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Much has been written about the changes made at that time. They include three major interpolations. There is also a further, less obvious addition, immediately preceding the Septet. This is a brief passage, distinctly un-Offenbachian in its harmonic development of thematic material from the love duet, in which Hoffmann discovers the loss of his reflection. At the same time as this revised edition of the score was being published, the opera was achieving belated international popularity through a German production mounted by Hans Gregor at the Komische Oper in Berlin on 17 November. However, Offenbach research during the s, centred on the preparation of an Offenbach thematic catalogue by Antonio de Almeida, has shown that this is not so. Gunsbourg was very much a showman, ever ready to produce something new, different and glittering. The passage in question has been quoted in a different translation by T. Walsh in his *Monte Carlo Opera*. The *Giulietta* act is certainly to be found in some earlier Choudens scores, but not in the ones standard in France around the turn of the century. Only on German stages was it common for the *Giulietta* act to be included. The first night was announced for Thursday, 25 February, as a gala performance for the Red Cross in aid of those injured in the Russo-Japanese war. Lise Landouzy, Marie Girard and Thomas Salignac were brought in for the delayed premiere, though the three indisposed singers were sufficiently recovered for a further performance on March 1. Whilst injecting a happy party diversion between the two fantastic adventures of the broken doll and the singer satanically killed by Doctor Miracle, [the Venice act] has moreover the very precious merit of having allowed us to hear several pages of the score with which we were unfamiliar: Charles Joly, in *Le Figaro*, went further: The Diamond Song, which Dapertutto sings, is quite simply a melodic pearl. As for the final sextet, built upon the theme and accompaniment of the *Barcarolle*, and interwoven with the Diamond Song, it constitutes one of the most solidly shaped and most vocally sonorous ensembles there has been in the theatre. It is easy to see why Gunsbourg should have added what with the addition of its choral contribution subsequently became known as the Septet, since it provided a brilliant conclusion to the otherwise somewhat anti-climactic *Giulietta* torso. As for the two baritone arias that formed the other major changes to previous Choudens scores, their rationale lies particularly in the presence of Maurice Renaud in the cast. Likewise, in the passage in which Hoffmann discovers the loss of his reflection, the new score was paying regard to the original plan of the opera. By comparison, the identity of the person who actually effected the musical changes has never been officially acknowledged and has been the subject of much speculation over the years. In the light of his own claim, Gunsbourg himself has been suggested as a possibility, since he was also the composer of some half-dozen operas. It is difficult to see Gunsbourg being involved in the detailed working out of the additional music for Hoffmann. Indeed his memoirs suggest a genuine vagueness over how much of his version of the *Giulietta* act was really new. Bloch was born at Wissembourg, near Strasbourg, studied harmony with Guiraud and composition with Massenet at the Paris Conservatoire, and was a winner of the Prix de Rome in . In his *Monte Carlo Opera*, Walsh tells us that Bloch had arrived in Monte Carlo in with an introduction to Prince Albert of Monaco and a ballet score that Gunsbourg was deputed to hear. He may well have provided the ballet music that was used in the *Olympia* scene, and he seems, at all events, to be the most likely candidate as the long sought- after composer of the Hoffmann Septet. Certainly it would not have been the only occasion on which Bloch was destined to adapt Offenbach for the Monte Carlo Opera House.
