Before you own All animals need attention, interaction, and room to roam. Recognize the impact of bringing a dog into your home: Once you own License your dog Dogs three months and older must have a dog licence for identification. There are many benefits to getting your dog licensed: If we pick up your lost dog, they will get a free ride home, once per calendar year. Your licence fee helps our shelter care for lost and injured animals, and supports pet adoption services. Your dog is added to the Emergency Pet Registry so emergency responders know to look for your dog in a disaster. Statistics collected from licensing help assess the need for dog facilities and services, like off-leash dog parks. Licensing allows Animal Control Officers to respond to emergency calls of hurt or stray animals, educate the public and enforce the by-laws. Licensing your dog is a legal form of ownership and shows that you are a responsible pet owner. License your dog Know your responsibilities under the Animal Control Bylaw Under section 4 of the bylaw, you are required to keep your dog under your control at all times. You cannot allow your dog to run free on the street or in any other public place other than one of our 36 dog off-leash areas. Your dog must be kept on a leash no more than 2. Ensure your dog stays up to date with vaccinations. Spay or neuter your dog to prevent accidental breeding. Exercise your dog Keep your dog healthy by taking daily walks. Pick out appropriate equipment including a collar, leash, and toys. Teach your dog basic obedience To make for a well behaved dog, teach your dog basic commands such as sit, stay, come, and down. Owning a dog is a joy, privilege, and responsibility. If you are considering bringing a canine companion into your life, think seriously about the commitment that being a responsible dog owner.

3: Responsible Dog Ownership

Responsible dog ownership means more than simply loving your dog. Dog ownership is a serious commitment that takes time and energy. Before you decide to get a dog, make sure you can be a conscientious and attentive owner.

There are some smart shortcuts to training and living with dogs that are available in books and videos. Each hour you spend in preparation, will save you ten in training. Check out the different methods used, to find the one that your pup best responds to. Part of it is to keep the pup safe, and the rest is to keep your stuff safe from the pup. Everything below four feet is fair game. Expect it and prepare for it. One of the best solutions is to offer a wide variety of puppy safe chew products all over each accessible floor in the house. If the pup is going to chew, you might as well control what he is chewing. Be aware that some foods and plants are toxic to dogs. Sadie the Goldendoodle loves the coolness of the air conditioning vent. She had twisted herself to the point where she was almost choking. Sadie will not wear a collar inside the home again. Most major products are online and search engines can bring up sites that compare the different dog foods to one another. Breeders will often give a new puppy owner a small supply of the food they have been eating. If you plan to change foods, it is easiest on the pup to make it a gradual change. Choose a Vet you are comfortable with and be sure that your dog gets the lifetime of care he deserves. Be prepared for emergencies and know where your local emergency Vet clinic is. Take it upon yourself to learn about the drugs prescribed to your dog. Merely "google" the name of the drug your pet is being prescribed. Be well informed of potential serious or fatal side effects in case your pet exhibits any of those signs. Parvo is a deadly silent killer, so please take heed of this warning. Once your pup is fully immunized, then they are ready to go out and meet the world. For the first few weeks they should be allowed to relieve themselves every few hours at most. Then, as they grow, they will be able to hold it in comfortably for longer periods. First they have to connect going outside with ringing the bell. Hang a large puppy-proof bell from a sturdy ribbon by the door, where you let out your pups. At first you will take them out often. For the first week or two they should be let out: But the trick is to let them understand that outside is for relieving themselves. The less accidents they have, the faster they learn. It takes some dogs only a few days to learn to ring the bell to ask to go out. We can control what they chew. They will chew the toy, not your hands. These pups are clever, they learn fast. Make a schedule for several daily walks, including one good run each day. Your dog will appreciate it. You will appreciate a more relaxed dog. It will help provide identification should your dog ever get loose. There are at least two companies that provide microchips, you might want to consider what shelters in your area use for convenience sake. A dog will naturally swim to the point it fell in and will drown working to get out just feet from the steps. Take it in and out via the steps for the first few times in the pool. Next gently place the dog in the pool at another place other than the steps and guide it to the steps. Do not leave a dog alone anywhere near the pool until it can be placed in the pool at any location and naturally swim to the steps to get out. Most breeder warranties stipulate that a pup must be seen by a Vet within a short time period - usually up to 72 hours. This protects the breeder, pup and owner by guaranteeing that the pup is checked by a Vet who will verify the health of the pup and continue the inoculations initiated by the breeder within a reasonable timeframe. Some States have mandatory laws which protect puppy buyers. Here is one good list on the net that has a list of Puppy Lemon Law States. Check to see if there are laws in place that deal specifically with your situation. Otherwise valuable feedback is lost to the breeder, and the same breeding dogs can be used again. How will they handle normal puppy behaviors like nipping, stealing toys, chewing, and jumping? How will they teach their children to be good and kind leaders? Who will be responsible for teaching the children these things? Pups are not disposable pets. I think the age of the kids and the size of the Dood should be a big consideration. I was pretty ignorant about the puppy biting and all the typical puppy behaviors. Beware mixing pups and small kids if you are a dog beginner. Your allegiances will get sorely tested. To play with the pup you need to get down to their level. Never let them get up on two legs. If you always kneel or sit, they never learn to jump up. No running in the house, all active play outdoors. Never let the dogs chase, or play tug of war with you - it will lead to pulling on clothes. When the doorbell rings, wait a second or two then calmly walk to the door. Never leave pups and young kids unsupervised.

