Huge shock," explained an expat in Luxembourg. There are two reviews of the International School of Luxembourg slightly negative and International School of Luxembourg positive. The younger the kids are the better. I have been stunned at how fast they can learn the language. Having shared that, I am not impressed with the public school education. If my child were to return to the States, the scores would be such to require repeating a grade or not being able to progress without remedial help," said an expat mom in Luxembourg. Learning the Languages of Luxembourg Learning the language in Luxembourg is a triple challenge. One American in Luxembourg explained, "It takes more than immersion to learn language especially since there are 3 languages used on a daily basis here, but it has helped. As everyone else would share; make an attempt to learn at least some of the language, it will take you a very long way in living abroad!! Yes, Luxembourgish is a real language and a challenge to learn but French and German are just as acceptable too," said an expat in Luxembourg. Another expat living in Luxembourg explained, "We were told that English is widely accepted and used throughout Luxembourg and that we should be fine. We were aware that there are 3 languages used in addition to English; German, French and Luxembourgish. Upon our arrival we were shocked that so little English is actually used and that not only is French a good first option for growing our languages but the reality is we need to know some German and Luxembourgish as well. We are surviving but could really flourish with the added languages. We are currently working on our French and in time will add the others. Health Insurance in Luxembourg One expat in Luxembourg talked about health insurance saying, "purchase supplemental health insurance. You need your CNS card to do it and that usually takes a few weeks to arrive. Go directly to the insurance company there are many to choose from and ask for a quote. Going to an independent agent can be much more expensive. But I mailed in all my expenses after the tooth extraction, stitches and post implanted this was euro. I have resubmitted my request after the implant was completed for an additional euro and still have not received anything from CNS. Also I find it very difficult with CNS because of the language barrier on my end. In the meantime we applied for supplemental insurance and was told I had to wait 8 months for dental coverage. CNS will only pay what they would pay in Luxembourg for coverage so you really do need something. The Locals in Luxembourg "We truly appreciate how kind people are here! That really surprised us. For the most part, people are very helpful and considerate. Another expat offered some advice they had received before moving to Luxembourg , "I would like to share with you, from one expat to another: Meaning that the locals were not friendly, neighborly, nice or warm to them. They ended up moving closer to the city and had a better time. I refuse to stereotype or to say this will happen to you but when we just chose our new apartment we kept that in mind. High Cost of Living "We had been warned that is was VERY expensive to live here and we thought we were prepared but we were quite shocked at how much

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more expensive it has turned out to be. The financial aspect has caused some anxiety and frustration, especially since there are so many variables and unknowns even for the locals. The biggest challenge we faced was trying to figure out how to shop and save money! In the beginning, our grocery budget doubled! Everything is VERY expensive here! New friends have helped us find the good and affordable ways to shop by going to Germany, France and Belgium on a regular basis. We go to Germany several times a month for everything from our washer delivered and installed, to clothes, food and most recently Christmas gifts. We use Ikea in Belgium as well which is literally just over the border. Our country is so small, that within about 30 minutes in any direction, we can be in another country--so cool! Shopping outside of Luxembourg is the most common and widely shared "secret" to saving money," advised one expat. An expat in Luxembourg said, "I think the biggest shock for us was how much walking happens here! We all lost a lot of weight fairly quickly. That was a huge expense for the entire family! Where to Live in Luxembourg When someone asked about the suburb of Schrassig, another member replied, "Schrassig is a nice suburb with some very nice houses. There are no shops so a car would be advisable. There is a supermarket in Niederaanven which is about a 10 minute car journey together with a selection of other shops and a lovely swimming pool. It is in the "Commune" of Schuttrange, which is the name of the neighbouring village, where we live. We like the area as it is quiet but yet close to the airport. There are some lovely walks in the area--through woods or countryside. There are a few restaurants within walking distance. If you have children who are going to the European School or St. Slightly less well located if using the ISL. So if you are living in the city and your husband is working in the city, the trains will probably not be of much use to you. But the buses are very easy, run often and use a quite modern system for fare payment. So I think if you are trying to get by without a car, you will have no problems there. Having said that, a car can be very nice for making trips to other parts of Luxembourg. If you are moving here and have never lived here before, you might want to do some exploring from time to time. And a car would be ideal for that. Also, things like groceries, shopping, etc. If you are thinking more generally, I would recommend it. I forgot to mention that the city has a very, very good bike share system called Veloh! You pay a monthly fee. This might be another option for getting around. And more related to your question, they are introducing a car sharing program. This will allow you to pay a monthly fee and then give you the right to make use of a car whenever you need it. But I come from Washington, DC. And unlike DC, there is a realistic parking strategy here in Luxembourg. Within the city center, there are many underground parking garages strategically located about the city. And there are even electronic signs located strategically throughout the city to tell you how many spaces are available in each nearby garage. So instead of driving around in circles looking for a parking space on the street which are also readily available in the less congested parts of town, you can go directly to a garage, enter and pay on your way out. One thing that is not realistic here in Luxembourg is the size of the parking spaces. The average car here in Europe has grown over the years. But the size of the parking spaces has not.

