Asteria. Krios - the father of Pallas. Kronos - father of the Olympians. Mnemosyne - [Memory]; the mother of the Muses. Okeanos - [Ocean]; the father of the Okeanids and the Rivers. Phoibe - the mother of Leto and Asteria. Rheaia - the mother of the Olympians. Tethys - the wife of Okeanos [Ocean] and the mother of the three thousand Okeanids and the Rivers. Themis - the goddess of law and order. The day-to-day exploits of the Titans still remain a mystery except for the most notorious Titan of all, Kronos. When Ouranos became too overbearing, Gaia persuaded Kronos to ambush and mutilate him. For his services to his mother, Kronos was elevated to the role of the most powerful Titan. Like his father, Kronos became too overbearing and suffered a humiliating defeat at the hands of one of his sons, Zeus. However, Kronos would not surrender his authority without a fight. The conflict became known as the War of the Titans and lasted for ten turbulent years. His inauspicious banishment to the Underworld is the last record we have of Hyperion. Automedon, took up the shining whip caught close in his hands and vaulted up to the chariot, while behind him Achilles helmed for battle took his stance shining in all his armour like the sun [Hyperion] when he crosses above us. Loeb Classical Library Iliad - book 8, line - Zeus to Hera, "Nor do I trouble myself about your anger, not even if I should go to the nethermost bounds of earth and sea, where Iapetus and Cronos sit and have joy neither in the rays of Helios Hyperion nor in any breeze, but deep Tartarus is round about them. Not even if you go plunging down to the pit of earth and sea where Cronus and Iapetus make their beds of pain, where not a ray of the Sun [Hyperion] can warm their hearts, not a breeze, the depths of Tartarus wall them round. Automedon leapt aboard behind the team and behind him Achilles struck his stance, helmed for battle now, glittering in his armor like the sun [Hyperion] astride the skies. From his awful head wise Zeus himself bare her arrayed in warlike arms of flashing gold, and awe seized all the gods as they gazed. But Athene sprang quickly from the immortal head and stood before Zeus who holds the aegis, shaking a sharp spear; great Olympos began to reel horribly at the might of the bright-eyed goddess, and earth round about cried fearfully, and the sea was moved and tossed with dark waves, while foam burst forth suddenly: And wise Zeus was glad. And so hail to you, daughter of Zeus who holds the aegis! Now I will remember you and another song as well. In collaboration with architects, agricultural engineers, agronomists and farmers, I eco-conceived this garden towers project rooted in Jaypee Greens Sports City, with the double objective of energy decentralization and food deindustrialization. My approach is holistic, combining the best of low-tech and high-tech instead of systematically opposing them. Our aim is to reconcile urban renaturation and small-scale farming with environment protection and biodiversity. The density, land economics and environmental challenges are immense. I want to prove to decision-makers that strategic links can be established between climate change, sustainable agriculture and urban development. Jaypee is a new city located in the Delhi NCR National Capital Region, one of the largest metropolises in the world with 50 million inhabitants. Located on the Yamuna Expressway between New Delhi and Agra, my city is reputed for the Formula 1 Grand Prix on the Buddh International circuit, and for its world-class cricket stadium, hockey stadium and sports academy. Its population is made mostly of students, white and blue-collar workers. Jaypee is saturated with concrete and pollution, and my ambition is to transform it into a pioneering urban agroecology. I come from farming roots, and lived through the massive, post Green Revolution exodus of my fellow rural countrymen towards cities such as Chennai, Kolkata, Mumbai, Delhi and Bangalore. The Green Revolution, which promoted the extensive use of chemical fertilizers and pesticides, may have enabled India to substantially develop its agriculture beyond the hopes of its million farmers, but this came at a great cost. The green illusion was short-lived, threatening food sovereignty. Washed out by pesticides, the land has become sterile; intensive farming has depleted soils of nitrates; groundwater is polluted with nitrate fertilizers; and biodiversity is heading towards extinction. The social fabric has been sacrificed, too, driving countless Indian farmers to suicide due to the untenable pressure of global market lobbies. Life has been privatized by a few multinationals patenting seeds that also led to an epidemic of cancer, Parkinson and Alzheimer diseases. The boomerang effect from the Green Revolution directly affected farmers, caught between excessive debt and