This law clarifies classifications of dogs subsequent to the event and outlines the responsibilities of owners and the consequences of non-compliance with the requirements. The effective date is July 1, This review is intended to inform the reader of the most common applications of the law. Further study is encouraged by reviewing the entire statute listed above. Specifics on those are listed below. However, this chapter shall not prohibit local governments from adopting and enforcing ordinances or resolutions which provide for more restrictive control and regulation of dogs than the minimum standards provided for in this chapter. Has your jurisdiction done so? And, the local government can and should add more restrictive control and regulation of dogs than the minimum standards provided by the RDOA suggestions on what to add are below. The local governments cannot reduce the minimum standards set forth in the RDOA in their local ordinance. If the person injured by such dog was a person who, at the time, was committing a trespass, was abusing the dog, or was committing or attempting to commit an offense under Chapter 5 of Title Note, in GA, a child under a certain age may not be considered a trespasser. Only one classified dog may be owned by an adult Only one classified dog may occupy any premise which the dog is kept at any time. It shall be unlawful for an owner to have or possess within this state a classified dog without a certificate of registration issued in accordance with the provisions of this Code section. Certificates of registration shall be nontransferable and shall only be issued to a person 18 years of age or older. No more than one certificate of registration shall be issued per domicile. No one having a potentially dangerous if local ordinance has such definition may keep a dangerous or vicious dog. Any person who has been convicted of two or more violations of this article may not own a classified dog A vicious dog may not be kept at a domicile occupied regardless of ownership by certain felons; see below for specifics. State law violations will create state criminal record GCIC which follows the dog owner. It is highly recommended that any serious injury cause by a dog attack or a reckless dog owner who violates more than once or fails to comply with requirements, be charged under state law. Anytime the state law is used. However, it is recommended to use the state RDOA for the reason stated above. RDOA a law enforcement officer or dog control officer shall immediately impound a dog if the officer believes the dog poses a threat to the public safety. Furthermore, rabies law dictates that a quarantine period must initiate. Yes, dog owners are responsible to any human including their own minors living in the home. Same scenario as above, but the kids are in the public street in front of the house and Child A calls dog over and attacks child B, that dog should be classified. A social party at dog owners home, dog attacks a guest, that dog should be classified The family dog attacks a family member in their own home, that dog should be classified. A person enters a place of business and is attacked by dog kept at business, that dog should be classified. Note, under GA law, children are treated differently under a certain age when it comes to trespass. Note, under GA law, children under a certain age are unable to determine trespass and therefore may be immune to this exemption. Ask, was there a chase involved or other action by dog? Certificates are not transferable. No more than one certificate per domicile. No registration is allowed for any person convicted of two or more violations of this law. Certifications are renewed annually and failure to renew within ten days of renewal date constitutes a violation of this law and can result in confiscation of classified dog. Owner must notify the dog control officer within 24 hours if the dog is on the loose or has attacked a human and shall notify the dog control officer within 24 hours if the dog has died or has been euthanized. The owner of a classified dog who moves from one jurisdiction to another within the State of Georgia shall register the classified dog in the new jurisdiction within ten days of becoming a resident and notify the dog control officer of the jurisdiction from which he or she moved. Any new owner would have to re-register and ensure requirements are met. Violation of any of the above requirements is a misdemeanor. Failing to comply with the requirements will result in immediate

