She could not be burdened by having to look after her son, and so she was very happy when her psychiatrist Dr. Finch offered to let Augusten spend time with his family. But Augusten, even at the age of 12, should have been able to tell that this move did not bode well when during a session with his mother and himself, the doctor explained that he has his own needs and between patients, or sometimes even during sessions, he will retreat to the back room from his office, which he referred to as "the Masturbatorium. However, even there, he is not safe. He knows he is gay, and he is eager to meet someone else who is also gay, so he is pleased to be introduced to Neil, a man considerably older than himself. Augusten becomes very confused though when Neil rapes him and they then develop a long-term relationship. With help from Dr. Finch, Augusten manages to drop out of school altogether, and leads a dissolute life of hanging around, popping pills provided by the doctor, and occasionally encountering his mother as she goes from one crisis to another. Through it all, Augusten keeps on writing, and it is not at all surprising that he ended up moving to New York City and becoming a writer. Running with Scissors is a real page-turner, and I would recommend it highly. However, it may leave the reader with an unsettling feeling of uncertainty about its truth. Some of the episodes are so bizarre and the Finch family runs so wild that there are points when one wonders whether Burroughs became carried away by the thrill of telling a great yarn.

When she asks Augusten his opinion on any of her poems, his stock reply is to say that it will surely be published in the New Yorker, which is her goal. Augusten himself is fascinated by clothing, jewelry, stardom and doctors. He spends his time listening to Tony Orlando and Dawn albums, and dreaming of being an actor, a doctor, or better yet, playing a doctor on TV. In one described episode his drunken father attempts to strangle his mother, who pushes him away, causing him to cut his head severely enough to produce a small puddle of blood, but no real injury. The result of the continued hostility is Dr. Finch, a family counselor who resembles Santa Claus. Finch and befriends the receptionist in his office, Hope, who turns out to be one of his many children. Finch-some of which involve Augusten who inquires about a small room in the rear of the office. Finch then reveals that this is his "Masturbatorium" in which he relieves himself sexually between sessions, and sometimes during excusing himself if the session is "particularly tedious". Augusten and Deirdre are invited to see the room. Upon entering, they find Hope Dr. Finch is seemingly furious with his daughter but asks Deirdre to confront her about the invasion of his privacy. Hope and Augusten talk in the lobby afterwards, about the Masturbatorium. Augusten, is very excited to visit the home of a doctor and looks forward to a glamorous, upscale house. Unfortunately the Finch residence is a pink, rundown affair that sticks out sorrowfully from its pristine white neighbors. While Deirdre is in her session with Dr. Finch, Augusten, who is now 12, spends his time with Vickie and Natalie, Dr. The two girls are the unkempt opposite of Augusten, who tries desperately to keep his clothes free of the animal hair which is quite prevalent in the house. The three decide to play with an old electroshock therapy machine. Fortunately, they do not plug the machine in. As their game begins, they are joined by Poo Bear, the 6 year old grandson of Dr. Finch who roams the house in the nude. The false shock treatment scares the child who then runs away. The three go after him only to find him defecating beneath a grand piano onto wall to wall carpeting. Natalie and Vickie cheer for the child, while Augusten is disgusted and goes to seek his mother. When he finds her in the kitchen she tells him that his father may intend to kill them and that Dr. Finch is the only one who can save them. He is then informed that his mother is going to live in a motel while he, Augusten, will stay at the Finch residence. In an upstairs room, lives a woman named Joranne who is a patient of Dr. Finch with Obsessive Compulsive Disorder. The woman keeps her room spotlessly clean in stark contrast to the rest of the house and only leaves the room to use the restroom. She has her own restroom which she also keeps shining. She also eats the caulk from around the sink. All of her meals are brought to her by Agnes, Dr. Hope introduces Augusten to Joranne as she is having an episode over a dirty spoon. Hope tells him that she will soon be ready to leave the house and live on her own. The fact that Dr. Finch could fix such a person is impressive to Augusten, but he is also fascinated by Joranne and her disorder. Deidre comes to pick up Augusten in a complete trance and barely acknowledges the fact that he is there. Just Add Water In further spending time with the Finches, Augusten

trades in his blazers and preened hair for faded jeans and natural curls. He replaces a jewelry obsession with smoking. He confides in Hope that he is gay and so she introduces him to her 33 year old adopted brother, Neil Bookman, who is also gay. They go on a walk together and Neil assures Augusten that the two can discuss anything, and that he will never take advantage of Augusten. Neil leaves before Hope has a chance to talk to him to see if he can fill in for her at the office while she visits a friend. What results is a strange tale of brokenness, loss, and the need for tangible and meaningful connections in the world in which we live. Rarely if ever, does she appear fully grounded in the present or able to identify the needs of others above and beyond her own aspirations. Finch fully embodies an extreme version of psycho-analytic psychology as a kind of life philosophy and consequently those around him seem to have adopted it as well. Deidre soaks it in, integrating Dr. Augusten, his mother Deidre, his father Norman and the psychiatrist, Dr Finch. The client is ultimately Deidra, however her son Augusten receives a kind of passive therapy indirectly imposed by Dr. We, the audience are not given many clues about the kinds of specific counsel or tools that Dr. Finch is offering Deidre in their counseling sessions. But we can infer from the clear indicators throughout the film that Deidre is presently in therapy and Dr. Finch is aware of whatever progress or digressions that are taking place. What is puzzling is the somewhat ironic abstract commentary the film conveys about the utter uselessness of psycho-analytic psychology. The viewer may find his or her head cocked to one side while asking the question: Because of this, the number of crossed boundaries and ethical violations on behalf of Dr. The norm seems to be whatever works goes, which means the social pragmatism of Dr. The question with this film is not where did Dr. Finch cross the line? The question is, does Dr. Finch have any sort of ethical system to which he subscribes? The only time we see Dr. Finch contradict Deidre is early in the film. Deidre as was complaining about her ex-husband and speaking harshly about him in front of Augusten. Finch bluntly and directly confronted her and told her to not instill fear in her son. She listened and responded by stopping what she was doing. Unfortunately this particular scene does not give us much as to what exactly Dr. Finch wants in the moment. Perhaps keeping the situation calm and preventing anxiety was his main concern or maybe he believed Deidre was truly harming her son in that moment. Relationships are built on more than random isolated connections with people. Something else is needed for true connection to take place. People need an inner sense of where they begin and end, a kind of inner solidarity with who they are in the world. This need is intrinsic to relationship building, trust, and honesty. Take these things away and we enter a slippery slope of not challenging the false constructs of reality that are sometimes created in our minds and hearts. Take these things away from the counselor-client relationship and the very foundation for improvement, change, and inner growth becomes slippery and indiscernible. In conclusion, a perfunctory glance at the film reveals a biographical story which is jolting to our sensibilities. However, one only need to watch Augusten to see if his living situation is truly conducive to meaningful relationships and sustainable connections with others. What is helpful about the film is its contrast to what the audience would identify as stability, rest, and contentment. Yet, it cannot be assumed that clients come from backgrounds where stability, rules, and boundaries function by the same standards as the counselor. Natalie refuses to believe such allegations. Due to the stress that this puts on their friendship, Augusten moves out. While living on his own, having also failed out of college, Augusten realizes that his life, though hard, prepared him for a richer life as a writer in the city. Given all he overcomes, such endeavors fail to scare him any longer. Throughout the memoir, Augusten dreams of many careers, from hair stylist to professional singer.
