During this time the neighborhood also developed a red-light district, known as the Black Sea. By , the Protestant churches had left the neighborhood. The North Bennet Street Industrial School now known as North Bennet Street School was also founded at around this time to provide North End residents with the opportunity to gain skills that would help them find employment. In the s the John F. Hundreds of North End buildings were demolished below Cross Street, and the Artery walled off the North End from downtown, isolating the neighborhood. During this time, many shops in the neighborhood closed, the St. During the s and s, the Boston Redevelopment Authority approved high-rise, high-density housing projects in the neighborhood while North End residents worked to build affordable housing for the elderly. One of these projects, the Casa Maria Apartments, stands on the site of the St. The entire city lies on the Shawmut Peninsula. The North End is the smaller promontory at the northeast corner of the peninsula, separated from the rest of the city by a large mill pond. The North End gets its name from being the north end of the old Shawmut Peninsula , the remains which have been obscured as large parts of modern Boston are now built on landfill used to expand the land upon which the city is built. The community is ringed by Commercial Street and Atlantic Avenue , while Hanover Street is the main north-south thoroughfare through the community.

By the time he took his family to England in , he had published a handful of poems in magazines and newspapers. He was a virtually unknown poet approaching the age of forty. While others experimented with free verse, jazz rhythms, fragmentation, and other nontraditional methods, Frost chose to stick with conventions such as rhyme and meter. His own experiments had to do with the nuances of human speech organized along a poetic line. Consequently, his poems sound like talk one might hear between two people—that is, everyday conversation—but talk of uncommon wit and intelligence. Some of the finest examples of that talk appear in the poems of North of Boston. The dialogues depend strongly on tensions to create drama, and Frost presents a great variety of them. Two neighbors meet each spring to repair the stone walls that separate their properties. The narrator feels that his neighbor is too practical, too old-fashioned in his thinking. Mary argues for making his last days comfortable and letting bygones be bygones. Warren knows Silas to have a rich brother in a town nearby and wants to send him there. There is very little action in the story, although the speakers summon up many scenes while talking about the past. Two opposing images form, and the reader is left to choose a side. The use of specific and general language is another source of tension in the poem, as are contrasts of darkness and light, of softness and hardness, and of inside where Silas sleeps and dies and outside where Warren and Mary talk. Each concept is associated with one or the other of the principal characters, but all resolve into a kind of grayness after Silas dies. Blank verse is defined as unrhymed lines of iambic pentameter. Obviously, not all the lines of a poem are equally regular. Frost was a master at substituting other metrical feet to give his lines variety.
