

1: Puppy Care Basics | How to Care for a New Puppy | Caring for a New Puppy

Did You Know 59% of those surveyed say pets are good for their health and the health of their family and help them relax. 40% say that owning a dog motivates them to exercise on a regular basis.

Set up a schedule and carefully supervise our puppy. The little puppy is very curious and will get into trouble every chance he gets. To save ourselves a lot of pain and to save our puppy from stress, we want set up a fixed schedule which includes crate time, play time, walk time, as well as handling and grooming time. When our puppy is out and about in a non-dog-proof area, we need to supervise him closely. Close supervision will give us the opportunity to teach puppy right from wrong, without too much damage to our furniture and belongings. If I do not have the time, I usually crate puppy or put puppy on a tie-down. If I do not have the time, I usually crate puppy, when he is home alone, or I put puppy on a tie-down, when I am home but unable to fully supervise. This can be a secure puppy pen or a safe room e. I make sure there is nothing in the enclosure that my puppy can destroy. I also put in some bedding, a water bowl, puppy pads, and safe chew toys. As a general rule, the longest time to crate a puppy is age of dog in months hours. Note that this is just a general guideline for the maximum crate time. Most puppies need to go outside more frequently than that, for exercise and potty training. I take my puppy outside as soon as he wakes up, and right after any kind of vigorous play. In the beginning, Husky puppy Shania needed to potty after about minutes of play. Here is a more detailed table of maximum crate time. At night, I crate my dogs in the bedroom. Sleeping together helps with the bonding process, and shows them that they are part of the pack. Keep a drag-lead on our puppy 2. Keep a drag-lead on our puppy. I put a drag-lead on my puppy when he is roaming freely in the house. This will help us control our ball of energy without resorting to chasing games. When my puppy tries to run away, all I need to do is step on the drag-lead. I use a regular, thick 1 inch wide , flat collar or harness and not an aversive collar choke chain, prong collar. I make sure to cut off the loop on the leash, so that it does not catch on anything around the house. I only do this while I am around to properly supervise my puppy. Once he matures and is better behaved, I switch to a leash tab or remove the drag-lead altogether. The 6 foot leash gives us better control of our puppy, and is necessary to keep him safe when he decides to go chasing after dogs, cats, or squirrels. Start with reward obedience training 3. Start with reward obedience training. Shiba Inu Sephy sits and waits patiently to be let into the house. It is most effective and least risky to start our puppy with reward obedience training. I started out with aversive techniques, and it made my Shiba puppy develop additional behavioral issues, including aggression. In fact, my aversive based dog trainer said that it was inappropriate use pain based techniques, such as leash jerks and alpha rolls, on dogs that are younger than 6 months old. Today, I prefer to use reward training because it is more effective at motivating my dogs, stopping undesirable behaviors, and building a strong bond. This simply means that my puppy has to do something for me, for example a Sit, before he gets any resource e. Any bullying will be ignored, or will result in the removal of that resource. Many people make the mistake of equating pack leadership with the use of aversive training. Aversive dog trainers say that difficult, strong-willed, dominant dogs require stronger, punishment based methods in order to show him who is boss. This is not true. One of my dogs a Shiba Inu is extremely strong willed, and can be quite difficult , but he responds much better to reward training. Be careful of advertisements for 10 minute puppy obedience training programs and the like. There are no miracle cures in puppy training. Pack leadership is most effectively attained through reward training. The good news is puppies do not have the jaw strength of an adult dog, and will not do much damage to us when biting. Because of