ruin caused by increasing GMO-related production prices, and the decrease in farming revenues caused by economic deregulation. Their sterile land has been requisitioned for the creation of industrial free zones. Hoping to find a new El Dorado, most farmers migrated en-masse to the cities. To reinvent a new urban and human model based on environmentally and socially respectful green development: In the asphyxiated Indian environment, I search for other ways of producing sustainably in order to shelter and feed the growing population. I imagine the city -- my city as territory for social innovation -- by bringing together the climate, landscape, agriculture and use flows. With my wife and urban planner Kamalesh, we both dream of turning Jaypee into wilderness; to transcend it with life, into a "nature-city" that is organically nutritive, mixed, dense, as flexible as needed, and with strong fertile potential. The Hyperions project in which we live is the first example, like an open-air collaborative lab. Through local fair trade stores, we try to progressively reconcile the economic dimension with the social and political approach of a type of agriculture that is more integrated into society. We now farm Jaypee in a sustainable, interdependent way, "Obeying nature to better control it," as Olivier de Serres, one of the first French agronomists, recommended back in Fertilizing the soils with compost and green fertilizers, thus maintaining moist humus and plant-based biomass levels that sequester carbon and ensure durable fertility. Systematic use of diversified crops, which by increasing biodiversity save using chemicals, fertilizers, pesticides, insecticides and fungicides. Minimal tillage such as mulch or non-plowing, thus preserving microorganisms and a permanent plant cover that structure the soil and limit erosion. Growing self-reproducing, diverse endemic crops, and privileging the use of less hydrophilic ancestral seeds. Collecting and optimizing rainwater resources especially during monsoon by putting micro-dams and small filtrating embankments in place to replenish groundwater. Jaypee thus becomes resilient and edible. Our quickset hedges replace barbwire and fences. Groves and tree rows reinvest our fields where millet, wheat or corn crops are rotated. In addition, our cereal crops, together with legumes such as

beans and squash, reduce nitrogen inputs responsible for green gases, while maintaining healthy protein levels. Our small farming businesses thus see their output grow through biodiversity. Diseases, weeds and insect damage become less frequent thanks to such rebalanced ecosystems. Phyto-purification ponds and lagoons merge with the garden towers, in community orchards devoted to spices such as camphor laurels, bergamot trees and other cinnamon plants. Agricultural by-products animal waste, farming residues, milking parlor water, etc. Meanwhile, earthworms re-oxygenate the soil, and beetles and bees buzz again while pollinizing flowers. The towers are built with cross-laminated timber CLT and are covered with orchard gardens. Their name comes from the tallest tree in the world, the Hyperion, a Sequoia Sempervirens found in Northern California, whose size can reach All the wood required to build the garden towers comes from a Delhi forest, which is also managed sustainably, and in which we make sure to renew what we collect with respect for the appropriate cutting cycle and regenerating capacity. Trapped as we are in the New Delhi smog, it is our duty to preserve those carbon-sequestering forests now more than ever. Indeed, one cubic meter c. By substituting these materials with wood, we can avoid the emission of up to 1. Between its CO<sub>2</sub>-sequestering capacity during its growth phase and its low-emission manufacturing processes, one cubic meter c. In order to optimize the residential buildings, our engineers opted for a mixed structure, with a steel and concrete substructure for the earthquake-resistant foundations, parking areas and vertical core bases; and a superstructure made of solid wood columns, beams and walls, reinforced with steel blades where columns and beams meet. Each wood-based structural component is made of multiple panels laid perpendicularly to each other, and bound together with pintles and gudgeons or organic structural adhesives. This mixed structure is reputed for its strong mechanical resistance including in the event of earthquakes; for its high resistance to fire; and for its high acoustic and thermal performance. Seeking a neutral environmental footprint, we wanted to go even further, by producing the "operational energy" for lighting, climate control, hot water, etc. They produce their own electricity thanks to magnetic-levitation, vertical-axis wind turbines VAWTs integrated on their pole. As for me, as an agroecologist, I suggested that the project