This month we will discuss invisibility. How does an invisibility cloak work? And how can a disillusionment charm work? The eye is a spherical organ that has the ability to focus light into one spot. When light bounces off an object, it enters your eye through the cornea, which is a thick transparent layer on the surface of your eye. The light will then pass through the pupil which is the dark circle in the centre of the eye and into the lens. Depending on the amount of light available, the iris the coloured ring will dilate or shrink. The lens will then focus the image through a gelatinous substance called the vitreous humor, onto the back surface of the eye, the retina. The retina has special cells, called rods and cones, which receive the light image and send it to the brain, where it will interpret the image being seen. Being invisible By far the easiest way to become invisible is to block the reflection of light. This means that no light will reflect off an object and bounce back towards your eye - it will pass through it instead. This is called transparency. This occurs in many objects, and even certain animals possess transparent tissues. The Glass Catfish, which can be found in Asia, has transparent muscle and skin tissue, which allows it to easily blend into its surroundings. While not completely invisible, its transparent tissue allows predators to be fooled into thinking that it is not there. In the case of humans however, since our tissues are NOT transparent, we must rely on other methods in order to achieve invisibility. How could the fibers from which it is made allow one to disappear from sight? To this question, there are a few hypotheses, which we will explore. Invisibility cloaks and becoming invisible Transparency There are a number of methods with which one could theoretically become invisible. The first of which is the reflection of light outside the spectrum of visible light. Our eyes can only process certain wavelengths of light, so anything outside that range is invisible to the naked eye. If it is possible to convert or diffract the light in such a way, then the object could be considered invisible. It would be like having a mini-human shaped black hole. Not exactly the ideal invisibility cloak, unless you are always going to be walking in the dark. Nanotechnology One particular method, developed at the Imperial College London, uses patterned crystals made up of nanoscaled boxes. Each of these boxes holds electrons, which become entangled in the boxes, causing them to disappear from sight and become invisible. Active camouflage Another method explored by scientists is the creation of active camouflage. In this approach, tiny little cameras are dispersed in the material and reflect the image they capture on the opposite side of the garment. In a way, you could say that the garment is like a movie screen, projecting a film of what is on the opposite side of the person. This makes it seem as if an invisible person exists in an otherwise normal-looking world. This makes it a type of cloaking device, which mimics invisibility. Method Effect Metamaterials Finally, a third method, which has recently been published in *Science*, an eminent scientific journal, relies on the use of metamaterials which can deflect microwaves around a 3D object, making it invisible to the waves. A bit like a mirage, this system relies on heat, which renders it invisible. Think of the way water flows around a rock. When observing the water further downstream, it is quite difficult to detect any interruption in the flow at all. When applied to light waves, as it already works with microwaves, this would allow the reflection of specific bandwidths of energy. At the present time, scientists have succeeded in making small objects disappear from sight, but only on small scales, and with the creation of a shadow behind the object. Both obstacles could potentially be resolved using a larger cloak with a negligible refraction. So it would be impossible to have a silvery-grey invisibility cloak like the one Harry Potter owns. Furthermore, according to the laws of physics, a perfectly invisible person would have to be blind. This is because no matter how invisibility is achieved, in order to see, light must be able to be absorbed by the retina of the eye. Whilst invisible, no light would be able to reach the retina, which creates a conundrum. A possible solution to this would be the presence of pinhole sized orifices in the cloaking device, thus allowing the wearer to see.
