When I married, he felt betrayed because our Mama had died and I left home. Another betrayal but he coped and grew close to our other siblings who lived with her. Eventually, Daddy was sent away too when the new wife got all she could from him. I think they both suffered during that period. My first clear memory of Billy was not when he was a baby. It was when they sent for Mama to come and get him. You see, he originally lived with our mother and when she remarried a GI, she took him with her. Doctors said I should not be removed from my grandparents. You see, I became sick because of the pending separation. So, I stayed and he left. He was 2 when they told Mama he needed to come home. He was having bowel issues. I can tell this now because everyone is dead. He knew the truth anyway. It was my first train trip and it was exciting. I remember sitting in seats that faced one another and I liked sitting across from an adult in my own seat. I was only 5. I remember the train stopping on a trestle and I looked out the window. Far below was a rocky creek flowing under us. It was so exciting and as clear in my memory as a snapshot. When we arrived in Columbus, I still remember the apartment house. The next few moments are like a movie in my mind. The door opened and I went in first. Billy was lying on a bed in the room, bedclothes all mussed and piled up. All I see is this tiny curly-haired boy pushing up on the bed and sitting, and a beautiful smile stretching across his face when he saw us. Today, that memory is bittersweet. He was such a lovely little boy. The redish brown curls made him look like a cherub. I remember his arms going around my neck. And the memory ends. We brought him home.

The thing that makes this story special is because Morgs and Jug are just like us, normal blokes who work for a living, have families, but spend every cent they make chasing their dreams to ride the biggest meanest wave. Everyone can understand massive waves, they say that all life came from the ocean and inside all of us there is a fascination with the sea. You see it on every huge swell - people lining the shore just to watch mother nature and all her fury unleashing massive waves and we get out there amongst it and ride them. They used to believe that the earth was flat and if you ventured too far off terra firma into the ocean you would fall off, this fear is still to this day deep in our psyche. Will it speak to non-surfers too? As mentioned above this series will talk to the thrill seeker in us all, in the same way that we love to watch tornados, volcanoes and the like we love to watch huge surf and to see people try to conquer it will appeal to everyone, particularly in the way this story will be told, we will look at environmental issues, social issues, and the story behind the scenes of these two classic Aussie men chasing there dreams. We will show them the real world of the big wave charger. The ups, downs, challenges and triumphs. It has always been what my life has revolved around. His priorities have changed, but his wife and 3 children all know how good surfing is and how it can make their dad happy. Jughead started surfing at 10 and just loved it. After finding some mates at the beach a few years later lived on the beach and has surfed every opportunity he could since. At 15, I had returned from a month in Bali and decided myself and two mates would take on a bombora over a kilometere out to sea. Once we were out there we realised it was much bigger than we thought. I still managed to get a huge tube and nearly drown. The adrenalin is definitely a huge part of this. This really appealed to me as I like to surf by myself. He has received 7 covers on magazines from Australia to Japan to the U. S to the UK, while some professional surfers may never see a cover in their entire career. In addition, Jughead has received double page spreads, features and posters and has appeared in Big Wave Tow-In movies and numerous surfing videos. I also would like to put something back into surfing to help the young guys coming up. Paul Morgan Bio Paul Morgan is a 24 year old lad who loves surfing, big or small waves, loves not to take life to seriously and really enjoy myself at what I am doing, but at the same time have an uncontrolling drive to ride some of the heaviest waves in the world. Grew up in south coastal Ulladulla, NSW, got into surfing when 9 years old by taking his dads board out and instantly got hooked. As a grommet his goals and dreams lay in competition but still as young as 15 yrs old I remember saying, I wanted to a big wave surfer. My first break was winning a pro-junior event in some of the biggest surf ever since for a pro-junior. Paul scored two 10point rides on the way to the win. Finishing the juniors with a win he was content, and knew deep down he was never going to do the WQS and knew if he was going to make his mark in surfing that it was going to come naturally and that was pushing himself in big heavy waves. With professionals and cameramen everywhere Paul just went about his business and blew everyone away. While everyone was trying to escape the wave I was trying to get inside it. This day earned Paul a cover of Australian Surfing Life ASL magazine and endless amount of spreads and set him on a path of chasing swells around Australia trying to push surfing with how big and deep he can ride. In , Paul received over 50 pages of editorial including 2 covers Tracks and Carve and made a unique surf movie called "Lost and Running" which was cover mounted with ASL. This issue was the biggest selling magazine of the year and also won Australian Best Surf movie of the year.
