If you know anything about me, you know I loved the first three books in the Mortal Instruments series. I absolutely loved them. They took me on an adventure. A good, old-fashioned, magical adventure. City of Fallen Angels, however, was like standing at the bus stop in the rain and getting shat on by a pigeon. These theories make more sense with the release of City of Lost Souls. And it pains me even more than Kegels to say that. That COLS was just awful. For starters, where was the plot? Clary was probably the worst part of this book for me. She was like the Daphne of the whole mission, constantly getting herself captured yes; getting herself captured. This is not victim blaming, people. She literally walks into the clutches of the villain and asks to be captured. These people are meant to be professionals but they act like stoners. Yet I hesitate to complain. As creepy and incestuous as it seemed in the first two and a half books, it was then that I rooted for them the most. I mean, come on! These books are fluff. It was fucking obvious, and it was for this reason that I gave in to enjoying them and at the end of City of Glass when they were finally and properly together, was on the verge of crying tears of fangirl joy. Maia and Jordan are particularly problematic as a couple. On Tumblr, Cassandra Clare seems committed to writing healthy relationships and frequently defends her plot and character decisions with good, solid blog posts that generally allow me to better understand the thinking behind the decisions she makes. There have been no such posts about Maia and Jordan. Yes; the boy who attacked her and ruined her life by turning her into a creature of the night. How is this okay? Was it simply a desire to pair everyone off? That was what I assumed at the end of COG. Either that, or she ended up alone, which would have been even better. How many more times might he "lose control" in the future? Probably the most agonizing part of this ordeal was Alec and Magnus, and let me put this into perspective: Alec and Magnus, to me, were what Bella and Edward were to Twihards. Their love was so pure. As separate characters, they were my favorites in the entire series. Alec, in particular, I adored. He was so awkward and shy, protective and genuine, calm and sincere. He and Magnus, with such different personalities, just gelled together perfectly. But then along came City of Fallen Angels and everything went to shit. It was disheartening, to say the least, when this new and blindingly irritating Alec surfaced at the end of COFA. He underwent a total personality transplant, and I wonder if perhaps it was a marketing tactic. The fanbase for Alec and Magnus is probably just as big, if not bigger, than the fanbase for Clary and Jace. It seems as if Alec and Magnus have been destroyed and turned into another Bethany and Xavier to shift the love of their fandom over to Clary and Jace who are, of course, the unbreakable power couple. The whole thing only got worse in City of Lost Souls. Theoretically, Alec should be totally irredeemable for what he considered doing to Magnus. He would never seek relationship advice from an obviously evil vampire. He would, however, have stood on that hill and used his archery mojo to protect his friends. And it was those brief little glimmers of Alec-ness that hurt the most. My feelings are a force far greater than I. And "a million little paper cuts" was so fucking beautiful. Ok, I need to pull myself together. The plot was all over the place, as aforementioned. And the thing with the faerie rings? Clary, the ring moulded to your finger. If it moulded into a perfect snug fit for your finger, why the hell would it fall off? How have you not already had a piano fall on you? Raphael, why are you still trying to kill Simon? Why does that matter? Maureen, why did you kill Camille? You wanted her dead, but to what end? And why were you even a character in this book in the first place? Camille, why are you still sniffing around Magnus when he is clearly in a serious relationship? Magnus, if you were thinking about taking away your own immortality way back in COG, why did you not tell Alec? Why have you gotten so boring? Where are all your hijinks? Alec, what the fuck happened to you? Jace, why are you even still alive? And could you BE any more Edward Cullen, now that you sparkle? I have no interest in you any more. But for some reason everything important has to surround you, everyone has to want you for their evil

schemes, and you get captured more frequently than Clary. Sebastian, give it up. You literally pinned her down on the floor, and yet neither Clary or Jace are at all fussed about it. Jace, in particular, is impassive, even when he comes back to being himself post-possession. I get that Clary is angry, but her anger feels half-hearted, which seems bizarre after she was victimized in such a terrifying way. The thing I find most problematic, as I mentioned before, is how little Clary and Jace seem to care. She should have not wanted to touch another man! You cannot possibly say what is or what is not the "right" reaction to rape - BUT! Having said that, any reaction would have left more of an impression on the reader, and would have highlighted the attempted rape as something more than a flippant plot device. And kind of glossed over. The writing was enjoyable, smooth and fun to read, and as usual the setting throbbled with life, like another character in the cast. You know what I wish?