this, puppy-hood is a good time for bite inhibition, or soft mouth training. One of the best ways to train a dog to have a soft mouth is through hand-feeding. I hand-feed my puppy at least some of his kibble every day. If he bites too hard when getting his food, I do a sharp ouch or yelp and ignore him for a few seconds. Then, I retry the exercise. If he takes food from me gently, I praise him and continue feeding without any breaks. Hand-feeding also helps with food aggression issues, so I continue with it even through adulthood. Because my Shiba Inu has good bite inhibition, we were able to solve many of his behavior problems, which would have been difficult to deal with if he were biting at full strength. Practice calm and assertive energy This is something that is always emphasized by Cesar Millan the Dog Whisperer and it is extremely important; especially for a hyperactive puppy. If we interact with a dog using nervous, submissive, fearful, or otherwise weak non-assertive energy, the dog will sense that and start acting out even more. Anger, impatience, frustration, and all other non-calm energies will only excite our puppy, and cause him to exhibit even more extreme behaviors. In order to achieve calm, assertive energy, we must first overcome whatever fears we may feel toward our dog, and become his pack leader. This is much easier to do if we have achieved good bite inhibition. A busy puppy is a good puppy 6. A busy puppy is a good puppy. Puppies have a lot of energy, and will get into trouble if we do not keep them busy. I make my puppy work for ALL of his food. Instead of presenting everything to him in a silver bowl, I use his daily kibble and treats for obedience sessions, bite inhibition training, handling, and grooming. If there is food left over, I put it in interactive food toys. I also schedule play time with my puppy. Some games that my dogs like include flirt pole, the water hose game, and sometimes soccer. When I start with a new game, I make it fun by handing out lots of treats for effort. Once my puppy understands the game, I switch to only treating his more stellar performances. This means that we own all the toys, and we decide when to start and stop the games. Play-time can be very useful in training our puppy to calm down, and to pay attention to us even when he is excited. I also schedule two or three short obedience training sessions minutes with my puppy every day. This helps to establish me as the leader, gives my puppy some mental exercise, and provides a good bonding experience. Other good ways to exercise our puppy after full vaccination include neighborhood walks, walks in the park, dog playgroups, and dog sports. I schedule two or three short minutes obedience training sessions with my puppy every day. We are not alone The most important thing to remember while bringing up a difficult puppy is that we are not alone! Our puppy journey will be filled with a lot of joy, but there will also be challenges and pit-falls. We are not alone! There are many support groups out there where we may post our questions. Small and medium-sized breeds can make the leap to adult dog food between 9 and 12 months of age. Large breed dogs should stick with puppy kibbles until they reach 2-years-old. Make sure your puppy has fresh and abundant water available at all times. Feed multiple times a day: Age weeks " 4 meals per day Age months " 3 meals per day Age months " 2 meals per day 4. According to the experts, your most potent allies in the quest to housetrain your puppy are patience, planning, and plenty of positive reinforcement. This helps reduce the spread of viruses and disease. Make sure to give lots of positive reinforcement whenever your puppy manages to potty outside and, almost equally important, refrain from punishing her when she has accidents indoors. Knowing when to take your puppy out is almost as important as giving her praise whenever she does eliminate outdoors. When you wake up. Immediately after your puppy eats or drinks a lot of water. When your puppy wakes up from a nap. During and after physical activity. Watch For Early Signs of Illness For the first few months, puppies are more susceptible to sudden bouts of illnesses that can be serious if not caught in the early stages.

