In this paper we will discuss the historical background of section 7, followed by possible situations giving rise to the revelation on John the Beloved, including the possibility that questions arose while translating the Book of Mormon. We will also explore the traditional date for the revelation in section 7 and a theory for another possible date of the revelation. It is hoped that this paper will help Latter-day Saints appreciate the wealth of additional truth the Restoration provides about this wonderful disciple of Christ.

Historical Context of Section 7 The traditional date for the reception of the revelation in section 7 is April. This is the date given in the Book of Commandments, the Doctrine and Covenants, and every subsequent edition of the Doctrine and Covenants, including the current edition. A difference of opinion arising between us about the account of John the Apostle, mentioned in the New Testament, John, as to whether he died or continued to live, we mutually agreed to settle it by the Urim and Thummim and the following is the word which we received. A few scenarios could have led up to such a conversation. Perhaps the topic spontaneously came up during one of what must have been many heartfelt discussions between Joseph and Oliver. We know that the issue of what happened to John was a popular subject of debate in the early nineteenth century. In a slightly ambiguous conversation between the resurrected Savior and His chief Apostle, Jesus explained that Peter would eventually be martyred for his testimony of Christ see John. The next verse shows that there was confusion about the precise fate of John from the very beginning: The reading of this account may have been the catalyst for the reception of section 7. Yet because Joseph and Oliver were so busy translating the Book of Mormon during this period, it is unlikely that they had time to peruse the Bible in April. All three sections are directly related to the early translation period of the Book of Mormon. In another instance of revelation prompted by translation, the question of Joseph and Oliver concerning baptism—which resulted in the restoration of the Aaronic Priesthood at the hands of John the Baptist—was sparked by the translation of the plates. In addition, John W. Book of Mormon Translation as Catalyst If section 7 was indeed prompted by translation, what passages in the Book of Mormon might have functioned as catalysts for questions relating to the fate of John the Beloved? One such passage might be Alma. And when Alma had done this he departed out of the land of Zarahemla, as if to go into the land of Melek. And it came to pass that he was never heard of more; as to his death or burial we know not of. Behold, this we know, that he was a righteous man; and the saying went abroad in the church that he was taken up by the Spirit, or buried by the hand of the Lord, even as Moses. But behold, the scriptures saith the Lord took Moses unto himself; and we suppose that he has also received Alma in the spirit, unto himself; therefore, for this cause we know nothing concerning his death and burial. While it does not specifically mention John, this account may have reminded Joseph and Oliver of the Beloved Disciple. Nine of the twelve desired to return to be with the Lord at the end of their lives see 3 Nephi. Jesus discerned the desire of the remaining three: Jesus then explained that they would not die but would remain on the earth until His return see 3 Nephi. One can see how translation of this chapter could lead to questions about the fate of John. Some Latter-day Saint scholars have pointed out similarities between 3 Nephi 28 and section 7 but have not posited an explicit causal connection. Close parallels in the language of 3 Nephi 28 and section 7 are noteworthy. There are no other places in the standard works that employ this phraseology. Furthermore, when the resurrected Lord spoke to the Three Nephites, He declared: What is the significance of these parallels between 3 Nephi 28 and section 7? It is likely that the Savior simply used the same phraseology when speaking to the Nephite disciples and also the Apostles Peter and John. But it is also possible that these similarities may suggest more. These similarities in phraseology open up the possibilities that the discussion of the fate of John was triggered by the translation of 3 Nephi 28 and, further, that when the Lord revealed

section 7 to Joseph Smith, the revelation reflected familiar language from the catalyst. Another Possible Date for Section 7 The theory that 3 Nephi 28 may have been the catalyst for the reception of section 7 suggests we reexamine the traditionally accepted date for that revelation. As stated above, Joseph Smith said that he received section 7 in April. It is not as well known, however, that when Joseph Smith received permission to recommence translation, he likely continued in the translation from the point where he had ended with the lost manuscript. In other words, Mosiah 1 was probably translated first, not 1 Nephi 1. To get a sense of the speed of translation this would have required, the beginning of the book of Mosiah through the end of 3 Nephi takes up pages in the edition of the Book of Mormon. In order to finish translating that material by the end of April, Joseph and Oliver would have had to translate the equivalent of about fifteen pages per day. A statement by Oliver Cowdery, however, could have bearing on the dating of the translation of 3 Nephi 28 and the possibility of this theory. The traditional understanding of the origin of section 7 suggests that the question concerning the fate of John arose in April—either independently of the translation of the Book of Mormon or possibly as a response to translating Alma. If, on the other hand, the discussion of what happened to John was prompted by the translation of 3 Nephi 28, it is possible that the date for section 7 might be the first half of May, rather than April. After the pages of manuscript were lost in June, the Lord took away the plates as well as the Urim and Thummim from Joseph Smith. At some point after Oliver Cowdery began assisting the Prophet in early April, they were discussing the fate of John the Beloved and sought understanding through the Urim and Thummim. Two versions of this revelation exist. The original, shorter version was published in the Book of Commandments. An expanded version was published in the Doctrine and Covenants. Rajesh was God, there has never been such hysteria. Khanna was nominated for his performance in a complicated role in Daag. However, since Rishi Kapoor had paid Rs. During the filming of the song "Mere Sapnon Ki Rani" in Aradhana, Sharmila Tagore was shooting for a Satyajit Ray film and director Shakti Samanta had to shoot their scenes separately and then join the scenes together. They would stand in queues outside the studios to catch a glimpse, they would marry his photographs, they would pull at his clothes. Delhi girls were crazier for him than Mumbai girls. He needed police protection when he was in public. I have never seen anything like this before or since. His films were always known for the music with chartbuster soundtracks. The reason for this was that Khanna used to personally sit in music sessions with music directors such as Kalyanji Anandji, R. Burman, Bappie Lahiri and select tunes for duets and solo songs in his films. He used to be personally present for recording of the solo songs to be picturised on him. Rajesh Khanna had 15 consecutive solo hit films between and Khanna said in an interview: Khanna persuaded Samanta to cast his sister-in-law Simple Kapadia opposite him in Anurodh. The declaration of emergency in India had angered the masses and this helped films having the lead character revolting against corruption to become successes. Actor Joy Mukherjee made Chhaila Babu , a suspense thriller in , which became the only successful film of his as a director, [74] and the unexpected success of Chhaila Babu gave a boost to the career of Khanna. Khanna was the first choice of director Raj Kapoor for the lead role in Satyam Shivam Sundaram, however, Rishi Kapoor, due to his boyish resentments and since few members from the Raj Kapoor camp vehemently opposed Khanna being the lead, the role went to Shashi Kapoor. Director Bharathiraja decided to remake his Tamil box office hit film "Sigappu Rojakkal" in Hindi with Khanna playing the role of a psychopath. When we reached, things

