This time make only the fleece dry, while the ground around it is covered with dew. Only the fleece was dry and the ground around it was covered with dew. The Midianites were camped north of them near the hill of Moreh in the valley. Bring them down to the water and I will thin the ranks some more. The rest of the men should go home. Gideon sent all the men of Israel back to their homes; he kept only three hundred men. Now the Midianites were camped down below in the valley. Attack the camp, for I am handing it over to you. Then you will be brave and attack the camp. Their camels could not be counted; they were as innumerable as the sand on the seashore. I had a dream. I saw a stale cake of barley bread rolling into the Midianite camp. It hit a tent so hard it knocked it over and turned it upside down. The tent just collapsed. God is handing Midian and all the army over to him. He gave them all trumpets and empty jars with torches inside them. I am going to the edge of the camp. Do as I do! They blew their trumpets and broke the jars they were carrying. They held the torches in their left hand and the trumpets in their right. The whole army ran away; they shouted as they scrambled away. The army fled to Beth Shittah on the way to Zererah. They went to the border of Abel Meholah near Tabbath. But there are times when more may not be better. When we come to the story of Gideon and his fleece, we are dealing with one of the most popular stories in the Book of Judges. Fleeces, jars, torches, and trumpets are a welcome subject in the Book of Judges. But let us keep in mind that our familiarity with this story may also work against us. We may be inclined to hear it as we have heard it before, without looking at the details as carefully as we should. Remember that the most dangerous stretch of road “so far as traffic accidents are concerned” is that stretch with which we are most familiar. We know from what we read in chapter 6 that they have sunk to the level of worshipping Baal and Asherah, Canaanite deities. As a result, God gave them over to the Midianites and an eastern alliance of nations. These were a nomadic people, so for seven years they came at will but most often during harvest time, plundering the land and leaving the Israelites in desperate straits. Adding insult to injury to Baal and his consort, Asherah, Gideon offers a sacrifice to God at this place, using a bull the symbol of Baal for the sacrifice and the wood of the Asherah pole for the firewood. The people of his hometown were furious and demanded that his father turn Gideon over to them to be put to death. The events of the previous night brought something into very clear focus for him. If Baal was so all-powerful, then why did the townspeople need to come to his rescue? No, let Baal take up his own offense with Gideon. Joash threatened to kill anyone who sought to defend this worthless god. Not only did they give up their opposition to Gideon, they began to follow him. The eastern coalition converged on the Israelites, staging for battle in the Valley of Jezreel. His own clan the Abiezrites and his entire tribe Manasseh, along with Asher, Zebulun, and Naphtali assembled to go to battle, following Gideon as their leader. Only the fleece was dry and the ground around it was covered with dew Judges 6: Here is what I believe happened. The Midianites somehow discerned that a rebellion on the part of the Israelites was imminent. They, along with their eastern allies, crossed the Jordan river and set up camp in the Jezreel Valley, poised to reassert their dominance. The Spirit of the LORD came upon Gideon, so that he was virtually compelled to blow the trumpet, summoning his fellow-Israelites to war. From his elevated position probably Mount Gilboa, Gideon was able to look out upon the Jezreel Valley and to observe the size of the opposing army. We know what Gideon would have seen from this later description in verse 12 of chapter 7: Now the Midianites, Amalekites, and the people from the east covered the valley like a swarm of locusts. Their camels could not be counted; they were as innumerable as the sand on the seashore Judges 7: Just what was it that Gideon was seeking to achieve by requesting this sign? God had made His will very clear: He was going to deliver Israel through Gideon. Gideon was certain that this was the God of Israel speaking to him 6: There was one thing Gideon found difficult, even

