It will also help you organize as you pack and move. If you need to make any other travel or transportation preparations, now is the time to take care of those as well. The items that do not fit or you no longer wish to keep can be sold or donated. Start Packing and Labeling Packing can be stressful and is best if not done all at once. Start by packing your most infrequently used belongings and valuables. Be sure to clearly label everything as you go and keep objects separated by where they are generally used or stored. It can even be helpful to develop a color and number system that coordinates with the rooms in your new house. You can label each box with the appropriate marking, so they are easy to identify during the move. These documents include medical and dental records, school records, your insurance and home warranty policies, financial statements, passports, and receipts from moving expenses. You will also need to update your driver license and car registration with your new address; some states will allow you to notify them of your new address to avoid paying for a new license card or registration. Notify Family, Friends, and Neighbors While you are in the process of having your address officially changed, go ahead and email your neighbors, friends, and family your new address too. This is also the time to start enlisting the help of friends and family with a moving save-the-date , so they can plan for and be prepared to help you move. You do not have to miss work to move, but you should keep in mind that weekend and holiday rates for moving companies are always higher. A few weeks away from moving day, you might want to avoid the grocery store when possible and start in on some of those things that have been hanging out in the refrigerator, freezer, or pantry for a while. Moving To Do List You will need to notify your utility companies of your move and schedule for each to be turned off at your old house and turned on at your new one. Keep in mind that sometime these are the same companies, and in other cases, you have to start with a new provider. Return Borrowed Items Remember all those books your friend lent you last year that you never gave back? Now is the time to be thoughtful and return them to their rightful owner. There is no sense in packing and moving things that are not even yours. You can also use moving as an excuse to ask for people to return anything you have lent out. This is also a good opportunity to make sure you know where everything is, such as the circuit breaker box and hot water heater. Double check room measurements to make sure that everything you plan on moving will fit. You can keep out the essentials, but if you can go without it for a few days, box it up. Deep Cleaning Even if your house is brand new, you are going to want to do some cleaning before moving in, and if it is a previously owned home, this is a must. New homes may not require quite the deep clean that older homes do, but it is likely that contractors, builders, and construction workers have left their mark during the building process. For the most efficient results, cleaning should be the last thing you do

before the movers arrive with all of your things. Of course, some cleaning will be required after move-in, but all of the major work is much easier to accomplish with an empty house. Be sure to use proper disposal methods for all of your hazardous materials. If you wish to continue the service after your move, and that is an option, reschedule the service to continue at your new location. **Go Over the Moving Plans** You can never be too thorough. You booked your mover at least a month ago, so there is no harm in checking one last time to make sure your scheduling is all lined up. Sometimes, the scheduler can make a mistake and put you on the wrong date accidentally. At this point in time, you are likely to have a clearer idea of your moving day timeline and can give better details to your moving company. This is also the time to firm up any plans with friends or family that might be assisting you with your move. If not, then spraying for bugs before moving everything into your new home is critical. You are always better off safe than sorry, and the bugman will be able to spray more thoroughly with less obstacles if you opt for spraying before your things arrive. You also eliminate the risk of exposure to harmful chemicals by spraying while the house is still empty. **Make Copies of Closing Documents** After you close on your house, you will want to make copies of your closing documents and find a safe place to store the originals somewhere outside of your home. While your new place is empty, go ahead and give the walls a fresh coat, even if it is with a neutral color you think you might want to change later. A fresh coat of paint does wonders to freshen up your home, plus painting is also a great way to add a personal touch to your new house. You do, however, want to be aware of cracks, holes, or other defects in your walls and ceilings. Be sure to address these issues before painting and seek professional assistance if necessary. It is relatively easy to do and will make your new house feel a little more like your own. **All you need to do is take a toilet count and measure the approximate difference between the two bolts that fasten the seat to the commode and the shape of the seat.** Surprisingly, there are a few different common commode shapes and hole spacing options. Save yourself the panic on move-in morning by locating all the keys you will need the night before and putting them in a safe, memorable place. **The Day of the Move** **Pre-Move** **Disassemble Furniture** Furniture can be challenging to move. You will need to take apart any furniture that cannot or should not be moved in one piece. You may want to use protective padding on sharp corners and blankets to avoid any scratches or other damage to either the furniture or walls and doorways. Take the time to do a quick walk through with your movers and any other helpers to explain what is going where and anything else that needs to be done before you begin. **Final Walk Through and Cleaning** You will want to make one final round through your old home before leaving, just to make sure that nothing has been overlooked or left behind. This is also a good chance to tidy up and do some light cleaning. While it is not required for a home sale, it is courteous to leave your old home clean for the incoming residents. For a home rental, most of the time cleaning is required upon vacating, and it is best to have an outside vendor clean the home, so you can prove that you had it cleaned by supplying your landlord with an official, third-party receipt. You can include your contact information as well, so they will be able to reach you or send along any mail they come across, if necessary. **Lights Out and Lock Up** Once you have