Whatever he does, you must react properly or he will learn the wrong things. Puppies are delightful bundles of energy and curiosity. If you respond properly to the challenges of bringing a new puppy into your home, the adjustment period will be shorter and less stressful for both of you. If you do not respond properly, what you must get right when raising a puppy. Routines are reassuring to puppies. For example, his food and water bowls should stay in one place. First and foremost, teach your new puppy daily routines. Where his food and water dishes are located. What times of day he will eat. Where his bed is. What time he goes to bed. What time he gets up. Where he goes to the bathroom. Where his toys are kept. It definitely does matter. If you use the wrong teaching method, your puppy will begin making decisions about how he wants YOU to fit into HIS life. These praise and correction words should be started at months of age. Imagine your puppy running out the front door. You call him, waving a treat. Food is a great motivator and I definitely use it. This sad scenario happens a lot with "biscuit training." You should teach your puppy to respect you as the leader in your home. Without proper respect, your puppy may learn words and routines but choose not to do them. And it can be traced to improper training right from the time the puppy was first brought home. Chihuahua and Papillon, listening carefully for words they know. Respect training is not something you can get "almost" right. You must get it completely, consistently right – in a way that dogs understand. I can help you with this. I can help you with this, too. But do expect him to listen carefully to your words, waiting for one he understands. Expect him to be eager to follow your directions. Some people mistakenly refer to a crate as "doggie jail" but that is not the way a puppy will view his crate. For a new puppy, a crate helps with housebreaking and provides a safe den for sleeping. When your puppy is used to his crate, it will be easy to take him visiting, or for trips in the car, or to the vet. When we watch TV, we sit in our favorite chairs and our dogs typically choose to lie down in their crates doors open, watching the same shows we watch well, sort of! Tiny breeds are notoriously difficult to housebreak and take even longer. Still, housebreaking begins the day you bring your puppy home. Establish the right pattern from the very beginning and a puppy will be housebroken as soon as his internal organs can cooperate. But if you do it wrong, housebreaking will become a nightmare. So you want to establish the right pattern from the very beginning. There are several methods of housebreaking, including using a crate, an exercise pen "ex-pen", a doggy door leading into a small potty yard, or a litter box for tiny breeds. Acceptance of being handled months. Start handling your puppy immediately so he learns to accept anything you need to do with him. Your puppy must accept YOU as the leader in your family. These are all times when YOU – not a puppy – have to be the one to decide what is necessary. A puppy should stand quietly for anything you need to do with him. If you teach words and respect properly, acceptance of being handled will come naturally – they go "hand-in-hand", so to speak! Gentleness months. Teach your puppy to be gentle when interacting with people. Just like acceptance of being handled, gentleness is taught along with vocabulary and respect training. Your job is to take over from where they left off and teach a puppy how to restrain himself when he plays with humans. Remember, you must be the one who sets the limits of ALL good and bad behavior. Household rules months. This particular behavior would be a "No." Is he allowed to shred the toilet paper? Can he sleep on your bed at night? What about barking at strangers he sees through the window? You need to choose the best household rules, then be completely consistent about enforcing those rules. My puppy training book spends a lot of time showing you how to teach those words, and also tells you the best rules to establish with your puppy. Is your puppy older than months? You might think a training schedule would be different for an older puppy. Respect needs to come first, no matter how long it takes. Then you can move on to walk on the leash without pulling. You need to teach these new words in specific ways that encourage a puppy to view you as a worthy leader. Just little things you need to say and do every time you interact with him. These little things are viewed as "leadership" by the canine mind. All puppies misbehave from time to time. How you respond when a puppy misbehaves is very, very important. If you respond the