Email When UK contractors go to work in the 28 Member States of the EU, they will still find 28 different tax regimes to which they have to adapt. First of all, UK contractors who decide to work abroad should be aware that they may still have tax liabilities in the UK. In general, a contractor has to remain abroad for a full tax year before being in a position to claim exit from the UK tax system to the one in the chosen country, at least in terms of income earned from contracting. Then, depending on what country is chosen, there are different systems. Germany Germany is a popular destination for UK contractors, but working there requires some administrative adaptation. Therefore to work legally as a contractor, one is legally obliged to work for a licensed temporary agency or umbrella company. These companies are subject to strict inspections to ensure that agency workers are not abused. So contractors rights are best protected by registering with one of these companies. It is true that some German companies still ignore these rules, but one is safest remaining compliant if it is possible. France It is perfectly possible to work as a self-employed contractor in France. You will be subject to a complex tax regime, however. But you should be careful here. Contractors with only one client do not meet the self-employment criteria determined by French labour regulations. If you only work for one client, then employment is the appropriate legal option. Preferably by a French registered Temporary Labour Company—this can also be an umbrella. Netherlands In the Netherlands, there are thousands of contractors, however on the whole they work through a Dutch registered payroll company. Every worker must be employed by a Dutch BV. This makes seeking an umbrella company the only possible route, short of starting your own company there. But there are some advantages. Further, if you talk to a Dutch advisor, such as your umbrella, you may be eligible for a certain number of tax breaks. If you are, the Dutch Tax Authority will repay you a portion of the withholding from your salary in advance of your filing a tax return. So if you choose to work in the Netherlands, you should definitely get good advice before starting as it can save you a lot of money. Belgium The regime regarding all foreign employees coming to Belgium has changed in the past year in Belgium, and it is now necessary for foreign contractors to register with the Belgian tax authorities. Luxembourg This tiny country is a major international financial centre, and happily has a relatively liberal regime governing contractors. If you choose to become resident, the process becomes more complex though, and here you should take advice. Italy This country has very strict rules regarding the use of agency workers of all kinds. After arriving in Spain Who needs a visa or permit for Spain? Nationals from other countries will need a visa to live in Spain, and in most cases, a work permit too. They have one common visa and no border controls between them. There are three types of visa allowing entry to Spain: Airport transit visa for Spain An airport transit visado de transito aeroportuario allows you into the international transit zone in a Spanish airport. Not everyone needs one but to check whether you do, check the information and list at www.wwo.com. Short-stay visa for Spain A short-stay Schengen visa visado de corta duracion allows you to stay in Spain " but not work " for up to 90 days in a day period. If you have a Schengen visa issued by another Schengen state you can also come and stay in Spain for 90 days. To find out if you need a Schengen visa check out our guide on Spanish passports. You need to complete an application form, which you can download here and apply through the Spanish embassy or consulate in your home country. Find the contact details of the Spanish embassy or consulate in your own country to apply. This will depend on your purpose of stay, as detailed below.

Long-term Spanish residence and work visas There are different residence and work permit types, depending on the purpose of your stay, including: Spain work visa There are several different types of Spanish work visas , as well as exemptions, depending on your employment situation in Spain. Spain student visa Spain is very popular with students from overseas. Spanish residence visa Both Spanish citizenship and a Spanish residence visa permanent allow you to stay living in Spain, but some differences exist between the two. Spanish business visa Spanish business visa requirements state that a short-stay visa for Spain will enable you to visit the country, but does not permit you to work there. Should you be relocating to Spain for business purposes you will need to request a Spanish business visa. This is otherwise known as a work permit. Spain spouse visa and family reunification Once you have been living legally in Spain for a year and have received official confirmation that you will be staying for a further year, you can apply for family members for example, spouse, common law partner, and dependants, including children under 18 and parents over 65 to join you in Spain. Students can apply for their family members to join them while studying in Spain. Should you be looking for a Spanish spouse visa , you will need to apply for family reunification. Should you not yet be in Spain, you can apply via the Spanish embassy who outline the Spanish spouse visa requirements. Spain retirement visa The current pension age in Spain is 65 years for both men and women, though it will rise to 67 by 2027. Should you be planning on taking your pension in Spain , you will need to set up a Spanish retirement visa. Spanish retirement visa requirements state that if you are an EU citizen you will need to possess an S1 form before travelling. This means you will have access to healthcare in Spain. You will not need a Spanish visa for a medical reason but if you have no insurance, you will most likely need to pay for being treated as a private patient. There is a youth mobility agreement between Spain and Canada for young people aged 18 to 35 to visit Spain to travel and work for up to a year. For details, see one of the [Spanish consulates in Canada](#). You can apply for a long-term visa from the Spanish consulate or embassy in your home country, or

