Learn the theory behind questions as well as doing questions - video tutorials on Pastest were a big help. Attempt lots of questions and read around the answers. There are favourite topics that come up time and again. Do as many questions as you can but consistently. Concentrate on the bigger subjects - gastro, cardio, resp. Focus more on these and less on the smaller topics. Use the questions to guide revision. Get hold of the subject matters that feature in the exam and allocate time to cover the major topics. Use the online lectures as they are very helpful and try a couple of past papers before the actual exam. Try to study by subjects e. Also make your own personal notes based on the videos as well as the questions asked. Some of the Pastest questions came out exactly the same in the real exam. Just do the past years over and over again. Do not just learn the stems by heart, understand the concept. Do not expect the same exact questions as you learned, but if the concept is clear, you can easily get the answers. Do as many questions as you can to get used to the pattern of questions. Familiarity is the key in part one. I would seriously recommend Pastest as it gives us a fair idea on the exam and what the examiner expects from the clinical questions. ### 2: MRCP Study | mrcp questions & mrcp notes for part 1 & 2

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Candidates would be tested on four subjects at three-month intervals – their knowledge of medical theory, signs used by physicians and the symptoms of disease, methods of treatment, and materia medica. The content of these examinations was based entirely upon the works of Galen, and candidates would have three months to build their knowledge of the 17 volumes of recommended reading. The president, together with five Fellows, would pick out at random three questions from three different places in the books. The candidate would be allowed several hours to consider the questions, before returning to read out to the assembled college his identification of the passages and his answers to the questions. The Fellows would judge whether he had found the right place, understood what he had read, and reasoned about it well. The result would be decided by a simple majority vote, although candidates who had failed to demonstrate their understanding of one of the three questions would have little chance of passing. A fifth, more practical examination, on the use and practice of medicine, did not involve knowledge of key texts, and candidates who were known to be highly skilled or of distinguished education would only be tested on this. The College ensured that the exam was robust and rigorous, to make it universally known that no one would become a Fellow unless learned in the theory and practice of medicine. Edinburgh and Glasgow used similar methods to test the knowledge and skills of prospective Fellows. The examinations evolved over the years to reflect changes in knowledge and practice, but they were always regarded as a fair way to test the skills required of physicians. The rigorousness of the exam is reflected in the fact that only 80 people passed between and . Some of the methods may seem odd to modern eyes, particularly the continued conduct of the examination in Latin until the beginning of the 19th century, but the Colleges included this to demonstrate beyond their own bounds that their Fellows were men of wide learning. However, by this time the examination was beginning to change to reflect the increasing professionalisation of society. London ran the first membership exams in April , while Edinburgh and Glasgow began exams to admit new members and fellows in and respectively. Candidates would sit papers on medical anatomy and the principles of medicine, the practice of medicine, and the principles of public health and psychiatric medicine. They would also have short extracts for translation from Latin, Greek, French and German. The latter were included so candidates could demonstrate that they had a sufficient level of general education and culture, and thus could maintain the dignity and honour of the College. A clinical examination and two oral examinations would follow. Candidates had to be a minimum age of 25, provide satisfactory testimonials of their character and their education, and not be engaged in trade. While the exam was run four times a year, the numbers passing remained small, e. Edinburgh required its candidates to pass written examinations on similar subjects, but also to comment on a case from the local Royal Infirmary and answer questions on it, as well as pass an oral examination lasting an hour. The London exam remained in this format until , when the retiring Senior Censor Censors are the senior officers of the RCPL criticised the variable standard and leniency of the examination. Following his recommendations, a system of numerical marking was adopted. The Clinical Sciences Portion comprises of: The good thing is that the royal colleges are very particular in maintaining this speciality wise distribution of questions so there are no hidden surprises. However it is largely speculative and there has not been any formal announcement from the Royal Colleges in this regard. They are expected to arrive weeks earlier than the exam, join some preparatory courses and then give the exam. My advice to anyone who is in a similar situation would be to plan PLAB 2 in accordance with the attempt at part 1. Part 1 is conducted three times a year in January, May and September. A good idea is to get a PLAB 2 date approx 3 months earlier than your Part 1 exam so you would have a window period of 3 months to settle down, join a clinical attachment and give the final touches to the preparation of your exam. Remember, it is quite challenging to prepare for an exam in an alien environment, with multiple antagonist factors acting at one single time, so the correct strategy is to do the bulk of your preparation when you are back home and to give final touches while you are here in UK. Obviously, there is no perfect way to prepare for this exam; however the most important points are summarized below, Do not entrap yourself in reading lengthy texts like Harrisons or Oxford Textbook of Medicine. These are for reference purpose only, and to be used whenever you are stuck up in a difficult question while practising. The more obese the pool, the better! Questions are available either in paperback books or online websites, which may offer up to questions. The medium that you would like to use is entirely up to you. Paperbacks are convenient, but online websites offer detailed feedback and analysis of performance based on responses of other candidates using the same website. Visit the exam centre, the day before if possible and try to be early rather than late. However, do keep track of your progress throughout the paper and make sure that you exactly know the questions you have left unmarked and others which you need to come back and review. Its your intuition during the paper which will do the trick and I really hope that it works for you on that particular day. Indeed, what complicate matters for overseas doctors is the difficult conditions in which they have to prepare for the exam and it makes proper planning all the more important and a more practical way of actually preparing for the exam an absolute essential. I hope the little information, which I have managed to gather here will be helpful to you.
