Pray that the children you teach will come to know their God, as Joshua did, so that they may walk in confident obedience, regardless of the evil that surrounds them. Joshua had courage to obey God. Joshua obeyed God, and marched around Jericho. God gave Joshua the victory! Joshua 6 teach dramatic play I like teaching little ones the story of Joshua and the battle of Jericho through dramatic play! I have this set of cardboard blocks that I picked a couple years ago to use as our walls of Jericho. Before that, I use to save ALL my shoe boxes, specifically for this lesson, and they worked great! I also gather up the little people from our nativity set. The children can each hold one as they participate in the story, making the people march, sleep and shout. Using little figurines such as Lego people, army men, or anything else you may have, gives the children a perspective of the size of the wall around the city of Jericho. It also gives them a greater appreciation for the incredible miracle God did when He brought the walls down. This activity not only burns off some energy, it also helps them to understand that Joshua won the battle because he obeyed, and did exactly what God told him to do, even though other people laughed at him, and made fun of him. Of course, on the seventh time that we wake up, we march around the city seven times, blow our "trumpets" and give a shout! I pull the cloth to make the walls fall down! God is bigger and stronger than any walls, or any army, and He made walls fall flat down. Thank You God for giving us the victory!! My God is So Big - This is also a great song to sing during worship time to support the lesson. Sing " They Marched Around the City ", as you march around the walls. At the end, pull the cloth or sheet to knock the walls down. The kids are sure to ask you to play it again and again!

The story of Joshua obeying God's command and marching around the walls of Jericho will come alive for your child with the reading of this book. If I were still teaching Sunday School, I'd definitely use this book and the others from the action rhymes series as a teaching aid.

God gave Joshua the perfect plan for victory, and by faith, the walls of Jericho came down! Now Jericho was strongly fortified because of the Israelitesâ€™ no one leaving or entering. March around the city with all the men of war, circling the city one time. Do this for six days. But on the seventh day, march around the city seven times, while the priests blow the trumpets. When there is a prolonged blast of the horn and you hear its sound, have all the people give a mighty shout. Then the city wall will collapse, and the people will advance, each man straight ahead. There was no human way to breach the defenses, so God gave Joshua a plan that would require the collective faith of the entire army. Seven days later, Jericho was theirs. Faith brought the walls down and faith saved the prostitute Rahab who had believed that God would deliver her and her entire family. Rahab and her entire family were spared and welcomed into the community. By faith the walls of Jericho fell down, after they were compassed about seven days. By faith the harlot Rahab perished not with them that believed not, when she had received the spies with peace. Joshua 2 â€™ Joshua sends spies to Jericho and they are saved by Rahab. Joshua 4 â€™ God exalts Joshua in the eyes of the people. Joshua 6 â€™ The walls of Jericho fall down after seven days. Why did the walls of Jericho fall? The Children of Israel marched around Jericho in silence, with only the trumpets sounding each day. As the soldiers marched, their faith grew. By the seventh day their faith was alive. They could see the victory and expected it. By the time they circled the city that seventh time, in their hearts they knew the city was theirs. Joshua gave the order to shout and every man let loose a victorious faith-filled shout that brought those walls right down. Whether stomping up and down in an imaginary walk around the walls, blowing a pretend trumpet through clenched fists or shouting out loud with Joshua, the child will long remember their march around the walls with Joshua.