confiscation of dog and a refusal to surrender dog will constitute a violation of law, a misdemeanor. Certificates for "vicious" dogs will not be issued to persons convicted of felonies involving drugs, dogfighting or aggravated cruelty to animals or to a person who resides with such felons can be allowed after two years of completing sentence. Dog cannot leave the property unless leashed, muzzled and under control, or in a locked cage or crate. Dog must be microchipped capable of being scanned recommended to include classification in microchip data. Make sure the insurance covers the specific classified dog and it will cover bodily injury. No "vicious" dog may be sold, transferred or donated to any other person. It must be relinquished to a government facility or veterinarian to be euthanized. Failing to comply with these requirements will result in immediately confiscation and a refusal to surrender dog will constitute a violation of law, a misdemeanor. A A serious violent felony as defined in Code Section At the time of renewal of a certificate of registration for a vicious dog, a dog control officer shall verify that the owner is continuing to comply with provisions of this article. Failure to renew a certificate of registration within ten days of the renewal date or initial classification date shall constitute a violation of this article. In general most violations under the RDOA are misdemeanors. In addition, the classified dog shall be euthanized at the cost of the owner. For example, meter reader, postal worker, and utility employee in the performance of their job. Owner can include anyone possessing, harboring, keeping or having custody or control of a dog. Note, the law is silent on time period. Under civil portion it says: The owner or, if no owner can be found, the custodian exercising care and control over any dog. In proving ownership, investigate the person caring for the dog providing food and water. Interviewing neighbors will most likely uncover facts not provided by owner. However, some neighbors, despite having valuable information, may be reluctant to get involved. Furthermore, a puncture wound with a tear or anything needing sutures can be classified as a serious injury. The new definition is: A refusal to surrender a dog subject to confiscation shall be a violation of this article. There are many ways in which a dog that poses a public risk may be euthanized under the Responsible Dog Owner Act. However it is important to remember that euthanasia will not stay the criminal prosecution or potential civil action of dog owner regardless if dog was voluntary relinquished for euthanasia. They can classify the dog dangerous or vicious but that does not mean they can automatically euthanize the dog. Rather, typically what happens is this: Dog is impounded, a notice is sent out, if owner fails to request a hearing, the dog is classified and requirements to keep the dog are set forth per the law. A written notice of those requirements is mailed to the owner. Once the requirement are met, the dog owner can get his dog back. If the owner fails to meet the requirement within the allotted time, then the dog can euthanized. Under 4 " 8- 23 e. Within ten days after the hearing, the authority which conducted the hearing shall mail written notice to the dog owner of its determination on the matter. If the determination is that the dog is to be euthanized pursuant to Code Section , the notice shall specify the date by which the euthanasia shall occur. Two " unspecified if dog has to be classified or not Under Three - unspecified if dog has to be classified. Dog has caused serious injury on more than one occasion, the dog shall be euthanized. A dog that is found, after notice and opportunity for hearing as provided by Code Section , to have caused a serious injury to a human on more than one occasion shall be euthanized; provided, however, that no injury occurring before July 1, , shall count for purposes of this subsection. Four " dog is already classified and owner fails to meet requirements at the time of renewal and compile within 20 days of the date the dog was confiscated, dog can be euthanized, Owner to pay cost. Five - dog is already classified and dog owner violates ANY violation of article and fails to comply with requirements in 20 days of the date the dog was confiscated, dog can be euthanized, Owner to pay cost. All fines and all charges for services performed by a law enforcement or dog control officer shall be paid prior to owner recovery of the dog. Criminal prosecution shall not be stayed due to owner recovery or euthanasia of the dog. A law enforcement officer or dog control officer shall immediately impound a dog if the officer believes the dog poses a threat to the public safety. A dangerous or vicious dog shall be immediately confiscated by any dog control officer or by a law enforcement officer in the case of any violation of this law. In other words, one whose dog has already been classified or has received a conviction of any dog bite law and violates by failing to comply with requirements or allows his dog to bite again, said dog shall be immediately confiscated. The owner may be required to pay the costs of housing and euthanasia. In cases that do not include dogs that are euthanized, relinquished or otherwise held

