Dubai Desert Safari Experience After a brief waiting period, we proceeded to start with our desert safari tour which included dune bashing, BBQ dinner, belly dancing show, camel rides, and picture-taking opportunities throughout the tour. The dune bashing actually lasted almost an hour, and it was a thrilling experience. The drivers had no GPS, and all around, you can only see red sand. Dune bashing may look and sound scary at first, but all the cars are fitted with roll cage and have functioning seat belts. Another important item to bring is sunglasses or hat – something to protect your face from the elements and blowing sand. The biggest inconvenience I felt through the entire experience was how crowded the desert was. You could pay an extra fee to ride a camel which we paid for but did not enjoy as much – you went around in circles outside the gate for about a minute. It was highly overpriced and not an authentic experience to say the least – there seems to be a feeling to upsell the tourists as much as possible. We continued into the evening with a belly dancing show and dinner, which was a self-serve buffet with plenty of food with options even for vegetarians. There are a number of booths and stalls around the camp, so you can enjoy shisha, a quick camel ride or henna painting as you relax into the evening. We finished off the evening by being driven to a different spot in the desert, where you can lay down on the cool sand, and look up at the clear night sky. We were driven back to the city, but instead of being dropped off at the hotel, we wanted to see the Dubai Fountain at the Dubai Mall. We were pretty exhausted at this point and slept through most of the ride. Loved seeing the fountain which reminded me of the ones in Singapore Sentosa Island. What You Need to Know Getting to the desert: Sunscreen, hat, sunglasses and a layering piece. Protect your body from the elements and blowing sand because getting sand in your eye really hurts. I admit that it caught me off guard, and my six-week stint went a lot more quickly than I expected. But before I say goodbye, I have some final highlights from my travels, and I have some overall impressions to share before I turn things over to Eliot next week. The offline chore system is a nice way to make tedious tasks less so, and while you start off with only the ability to collect travel time at chariot hubs, you can add chores to your list by reaching milestones in game. I wanted to see as many areas as I could without wasting too much time running aimlessly through empty deserts. I just skimmed the tip of the iceberg, but what I have come to appreciate are the impressive settlements that have been constructed by players. I liked the layout of the well-populated settlement in River Plains where I built my home, but the ones I saw outside of town show an eye for city planning, while others show a sense of humor. I was drawn to one in particular in the Valley of the Kings because on the map it resembled a Pharaoh holding up a giant hand. Players apparently altered the terrain so that it appeared that way on the map, similar to the lines of Nazca. I wish I had been able to work on increasing my speed more for the trip, but in the end it was worth it. Players can petition to have their names included on a ballot, and a Demi-Pharaoh Jury will conduct multiple rounds of voting until they reduce the pool down to a final group, and then the general public votes on one overall winner. According to the announcement this past week, the vote participation was the highest yet in this telling. He can exile up to seven players from the game, which means they cannot log back in until the next telling. However, if he abuses his power and exiles innocent people, he will probably pay a price when the next Demi-Pharaoh is chosen, who can turn around and exile him. I stayed there for 2 days and 2 nights and my only regret was not staying for a third day but i also try to not regret anything so lets say i was happy spending 2 nights there! Wadi Rum has a small village which is where the locals live but tourists stay in Bedouin camps which are spread out around the desert and can easily be booked online, the majority that i saw have great websites with all their details and prices on and emailed me back within a few hours with the further information i was looking for. I had emailed 3 different camps about prices but i decided to go to the camp recommended by my hotel owner in Aqaba as it included transport from Aqaba into the Desert and in the end this worked out better and cheaper than i could of imagined as i pretty much ended up having my own guide- Muhammad and paying roughly half of what i had been quoted by the other camps but also doing way more activities than they had quoted me for! Muhammad was a lovely local Bedouin guy who had lived in the Wadi Rum desert all of his life, he was full of passion for his home which was lovely to see and a fountain of information.. He picked myself and a couple from Budapest up at midday from Aqaba and we drove straight to Wadi Rum which took less than an hour, once there we got straight on with seeing some famous sights and amazing views. Sleeping outside in the desert is quite a popular thing to do so after having dinner at a Bedouin camp Mohammad and I drove out into the wilderness where he created a fire, made some chai tea and then i slept in the back of the pick up truck with a mattress and thick blanket under the starsâ€¦ just perfect!! A typical Bedouin camp A fire and tea.. We arrived at about 7: The robot on their backs. Two other things i noticed were that i seemed to be 1 of 3 white tourists which was pretty cool as its a really local event and that i also seemed to be 1 of 3 women as everyone else was Male! Anyway i was glad i got to go along and witness this bizarre but wonderful event. One of the things i really wanted to do in Wadi Rum was a Camel ride. I expressed some concerns to Mohammad and asked him about the Camels but after hearing how passionate he felt about his Camel i asked to be taken out on one. His brother took me out and was just as lovely as he was, we rode for about 2 hours, had lunch and then visited the house where Lawrence of Arabia lived and then continued for another 2 hour ride, we had lots of laughs a long the way but i also got to ride in silence and appreciate once more how gorgeous this place was and just how quiet and peaceful it is. I was pleased i did the Camel ride and that i did it this way despite having a very sore bum and legs that evening and the following days! I was never going to go for a ride which was a short 30 minutes in a circle which the Camel has to do all day everyday