completed that final walk through and said your goodbyes , it is time to lock up and head out. Make sure you do not leave on any lights and that all of the doors, front, back, and other, are securely locked. Photograph Old Utility Meters Before you leave, record the readings on and snap a photo of your utility meters. This can be used as a reference later to make sure that you do not get charged for any utility usage that is not yours. The Day of the Move: New Home Checklist Before you do anything else, take a quick picture of the meters and jot down the readings. This can be compared to your first utility bill to make sure everything lines up properly. Direct Boxes to the Right Place This is where your handy-dandy floor plan and your strategic labeling come into play. As your boxes make their way into your new home, be sure to direct them where they need to go. Check Your Inventory and Survey for Damages Not only is an inventory list useful for making sure nothing is left behind at your old house, it is equally handy for making sure everything arrives safe and sound at your new house. Before your movers leave, you want to make sure nothing was damaged or broken in the move, and if it was, contact the moving company and ask them to reimburse you or deduct the cost of replacing the item from your moving bill. You have every reason to be proud of yourself. Take advantage of our moving into a new house checklist – a visual moving house checklist that details what to do after you move into a new house.

**Inspect Delivered Boxes** Inspect the moving boxes as they are carried inside your new home. You do have the household inventory you prepared or received during the moving preparations, right? Check each moving box against the detailed list as it is carried inside your new home, and if a box or a household item happens to be missing, notify the moving crew right away and check together if it was left in the moving truck by mistake. Once the movers leave, inspect each moving container for visual damage or any other signs of obvious mistreatment. If you find out broken or damaged goods, note down the specific damage in your inventory list and contact the moving company in an attempt to resolve the issue peacefully. If you were prudent enough to choose reliable and trustworthy movers, the dispute should be resolved quickly in your favor. However, should the moving company prefer to play dumb, exercise your consumer rights and file a complaint against your movers.

**Get Your Utilities Up And Running** Be sure to note down the readings of the electricity meter and water meter, and keep the numbers in a safe place should a dispute of any sort arise. Naturally, the first utility companies to call are the power and water providers – things will look much brighter and smoother once you have electricity, gas and running water in your new house. Having taken care of the fundamental utilities, consider making the necessary arrangements to gain access to the Internet, phone, and other important services.

**Unpack Essentials** Get professional backup from your movers if you have trouble re-assembling your bed. Proceed by unpacking your essentials boxes and prepare the two most important rooms for normal use – the bedroom and bathroom. Of course, unpacking and arranging the kitchen is also a priority but the task can wait a few days until you get back on your feet.

**Get Organized** Make the most of your post-move time by creating a detailed to-do list and sticking to it. Just like the moving calendar enabled you to have a stress- and trouble-free move, this prioritized to-do list will clearly jump-start the speedy process of settling in your new home and your smooth period of acclimatization to the unknown surroundings.