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sometimes online on their websites before you come to Spain. Allow plenty of time for the consulate to process your application – check with yours for the timescale – and you or your representative must collect it in person. Advertisement New fast-track visa Non-EU national investors, entrepreneurs, highly qualified professionals and researchers can apply for fast-track visas and permits, which offer preferential treatment, such as automatic residence for the whole family with no minimum stay, and free travel throughout the Schengen visa region. For more information on requirements for each category of applicant, contact the Spanish embassy or consulate in your home country. Permanent residency in Spain After five uninterrupted years of residence, you can apply for a long-term or permanent residence. If you hold a Blue Card from another EU-member state, and have lived elsewhere in the EU for the same period, this also entitles you to long-term residence in Spain. A long-term residence permit allows you to stay in Spain indefinitely, working or otherwise, under the same conditions as Spanish citizens. You can apply for Spanish nationality after 10 years of residence in Spain. You can also acquire Spanish nationality through marriage or through having Spanish parents even if they were born outside Spain.

Unfortunately it is much more difficult for non-EU nationals to find work as potential employers are required to gain the approval of the local labor office before they can hire someone from abroad. Belgium is a good destination for those looking for work in public affairs or social policy. However, many people in the country are bilingual and if you are only able to speak one language you may not be able to compete with other applicants. Opportunities also exist in high skill areas such as engineering and computing where labor shortages still exist, but again, you will be expected to be fluent in at least two languages. If you lease one of these you will be required to provide your own appliances and, in some cases, even cupboards. Leases in Belgium must be registered with the local office of the Receiver of Registrations, Ministry of Finance within four months of being signed. If the registration is late you will be fined. In Belgium you are required to have all foreign documents legalized. You will be expected to get a numbered and dated certificate that is known as an Apostille whenever you submit any form of official paperwork that originated outside Belgium. All residents of Belgium over the age of 12 are required to carry their identity cards with them at all times. If you are asked to produce your card and are unable to do so you can be placed under administrative arrest for up to 12 hours. i. Exempt from income tax are certain bonuses paid for night or overtime work, severance pay and seniority bonuses. All forms of private pension are included in taxable income even when paid from abroad. The number of dependents is indicated by a figure following the tax class. For example, a married couple with two children would be classified as 2. A married person who is widowed, divorced or separated remains in class 2 for three years following the bereavement or separation. The card contains personal details and the details of any deductions that you are entitled to, such as dependent children. The card will indicate the tax category to which you belong. This information is used to calculate the amount of tax payable and should be given to the employer. The tax card also includes a form for notifying the tax office of any changes to your personal circumstances which may affect the amount you need to pay. The tax system in Luxembourg distinguishes between resident and non-residents. Residents are taxed on their world-wide income, while non-residents are taxed only on income originating in the local country. A person can be resident in more than one country, but can only be domiciled for tax purposes in one country. People entered into the local population register are most likely considered domiciled there for tax purposes. Corporate Tax Luxembourg has a corporate tax base of This rate is composed of 22 percent income tax, a five percent unemployment fund added to the income tax rate and a 7. Rates vary between 3 and 15 percent depending upon the service or goods provided. This is the lowest rate in the EU. The declaration must be submitted by the end of March in the year after the income was received. Once the paperwork is submitted, it may take as long as six months to receive your tax assessment and bill. The assessment will summarize how much you have paid already throughout the year and if you are due money back, or owe more money. Any amount due to the tax authorities must be paid within two months of the date of the assessment. The tax authorities helpfully enclose a bank transfer form for you to complete. Payments can also be made in four installments during March, June, September and December. Returns are generally credited directly to your bank account within a few weeks of the assessment.
