**Student Demographics** What is Special Education? Special education programs and services adapt content, teaching methodology and delivery instruction to meet the appropriate needs of each child. The goal of EHA was to ensure children with disabilities gained access to a free and appropriate public education. This law provided local and statewide support and protection to children and youth with disabilities, as well as their families. Schools were required to evaluate children and create an educational plan that paralleled the academic experience of their non-disabled peers. EHA requirements also provided parents and families the necessary support systems to ensure their child received appropriate and adequate services, along with the services needed to dispute decisions made on behalf of the child. The amendments made in IDEA provide children and youth with disabilities access to a higher quality of education-related services, ensuring all students the complete access to the most appropriate education within the least restrictive environment.

**Back to Top Types of Disabilities Covered in IDEA** The umbrella term of special education broadly identifies the academic, physical, cognitive, and social-emotional instruction offered to children who are faced with one or more disabilities. Under the IDEA, these disabilities are categorized into the following areas:

- Autism Spectrum Disorder ASD** Autism Spectrum Disorder refers to a developmental disability that significantly affects communication both verbal and nonverbal and social interaction.
- Deaf-Blindness** Deaf-blindness refers to concomitant visual and hearing impairments. This combination causes severe communication, developmental and educational needs that cannot be accommodated through special education programs solely for those children with blindness or deafness.
- Multiple Disabilities** Children with multiple disabilities are those with concomitant impairments such as intellectual disability and blindness or intellectual disability and orthopedic impairment s. This combination causes severe educational needs that cannot be met through programs designed for children with a single impairment.
- Deaf-blindness** is not identified as a multiple disability and is outlined separately by IDEA.
- Orthopedic impairment s** include those caused by congenital anomalies and diseases, as well impairments by other causes i. Included are conditions such as perceptual disabilities, dyslexia also dyscalculia, dysgraphia , brain injury, minimal brain dysfunction and developmental aphasia.
- Traumatic Brain Injury TBI** Traumatic brain injury refers to an acquired injury to the brain caused by external physical forces. TBI does not include congenital or degenerative conditions or those caused by birth-related trauma. TBI applies to injuries that result in impairments in one or more of the following areas:

After a student is deemed able to receive such services, their progress is annually reviewed. Set reasonable learning goals for the student, and State the required services that the school district needs to provide for said child. Cohort drop deadlines and refund policies will apply. In-State Tuition Form Please print out the in-state tuition form. This form is required of all students who are new to the university, who have not taken courses in more than a year or who are inactive due to graduation. This form must be submitted by the students before students can be registered in courses. Incorrect or incomplete In-state forms may result in out-of-state classification for students who may be eligible for in-state status. As of the fall semester, students classified as out-of-state by the Domicile Office will not be charged an additional fee. However, if a student chooses to take a non-contract course outside of their cohort program, the student will have to pay the out-of-state tuition price. Students designated as out-of-state who wish to appeal their domicile classification may submit an appeal to the Domicile Office for a change in status for subsequent semesters. Domicile status is determined by Admissions upon application to the university or re-enrollment in a program. It is based on the information provided by the student on the In-state tuition form. Upon admission to the program, students are notified of their in-state or out-of-state status in the welcome packet. Students who are quick-admitted will be notified of their status in the email they receive upon registration in their course. Students may also view their domicile status in Patriotweb by clicking View Student Information under the Student Services tab. Students who wish to have their domicile classification re-considered must do so by following the Appeal Review Process. Because Domicile is a university-wide classification, appeals must be submitted by the deadlines established by the Domicile Office in accordance with the standard university calendar. Questions about the documentation or process for domicile should be sent directly to the Domicile Office. Cohorts are collaborative agreements between Mason and third party agencies, such as school systems, to offer Mason course sections specifically for their employees. While admission to the Mason program is governed by GMU, participation in a cohort is determined by the third party agency. Once you have been assigned to a cohort by your school, you should plan to take the courses as they are scheduled for your cohort group. However, since it is not always possible for students to follow their cohort schedule, at times students are granted permission to take courses outside of their cohort schedule. In these instances, students have a few options for taking courses. Courses can be taken through the regular Mason schedule. Payment, registration and tuition fees for these sections will follow typical university processes and deadlines. Students may also request permission to take a course with another cohort within their county. To make a request to take a course within your county system but in a different cohort e. Additionally, students may request permission to take a class outside of their school division. Mason will contact the agency to determine if space is available in the course and if you may attend. If granted permission, be sure to follow the instructions on the form so the Cohort Registration Office will be aware, upon receiving your enrollment form, that you have permission to register.

Embrace Universal Design One of the buzzwords in contemporary education is universal design. This approach makes your curriculum accessible to all students, regardless of their backgrounds, learning styles and abilities. There are several ways for you to accomplish this feat: Relay content in diverse ways visually, verbally, written. Ask students to share what they are learning in diverse ways speaking, illustrating, writing. Utilize multiple materials to engage students software, art, theater, video, object lessons. Showing videos about the solar system. Making models of the planets. Visiting a science museum or planetarium with an astronomy display and program. Looking at books with images of the solar system. Making up songs, poems, rhymes and chants about the cosmos. Drawing or painting images of stars, meteors, galaxies and planets. Acting out a scene of astronauts in flight. However, integrating some basic, daily strategies can make a profound difference in your students. Organizing school supplies, art materials, learning centers and the classroom library teaches valuable life skills while making all students feel part of the classroom community. Being in charge of homework collection, attendance charts, computer equipment or record-keeping teaches organizational skills. Incorporating life skills training into your curriculum is not a one-time proposition. Employ Collaborative Teaching Techniques No classroom is an island, particularly an inclusive classroom. Two or more teachers shift roles between leading whole-class instruction, observing instruction and monitoring learning. One teacher leads small-group instruction while the other teacher works with the rest of the class. This model works particularly well if a small group requires reinforcement or reteaching to master a concept. This approach functions well when teachers require a high level of focus and participation from students. This technique helps students stay on task as they complete shorter activities and transition clearly from task to task. With many students, those with special needs and otherwise, a rigid behavior management plan will not serve you in every circumstance. For example, if you have a student who has a shorter attention span due to developmental issues, it is unfair to expect that student to stay focused on seatwork for as long as students with longer attention spans. It can list, with short phrases, symbols or cutouts, how to review work, put away supplies and find an independent task to do, such as writing in a journal, drawing in a sketchpad or reading a book from the classroom library. Posting a schedule and sticking to it. Encouraging peer instruction and leadership. Using signals to quiet down, start working and put away materials. Giving students folders, labels and containers to organize supplies. Checking in with students while they work. Speaking to students privately about any concerns. Employing specific, targeted positive reinforcement when a student meets a behavioral or academic goal.