be covered with a genuine, virtuous feeding ecosystem based on organic aquaponics. They are irrigated with water from ponds breeding several species of fish, whose excrement is naturally rich in nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. In these organic fish farms promoting mixed farming, we also find mollusks and crustaceans filtering and grazing the organic micro-waste. This vertical farming gives residents some food autonomy while saving on the land. Our food is produced mostly on-site or in neighboring agroforestry fields. The six garden towers are like a vertical village with a high social, cultural and use mix. The flexible, evolutionary spaces dedicated to business incubators, living labs, coworking spaces, multi-purpose rooms and concierge services are located behind the solar facades. All apartments big or small, as well as student housing, open onto cascading hydroponic balconies. Indoor furniture is made of natural materials such as tamarind and sandalwood, and comes from local cabinetmakers, fab labs and recycling shops. The various spatial uses are linked together with footbridges, and converge under a large orchard roof that serves as a meeting place for our small urban farmer community. This network of sky-high suspended walkways allows residents to move from one tower to the other, from one use to the other, and to forge social and interdependent relationships among neighbors. From Rajasthan, Jaypee inherits high temperatures and droughts, while freezing currents from the Himalaya can sometimes bring harsh winters. In order to secure the natural ventilation of our living spaces in this mostly hot and humid subtropical climate, we put together a natural climate control system, articulated along the vertical circulation cores of the wind chimneys. Through natural airflow, the external air -- which can reach 45 degrees Celsius degrees Fahrenheit and fall to 3 degrees Celsius c. As you may have guessed, our village basically imitates the climate control of a termite mound. From agroforestry to wood-based construction to permaculture and aquaponics, the Hyperions project is the symbol of a short supply chain economy based on harvesting local resources. This virtuous circle generates links between local producers and "prosumers". Residents, organic farmers, garden producers, agroecologists, loggers, agronomists, architects and designers: Hyperions is a sustainable agro-ecosystem project capable of resisting climate change thanks to its healthy economic and environmental ecosystems. The female offspring of Helios were called Heliades. The Greek sun god had various bynames or epithets, which over time in some cases came to be considered separate deities associated with the Sun. Most notably, Helios is closely associated with, and sometimes consciously identified with, Apollo. Diodorus Siculus of Sicily reported that the Chaldeans called Cronus Saturn by the name Helios, or the sun, and he explained that this was because Saturn was the most conspicuous of the planets. If Zeus had not interfered by throwing a thunderbolt at Phaethon, killing him instantly, all mortals would have died. Helios was sometimes characterized with the epithet Panoptes "the all-seeing". In the story told in the hall of Alcinoüs in the *Odyssey* viii. In the *Odyssey*, Odysseus and his surviving crew land on Thrinacia, an island sacred to the sun god, whom Circe names Hyperion rather than Helios. There, the sacred red[ citation needed ] cattle of the Sun were kept: You will now come to the Thrinacian island, and here you will see many herds of cattle and flocks of sheep belonging to the sun-god. There will be seven herds of cattle and seven flocks of sheep, with fifty heads in each flock. They do not breed, nor do they become fewer in number, and they are tended by the goddesses Phaethusa and Lampetia, who are children of the sun-god Hyperion by Neaera. Zeus destroys the ship with his lightning bolt, killing all the men except for Odysseus. In one Greek vase painting, Helios appears riding across the sea in the cup of the Delphic tripod which appears to be a solar reference. Athenaeus in *Deipnosophistae* relates that, at the hour of sunset, Helios climbed into a great golden cup in which he passes from the Hesperides in the farthest west to the land of the Ethiops, with whom he passes the dark hours. While Heracles traveled to Erytheia to retrieve the cattle of Geryon, he crossed the Libyan desert and was so frustrated at the heat that he shot an arrow at Helios, the Sun. Heracles used this golden cup to reach Erytheia. His other children are Phaethusa "radiant" and Lampetia "shining". By Hellenistic times Apollo had become closely connected with the Sun in cult. The identification became a commonplace in philosophic texts and appears in the writing of Parmenides, Empedocles, Plutarch and Crates of