impossible, to believe that God would deliver Israel from the Midianites through him. That was what Gideon wanted God to confirm, not merely with words, but with a sign. We believe in the Lord Jesus, and we know that we are eternally saved, safe and secure in His keeping. We believe that God is going to bring many to faith. We even believe that God may bring revival to our country, to our city, and perhaps even to our neighborhood. But we have our doubts when we consider the possibility that God intends to accomplish these great things through us. That is what this test is all about. That will convince him that God is really going to use him to deliver the Israelites. And so it came about in the morning that the fleece was wet, and the ground around it was dry, just as Gideon had stipulated. And so in truly scientific fashion he reverses the test. Graciously, and without a word of rebuke, God grants his request. The bad news is that Gideon is reluctant to take God at His word. The good news is that Gideon is not proud, arrogant, or confident in his own abilities. Gideon is scared to death and clinging desperately to God. Our culture says otherwise, and thus many Christians think otherwise. Much like the secular world, we think that those most likely to succeed are the ones who have great intellect, healthy self-esteem, are good looking, and aggressive. Thinning Out the Ranks Judges 7: Now the Midianites were camped down below in the valley Judges 7: Do you not find it noteworthy that our author would refer to Gideon as Jerub-Baal in verse 1? I believe that he is reminding us of the events of chapter 6 and is keeping before us the challenge to Baal and all the Canaanite deities that is being made here. Baal could not give Israel prosperity, nor did he deliver her from Midianite bondage. Baal could not even defend himself from a timid fellow like Gideon. So how will the God of Israel fare in this contest with the Midianites and thus with the Canaanite deities in chapter 7? We shall soon see. Consider this text through the eyes of a man who lacks courage. He first requested that God prove His identity. Gideon next requested that God verify His promise to deliver Israel through him. Here stands a man who has just sounded the trumpet for his fellow-Israelites to assemble for warfare, and 32, have shown up. But these are far too few to match the combined forces of the eastern alliance. And yet now, in our text, God is going to reduce this fighting force of 32, warriors to a mere in number. The Midianites and their allies have come from east of the Jordan and have crossed over into Israel, setting up camp in the Jezreel valley, on the southern side of the Hill of Moreh, and to the north of the Israelites, who are camped by the spring of Harod. Gideon has just tested God twice, and now God will test him by a two-fold reduction of his forces. The key to understanding our text is found in verse 2: In Deuteronomy 7, God instructs the Israelites not to fear their enemies because they are greater in number and strength, for it is He who will defeat them. He made water flow from a flint rock and 16 fed you in the desert with manna which your ancestors had never before known so that he might by humbling you test you and eventually bring good to you. The greatness of God is the cure to our fears regarding our inadequacies and weaknesses. It is also the greatness of God that should be the preventative for any pride or arrogance on our part, for when victories are won, it is He who has done it, not us. Thus, the greatness of our God should keep us from fear and from pride. Surely Gideon felt that a mere 32, men would not be sufficient to defeat the horde of Midianites who were spread out before him in the Valley of Jezreel, but God will now reduce his resources by means of a two-step process, which will leave him with a mere men. No one would dare to take the credit for the victory God will bring about through this small, unarmed force. The reason for this reduction is: When God graciously granted Gideon the signs he requested, it had to be with this in view.

Read with me, beginning in Exodus After they started out from Rephidim, they entered the Desert of Sinai. They camped there in the desert in front of the mountain. Then Moses went up to God. The Lord called out to him from the mountain. You saw how I carried you on the wings of eagles and brought you to Myself. If you do, then out of all of the nations you will be my special treasure. The whole earth is mine. But you will be a kingdom of priests to serve me. You will be my holy nation. So far, do you think that the Israelites had been trusting God in the wilderness? He told the people to wash their clothes. This may sound strange to us because we wear clean clothes everyday. But remember, these people had been traveling for 3 months in the desert. Can you imagine how dirty their clothes must have been? Show a really dirty piece of clothing. When God told them to wash their clothes, He was helping the people understand that just as their clothes were dirty, their hearts were polluted as well. They needed God to clean them from the inside out! God wanted the people to be physically and spiritually ready to hear from Him. Show that same piece of clothing completely new and clean. After the people washed their clothes, Moses led the people to the foot of the mountain. God set a boundary line around Mt. Sinai that they were not allowed to cross. They were not to go up the mountain, or even touch the mountain. The people were warned not to approach God, because He is holy, and they were sinful. God sent thunder and lightning, a thick cloud over the mountain, and a loud trumpet blast. Everyone in the camp trembled with fear and awe of God. God called Moses up to the mountain, and there He gave him the 10 Commandments. These 10 Commandments would teach the people more about God. It showed that He requires the high standard of perfect behavior because He is perfect. God also gave these rules to show love and protection to His people. These rules would help them keep away from the dangers of sin. The commandments showed the people their need to separate from sin and turn to God. God wrote the 10 Commandments on two stone tablets. These commandments were written on stone to symbolize that they could not be changed. It stands firm in the heavens. The first four commandments are all about our relationship to God. The last six commandments are about our relationship to other people. Rule 1 Exodus There is no other Lord. I am the one and only God. If toys, family, being popular, video games, sports, hobbies, or anything else becomes more important to you than God is; you have broken this commandment. Rule 2 Exodus Do not bow down to them or worship them. That is my name! I will not let any other god share my glory. I will not let statues of gods share my praise. Be careful about directing too much attention to pictures, statues, or symbols of God. God is a spirit, and there is no need to form a physical image of Him or of anything He created angels. Rule 3 Exodus Often His name is used while cursing or joking. Rule 4 Exodus God was telling the people that their bodies needed one day a week for rest and worship. Even today, our culture promotes over-busyness. God wants us to be still and quiet so that we can listen to Him. Rule 5 Exodus God wants our homes and family life to be peaceful and filled with love. Children should be respectful and obey their parents. God provides parents to help, protect, and teach their children. What are some ways that you can show respect to your parents? This commandment has a promise in it. It says that if you honor your parents, you will live a long time on the earth. Raise your hand if you want things to go well in your life. God has made a promise to you. Respect and obey your parents and watch this promise come true! Rule 6 Exodus God created man in His own image, and God gives life to all. It is wrong

