I met Arn through a neighbor in my apartment building in New York. I was a little wary at first because what I knew about Cambodia and the Khmer Rouge led me expect to meet a person so traumatized that he might not be able to tell his story in way others could understand. He had a fire to be heard and an irresistible insistence that you listen. But genocide persists â€” and Never Fall Down shows how its architects and the tools they use remain the same. How did you arrive at this decision? In the course of my research, I found Arn to be a remarkably reliable and consistent storyteller. He could remember, often in horrendous detail, much of what he witnessed. And when I checked his account vs archival material and other witness accounts, he was surprisingly accurate in recounting events from more than 30 years ago. And so I chose to use his recollections as the armature onto which I could craft a narrative. I wove his memories together with my own research or my own imagination to write scenes that have the specificity of non-fiction and the narrative drive of fiction. What kind of research did you do for the novel? Arn and I spent hours in my home doing long, emotionally draining interviews. Then I traveled to Cambodia with him, retracing the steps of his childhood â€” from the town square where he and his little brother hustled for change, to the Killing Fields temple where he was forced to witness the torture and death of hundreds of people, and on to a remote corner of the country where Khmer Rouge hold-outs live to this day. He was unsure of his memories but what was astonishing was how well his stories meshed with theirs. The only thing that was different? They reenacted -with some hesitation at first â€” the propaganda songs and dances they had to perform to stay alive. And we all visited the home of the former Khmer Rouge soldier who was their warden and sometimes their protector. It was an honor that they shared so much with me â€” and it was moving to see them process, and shrug off, some of the memories that held them hostage all these years. What were some difficulties you encountered in writing from his perspective? I tried to write this book a dozen different ways. Just the facts, with a journalistic remove. Then I tried on a number of different styles. He speaks urgency, terror, confusion â€” and sometimes wonder and wisdom. But I was afraid of using it for the book, afraid people would find it distracting or that it would fail to capture all the intelligence and wit that Arn has. After a chance meeting with an English teacher who made me realize that if I took the risk, readers would follow, I gave it a try. These moments are often bittersweet, since they tend to indicate something we take for granted in our everyday lives. What effect did you hope to achieve by including these moments? My hope was to show the pure wonder of encountering a strange new culture â€” and to show that even after all Arn had been through, he still retained a sense of curiosity, trust and joy. How did writing this novel compare to writing others? This was probably most difficult because I felt a keen responsibility to Arn â€” who had become my friend â€” to tell his story with honesty. To convey his heroism, his canny ways of surviving and my deep respect for him â€” but to also convey accurately the full picture of his life, the things he had to do to survive and the guilt he carried. The other thing that made it hard was that my other books are more purely fiction. Arn is a real man who laid bare his entire life story. This book would form a record of his life. I had to get it right. How did you arrive at this hopefulness? That optimism is pure Arn. He has an unquenchable belief in the power of forgiveness and in his ability to spread peace. He takes true joy in life. And he has made good on those beliefs by starting an organization to save the traditional music of Cambodia, to provide literacy and job training to orphans like himself and to go to areas of conflict to spread peace. Most of all, he leads a life as an example of hope Never Fall Down.

Most, including Arn, his aunt and his siblings, begin the long walk to the countryside where the Khmer Rouge imprison them in work camps. Even on this initial walk, the devastation begins. Prized possessions are left in the road, food is scarce, the Khmer Rouge are ruthless and people begin to die. Arn says, "In just one day a person can get use to seeing dead body. In this new world, Arn says, "Being rich now is no good. Being poor, this can save your life. There is no money. Everyone is called, Comrade. A black uniform is worn by all. No one can have their own possessions. Angka, the ruler of the Khmer Rouge, is their new family. Thinking too much is a disease. It is the Year Zero. All day long, the prisoners work in the rice fields, and at night they sit through indoctrination meetings. Arn witnesses countless atrocities. People are literally starving to death. A girl sitting next to him dies at the table. Many are beaten to death, some with a small axe to the back of their heads. Arn sees people getting their insides sliced out with a bayonet and even a young boy chewing a human arm. The dead are tossed into growing dirt piles, some still partially alive. Arn is forced to push the dead into a ditch, to cook a human liver, to go along with the sexual advances of a young Khmer Rouge girl, and to play music to conceal the sound of all the killing. When the Vietnamese invade, Arn ends up fighting alongside the Khmer Rouge, committing some of the same violent acts that had only recently horrified him. Later, when Arn eventually makes his miraculous journey to the United States, he is faced with even more challenges as he confronts American bullies and tries to figure out the peculiarities of American culture. How does Arn survive all this madness? Is it because he seems to learn from each experience and adjust himself to each new situation? He figures out how to avoid the wrath of the Khmer Rouge by being invisible. He learns not to see and not to hear what is going on around him. He understands that "They fall down, they never get up. Over and over I tell my self one thing: Bend low, bend low, then bend lower. The wind blow one way, you blow that way. It blow the other way, you do, too. That is the way to survive. His survival may also be the result of his ability to continue to find positives, to create new relationships and to care about others. He keeps that strength hidden "You show nothing, maybe you live. He says, "This guy, Mek, he decide to live because of what I say. Now, I know, it my job to keep him living. Why were they so cruel? Why or why not? Does it help you get through difficult situations?