Thebes among others, as well as appearing in some Orphic texts. Therefore, Dionysus, being angry with him, sent the Bassarides, as Aeschylus the tragedian says; they tore him apart and scattered the limbs. The sun-god, the son of Hyperion, with his sun chariot, though often called Phoebus "shining" is not called Apollo except in purposeful non-traditional identifications. Helios is also sometimes conflated in classical literature with another Olympian god, Zeus. Cult of Helios[ edit ] L. Farnell assumed "that sun-worship had once been prevalent and powerful among the people of the pre-Hellenic culture, but that very few of the communities of the later historic period retained it as a potent factor of the state religion". Burnet observes, "but he might think them to be gods, since Helios was the great god of Rhodes and Selene was worshiped at Elis and elsewhere". Hvar-khshaeta, Mah; all the evidence shows that Helios and Selene were minor gods to the Greeks. Their annual gymnastic tournaments were held in his honor. The Colossus of Rhodes was dedicated to him. Helios also had a significant cult on the acropolis of Corinth on the Greek mainland. The scattering of cults of the sun god in Sicyon, Argos, Ermioni, Epidaurus and Laconia, and his holy livestock flocks at Taenarum, seem to suggest that the deity was considerably important in Dorian religion, compared to other parts of ancient Greece. Additionally, it may have been the Dorians to import his worship to Rhodes. While the predominance of Helios in Sparta is currently unclear, it seems Helen was the local solar deity. His name appears on the bronze liver of Piacenza, next to Tiur, the moon. In Late Antiquity a cult of Helios Megistos "Great Helios" Sol Invictus drew to the image of Helios a number of syncretic elements, which have been analysed in detail by Wilhelm Fauth by means of a series of late Greek texts, namely: Helios in these works is frequently equated not only with deities such as Mithras and Harpocrates, but even with the monotheistic Judaeo-Christian god. He can take the form of all animals of the zodiac.

Hyperion also silences and mocks his nephew Atlas, who is complaining, saying he wants to fight and someone should take the sky from him. Hyperion, however, refuses to release him. Hyperion duels his grandnephew Percy, who creates a hurricane that douses his fire power, long enough for Hyperion to be trapped in a maple tree by the satyrs and nymphs. The House of Hades At some point, the tree that imprisoned Hyperion presumably destroys him, returning the Titan to Tartarus to reform. While Iapetus, Annabeth Chase and Percy Jackson are wandering around in Tartarus, they come across a golden bubble in which Hyperion reforming. He convinces Iapetus that he was a good Titan while Hyperion was bad who had tried to kill him and other innocent beings. He hates just guarding the Doors and wants to go to the mortal world. Personality Hyperion was cruel and arrogant, like all of his brothers. Hyperion, however, seemed particularly brutal, like his brother Kronos, and had no qualms about helping re-imprison his Elder Cyclopes and Hekatonkheires brothers in Tartarus yet again, as he viewed them as repulsive and inferior to his Titan race. Hyperion was also extremely vain, and called himself "The Lord of Light", since the light of day came from the east every morning. Hyperion was also somewhat of a hypocrite, since in The House of Hades, he claims that he would have wielded the scythe against Ouranos himself, had he had the chance, while in actuality, he was too scared to do so at the time. The Titan seemed to relish his ability to burst into flames, which made him "the flashiest" of his siblings. Appearance Hyperion is described by Percy in The Last Olympian to be muscular, tall and bearded, with fiercely glowing skin "the color of polished pennies", golden eyes "like miniature suns" with a harsh light. He reminded Percy of Apollo except his light is "harsher. Abilities Hyperion is an extremely powerful Titan. In the old days, when he and his brothers Koios North, Krios South and Iapetus West controlled the four corners of the world, Hyperion was the East - the most powerful of the four, and third in power only to Atlas and Kronos. He was surpassed only by Kronos and Atlas in terms of combat might. He was more fierce and skilled in battle than even some of the most powerful of the gods, holding the upper hand in a battle with a Styx-bathed Percy Jackson who had earlier speedily defeated Hades in his own realm. Ultimately, it was the woodland magic of the nature spirits that defeated Hyperion by imprisoning him in a tree and subsequently sending him to Tartarus. Like all Titans, Hyperion can blast things hundreds of yards away from himself with a yell or a wave of the hand. He can walk on water, much like his half-brother Orion. Tongue of the Old