**Inspect Your House Thoroughly** If you notice any unpleasant signs of pest infestation, deal with the issue on your own or call a pest control company if your efforts fail. One of the first things to do after moving into a new house is to get to know your place inside out. Locate your favorite magnifying glass and inspect every nook and cranny of your new home as meticulously and passionately as if your birth name were Sherlock Holmes. Inspect each and every room for visible signs of damage, especially from water or fire. Check for plumbing leaks, dripping faucets, and running toilets. One clever trick to make sure there are no water leaks of any kind is to register the readings of your water meter at the start and end of a period of several hours when no water is used anywhere in the house. You must know which fuse controls which part of your new house if the fuses are not labeled at all or if the guy before you got it all wrong. Similarly, get familiar with how the main water stop valve works and see if it functions properly by checking for any running water after the valve has been turned off.

**Secure Your New Home** Do whatever it takes to provide a safe environment for you and your family. Change the locks on all outside doors to ensure that you and your family are the only persons who have access to your new home. Double-check all windows and doors and make sure they close securely. Install smoke detectors in every room. Provide at least one functional fire-extinguisher per floor. Purchase a few first-aid kits. Devise an escape plan out of the house in case of emergencies and make it known to each family member. Consult specialists and consider installing a burglar alarm, especially if your home is situated in a neighborhood with a relatively bad reputation.

**Childproof Your New Home** A safe baby means a happy baby, and a happy baby means happy parents. If you just moved into a new home with a baby or toddler, your house will have to go one step beyond the usual household security, and this additional step is called childproofing. Also known as baby-proofing, this safety step is more like a series of steps – an entire process which includes timely identification of all household hazards that await your little child and their subsequent effective elimination.

Start the childproofing process from the room your baby or toddler will be spending most of their time in – the nursery room. Leave only two items in the crib – your happy baby and the fitted mattress sheet. Secure the changing table against accidental tip-overs, mount window guards and cordless blinds on the windows and electric outlet protectors on the walls. Make your way to the bathroom and take all precautionary measures so that the bathing time of your little angel is nothing but fun. The kitchen, the stairs, and the living room are the other premises in your new house where things could go very wrong for your baby or toddler. **Connect Major Appliances** If your refrigerator is not cooling after the move, or one of your other kitchen appliances is not working properly, have it checked out by an authorized repair person. If you have chosen to move your fridge, freezer, washing machine or dishwasher instead of selling them, giving them away to friends, donating them to charity or just throwing them away, now is the time to connect them and thus finish the process of unpacking and setting up the most delicious room in your new house or apartment – the kitchen. Refrigerators are the most fragile appliances from the ones mentioned above and extra care should be taken in their preparation and actual relocation. You need to leave your fridge upright on its final kitchen spot for at least 3 full hours before you can plug it in and turn it on after moving. This is roughly the time it takes for the oil, which must have escaped the compressor and flown into the cooling lines, to return to the heart of the cooling mechanism – the compressor.

**Continue Unpacking** Timely help by good friends is always welcome, especially when packing and unpacking. You already unpacked the essentials boxes and furnished and arranged the most frequently used rooms, but what about the rest of your new residence? Step by step, the unpacking process will stretch out and reach the living room, spare guest room, garage, basement, attic and any other storage areas of your home. You can either dig deeper into your pockets and hire a professional unpacking team to get the job done in no time, or you can organize an unpacking party and invite good friends to help you out in exchange for sweet talks, dear memories, great music, refreshing drinks, tasty food and your eternal gratitude.

Before hiring a moving company, be sure to do your homework and choose a mover that is licensed, insured and trustworthy. Measure all interior spaces, as well as your own furniture. Transferring the utilities A few weeks prior to moving, contact your utility service providers to let them know about your move. While you have them on the phone, go ahead and schedule your disconnect and connect dates for gas and electric. Additionally, you should contact your cable and internet service provider, as well as your security system provider to schedule an installation date after the move. To forward your mail before the move, go to USPS. These items typically include aerosol cans, paints, pesticides, cleaning solvents, scuba tanks, propane tanks, fire extinguishers and fertilizer – just to name a few. Be sure to check with your moving company for specifics. All fragile items should be labeled as such to avoid becoming damaged while in route.