Lesson Plan- Pre K - K: The children will be able to - retell the story Joshua and Jericho - explain that after Moses died Joshua led the people - discuss that God asks us to be obedient servants and to do what is right even when people make fun of us Review: When Moses died, who led the people? Then ask some questions from below. Who led the people after Moses died? What city did God say He would give them? A huge enormous stone wall. What did God tell Joshua to do for six days? Have everyone march once around the city. What did they do the seventh day? They marched around the city seven times and had the priests blow their horns. What happened when they did this? The walls came crashing down. Row, Row, Row your Boat sundayschoolsources. London Bridge is Falling Down Activities: How long did the Israelites travel in the desert? When Moses died, who became the Israelites new leader? Joshua asked the people of Jericho to leave. Did they do what he asked? Did some of the Israelites want to go back to Egypt? Who did Joshua get help from? March once around the city with soldiers. Behind them seven priests would carry rams horns ahead of the ark. Who will take care of the Israelites if they will follow Him? Did the walls of Jericho fall down? Apply glue to the back of the brown paper after decorating, and then wrap it while still wet round the party horn. Trim excess, bend the open end up a little as shown in photo above. Ram Horn Trumpet- Easy and fun horn craft to blow the mighty walls of Jericho down. Jericho Horns Empty paper towel roll one per child Wax paper squares Rubber bands one per child Pencil Markers and crayons Help the children make horns. Show children how to blow the horns like kazoos. Have the children make a wall out of cardboard boxes and reenact the story of Joshua and Jericho using their horns and knocking the wall down. Sunday, December 8, Joshua: Genesis and Moses were a quarter each, and different people in the Old Testament for the other two quarters. So, this is combined into one lesson. There are so many options for this lesson, too! Today, we are in the Old Testament book called Joshua. We studied about the 12 spies one man from each tribe that went and spied the land of Canaan. They came back with grapes so huge, 2 men carried them on a pole between them! Not all of the 12 spies had faith that God would protect them. One year for every day. Moses told Joshua he would be the next leader. After Moses died, Joshua sent 2 men to spy out Jericho. The king said that there were spies in his city and told Rahab to bring them to him. But, she took the 2 spies and hid them on her roof and covered them with stalks of flax. Rahab said that they had left the city after dark, just as the city gates were being closed. She told him that if he chased them quickly, maybe his men could catch them. She asked if they would save her and her family when they took over the city. Then, they left Rahab and the city and hid in the mountains for 3 days until they were safe. The priests were carrying the ark of the covenant and the people were following vs. They were going to cross the Jordan River that was always flooded over the banks of the river. The priests dipped their feet into the river, and the water stood still and rose so that everyone crossed over on dry land! God told Joshua to have the 12 men, the leaders from each of the 12 tribes, to put a stone from the Jordan River onto their shoulder. God told Joshua to have all the men of war march around the city 1 time a day for 6 days and do not talk. BUT, on the seventh day, you will march around the city 7 times and the priests will blow the horns. When they make a long blast with the horns, all the people will shout and the wall of the city will fall flat! Joshua told the 2 spies to get Rahab and her family and they took them to the Israelites camp for safety. Everyone in Jericho died and they burned the city. When I usually teach this lesson, I have horns and stack up a bunch of boxes. So, if you divide the lessons, there is an idea for each lesson. Once it was set, I cut it into about 1" wide slices and whatever length you need for the containers you use. I let the kids put it all together and they stacked and glued the 12 Tribes stones worksheet. You will need a red piece of yarn, string or embroidery floss for this worksheet. So the Lord was with Joshua, and his fame spread throughout all the country.

Click here to respond Learning Objectives: After this lesson, the children will demonstrate an understanding of the story by reenacting the story while the teacher is reading it. Welcome activities are things to have out for the children to do as they are arriving for class. These activities will get them engaged as soon as they arrive and will help the transition from their parents. Have blocks available for the children to build with as they arrive. Moses Songs Bible Lesson Introduction: Split the children into 2 groups and give each group a pile of blocks. Have each group try to build the largest tower. There is also a book that you can print out that has the story along with simple pictures to help the children understand what is being read. Read the verses story to the children. If you are using the print out story, point to the pictures as you read the story so that the children can better understand what you are saying. No one went out. No one came in. I have also handed its king and its fighting men over to you. In fact, do it for six days. They must carry them in front of the ark. On the seventh day, march around the city seven times. Have the priests blow the trumpets as you march. When you do, have all of the men give a loud shout. The wall of the city will fall down. Then the whole army will go up to the city. Every man will go straight in. Then the men returned to camp. They spent the night there. The priests went and got the ark of the Lord. They marched in front of the ark of the Lord. They blew the trumpets. Some of the fighting men marched ahead of them. The others followed behind the ark and guarded all of them. The priests kept blowing the trumpets. They did all of those things for six days. They marched around the city, just as they had done before. But on that day they went around it seven times. Then Joshua gave a command to the men. The Lord has given you the city! As soon as the fighting men heard the sound, they gave a loud shout. Then the wall fell down. Discuss the Bible Reading: When you are finished reading the story the second time, ask the children the following questions so that you can know they understood it. Use the following activities to reinforce the learning goals. If time is short, move on to the evaluation portion of the lesson plan. Since Joshua did that, God made the walls of Jericho fall down. We are going to make a picture showing what happened. We will obey him. Make it fun for them to do the motions and say the words. Involving them in active learning is essential for memorization at this age. To obey means to listen and follow directions. Who should we listen to? They want us to grow up to be big girls and boys. We are going to play God Says. Whatever God says you need to do. Read the story again and have the children reenact it.

We march around the city walls once, without a sound, then go lay down to sleep, and repeat the process five more times, just as the Israelite's did.

