While Windows delivers with its operating system a default image viewer called Windows Picture and Fax Viewer, there are a lot of other image viewers that support printing, to name a few popular ones: If you need to convert several images at once to a single PDF, use Windows Explorer to select all the images for conversion, right-click on one of them and choose the Print option. On Windows 8 however, by default Windows 8 will automatically open photos using the new Photo App and it will take you out of the desktop environment. You can circumvent that by right clicking an image and selecting Open With and from the list of programs choose Windows Photo Viewer. Regardless of what your current operating system is, the conversion process is the same and contains the following steps: Open the image in Windows Photo Viewer. Select novaPDF from the available dropdown list and choose paper size and quality. Optionally you can select multiple images at once and print them using predefined layouts. Converting images to PDF using Picasa "Picasa" is a software product that lets users view, organize, edit and share images. By default, Picasa does not have a direct PDF conversion option available. Since it does contain a print option instead, you can use it to convert images to PDF by virtually printing your images using a PDF creator. To convert to PDF from Picasa follow these steps: Download and install novaPDF on your computer using the Download section on our website. Open Picasa and select the images you want to convert to PDF can be a single image or multiple images if you want to convert multiple jpg to PDF. Choose a printing layout for the images single image per page, multiple images on a page , as well as selecting the number of copies per PDF page. This option can also be set in the novaPDF "Printing Preferences" window before starting the conversion. Video below shows how to convert images to PDF using Irfanview: Creating a PDF photo album A PDF photo album has the advantage of sharing photos with others using a single file in a format that is widely recognized on multiple platforms. The procedure is simple and requires following these steps: Make sure you have novaPDF installed on your computer. If you do not, then download and install it from our Download page. Using Windows Explorer, select all the pictures for the album, right-click on one of them and select Print in the list of options to open the Print Pictures window. Select novaPDF from the available list and choose how you want to display the pictures in the album. Click OK to finish the conversion. Your shortcut to better photographs. As a photographer you shoot in Raw or Jpeg, or sometimes both. You may start in Lightroom or Adobe Camera Raw, but many photographers will end up in Photoshop doing more detailed editing of your photographs. Now it is time to save. What do you do? It is meant to focus on how you save to share photos on the web and for print. Here are a few of the most common formats and why you may or may not want to use them: Saving this way will retain adjustment layers, your masks, shapes, clipping paths, layer styles, blending modes. Useful if you need to maintain transparency. PSDs often are large in size, especially if you edit with many layers. Only those with Photoshop, Adobe products or certain other graphics programs will be able to view them. Unless you are printing from an Adobe application like Photoshop, or possibly another graphics program, you will need to save in a different format for printing, such as at a professional lab. You cannot display on the web in this format. TIFF This targeted file format is the highest quality and is excellent for print as there is no loss in quality. Retains information in layers, depending how you save it. The downsides are the extremely large file size and you cannot display on the web in this format. Lossless format so you will retain information from your images as you re-open and re-save. It is viewable by all and can be used for print and the web. When saving as a jpg, you decide what quality you desire In Photoshop for example a level 1 is the lowest quality or a 12 which is the highest quality The biggest downside is that the jpeg format is lossy. Each time you open and save, the image compresses and you lose a small amount of information. Another downside is that layers are flattened upon saving so you lose the ability to go back to past edits to tweak. Often used for graphics instead of GIF. You can share these files on the web. The file size is very small so these files load fast on the web. The downsides are limited colors and does not handle photographs well. Hopefully after reading this you have a better idea on which suits your style. There is no right or wrong per say, though many will feel strongly about how they manage their workflow. I personally simplify my workflow. While there is a compression and loss of information editing jpeg images, the difference is so minor unless you are re-opening dozens of times. For that reason, I save my images as PSD if I know I will need to come back to it to alter adjustment layers, masks, or layer opacity. Tell us which file formats you chose to save in and why? Save a file Use the Save command to save changes to the current file or the Save As command to save changes to a different file. The file remains in the current format. If you choose a format that does not support all the features of the document, a warning will appear at the bottom of the dialog box. Specify a filename and location. In the Save As dialog box, select saving options. A dialog box appears for choosing options when saving in some image formats. To copy an image without saving it to your hard disk, use the Duplicate command. To store a temporary version of the image in memory, use the History panel to create a snapshot. File saving options You can set a variety of file saving options in the Save As dialog box. The availability of options depends on the image you are saving and the selected file format. As A Copy Saves a copy of the file while keeping the current file open on your desktop. Alpha Channels Saves alpha channel information with the image. Disabling this option removes the alpha channels from the saved image. Layers Preserves all layers in the image. Notes Saves notes with the image. Spot Colors Saves spot channel information with the image. Disabling this option removes spot colors from the saved image. Thumbnail Windows Saves thumbnail data for the file. Thumbnails appear in the Open dialog box. Set file saving preferences Do one of the following: Set the following options: Image Previews Choose an option for saving image previews: Never Save to save files without previews, Always Save to save files with specified previews, or Ask When Saving to assign previews on a file-by-file basis. Use Upper Case to append file extensions using uppercase characters, or Use Lower Case to append file extensions using lowercase characters. Choose an option for appending extensions to filenames: Never to save files without file extensions, Always to append file extensions to filenames, or Ask When Saving to append file extensions on a file-by-file basis. Select Use Lower Case to append file extensions using lowercase characters. Save As to Original Folder When saving, defaults to the folder images originated from. Deselect this option to instead default to the folder you last saved in. Save in Background Background saving lets you keep working in Photoshop after you choose a Save command. Automatically Save Recovery Information Photoshop automatically stores crash-recovery information at the interval that you specify. If you experience a crash, Photoshop recovers your work when you restart it. Icon Uses the preview as a file icon on the desktop. Macintosh Thumbnail Displays the preview in the Open dialog box. Windows Thumbnail Saves a preview that Windows systems can display. Save large documents Photoshop supports documents up to , pixels in either dimension and offers three file formats for saving documents with images having more than 30, pixels in either dimension. Keep in mind that most other applications, including versions of Photoshop earlier than Photoshop CS, cannot handle files larger than 2 GB or images exceeding 30, pixels in either dimension. Photoshop Raw Supports documents of any pixel dimension or file size, but does not support layers. Large documents saved in the Photoshop Raw format are flattened. Layers are named automatically as they are saved. You can set options to control the generation of names. In the Export Layers To Files dialog box, under Destination, click Browse to select a destination for the exported files. By default, the generated files are saved in the sample folder as the source file. Enter a name in the File Name Prefix text box to specify a common name for the files. Select the Visible Layers Only option if you want to export only those layers that have visibility enabled in the Layers panel. Choose a file format from the File Type menu. Set options as necessary. Select the Include ICC Profile option if you want the working space profile embedded in the exported file. This is important for color-managed workflows.