were okay. He enjoyed the mediocre film *The Swarm* thoroughly and refused to leave until the end titles. This was Rajesh Khanna, the star of the millennium. If audiences got to know he was present there would be a stampede and blood on my hands. But Mr Khanna refused to listen. He stayed on till the end. The inevitable happened after the show. All hell broke loose as audiences realised he was there. His shirt was torn, but he was enjoying himself thoroughly. He giggled and chuckled like a child. He did three movies with Jeetendra: *Dharam Kanta*, [94] *Nishaan* and *Maqsad*. Ram Avtar, Khanna played the character of a corrupt politician. Viewers praised his role in the film. According to *The Guardian UK*, he had 11 releases as solo lead hero in the year and eight of them were hits. David Dhawan regards *Swarg* as his favourite directorial venture. He played a variety of characters as the lead hero: *Burman* [] and *Kishore Kumar*. The trio were friends and have worked together in thirty-two films. In *Pancham* found himself being sidelined after failures of a few films, but Rajesh Khanna was among the few who continued to stand by him. *Burman* had quoted in an interview "I have always reserved the best music tunes for Kaka and I don't feel guilty about it, as he deserves it. Although *Amitabh Bachchan* was a fine actor, it will be Kaka who would be remembered forever and stay immortal". From *Do Raaste* to *Amrit*, we gave hits together both as films and as music scores. When we went on our first overseas concert tour in , he came and danced to three songs. He was very particular about his music and would take a tape home if he could not assess a song. He would then give his feedback after a day or two. But if he liked a song at the sitting, he would loudly shout "Wah! Incidentally, he had a stake in *Mehboob Ki Mehndi* too. His music is dominated by *Pancham R*. Then *Laxmikant* made *Kishore* meet *Rajesh Khanna* and *Khanna* winked at *Laxmikant* and told *Kishore* that in that case the song should be scrapped. On hearing this, *Kishore* immediately agreed to sing it by himself for *Khanna*. *Hangal*, who remained part of his "working team" from the start until the late eighties. The lyricist whom he preferred for his movies was *Anand Bakshi*. The films *Samanta* directed without *Khanna* in the eighties were duds. *Om Prakash*, *Prem Chopra* and *D. Rama Naidu* [] and *Jeetendra*. Celebrities of the post era, like *Madhur Bhandarkar*, say that they take at least three or four turns in *Carter Road* at that time, just to see *Khanna*. The younger generation stars like *Imran Khan* still regard *Rajesh Khanna* as someone who would take the top slot as the most romantic hero of all time. For me, in the early s, he was the only hero "romantic to the core, not larger than life, so Indian and real" he was my hero; the reason I came into films and he still is. He was the biggest and the most real star *Bollywood* has produced. They organised it in a stadium. I was with him as we were discussing some scripts. He was like *Caesar*. After , he appeared in only 10 films and declined most film offers. He did 4 television serials in the period " He appeared in a rare interview in the show *Aap Ki Adalat* in , where he quoted to the interviewer *Rajat Sharma*, "I would just ask if I am arrogant, how come all these producers made so many films with me. My fans who turned this actor into a superstar would have never accepted me if I was arrogant. If I was arrogant people would not have made me a *Lok Sabha* member because if someone is arrogant, that arrogance is visible. On 10 April *Khanna* inaugurated the live concert of *S*. He said in an interview on being queried about his decision to do TV serials: *Advani* by a narrow margin of votes, after which *Khanna* stood on the grounds at the counting station insisting that he had been cheated of a win. When *Khanna* was MP, he did not accept new acting assignments, but only acted in the film *Khudai*. He also performed on 9 films which became average grosses.