The citizens of Jericho were well prepared for a siege since a spring lay inside the city walls and the harvest had just been gathered Joshua 3: So, the inhabitants of Jericho could have held out for perhaps several years. The full grain jars show that the siege was short since the people inside the walls consumed very little of the grain, another historical verification of biblical accuracy. Use adjectives to describe Rahab in your own words. What conclusion did Rahab make about the God of Israel? Could anyone else in Jericho have come to the same conclusion? Research the ancient city of Jericho. What was it like for Rahab to live there? Rahab was given an opportunity to make a conscious choice for God based upon the facts she knew about Him, and she responded with FAITH! Faith resulted in action. See also Exodus 1: Day Two Study 9. The spies made a covenant with Rahab. All of those men who had been born in the wilderness were circumcised. The Passover was celebrated. And, the people ate produce from the land. The manna stopped the next day. How did Joshua and the people respond? Surrounding Jericho was a great earthen rampart, or embankment, with a stone retaining wall at its base 12–15 feet high. Above that stood a mud brick wall 6 feet thick, 20 feet high. This loomed high above the Israelites as they marched around the city each day for seven days. Humanly speaking, it was impossible for them to penetrate the impregnable fortress of Jericho. Also, there were houses built against the wall as in Joshua 2: Excavations showed that the bricks from the collapsed walls formed a ramp against the retaining wall so that the Israelites could climb up over the top as is described in Joshua 6: The city was thoroughly burned. Rahab had to wait those seven days also. Based on her responsibility in the oath, who else was waiting with her? See also Joshua 5: What did God do for her and her family? Research others in scripture who experienced a time of waiting for God to act upon a promise for example, David, Paul. What did they do while waiting? Rahab had to wait patiently for God to act. Is this a problem for you? Have you become discouraged or been discouraged in the past from having to wait? How does this scripture and the story of Rahab encourage you? Think About It Optional: Read the words to the song below. Have you considered that God was in the waiting, too? What does it say? Rahab and Salmon had a son, Boaz. What does the mention of Rahab three times in the New Testament tell us about the grace of God? Rahab was likely a prostitute just as it is written. In what ways did God forgive her past and give her a new future? This in no way mars the righteousness of God who used such a person in the fulfillment of His purposes. Instead this incident serves to bring His mercy and grace into bold relief. He knew what was going on in her life. He was able to do something about it. But, God did not keep Rahab from losing the security of her home nor did He prevent her from having to go through the agony of watching the Israelites march around the city for 7 days. When she stepped out in faith, He met her there. She trusted Him to rescue her, and He did. God judged her by her heart—the inward woman, not by her lifestyle—the outward appearance. He not only saved her life, but He forgave her past and gave her a new future. She chose to trust Him rather than submit to fear. Likewise, God forgives your past and gives you a new future. How did she demonstrate faith at those times? We will probably never be faced with

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the dramatic circumstances of Rahab, but we do have our own distressing situations in life. What problems are you facing now, and what choices are available to you? How will you respond? This is part of your story.

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7: Lessons from Joshua (Sunday School Activity) - Kids Korner - BibleWise

Like Joshua, we can boldly leap into the waters and march with shouts around the walls of any challenge, because we know that the God who parts waters and tears down walls is the greatest and only power in the world.

Joshua courageously led the children of Israel out of the wilderness and into the Promised Land, and from his bold example we can learn many lessons. Have you ever been scared of a big test, a game, or a bully? In a scary situation, you can remember the words of Joshua, "the Lord is with us: When the children of Israel were in the wilderness, Moses sent one spy from each of the twelve tribes of Israel into Canaan. Ten of the spies reported that it was impossible to enter the Promised Land because the people who lived there were huge and stronger than the children of Israel. This report made the children of Israel complain that they never should have left Egypt. Joshua and Caleb, the last two spies, told the children of Israel not to complain or to be afraid of the strength of humans. Instead, they should trust God, the ultimate strength. They had to spend forty years wandering in the wilderness, turning to God every day for their food and water, until they trusted Him enough to enter the Promised Land. The path is a lot quicker when we trust God right from the start! By the time they were ready to cross the Jordan River and enter the Promised Land, the children of Israel were trusting God with every step. In fact, they walked right into the Jordan River, knowing that God would part the waters. And, sure enough, God did! Sometimes we have to get our feet wet before the waters will part. To overcome any problem that faces us, we must courageously move forward with faith in God. This faith in God was symbolized by Joshua ordering the priests, who were carrying the Ark of the Covenant rather than the soldiers carrying swords, to lead the children of Israel across the Jordan River and into the Promised Land See Joshua 3. In any difficult circumstance, we might ask ourselves, what am I putting first in my life: Am I facing this challenge by beginning with prayer? When the children of Israel entered the Promised Land and came to the walls of the ancient city of Jericho, Joshua once again led them to turn to God for help. Instead of using battering rams and bombs to conquer the city, the children of Israel used prayer and praise. Prayer and praise are the greatest weapons in the world. Often, this story has been used by powerful countries to say that God will help them destroy their enemies. But that interpretation misses the whole point of this story. While most people who lived around the children of Israel believed that God protected only the powerful rulers and did not care about the powerless or poor, the children of Israel knew differently. The children of Israel worshipped a God who cared for, freed, and protected a rag-tag bunch of slaves "as the apple of his eye" Deuteronomy The story of Joshua and the walls of Jericho found in Joshua 6 teaches us that God brings land to the landless, loves everyone - even those who nobody else cares about - and overthrows all walls of limitation, no matter how high. We too can celebrate this God through marching and music, the dedicated action of our daily life and the praise in our hearts. Like Joshua, we can boldly leap into the waters and march with shouts around the walls of any challenge, because we know that the God who parts waters and tears down walls is the greatest and only power in the world. Instead of being afraid of, and thereby worshipping, the greatness of a problem, we can worship the greatness of God. With Joshua, we can let our lives declare, "the Lord is with us:

