Following Neidle , Kagan argues that the latter two genitives constitute different instances of a single phenomenon: The main arguments in favor of such a unification come from the semantic properties of NPs that are marked genitive in these configurations and from their cross-linguistic patterning. Thus both in the scope of negation and with intensional verbs, genitive is more likely to be assigned to NPs that are abstract rather than concrete , plural or mass rather than singular count , indefinite rather than definite , common rather than proper , and non-specific taking narrow scope. Irrealis genitive differs in this respect from partitive genitive. A further distinction between the two types of non-canonical genitive is drawn on the basis of their cross-linguistic distribution. As Kagan shows, across Balto-Slavic languages genitive of negation and intensional genitive tend to occur together: Exceptions to this cross-linguistic generalization Polish and Slovenian are discussed, as is the fact that partitive genitive does not pattern with irrealis genitive.