wrong way, he will keep misbehaving. Respond the right way and he will view you as a leader and listen to you. You get only one chance to teach all the right habits to a "clean slate" puppy. If you try to train your puppy without help, you will probably have to re-do the lessons, only this time with an older puppy with bad habits. Timid puppies can get overrun by bullies, and excitable puppies just get more excitable. By Cesar Millan. People often ask me at what age they should start puppy training. The answer is immediately! Here are some quick tips on the steps to training and maintaining an obedient and balanced dog from the start.

From basic obedience commands to advanced tricks, dog training is a rewarding and engaging experience for you and your dog. Just as every new human member of a household must be trained to behave properly, so must dogs. Everyone in the household is better off if the dog conforms to the behaviour expected of it. That applies to the dog, too. By nature, your dog wants your approval. It wants to please you most of the time, anyway! But the following types of training should be considered as absolutely essential for every dog owner. Toilet training is often a time of trial and stress for everyone involved. Start when the dog is young – about 3 to 4 months of age. And if you start later, the training period is likely to take much longer. When you begin the training, start by confining the puppy to a fairly restricted area – a single room, the length of a tethered lead, or even a crate. Here are a few tips for effective toilet training: Keep your puppy on a regular feeding schedule during toilet training. That means no snacking between meals! Offer frequent potty opportunities. Give your pup plenty of opportunities to take care of business outside. Go outside first thing in the morning, and then every 30 to 60 minutes throughout the day. And also take your puppy outside after it wakes from a nap or finishes a meal. Take your dog to the same spot outside every time. Your dog will recognize its scent and more readily do its business. Stay out with your dog. When your doggie does its duty, praise it! Offer a treat, or something the dog really enjoys, like a walk. While an obedient dog is a pleasure to be around, the opposite is also true – a disobedient dog can be a real pain! But at the very minimum, your dog should learn to respond to the following basic commands: This basic command helps you to keep control of your dog no matter the situation, and is a good command to teach first. This teaches your dog to instantly drop whatever is in its mouth. Could save your dog from harm if it ever picks up something dangerous or toxic. Teaches your dog to remain still, calm, and in one place. Teaches your dog to stay close to you as you walk, with or without a lead. Teaches your dog to immediately come to you upon your command. You should begin to teach this command to your puppy as soon as it recognizes its name. This command could potentially help you protect your puppy from harm. There are a number of dog-training methods available for teaching your dog these commands, but we recommend positive reinforcement as the best method. Positive reinforcement rewards wanted behaviour rather than punishing unwanted behaviour. This method of training makes learning more enjoyable for your dog, and will help to strengthen the bond between you and your pet. Your dog will be happy because it wants to please you, and because it wants to reap the rewards of good behaviour. You will be happier because your dog will be more manageable and will enrich your life. And visitors will be happy not to have to endure a poorly behaved pooch rampaging through the house!

When this happens, bad behaviors, such as excessive barking, chewing, leash-pulling, or anxiety, will develop. For your new puppy to grow into a healthy, balanced dog, you must demonstrate leadership from day one! Visit to the veterinarian One of the cornerstones of good health for your puppy is regular veterinary care. It is crucial that your puppy maintains a nutritional diet and exercise routine to stay healthy and balanced. Plus, your vet can advise on heartworm, and flea and tick preventative care. While a lot goes into keeping your puppy in good health, it all begins with the first visit to the vet. Housebreaking All dogs become conditioned never to eliminate in their dens. From two to four months of age, most pups pick up on the concept of housebreaking quite easily since it is part of their natural programming. In the early days of housebreaking you want to make sure the puppy has a place to relieve herself where she feels safe; a place that seems and smells familiar. First thing every morning, bring your puppy outside to the same general area. It is important to remain consistent throughout the process so your puppy can learn the habit. Once your new puppy has successfully gone outside, it is important to reward the good behavior. And be sure not to punish your puppy for an accident or do anything to create a negative association with her bodily functions. Stay calm and assertive and quietly remove the puppy to the place where you want him to go. Dog walking Please find safe ways to exercise your puppy too! For all dogs, this means a daily walk. Walking in front of your new puppy allows you to be seen as the pack leader. You should be the first one out the door and the first one in. Your puppy should be beside or behind you during the walk. Whether you train your new puppy or dog yourself, take classes, or hire a private trainer, some basic training tips should be tackled right out of the gate. These top 10 tips from professional dog trainers at the top of their game will help get you going.