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8: Battle of Jericho {Lesson and Craft} - Growing Kids Ministry

He told Joshua to have the armed men march around the city once each day, for six days. The priests were to carry the ark, blowing trumpets, but the soldiers were to keep silent. On the seventh day, the assembly marched around the walls of Jericho seven times.

What should we learn from the walls of Jericho falling down? The story of the walls of Jericho falling down, recorded in Joshua 6: This was the land of milk and honey God had promised to Abraham over years earlier Deuteronomy 6: After spending forty difficult years wandering in the desert of Sinai, the people of Israel were now on the eastern banks of the Jordan. However, their first obstacle was the city of Jericho Joshua 6: Excavations there reveal that its fortifications featured a stone wall 11 feet high and 14 feet wide. At its top was a smooth stone slope, angling upward at 35 degrees for 35 feet, where it joined massive stone walls that towered even higher. It was virtually impregnable. In ancient warfare such cities were either taken by assault or surrounded and the people starved into submission. Its invaders might try to weaken the stone walls with fire or by tunneling, or they might simply heap up a mountain of earth to serve as a ramp. Each of these methods of assault took weeks or months, and the attacking force usually suffered heavy losses. However, the strategy to conquer the city of Jericho was unique in two ways. First, the strategy was laid out by God Himself, and, second, the strategy was a seemingly foolish plan. God simply told Joshua to have the people to march silently around Jericho for six days, and then, after seven circuits on the seventh day, to shout. When the people did finally shout, the massive walls collapsed instantly, and Israel won an easy victory. In fact, God had given the city of Jericho to them before they even began to march around its walls Joshua 6: It was when the people of God, by faith, followed the commands of God that the walls of Jericho fell down Joshua 6: The description of the complete obliteration of Jericho was recorded in Scripture in order to teach us several lessons. When we are faced with seemingly insurmountable odds, we must learn that our Jericho victories are won only when our faithful obedience to God is complete Hebrews 5: There are other key lessons we should learn from this story. Second, the power of God is supernatural, beyond our comprehension Psalm The walls of Jericho fell, and they fell instantly. The walls collapsed by the sheer power of God. Third, there is an uncompromising relationship between the grace of God and our faith and obedience to Him. Although their faith had frequently failed in the past, in this instance the children of Israel believed and trusted God and His promises. As they were saved by faith, so we are today saved by faith Romans 5: Yet faith must be evidenced by obedience. Saving faith impels us to obey God Matthew 7: In addition, the story tells us that God keeps His promises Joshua 6: The walls of Jericho fell because God said they would. They are just as unswerving. They are exceedingly great and wonderfully precious Hebrews 6: Finally, we should learn that faith without works is dead James 2: If we truly believe God, our desire is to obey God. Our faith is put to work. We make every effort to do exactly what God says and keep His commandments. Joshua and the Israelites carried out the commands of God and conquered Jericho. God gave them victory over an enemy that was trying to keep them out of the Promised Land. So it is with us today: Obedience is the clear evidence of faith. Our faith is the evidence to others that we truly believe in Him. We can conquer and be victorious through life by faith, a faith that obeys the God who gives us that faith as a free gift Ephesians 2:

Comments This printable lesson plan is designed to teach preschool aged children about the story of the Walls of Jericho.

