For the second of my armistice anniversary concerts, I moved across town from the Royal Festival Hall to the Barbican. It is bound up with hatred, jealousy, boastfulness, disregard of all rules and sadistic pleasure in witnessing violence: Let us not be ashamed to shed a tear of emotion as we hear it! The staging is refreshing and pacy. Musically, it has the four crucial ingredients: This new production, shared with the Royal Opera House, Covent Garden and with the Teatro Real, Madrid, features an accomplished cast and innovative scenic approaches. A great big conductor promotes the maelstrom of great big music that shepherds all this to ecstatic conclusion. What evil lurks here? Can these people be saved? Proof that new work, like good wine, needs to settle and mature to reveal its riches. As a consequence of many unorthodox aspects of her lifestyle, Sand was obliged to relinquish some of the privileges appertaining to a baroness Poet Charles Baudelaire was a contemporary critic of George Sand: Her ideas on morals have the same depth of judgment and delicacy of feeling as those of janitresses and kept women The fact that there are men who could become enamoured of this slut is indeed a proof of the abasement of the men of this generation. Flaubert, who was by no means an indulgent or forbearing critic, held unabashed admiration for her, as did Marcel Proust. Later in life, she corresponded with Gustave Flaubert. Despite their obvious differences in temperament and aesthetic preference, they eventually became close friends. She was engaged in an intimate friendship with actress Marie Dorval, which led to widespread but unconfirmed rumors of a lesbian affair. Chopin was already ill with incipient tuberculosis or, as has recently been suggested, cystic fibrosis at the beginning of their relationship, and spending a winter in Majorca - where Sand and Chopin did not realize that winter was a time of rain and cold, and where they could not get proper lodgings - exacerbated his symptoms. They split two years before his death, for a culmination of reasons. However, the tipping point in their relationship involved her daughter Solange. Chopin continued to be cordial to Solange after she and her husband, Auguste Clesinger, had a vicious falling out with Sand over money. Chopin was never asked back to Nohant. Chopin was penniless at that point; his friends had to pay for his stay there, as well as his funeral at the Madeleine. The funeral was attended by over 3, people, including Delacroix, Liszt, Victor Hugo and other famous people. George Sand, however, was notable by her absence. They published a few stories in collaboration, signing them "Jules Sand. She subsequently adopted, for her first independent novel, Indiana , the pen name that made her famous " George Sand. A Winter in Majorca described the period that she and Chopin spent on that island in Further theatre pieces and autobiographical pieces include *Histoire de ma vie* , *Elle et Lui* about her affair with Musset , *Journal Intime* posthumously published in , and *Correspondence*. When the Revolution began, women had no rights and Sand believed these were necessary for progress. This allowed her to publish more political essays. She wrote "I cannot believe in any republic that starts a revolution by killing its own proletariat.
