There are many factors to consider when making this decision but considering the drop in the Indian economy, it would be advisable to pick a country where you can find a balance between a good quality of life and a better exchange rate for the rupee. There are many advantages to attending a private university including flexibility, more extracurricular activities, a large number of on-campus organisations to be a part of and occasionally a better quality of education although that may not always be true. It is obvious that the more time spent on attaining your degree, the more money you are likely to spend on course fees and living expenses. For example, the course duration for a Bachelor of Arts BA degree programme in the United Kingdom is three years whereas the same programme would take four years to complete in the United States of America. However, since the American system of credits allows for flexibility, it is possible to complete the course quicker by taking up summer school programmes or attending extra classes during the semesters. Wondering how life would be just so perfect if a leading university like Harvard or Cambridge came knocking on your door with a fantastic scholarship? You might not get a literal knock on your door, but you may get to walk down their hallowed halls at little cost. Run a generic search of universities that provide scholarships to Indian students. Search for government-aided and privately awarded scholarships available for Indian students to study abroad. Short-list those scholarships and universities that suit your requirements. Look up the tuition fees and living expenses of the universities so you have a rough idea of how much funding to ask for. Apply to multiple scholarship-awarding bodies. Similarly, forms for privately funded scholarships are available in their respective websites. Read all the clauses of government and private scholarships. They may contain terms you may not find agreeable, for example, one may state that the student has to return to work in their own country or in a particular sector. Focus on these to ensure chances of getting the scholarship. Use your strengths to your advantage. For example, if you are good at debating, mention how this reflects your command over English, your speaking skills, your confidence, etc. Give a rounded impression of yourself, your aspirations and what the scholarship can do for you. A good application essay will increase your chances of winning the scholarship. In fact, submit your application way before so that you are on top of the pile and get preference above others. Missing the deadline will ruin your chances completely. If you are good enough and deserve the scholarship, you will be awarded. They are a mix of government-aided and privately funded scholarships. Covers subsistence allowances, travel costs, tuition fees and all university fees. Also pays for individual insurance on health, travel and accidents. Requires an Indian citizenship. You must not have resided or carried out any activity like studies or work for more than 12 months in any eligible European country five years before applying. The application usually opens in December and closes by mid-February. Covers university and college fees and living expenses for term and vacation time. Air travel expenses borne as well. Besides an outstanding academic performance, commitment and capacity for leadership is also considered. You must be

between 19 and 25 years old as of 1 October of the year of application. You should also possess a first class degree in either humanities, engineering, agriculture, sciences, law or medicine from an Indian university. The application form is available online by 1 June. Complete applications must be submitted by 31 July of the same year. Covers tuition and university fees, living expenses, J-1 visa support and round trip travel expenses. Applicants should have graduated from a recognised Indian university with a good academic award. Mid-career professionals up to the age of 45 may apply if they want to go abroad for research studies. Application forms are available from the first week of December at their administrative office. The deadlines vary every year but are announced through advertisements. Consider the choices that lie ahead of you: Also, the admission process can be overwhelming; from getting your documents in place to keeping up with university deadlines. Agents make this process easier by organising and submitting your documents, helping you get your student visa and even booking your tickets. However, ensure you carry out your own research as they might promote certain universities due to vested interests. If you are looking to save money, you should consider applying on your own. They even have joint sessions with parents and provide more individual attention to each student. After that, you can send your application on your own to save additional costs. Early decision is binding; this means if you apply to a certain university under ED early decision, you are obliged to attend the course. On the other hand, if you apply and are accepted under EA early action, you have the option of turning down the offer letter. Here are some things you should consider while applying for EA or ED: Therefore, you should be sure of your choice before applying. You are also entitled to financial aid under ED. This means you cannot apply to any other universities during the early action period till mid-December. Some of them inform you about the process and timelines but the application has to be carried out by you. Sometimes, these options can lead to more confusion and you still have to find a definite answer on your own. Universities also list details of admissions officers to answer your queries. It takes considerable organisation and focus to ensure you have your documents, visas, tests, scholarship applications, etc ready in time. While applying on your own, you will have to keep an eye out for latest developments. Advanced countries have country websites giving a comprehensive overview of the educational system, admission norms, schedule of applications, and links to different universities, and the standardised tests required. In addition, each university website provides prospectuses and application forms with specifics for international students. Seeking advice

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and guidance of agents is practical to sort out confusion about the technicalities, and practicalities, but the agent should not be deciding what the student should study and where, and to write in their application essay, because then the student is not in the driving seat at all. The final decision should be an informed one aligned with personal career and life goals.
