Evidence for a Paleoindian presence has been found in the form of a fluted Clovis -like point found in the s along the western Santa Barbara Coast, as well as the remains of Arlington Springs Man found on Santa Rosa Island in the s. For thousands of years, the area was home to the Chumash tribe of Native Americans, complex hunter-gatherers who lived along the coast and in interior valleys leaving rock art in many locations, including Painted Cave. Spanish ships associated with the Manila Galleon trade probably made emergency stops along the coast during the next years, but no permanent settlements were established. The party traveled the same route on the return to San Diego in January That same year, a second expedition to Monterey again passed through the area. European contacts had devastating effects on the Chumash people, including a series of disease epidemics that drastically reduced Chumash population. The Chumash survived, however, and thousands of Chumash descendants still live in the Santa Barbara area or surrounding counties. A tribal homeland was established in , the Santa Ynez Reservation. Santa Barbara County has a mountainous interior abutting several coastal plains on the west and south coasts of the county. The largest concentration of population is on the southern coastal plain, referred to as the "south coast" " meaning the part of the county south of the Santa Ynez Mountains. In the extreme northeastern portion of the county are the small cities of New Cuyama , Cuyama , and Ventucopa. Most of the mountainous area is within the Los Padres National Forest , and includes two wilderness areas: North of the mountains is the arid and sparsely populated Cuyama Valley , portions of which are in San Luis Obispo and Ventura Counties. Oil production, ranching, and agriculture dominate the land use in the privately owned parts of the Cuyama Valley; the Los Padres National Forest is adjacent to the south, and regions to the north and northeast are owned by the Bureau of Land Management and the Nature Conservancy. Air quality in the county, unlike much of southern California, is generally good because of the prevailing winds off of the Pacific Ocean. The county is in attainment of federal standards for ozone and particulate matter , but exceeds state standards for these pollutants. Sometimes in late summer and early autumn there are days with higher ozone levels; usually this occurs when there is a low inversion layer under a stagnant air mass, which traps pollutants underneath. In these cases a traveler into the mountains encounters a curious paradox: On these days the visibility from the higher summits may be more than a hundred miles, while the population on the coastal plain experiences haze and smog. All of them contain native and endemic wildlife, like the island oak and Torrey Pine. All four have the deer mouse living on them, the three latter, the island fox, and the two latter, the island spotted skunk. There used to be skunks on San Miguel Island, but due to predation from marine life, birds, and foxes, the San Miguel Island skunk has gone extinct. Climate[ edit ] Santa Barbara County has a mild climate. In the interior, though, summertime temperatures can soar, and above 2, feet meters , temperatures can plummet during the winter months, often dropping below freezing. The climate is called the warm-summer Mediterranean climate. The Thomas Fire , largest in acreage burned ever recorded in California, started in Ventura County and rapidly spread into southern Santa Barbara County in December Winter rains followed in January, causing massive mudslides and debris flows from steep, fire-denuded hillsides. The community of Montecito was especially hard-hit. As of February 3, 21 are known dead and 2 are still missing.

**Etymology**[ edit ] The origin of the name "Moorpark" is unknown, but several sources have been suggested. Hence the name Moorpark. **History**[ edit ] Chumash people were the first to inhabit what is now known as Moorpark. They were hunters and gatherers who often traveled between villages to trade. The village of Quimisac once controlled the local trade of fused shale in the region. Poindexter, the secretary of the Simi Land and Water Company, received the land when the association was disbanded. A map showing the townsite was prepared in November. It was a resubdivision of the large lot subdivision known as Fremont, or Fremontville. The application noted that the town had a railroad depot. The depot remained in operation until it was closed in. It was eventually torn down around. Moorpark was one of the first cities to run off commercial nuclear power in the entire world, and the second in the United States, after Arco, Idaho on July 17, 1954, which is the first city in the world to be lit by atomic power. The majority of the small businesses in town can be found on Guadalupe St. Some of the small town businesses include El Tapatio, and Guadalupe Restaurant serve traditional Mexican food. There is a hardware store called The Guadalupe Hardware Company, Napa Auto Parts, two tire shops, an auto body shop, and three auto mechanic shops in town. There is also a public library on Main Street, with a dentist and a panaderia Mexican pastries and sweet bread La Roca. There is a pharmacy and a medical clinic behind the post office. After more than 20 years of waiting, construction is officially underway beginning on a development in Guadalupe that will eventually add more than homes to the small town. The city annexed the acre site in In addition to homes, the plan includes a new school and commercial development. 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Later they worked on large Spanish ranchos such as Rancho Camulos. Cook from Elgin, Illinois , a wealthy publisher of Sunday School tracts and supplies who bought the Rancho Temescal Mexican land grant from the sons of Ygnacio del Valle.