Save pictures as a PDF (Portable Document Format) by using the Windows Picture and Fax Viewer. Free and paid picture viewer software usually has the capability to support printing to PDF for saving pictures in this format.

Navigate to the folder in which you want to keep your images. In the "Save image as" box, change the name of the picture to the name you have chosen. If you intend to use the image on a web page, make sure there are no spaces in the name you choose. If you are working on a Mac, also make sure that the name you choose ends in. Click on the "save" button. You now have an identical copy! If you are using an image for educational or personal purposes it is usually acceptable to copy images off the Internet provided that you state the source of the image. A simple way to do this is to keep a list of the names of the images and the URLs of the pages from which they came. Open a new document e. Type a heading such as "List of images and image sources. If the name of the person who took the image is given on the page from which you took the image, then record that information too. When you use an image in a document, underneath or close to the image insert a note that says something to the effect of "This image was copied from insert the page URL. Get into the habit of always recording the source of the images you copy so that if you use them you can give credit to the source. Copy the images below. While the original image can be saved in a number of different formats, any of them can be converted to a PDF file using Windows. All you need is the default Windows Picture and Fax Viewer that is pre-installed with the Operating System and a PDF program.

If you have inserted a picture into your Word document it is already in a graphic format, i.e., jpeg, gif, bmp, etc. If you want to resave it to another format, select the picture, right click it, click "Save as Picture" and save in the jpeg format to "My Pictures" folder, which will open, or select another folder or the Desktop for the picture to be saved to.

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
