Hunted is the sixth book of The Iron Druid Chronicles and it's still just as awesome as when I first started reading this series Atticus, Oberon, and Granuaile are one of my favorite bookish teams in urban fantasy.

He was in a love rectangle? They were both sons of the Dagda. These events took place before I reached my first century of life. Ready for the short versionâ€”the version I heard from people living at the time, not the one written down by Christian monks centuries later? She made the leap from digestive system to womb, shifted from butterfly to egg, and was eventually reborn to this woman, still beautiful but remembering nothing of her former existence. You gulp giant draughts at a time and let rivulets of mead flow out the sides of your mouth. How do you jump from stomach to womb? And shift from an insect to a fertilized human egg? Most of the wards I craft are simply wards of repulsion, to prevent certain kinds of beings from passingâ€”like a ring of salt can prevent the passage of spirits but not much else. Wild magic is capable of doing most anything. The details were given to me by the Morrigan and Airmid after the fact. So he set about wooing her in epic fashion. Not so the High King. "Hunted" is an excellent title, because the bulk of the book happens as Atticus et al. are being hunted across Europe by various people and pantheons he's offended. It's very exciting and eventful, and does tie up some of the vast number of loose ends from previous books.

Hunted is the sixth Iron Druid Chronicle and it would be extremely ill advised to jump into the series with this book as the plot has a ton of references to the many events and characters in the preceding books. Cover art is provided by Gene Mollica. Hunted is the sixth volume of the Iron Druid Chronicles and now the readers are firmly in the middle of this fascinating saga. When we last left Atticus, Granuaile and Oberon, they were just about running from certain doom in the form of two huntresses that were facsimiles of each other across languages and cultures. Hunted opens up with a very tense situation wherein our favorite two Iron druids and their dog are running across planes while the Morrigan is trying to buy them time. The Greek and Roman pantheons are pissed that Atticus has managed to trap Bacchus in a time trap of sorts. So Diana and Artemis have been sent to capture the recalcitrant druid and bring him to heel. Atticus also has Granuaile and Oberon with him across his trek across Europe and he will also come across previous enemies turned allies like the Polish witch coven and surprisingly an ally turned enemy that is Lief Helgarson. Hunted is many ways a thriller of a book than just a regular urban fantasy book. What I really enjoyed about this book is that not only do we get Atticus in all his snarky glory but also Granuaile who gets to be a major POV character with this book. Previously she only had a POV in a short story but with this book due to certain events, it becomes highly imperative for readers to see what she thinks. Like I mentioned previously this book reads much more like a thriller and kudos to the author for structuring this book this way. The author also brings to the fore several storylines that have been fermenting across the last two books and a novella. I was very concerned about this book after the less than fun experience I had with its predecessor. This book does overcome the problems faced by Trapped but not the extent that I would have liked. The book very early kind of splits up into two plot threads and then continues before joining up again in the middle. This move along with the plot twists does help in making this book much more unpredictable than its predecessors. Overall I would easily rate this below the first three as that trio has set the bar really high for the sequel books and it remains to be seen how much the last three will adhere to the awesomeness of the first three books. I enjoyed Hunted, but like Trapped, it mostly felt like preparation for other books. The last two books have felt very middle-book-of-the-series to me. After read On one hand, we get more interesting foes and mythologies, some new magic, Granuaile starting to come into her own, and Oberon, who is always delightful. On the other, once the main conflict of the book is dealt with, Atticus promptly ditches Granuaile and Oberon to try and deal with it on his own. Admittedly, I read the ARC, so this could have been smoothed out prior to publishing, but a lot of times her voice in each felt really stilted and overly formal. My biggest problem, though, has to do with a surprise death right towards the beginning. It came out of nowhere, and Atticus.

And since Atticus should have had the process of binding his aura down by the time he finished the process, maybe they could have sped up how long it takes Granuaile to do it. Work with us here. They got her a magic weapon right away. No one thought to jump on the necklace thing which works so well for Atticus. There is plenty of excitement, some shocking moments and an interesting ending which will bring some changes to the series. This a great series. Luke Daniels is fabulous. He brings this series to life with his narrative and he has so many characters to draw from which helps with this giant cast. Definitely give this series, and especially these audiobooks, a try. Although I already determined it would be unwise, I asked anyway to see what Odin would say. Hunted (The Iron Druid Chronicles #6) by Kevin Hearne 4 of 5 Stars Druids Atticus O'Sullivan and Granuaile, along with faithful wolfhound Oberon are on the run from the Roman and Greek goddesses of the hunt Diana and Artemis for trapping Bacchus.