until case is adjudicated because the dog poses a public threat, the government must return the dog AFTER the owner has made payment of reasonable confiscation and housing costs and proof of compliance with the provisions of this article. However, the owner has 14 days to show proof of compliance otherwise, the government can humanely euthanize the dog. All fines and all charges for services by a law enforcement or dog control officer shall be paid prior to owner recovery of the dog. It is recommended that the compliance should be verified. For example, an officer should look at enclosure, signs, leashes, muzzles, verified ages of household members, check for felons, contact insurance company for direct verification of insurance and the like. No, criminal prosecution shall not be stayed due to owner recovery or euthanasia of the dog. Also, keep in mind, the owner may continue their irresponsible behavior in the future with another dog. Giving the dog up relinquishment does not always cure the behavior nor does it stop an owner from getting another dog and repeating the behavior. Only when consequences are experienced does one typically change the behavior. This law is focused on the irresponsible owner. Persons carrying out the duties of dog control officer shall not be authorized to make arrests unless the person is a law enforcement officer having the powers of arrest.

7: The 5 C's of responsibility | Cesar's Way

February is "Responsible Pet Owner" month, and that got us thinking: how do we view responsible pet ownership? While there isn't an exact definition for it the America Kennel Club gives each of us a great starting point for how we view pet ownership: "Owning a dog is not just a privilege-it's a responsibility."

Responsible Dog Ownership Responsible Dog Ownership The Utah Drathaar Organization is driven to educate dog owners of their responsibilities, which includes obedience training, the companionship, and values that a dog can give to its owner. In Utah, United States of America, like in many developed countries, is confronted with a high level of abandoned animals as society progresses. There are many reasons for an animal being given up or abandoned, the most common being the lack of time or that the dog is misbehaving thus being a nuisance to the owner as well as the public. In most situations, it is the novelty that has worn out, when it is no longer a cute puppy, or the owners discover that they just simply cannot cope with looking after the dog due to the lack of knowledge of how to care for a dog. The easy way out is to send it to the shelter or abandon it somewhere, and the problem is solved for the owner. Anyone who decides to have a dog should consider the following factors before buying or adopting one: Communication with your dog is imperative especially during puppyhood. Time commitment from the owner is required for walking the dog daily for the purpose of exercise as well nurturing its socializing skills. You would need to bring your dog for Obedience training classes as it allows him to learn the necessary commands so that it will not be a nuisance in public. Also, it will have the opportunity to socialize with other dogs, which is part of their growing processes. One should look at one? Lifestyle, such as work and travel schedules before such a major decision is made. Commitment Make sure that you send the dog to the vet for its annual vaccination and when it is sick. Ensure that he is well cared for in its grooming, diet, exercise, socialization, etc. These are the few basic expectations, which requires time from the owner. Dogs live in a pack order within their social circle; they are led by a packer leader whom they look upon to provide the basics. Allowing your maid to handle the dog will make your maid the pack leader. Now you understand why your dog does not obey you when you try to discipline it. Affordability Apart from financial aspects, this includes a decent space for the dog. Are you able to accommodate a dog where you currently live? Keeping a dog naturally involves cost, but with proper planning, understanding its needs and diet, one can have a dog at a reasonable cost. Tolerance All puppies are the cutest no matter how ugly they may grow up to be. During their growing process, one has to understand the stages that puppies go through. They bite everything they can get their paws on, much like a child who will put everything into his mouth. Puppies will also urinate everywhere until it is toilet trained. With patience and tolerance, a puppy can be trained fairly quickly. Ownership One of the most unfortunate reasons for a dog being given up is that no one has the time for it. When that happens, the dog is looked upon as a nuisance and a burden to all concerned. Always remember that the decision in having a dog should involve every family member living under the same roof as the dog, especially the ones who would be responsible for its care. Owning a dog is a lifetime commitment averaging 10 to 13 years, depending on the breed of the dog.