and i knew these camels were looked after and of course it is in their blood to be walking long distances in the desert heat. Before arriving in the Desert i had been overthinking how long i would stay there and each place in Jordan, would i have enough time or too much time but after being in the desert for 2 days and nights with no wifi i felt myself completely calm down and relax. Trying on the local headwear! The locals have seen a decrease in tourism especially in Wadi Rum over the last year or so so they are itching to get more tourists there and to prove to them how amazing.. There were four games that were all within a few votes of each other. I created my character over the weekend and began my path to citizenship. Did I make it through, or did flax farming get the better of me? Help me plan my course! Getting the feel There were two things I had to really adjust to when I first started out. One was the fact that my avatar is actually part of the UI. Much of what I did during the first play session, from planting and building to repairing broken blades, involved selecting actions by clicking my character rather than a button on a UI frame. It took some getting used to, but after a while it felt natural and even made sense because my character is actually the one performing all of these actions. The other bit I had to get used to was leaning heavily on the wiki. The tutorial gets you started but often leaves you a little short on the details. I ran around with my flax seeds for what seemed like forever, trying to figure out whether I should be looking for an icon indicating the proper place to plant or clicking the ground to start my seedlings. It was only after consulting the wiki that I learned I had to click on my avatar to get the plant option. After that, I used the wiki quite a bit to help me answer questions about my surroundings. What I love so far about the UI is how easy it is to keep track of my inventory. The running list of items I acquire makes it easier for me to enjoy the process of crafting. I did have a little problem with becoming overburdened, but after dropping the pounds of sand I had been scooping up hey, I was told it was a sandbox! Citizenship Usually, when I begin to play an MMO, I lose patience with things like tutorials and starter quests and immediately go off running and exploring, eventually finding places I have no business seeing yet, which forces me to go back and "do it the right way" or just walk away from the game completely. Ironically, I held off on doing a walkabout until I could complete my citizenship. It was fun explaining plant domestication to my daughter after she asked me why I was weeding some flax beds and not others. Eventually I did finish up the tasks for citizenship and was caught a bit off guard that completing it led to my character getting lifted up into the sky and hit repeatedly by lightning. Community beginnings I also had a chance to dip my toes into the community. Every single player to whom I sent a message responded, and each of them made me feel welcome. Several gave me some helpful tips and suggested a few good guilds that were a match for a new player like me. Some of them seem more crafting-oriented, like architecture, thought, and art and music, while others are more social in nature, like leadership and harmony. So in a way, your selection will also help me decide whether to explore crafting a bit more or branch off and get more involved in the community. I plan on doing both, but this will help me prioritize. The other decision I need to make is whether to spend the next week traveling and exploring or setting up my compound and planting some roots. Should I make my home first, or see the sights and then settle down? I have lived my life in fast forward for so long that I am actually a bit fearful of slowing down. On the bright side, however, I am convicted by the thought that God did not design us to live life dazed and out of breath because of incessant hustling. That said, I do try to intentionally build periods of adventure into my schedule. Opting outside has proven to be very good medicine for me. There is something unmistakably therapeutic about the outdoors. Fresh air, beautiful vistas, and even muscles aching from strenuous activity somehow trigger my internal reset button. This past week, my wife Cheryl and I have been hard at work outdoors. Earlier this year we purchased a few acres of land in one of our favorite places in Texas – Big Bend. For the first time since signing on the dotted line, Cheryl had the opportunity to return with me to Dos Arbolitos, our little slice of heaven on earth. We drove across the state with a list of things we wanted to accomplish. Until we decide on what kind of tiny house we will build we have plenty of other things that need attention. Our first order of business was to identify all of the trees on the property that have the potential to accentuate our place with their own natural beauty. We marked more than forty trees we would like to nurture. We started with the mesquite trees located on or near our turnaround. When it comes to mesquites, folks either love them or hate them. As for me, I love mesquites. The mesquite is the tree of my youth. They are rugged, defiant, grow in whatever way suits them, and are hard to kill. Every mesquite is unique because of the way it grows in response to the challenges of its environment. I love that about mesquites. Because the annual rainfall in the Chihuahuan Desert is only a few inches per year, we wanted to give our trees a little advantage. So, we pruned all of the sucker branches and scooped out the ground around the perimeter drip line of each tree. This way, when it does rain, each tree will have its respective water catchment basin. This should give these trees a little growth advantage in their tough desert home. Cheryl and I worked from early morning to sunset. We set up our canopy, camp chairs, and ice chest packed with electrolyte drinks and food and then worked like Trojans. The absolutely best part of the day was watching the sun go down and then waiting for the first stars to grace the expansive night sky. The colors at sunset in the desert are beyond amazing. There is no way to describe the magnificent colors painted on the canvas above layers of rugged mountains in the distance. Each sunset in the Big Bend is indeed a masterpiece. Sunset at Dos Arbolitos was everything we imagined it would be and more. Getting to watch a magnificent thunderstorm move across the Big Bend Valley one afternoon was an added bonus. We are beyond refreshed, unquestionably blessed, and excited to watch our Dos Arbolitos adventure continue to unfold.