His defining physical characteristics are his fiery red hair, and strong physical presence, and the similar build as a very, very fit 21 year old. His main trait that identifies him are a series of connected tattoos running up his arm and down his right side, down to his right foot. These tattoos connect him to the earth, and are the conduits of his power. Living over years has made Atticus cynical, stoic, world-weary, and very used to being alone. He has lived all over the world, and finally settled in Tempe, Arizona because it is a two hour drive from the nearest trees that allow Faeries to enter this plane. Throughout the series, Atticus is faced by various mythological and human enemies, and continues to live through a mix of paranoia, cunning, layers of planning and sometimes the help of others. In several instances in the series he has completely lost his normally cool composure when in the presence of women he finds attractive. He draws power from the Earth through his tattoos when he is physically in contact with the ground. While this gives him access to near-limitless supply for power, it puts him at a major disadvantage when in areas that are paved over or he is otherwise off the ground. He can, however, store a limited amount of power in his Bear charm, which acts as a small magic battery. This process can create or break mental or physical connections between these things, as well as alter them at the cellular or even molecular level to change them. This allows him to accomplish such feats as forming a telepathic bond with another creature, changing the properties of herbs to achieve specific effects, cause physical objects to attract each other or even fuse, break the bonds within substances so they fall apart, and altering his own body in a variety of ways including healing wounds, shapeshifting, and enhancing his eyesight, strength, and speed. Atticus also has the ability to travel between realms by binding and unbinding himself to the plane. Druidic magic cannot directly harm a living being, or the spell will kill the druid on the spot. However, the rules of druid magic do not prohibit indirect harm. Whenever Atticus is severely hurt, he can maximize his healing process by lying on bare earth on his right side, so the full extent of his strip of tattoos are touching the ground. In the events of *Hounded*, he received a trinity tattoo from Brighid that calls forth Cold Fire that can destroy all demons in his presence that are touching the earth. However using it leaves him extremely drained to the point he can barely stand after using this. Atticus maintains his youth through the continued use of what he calls "Immortali-tea", which he also feeds to his Irish Wolfhound, Oberon, and to his apprentice, Granuaile. In addition to being effectively immortal, he has also struck a bargain with the Celtic chooser of the slain, The Morrigan - teaches her the magic behind his amulet, she will never actually choose him to be slain in battle. *Being Separated From the Earth*: That said, artificial materials such as cement or steel do not count as the Earth. Also, were his tattoo removed through severe damage or by amputation, he would lose his ability to call some or all his magic from the Earth until the tattoo was repaired by another Druid. His discovery of a loophole in the interaction of magic and normally anti-magic iron resulted in his creation of a powerful amulet that lets him resist many types of magic. This makes him way more powerful than a normal druid, magically, and its resistance makes him consequently able to fight gods on equal footing. This also causes his very presence to be unhealthy to faeries, and his touch, fatal. It took him centuries and the aid of an Iron Elemental to form. He has since created similar Amulets for The Morrigan and Granuaile. *Charms* - Attached to his Amulet is a series of Charms which allows him to cast magic faster Atticus explains them to Granuaile as "macros" in *Tricked*. *Bear Charm* which acts as general magic storage, for whenever Atticus needs magic, but is not directly connected to the earth. *Faerie Specs Charm* which provides him the ability to see the magical realm, such as enchantments and auras. *Fulgurite Stone Back* In book 3, our hero gains a fulgurite rock petrified lightning that he puts on his amulet. It prevents death by lightning. *Healing Charm* in case Atticus needs to heal himself or another quickly, the Healing charm allows him to cast the spell instantly, but still requires magical energy to spend. *Night Charm* which provides nightvision. *Shapeshifting Charms* to allow Atticus to shapeshift into his 4 forms: These forms were chosen by the earth when Atticus

was bound to the earth during his Tattooing. His amulet and charms are small enough that he can continue wearing the object while shapeshifted. Naturally he had no way to test it, but it appears to have worked during the events of Hunted when he was shot in the head by a sniper. Vampire Charm while not fully created yet, Atticus has mentioned several times that creating a charm to easily unbind Vampires which are undead and therefore not protected by the laws of Druidic magic would be a very good idea. He has a prototype by book 5 that needs tweaking to function properly. Fragarach - an ancient enchanted sword with the ability to effortlessly cleave through both armor and lies. The sword also can control the winds. Moralltach - another ancient enchanted sword which can kill anything with a single cut. Gungnir - Old Norse for "swaying one" is the spear of the god, Odin. It is enchanted to never miss its intended target and always kills when it strikes, but this power has certain exceptions.