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to take away life from another person. But even more than that, God tells us that if we WISH that someone were dead, that is the same thing as murder! When a person is married, God tells them that they are to show romantic love only to their husband or wife. The Bible also tells us all to have pure thoughts toward other people. Rule 8 Exodus Stealing is taking something that does not belong to you. Have you ever had something stolen from you? God is the one who provides what we have. We should trust that God gives us everything we need. Rule 9 Exodus God can do anything “ except for this: The Bible says that lying is his native language. This commandment warns us not to be like Satan, but rather to be like God and speak the truth. Rule 10 Exodus This means that we should not want what other people have. The Bible tells us to be content with what we have. Be happy with what you have. I will never desert you. Soon they would realize that there was no way to keep all of these commandments perfectly, all the time, on their own. They desperately needed God! The interesting thing to note here is that these 10 Commandments really were not new. God had already written them in the hearts of people.

Now notice, God has obligated Himself only to the extent of our needs. That would include food, clothing, shelter, companionship, love, and salvation thru Jesus Christ. It would not include the multiplicity of luxuries that we have come to think of as needs. God has promised that His grace is sufficient for us. It is through an obedient faith that we have access into the grace of God according to Romans 5: God has promised that His children will not be overtaken with temptation. Instead, He assures us that a way of escape will be provided. This promise is recorded in I Corinthians He did deliver Daniel from the den of lions. God has promised us victory over death. He first resurrected Jesus by way of assuring our resurrection. Paul wrote to the Corinthians: Later on he adds: God has promised that all things work together for good to those who love and serve Him faithfully Romans 8: It may be difficult for us to see and understand how this is accomplished at times, but God has promised it, and He will deliver. God has promised that those who believe in Jesus and are baptized for the forgiveness of sins will be saved. God has promised His people eternal life John In closing, let me appeal to you to live so that the promises of God will be yours.

For example, our subcontract requires written prior approvals on extra work in order for subcontractors to get paid. The problem is really not doing what one agreed to do. When you tell the truth and do what you agree to do, whether verbal or written, your customer knows what to expect, all the time. When you sign contracts or make promises, and then change your commitment or attempt to alter the written agreement after the fact, your customer gets confused and upset with your integrity. These issues become evident when the promise and results differ. Just do what you promise! And the word finish means finished! You create drop-dead deadlines by making promises and agreeing to do something. Never tell people what they want to hear just to make them happy. Ask before you commit: Honesty is the only policy in every instance. The truth will always surface eventually. Customers respect and trust honesty about the news,. Years ago we were working for a construction manager who asked us to pad our construction budget and pay a few of his expenses from the extra money. I was put into the middle of a tough situation. The construction manager was the person who approved our invoices, change order requests, and workmanship. But the developer was our ultimate customer. He listened, thanked me for the information, and then asked us to meet with him and the construction manager to discuss the facts. In the meeting, the construction manager denied the claims and proceeded to yell and scream obscenities at us. The developer fired him and we finished the project. Ten years later we still build for this developer and the construction manager is out of business selling used cars. Does it cost more to find new customers over and over or keep the ones you have? When you stretch the truth, your customers are always looking for other providers as you make their lives miserable. New customers are harder to find than keeping the ones you have. All it takes is straight and pro-active communication. Communicate about what they expect and how you can deliver it. Do your customers want it faster, better or their way? What do they really want and need? What will make them satisfied with your performance? What problems can you solve to make their job go better? How can you act like a partner versus a vendor? When asked, customers value reliability, responsiveness, and empathy higher than providing a good quality product or a lower price. Building projects for customers seems like it should be easy. Bid them, get contracts signed, and then build them per the plans and specifications. But the survey shows just doing work is not enough. You must give customer exactly what you have promised to perform, and then go and do it. Consider each project a new opportunity to deliver as promised. Be Responsive - Be available, accessible and respond promptly to customer requests. Keep customers constantly informed of everything happening on their project or account. Be overly pro-active in your communications and call your customers every few days. Be Empathic - Show customers you care about them, put them first and treat them special. Remember your customers are the only way you can build a profitable business. Treat each customer like they are worth at least ten times the contract amount.
