

1: Packing List For Scotland

A long weekend visiting family or friends at Christmas in the UK will need a completely different packing list to a month in Australia at the same time. The weather can make such a difference to what you pack in your suitcase so, the first thing to do is to check the weather forecast for the place you plan to visit and pack your suitcase accordingly. Remember, when you reach your vacation destination you can always buy things there if you need them. If you are flying to your destination make sure you know the limit of your baggage allowance, as most budget airlines today charge substantial excess charges for overweight baggage. Make sure you weigh your baggage before leaving home if you want to avoid paying extra. Only take the minimum amount of toiletries with you as you can always buy more locally. Always pack them in sealable plastic containers to prevent any spillage from damaging your clothing. The Rolling Method of packing your clothes is a great way to reduce creases and wrinkles. Fold the shirt in half lengthways and lay another shirt or a tee shirt folded in the same way on top. Then, from the bottom of the shirt roll them both together into a reasonably tight roll. The idea behind this method is that by rolling the clothes they are being wrinkled less right from the start and as the rolling creates a gentle bend in the clothes it will recover when unrolled and given a gentle shake! Try it! it works! Molly Feltner You can put three or four or more items together in a roll and because you are creating a gentler bend there will be less creases in your clothes. The best place to put your toiletries bag is right in the center of your suitcase. It can help to decide in advance the outfits you want to wear each day and then pack each outfit in individual re-sealable bags and then roll them up. Unfortunately, luggage does go missing from time to time and it can take a day or two before you get it back. You can throw them away before coming home. So many suitcases look the same today it can be difficult spotting yours on the baggage belt.

My overarching philosophy when packing for Scotland is to travel light and check no bags. Plan to dress in layers and bring wind- and waterproof outerwear.

The winds can be strong and unforgiving so forgo your umbrella in favour of a waterproof jacket with hood. It will look far more refined than fighting a battle to stop your umbrella turning inside out. Trousers will carry you through anywhere apart from perhaps Hogmanay 31 December, which is a big event in Scotland and a time to dress up and party. It is a far bigger deal here than Christmas. If you enjoy walking this is definitely the country to bring your walking boots and all-weather gear and soak up the scenery. If you love your jeans then you will find these are acceptable everywhere although for smarter restaurants you may want to opt for black jeans or even trousers. From mid-May, June, July, August to early September the Scottish midges are out and about feasting on any exposed flesh. Be sure to keep room in your bag for some great Scottish souvenirs; whisky, cashmere and shortbread to name just a few. You can be sure of a warm welcome and friendly people wherever you go. We have stayed at Knockderry House , a really smart country house hotel overlooking Loch Long and not far from Loch Lomond. The staff are lovely and there are some great walks to do directly from the hotel. Rain, wind, sunshine and even snow. For the cooler months November, December, January, February, March and April have a warm waterproof coat or jacket, scarf and gloves and either ear muffs or warm hat. For the really cold months of December - March be sure to have waterproof boots with non slip soles, that can cope with snow and rain. Look out for biting insects - from around May to August swarms of midges can be unbearable and you are very likely to be bitten, although this is very uncomfortable rather than dangerous. Wear long trousers and sleeves and pack plenty of repellent. From late spring to autumn ticks are prevalent in woodland and heath areas - and these can spread disease including Lyme disease. Crime and personal safety For the most part the Scottish police are approachable and helpful to visitors. The chief urban risk is pickpocketing, so carry only as much money as you need, and keep all bags and pockets fastened. Out in the Highlands and Islands, crime levels are very low. Should you have anything stolen or be involved in some incident that requires reporting, contact the local police station. Emergencies For police, fire and ambulance services phone US, Canadian, Aus-tralian and New Zealand citizens can stay for up to six months, providing they have a return ticket and adequate funds to cover their stay. Elsewhere in Scotland, there are one or two gay bars in both Aberdeen and Dundee, and support and advice groups dotted around the country. Most pharmacies are open standard shop hours; local newspapers carry lists of late-opening pharmacies, or you can contact the local police for current details. These services are free to all. Mail A stamp for a first-class letter to anywhere in the British Isles currently costs 60p and should arrive the next day; second-class letters cost 50p, taking three days. Scotland is covered by 85 maps in the 1: Virtually every service station in Scotland stocks at least one large-format road atlas, covering all of Britain at around three miles to one inch, and generally including larger-scale plans of major towns. These are available from just about every tourist office in Scotland. All Scottish notes are legal tender throughout the UK, no matter what shopkeepers south of the border might say. For the most up-to-date exchange rates, check the useful website xe. However, on some islands, and in remoter parts, you may find there is only a mobile bank that runs to a timetable usually available from the local post office. General banking hours are Monday to Friday from 9 or 9. Post offices charge no commission, have longer opening hours, and are therefore often a good place to change money and cheques. Opening hours and public holidays Traditional shop hours in Scotland are Monday to Saturday 9am to 5. In the bigger towns and cities, many places now stay open on Sundays and late at night on Thursdays or Fridays. Large supermarkets typically stay open till 8pm or 10pm and a few manage hour opening excluding Sunday. Note that last entrance can be an hour or more before the published closing time. Payphones take all coins from 10p upwards, some take only phonecards and credit cards, and others take all three – the minimum charge is usually 60p. Phonecards are available from post offices and newsagents, but discount call-cards with a PIN are generally cheaper for international calls. Tipping There are no fixed rules for tipping. Tourist information The official tourist board is known as VisitScotland visitscotland. Beware that phone enquiries are often directed to a central call centre in Livingstone, where the staff have no knowledge of local information other than what appears on their

computer screen. As well as being stacked full of souvenirs and other gifts, most TICs have a decent selection of leaflets, displays, maps and books relating to the local area. Access to many public buildings has improved, with legislation ensuring that all new buildings have appropriate facilities. Other nationals need a work permit in order to work legally in the UK, with eligibility worked out on a points-based system.