Times fluency: Hence, Hyperion understands and speaks it perfectly. As the Titan of Fire, he has divine authority and absolute control over fire. Hence, he is noticeably weaker when he is wet. He can set himself on fire. He can put out a Greek fire bomb with his hand. It is assumed that Hyperion can launch projectile blasts of flame at opponents. As the Titan of Light, he has divine authority and absolute control over light. He can surround himself with blinding, harsh light. He can travel at considerable superhuman speeds, which Percy could match only with the Curse of Achilles and a tornado backing him up despite Percy having outsped Hades himself. Trivia A moon of Saturn is named after Hyperion. Hyperion is weaker when he is wet as shown in The Last Olympian; because the water is conflicting with his element which is fire. Hyperion and his half-brother Orion are the only 2 characters in both series to have the ability of walking on water without sinking. And she spoke, cheering them, while she was vexed in her dear heart: But great Kronos the wily took courage and answered his dear mother: And Ouranos Sky came, bringing on night and longing for love, and he lay about Gaia Earth spreading himself full upon her. These sons whom he begot himself great Ouranos Sky used to call Titanes Titans, Strainers in reproach, for he said that they strained and did presumptuously a fearful deed, and that vengeance for it would come afterwards. Hesiod in the last few lines says that all six brothers were involved in the ambush and castration of Ouranos: Evelyn-White Greek epic C7th - 4th B. For Hyperion wedded glorious Euryphaessa, his own sister, who bare him lovely children, rosy-armed Eos Dawn and rich-tressed Selene Moon and tireless Helios Sun. It is not known if the brothers were named in the play or individualised in any way. Aldrich Greek mythographer C2nd A. Now Ge Earth , distressed by the loss of her children into Tartaros [the Kyklopes Cyclopes and Hekatonkheires Hecatoncheires ], persuaded the Titanes [Koios, Hyperion, Kreios, Iapetos and Kronos] to attack their father, and she gave Kronos a sickle made of adamant. So all of them except Okeanos set upon Ouranos Heaven , and Kronos cut off his genitals, tossing them into the sea. Oldfather Greek historian C1st B. Each one of them was the discover of things of benefit to mankind, and because of the benefaction they conferred upon all men they were accorded honours and everlasting fame. The Titanes should be listed as children of Ouranos Caelum and Gaia Terra not Aither and Gaia, but the notation to this effect seems to have been lost in the transcription. Hyperion as the father of sun, moon and dawn was surely the great Pillar of the East. Hyperion, as a Titan son of Heaven, was probably also viewed as the primal god who first ordered the cycles of sun, moon and dawn, establishing the regular rhythm of days and months. His brother Krios , on the other hand, presided over the ordering of the heavenly constellations and so in a complimentary manner ordered the year and the cycle of seasons. He and his brothers also seem to have been viewed as the ancient gods responsible for the creation of man, and who each bestowed a quality. Hyperion as his name suggests "he who watches from above" was clearly associated with watching and observation, just as his wife, Theia, was the goddess of sight thea , and so theirs was surely the gift of eyes and sight. The Greeks also believed that the eyes emitted a ray of light which allowed one to see. Hence the sun and moon, whose rays lit up the earth, were also connected with the gift of sight.

Her run in the Oaks was brilliant, winning by three lengths under apprentice Douglas Marks, who turned in his saddle and urged the other riders to "come on! That was her final start. She produced the good stakes winner Restoration by Persian Gulf and stakes placed fillies Belladonna and Highlight, the latter becoming a major broodmare for the Royal Stud producing, among others, Highclere dam of the great broodmare Height of Fashion. Retired to stud at Calumet as a four-year-old in , Pensive made only four breeding seasons before his death in May of at the age of eight. The trio of Heliopolis, Khaled, and Alibhai all exceeded him as sires in quality and quantity. At three, he won the Chester Vase 12f. At four, his best effort in three starts was a second in the Stonehenge Plate. Sold to American Charles B. He closed out his career with 15 starts, five wins, and although short of top class, had proven well up to classic distances, if not the competition. A brown horse with plain head set off by a large snip on his nose, and both hind feet white a fetlock on the right and a coronet on the left. He was a lengthy horse with tremendous hindquarters and a somewhat upright shoulder, giving him the appearance of having a dip in his back.