To protect Clary, Jocelyn changes her surname to Fray. Clary is described as having long, curly red hair, freckles, and bright green eyes. She is very small and short, "a little over five feet" as first described in City of Bones and often viewed as younger than her actual age. In the first book, Clary is 15 years old, approaching 16, which is the age of Isabelle Lightwood. Clary is an artist, and in the first book, City of Bones, it is believed that she is a mundane, an ordinary human, as she first thought of herself. It is later revealed that she is a Shadowhunter, or Nephilim: Clary is described as being stubborn and often rushes into dangerous situations without considering the consequences. Her best friend in the series is Simon Lewis. He is in love with her but she is romantically involved with Jace who uses various surnames. Clary is devastated when she is told that Jace is her brother but later learns that this is untrue. In the first few books, Clary has a tense relationship with the Lightwoods siblings. Jace Christopher Herondale also referred to as Wayland, Morgenstern, and Lightwood, known as the brother of Clarissa "Clary" Adele Fray and sometimes referred to as Jonothan in early series is described as being tall and muscular with scars across his golden skin from faded magical marks called Runes. He has wavy blond hair and golden eyes, and, like Clary, is a Shadowhunter. Jace is often flirty and insensitive, and is described as projecting a false arrogance due to an insecurity that he is not good enough. He goes by the surname of his adoptive family, the Lightwoods but changes it back to Herondale upon learning more about his true father. His parabatai is Alec Lightwood. Parabatai refers to a pair of Nephilim warriors who fight together as lifelong partners; this is represented as a permanent rune that allows both individuals to be connected to each other. Simon Lewis also referred to as Lovelace is a tall, thin boy with a mop of brown hair, brown eyes, and wears glasses. He often wears T-shirts with gamer slogans. In City of Lost Souls, Simon describes himself as being a "hipster," but his best friend, Clary, refers to him as a "geek". Simon is the only character to begin life as an ordinary human called a mundane, but in City of Ashes he is transformed into a vampire. After becoming a vampire, he never ages and physically will remain 16 years old. He gets taken care of by Raphael Santiago. Valentine Morgenstern stabs Simon in the throat and slits his wrists for the one-fourth vampire blood needed to convert the Mortal Sword. Jace finds Simon and cuts his own wrist to let Simon drink his blood, thus resulting in Simon becoming a Daylighter. Simon is quirky and caring, often putting other people before himself. Isabelle "Izzy" Sophia Lightwood is a sixteen years old Shadowhunter that is described as tall, thin, and beautiful. She has long black hair and dark brown eyes, and is often carrying her trademark gold electrum whip, as shown in City of Bones, where Izzy attracted a shape-shifter blue-haired demon in the Pandemonium. Isabelle is described as being incredibly girly but with a fierce attitude. She often seems flirty and cannot hold a serious relationship, until she becomes interested in Simon Lewis. Alexander "Alec" Gideon Lightwood is the oldest Lightwood sibling. Alec is a Shadowhunter with floppy black hair and blue eyes. He is described as being quiet but protective of his younger siblings: Isabelle and Max, the latter of whom dies in City of Glass. Alec believes he is in love with Jace, his best friend and parabatai in the first book, City of Bones, until he meets Magnus Bane. In City of Glass, Alec kisses Magnus in front of his parents, revealing to them that he is gay. This insecurity leads him to consider turning Magnus into a mortal against his will, which causes Magnus to end their relationship in City of Lost Souls. Magnus Bane is the self-described freewheeling bisexual High Warlock of Brooklyn. Magnus is an approximately year-old warlock who appears to be He is tall and thin with jet black hair and amber and green cat eyes. Magnus Bane is often described as glittery, and he throws countless parties with Downworlders. In The Bane Chronicles, Magnus is romantically involved with a vampire named Camille and various others which are never again mentioned. His parents are an unnamed Indonesian woman and the demon Asmodeus. Lucian "Luke" Garroway Graymark is a former Shadowhunter and the former second-in-command of the Circle. When he was younger he was best friends and parabatai with Valentine. However he was soon

betrayed by Valentine who led him into a trap where he was bitten by a werewolf, causing him to become one. He was the leader of the Manhattan werewolf pack, preceded by Maia Roberts. He is described as calm, level-headed and righteous. He is also fiercely loyal to his loved ones. She was once married to Valentine but following the birth of their first child, Jonathan, she learned that Valentine mixed demon blood into her food, thus making Jonathan into a monster. In *City of Bones* she self-induces a coma to prevent Valentine learning the whereabouts of the Mortal Cup. She is reawakened in *City of Glass*. She is currently engaged to her childhood friend, Luke Garroway. Her current surname, Fray is revealed to be a portmanteau of her initial maiden name, Fairchild, and that of Tessa Gray, a warlock seen in *City Of Heavenly Fire*, and the prequel series, *The Infernal Devices*. Like her, he is a Shadowhunter but he was born with demon blood in his veins. It was administered to him by his father, Valentine, while his mother, Jocelyn, was pregnant. Jonathan is described as having pitch black eyes with no whites as a baby, but when he is older, they are simply black on the inside, a sharply angled face, and blonde, almost-white hair. At the end of *City Of Heavenly Fire* the evil is burnt out of him, and his face becomes rounder and his eyes turn green.