My selfish reason was to surf in the desert at Wadi Adventure. After a little research I discovered it was very possible to live the dream I've had for years about surfing the mystic wave created by man.

Flying a hot air balloon over the desert at sunrise: We each find our little space and excitedly wait for the balloon to lift off fully. First we seem to fly to the sky oh so high! The highest point we reach is 4, feet up 1. Simultaneously, we keep watching the other balloon that took off into the air just after us. From high up we descend a few thousand feet down. Getting ready for the takeoff, still in the dark! The flight Everyone is using their cameras to the fullest, snapping selfies, shooting videos because this is definitely one of the moments everybody wants to remember for life. You look around, watching the occasional animal appear below as you keep snapping photos of the gorgeous rising sun that colors everything orange. Suddenly the other balloon appears so the main task at hand is now to fit in the rising sun and the balloon into one photo. The whole experience is indescribable. You wonder how come there are occasional bushes in the sand. At the same time you keep watching the performance of your captain. He communicates with the control towers, informs them of entering the airspace and throws little facts to us, the crew, here and there! Oh look, a camel farm! Notice the guy waving at us, even though he sees the balloon almost every day: The sun rising above Dubai desert Smooth sand dunes everywhere you look Dreamy views of the other balloon and the gorgeous sunrise Being up there reminded me of a quote: The sleeper must awaken. In a slight disagreement, we all get into our trained positions with our knees bent and our backs against the side of the basket. Landing in the desert is not a piece of cake, after all! We slightly hit a first dune, second, third, and then we land on the ground. We landed on the side. Sad for it to be all over, we stood watching the balloon to deflate. The result of smooth landing: Back on the ground, safe and sound. The ride in the old open top Rover is fun enough on itself, as riding on the dunes produces quite some adrenaline. Land Rovers waiting to take us to falconry showcase and breakfast Falconry show An optional falconry showcase is done right near the breakfast spot, and I can highly recommend it to anyone! Falcons react only to what they see. What a great way to continue the adventure! Jessica explaining all about how Bedouins used falcons to catch food The falcon Shoo finally got her reward Breakfast Enjoying original style Bedouin coffee with fresh dates is the typical way of hosting guests in the desert. If you have more time and more curiosity for the desert, I strongly recommend purchasing an add-on: The whole combo can be booked via Platinum Heritage Website. Even the breakfast exceeded my expectations.. Your guide will help you put a scarf on your head, just like the Bedouins would do. A black one for each lady, who can also use it to cover her face, if she prefers to. Men get a white and red, which covers their head and the neck. Me wearing a shemagh. We were driven around in the old Rover again and our guide Oscar from South Africa would talk to us about the unique Bedouin way of life in the desert. It was all so interesting! Oscar explaining the medicinal usage of this plant. Different traces in the sand would reveal who was sniffing around before our Rover appeared. You can see a few trees and a small lake which is, unsurprisingly, very popular among local animals. The sand is so smooth that I have to remove my flip-flops and let it flow between my toes. Only Platinum Heritage is allowed by the government to operate in the Reserve. Some companies in Dubai do offer tours like that but please consider staying away from dune bashing. It was real fun to ride a Rover in the desert. No dune bashing involved, though. Desert is not always just pure sand! The national tree of UAE, the Ghaf, has roots 6x longer than the surface part of the trunk. Lonely oryx in the desert, seemingly just waiting for his life to be over. Practicalities Before the flight A driver picks you up from your hotel in Dubai at the set time. You arrive at the take off spot right before the sky starts turning lighter from pitch black. All minivans are disembarked and people are divided into groups to fly different balloons. From my research, they seemed the most experienced and made me feel comfortable enough to overcome my slight nervousness connected with first time flying. Practical tips for making hot air balloon flight comfy and enjoyable There are a few things that can turn bad when preparing for the ride. Follow the tips below to prepare for everything: Make sure to be waiting for your driver to pick you up at your hotel before your agreed upon time! The first option to use a toilet is only after the hot air balloon ride, at the

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breakfast location. Of course, weather can turn bad. One of the classiest Rovers. Seriously, go with this company! My personal unbiased view The whole idea came to me when planning what to do on a stopover in Dubai. I had about 18 hours in Dubai on my way back from the Philippines and decided to make the most out of it. This hot air balloon experience absolutely exceeded my expectations. That really stood out.