What was the battle of Jericho? The Battle of Jericho is narrated in Joshua chapter 6. However, some modern Biblical Scholars and Archeologists have concluded that the Battle of Jericho did not happen. Most scholars reject the historicity of Joshua in favor of belief in peaceful conquest. The prevailing belief in academia is that the Israelites came in far later than B. Evidence indicates extensive sociopolitical disruption and turmoil in Palestine at this time, but does not support unequivocally the biblical picture of a complete Israelite conquest. Not only is the Bible account of the capture of Jericho historical it is confirmed substantially by the discoveries of archeology in numerous places. Such confirmation is startling in its accuracy in terms of its correspondence to the the Bible account. In order to answer this question it would first be necessary to detail the actual evidence that might be expected to be found were the Biblical account to be true. This is not to say that this would necessarily be found but that if found, as part of a correctly understood chronology of the site, it would add credence to the Biblical record. A strongly fortified city as recorded in Joshua 2: That the attack occurred just after harvest time in the spring as indicated in Joshua 2: The inhabitants had no opportunity to flee and remove their food as indicated in Joshua 6: The seige was short as in Joshua 6: The walls were destroyed, possibly as the result of an earthquake. The city was not plundered of its material goods and food etc as detailed in Joshua 6: The city was burned with fire as in Joshua 6: Possibly a portion of the wall remained intact, as in Joshua 6: In the early s, there was a startling report by Dr. Previous excavations had been in a different section of the mound of ancient Jericho. Woods found a layer of ash 3-foot deep over his entire excavated area. This appears to be clear evidence of large scale destruction by fire. Large stores of spring harvested wheat that were barely touched were also discovered. The city seems to have fallen after a very brief siege, whereas a walled city would usually have been expected to hold out until starvation. In addition, exactly as the Bible records, the city was not rebuilt for around years after its destruction because it was cursed. Kenyon, in particular, noted this gap in the occupational levels. Another reason is that Kenyon dismissed the investigations of John Garstang, even though he found pottery to date his findings pottery which she was looking for but did not find - an argument from silence and dated the walls which fell as being from an earlier time. In addition to this, she referred to the time of the construction of the walls but not necessarily to the time of their destruction. It is known that some ancient walls remained for centuries ancient Jerusalem being a good example of this. Jericho has since been rebuilt near the original site. While they had fought other fights in the 40 years that preceded Jericho, they were not in any sense "battle-hardened veterans. The notable thing about the battle was how it was "fought," because in military terms, the "fight" was actually not much of a fight at all. The Israeli leader, Joshua, received his battle plans from G-d. Every day for six days the Israelis marched around the city once, early in the morning. On the seventh day, they walked around the city seven times, the priests blowing the whole time. When they finished the seventh circuit, the priests stopped and blew their horns for a long time while all the people broke their silence and shouted. At that moment, the brick walls of Jericho fell outward, not inward, and all the Israelis flooded into the now defenseless town, killing most of the inhabitants, and setting the rubble on fire. The importance of the walls falling in and not out is, that an army besieging a town and trying to break into a city would leave a breach with rubble on the inside of the walls. But in Jericho, the evidence shows the walls fell outward. This is taken to demonstrate a direct Devine intervention in the destruction of the walls, rather than a human-powered effort. So, in addition to everything else, Jericho was an affirmation by G-d to the Israelis of His ability and readiness to help them conquer the Promised Land; a sort of a down payment or pledge. After Moses died, Joshua became the leader of the Israeli and hefought in Jericho. You crossed the Jordan and came to Jericho; and the citizens ofJericho

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fought against you, and the Amorite and the Perizzite and the Canaanite and the Hittite and the Girgashite, the Hivite and the Jebusite. Thus I gave them into your hand. The biblical account describes the Israelites being led by Joshua and crossing the Jordan into Canaan where they laid siege to the city of Jericho. And Joshua ordered the people to shout. The walls of the city collapsed, and the Israelites were able to charge straight into the city. Only Rahab and her family were spared, because she had hidden the two spies sent by Joshua. After this, Joshua burned the remains of the city and cursed any man who would rebuild the city of Jericho would do so at the cost of his firstborn son. It is generally accepted that the biblical date for the fall of the walls is the 28th of Nisan, according to the Hebrew calendar. How big was Jericho? However, from excavations carried out by a German team in the first decade of this century, we know that people were also living on the embankment between the upper and lower city walls. In addition, those Canaanites living in surrounding villages would have fled to Jericho for safety. Thus, we can assume that there were several thousand people inside the walls when the Israelites came against the city.