Plus, puppy training builds a bond between a dog and his new human family. But where do you start? What Is Puppy Obedience Training? Obedience training helps your pet learn his role in your family and in the world. It will teach him the skills he needs to interact with other dogs and with the people inside and outside your home. Puppy training is the first step to teaching healthy behaviors and avoiding negative ones. Often, dogs start their training by learning simple commands, such as "sit" and "stay," though later on they may be trained in more specific ways, such as how to stay in a crate without whining or how to sit patiently without begging while the family eats dinner. The best part of training your puppy at home is that you can personalize your efforts to your dog and your lifestyle. The most important part is teaching the skills your dog needs to be a good listener and follow your directions. Some pet parents hope to ward off excessive barking, while others are worried about their dog chewing on non-food items like dangerous house plants or their shoes. Digging, begging, biting, stealing food and urinating in the home are other issues pet parents look to avoid. This is where you have to be strong and avoid feeding him table scraps. Make sure the whole family follows this rule. He might also growl and wave his tail slowly. On the other hand, a submissive dog will try to make himself appear small and act like a puppy. This is because an adult dog will "tell off" a puppy but not attack him. Submission will take the form of a sideways crouch near to the ground, his tail held low but wagging away. He may also try to lick the face of the dominant dog or human. He may even roll on his back. In either case, it will require you to help train him out of these behaviors. Either by reducing aggression or helping him feel more confident and not shrinking back. After all, you want your dog to alert you if he hears an intruder, but not every time he sees a squirrel. Whining on the other hand is something you should never reward. When your dog whines and you go to comfort him, you are just reinforcing the behavior and he will continue to whine so you will come and comfort him. Finally, socialization with children and other animals is a key reason people begin puppy obedience training. In order to invite people into your home and bring your dog out in public, you want to feel confident that he can communicate in a safe, social manner with his furry peers and people of all ages. Children often make pets very skittish, so showing them how to behave around children "even if none live in your home" is an integral part of training. Having an idea about what you want to focus on in the beginning will help you get off to the right start. Just remember to touch on all behavior concerns throughout the time you spend training. Any time spent allowing negative behaviors could become a setback, so get your puppy started off on the right paw. Here are some puppy obedience training tips to implement in at-home lessons. Practice one command for five minutes at a time, and again later when you have opportunities outside of training sessions. Your dog can only do one thing at a time, so focus on one skill and move on once he has mastered it. You should also always end the training on a positive note so your pet is excited for his next lesson. Be Consistent When you were a kid in school, what helped you learn your spelling words and multiplication tables? Consistency is key to training your new puppy. He not only needs to keep practicing commands over and over with you, but he also needs you to be consistent with your approach. Use the same command words when teaching him simple campaigns like "sit" or "stay" or "no. Practice Training Everywhere You want your puppy to be able to respond to you in various situations and places, so be careful not to limit training to one room of your house or corner of the yard. Practice commands in your home, backyard, front yard, surrounding neighborhood, woods, park or in any other location you visit with your pet. There are different distracting smells and noises in new areas, and you want to be sure your dog can still perform what he knows in different environments. Similarly, while it helps to have one adult assert themselves as the pack leader, your dog should also be trained by every member of your family. Part of puppy obedience training is simply learning where your pet falls in the order of the pack, so everyone needs to be involved. This also teaches your pet to follow commands by all humans and not just one leader. Reward Your Puppy Dogs

are highly motivated by praise and rewards. Create positive associations for your puppy when he follows your commands by verbally encouraging him or sharing a bite of kibble or healthy dog treats. Rewards not only make training more fun for your pet, but also give him something to work for. Dogs are motivated by pleasing their owners, but also like humans seek opportunities for praise and rewards. Just make sure to wean your dog off of a treat once he starts to master a particular command. This will give him the confidence to perform commands on his own and teach him that not every good deed results in a snack. Classes meant specifically for puppies often enroll dogs between the ages of eight to ten weeks old to five months old. Trainers offer at-home classes or training at their facility. Similarly, speak with them about their training philosophy to make sure their efforts are in line with how you want to educate your pet. If you need a referral, contact your veterinarian or ask a friend who recently went through professional training with their own new dog. Finally, whether you train your pet at home on your own or if you bring him to a class or an instructor, understand that patience is the most important skill you need during this process. Your puppy will inevitably make some mistakes or have an occasional accident. He needs your support during those times. Clearly and kindly correct the behavior or action and reinforce the training command you taught your pet. Your dog is counting on you and excited to learn.
