The Nikolaievsky Bridge spanned the river near the western corner of the Winter Palace and connected this region of the city to Vassili Island. In it was one of two permanent bridges in the city, the others being on pontoons, which were removed in winter just before the river froze over. The span was built of iron and carried railings decorated with classically cast hippocanths facing tridents, whose fish-tails erupted into wreaths of acanthus. The Nikolaievsky Bridge was not only a practical improvement, it was meant to be beautiful and add to the splendors of the city. This one could be enjoyed by all regardless of class or the number of kopeks in your pocket. The span was lit from one side to the other and was an enjoyable palace to stroll across in the evening. The views from the bridge were delightful and ever-changing, providing free entertainment to the lower classes. One of the great events of the year was the noisy break-up of the Neva ice in spring when enormous plates of ice crushed against one another as the warming river pushed them towards the sea and this could be seen better from parapets of the Nickolaievsky Bridge than anywhere else. A midth century pontoon bridge over the Neva River in winter. Foreigners were amazed to see almost everyone pause to cross themselves in the middle of the bridge to mutter a prayer when they passed the chapel and men also removed their hats before they genuflected. Cab drivers prided themselves on how reverently they could salute these chapels without slowing their carriages, dangerously standing and bowing as they passed by. Petersburg in could be an ordeal because many of the streets were still unpaved and became quagmires in the wet months. Many streets were paved in cut sections of logs which were arranged like a mosaic and sidewalks were built of wood. The best time to travel the roads was in winter when the surface was frozen hard. In winter the Neva itself became one vast bridge linking the islands of the delta one to another. The roads in the center of town around the Winter Palace were the best and it was here that the first permanent bridges across the Neva River were built. Most people in the city worked close to the places they worked. For the poor this was a necessity since travel by tram was expensive. Most workers walked to their places of employment - regardless of the weather. People spent most of their time in their own neighborhoods, shopping, eating and working near their homes. Seasonal workers came to the city from the countryside without shedding their rural ways of life and dress. They did not expect much in the way of sophisticated transportation or housing so the city government was happy to neglect the development of public services and transportation in the neighborhoods where they lived.

It was home to the U.S. Navy's Nightly anti-submarine air patrols were made over the Gulf of Mexico, and the War Department later selected St. Petersburg as a major technical services training center for the Army Air Corps. More than 100,000 trainees filled every hotel in the city swelling the population and creating a housing shortage as their families looked for a place to live. Post war, many of the military men stationed here returned to live with their families or visit as tourists. The 1950s are notable for the advent of air conditioning, which brought a considerable amount of housing for retirees. The population peaked beyond 100,000, and streetcar tracks were removed to make way for a society of automobiles. New development in the 1960s included the municipal marina, the main library, the Bayfront Center, and the Museum of Fine Arts. In the 1970s, St. Petersburg looked to the future by developing reclaimed water, recycled wastewater used for irrigation. It developed the largest reclaimed water system in the United States. Petersburg continues to lead the region in conserving precious water resources. The 70s also saw the beginning of St. Petersburg's Renaissance. The stately Vinoy Resort on the downtown waterfront was restored to its circa grandeur, reopening in 1976. BayWalk, a dining, retail and entertainment destination brought movie theaters and upscale shopping to downtown in 1978. After extensive renovations, the complex has reopened as the renewed, refreshed SunDial still with movies, upscale dining and retail. With the continued expansion of USF St. Petersburg, downtown is also home to a growing number of students. More than 10 oceanographic institutes call St. Petersburg home. The Deuces African Americans have been part of the St. Petersburg story since long before the railroad came in 1888. Integration gradually crept into the city and the old neighborhoods gradually disappeared. But they "and the surviving landmarks within some of them" have left memories of a closely knit society whose members respected and looked out for one another. The Hotel Europe catered to both transient and long-term guests. There were suites of rooms - some with private entrances - which were permanently reserved by members of the aristocracy, big business and the arts. Dining Room of the Hotel Europe in Service in the Hotel Europe was good; the rooms and dining rooms were clean and efficiently run. However, this was not the norm in Russia and hotels could be a frightening place to turn out the lights at night. One of the biggest complaints was dirt and vermin in hotel rooms. Bedbugs and the famous St. Petersburg flea were an endemic problem that generations of travellers to Russia had moaned about. Russians were not very sympathetic to the plight of their guests. Travellers who choose to complain to hotel staff were liable to hear - "Relax, let them bite. Travellers had to avoid drinking the water or eating raw fruit or vegetables. Even fruit juices could be a problem if they were watered down. After one had decided upon the hotel one wanted to stay in the next step was negotiating a price. Bargaining in Russia was standard practice and it drove American visitors mad. It happened everywhere - even when a shop or hotel posted a sign claiming "Prix Fixe", fixed prices. No one who knew the system would be foolish enough to pay the listed price in hotels. Negotiations to conclude a price might take some time and energy to conclude successfully. The tenacious negotiator - willing to walk towards the door, bags in hand ready to go somewhere else - would almost always be offered a price one third of what was originally asked - or, as an alternative - an upgrade to the best room in the hotel at the price of a budget room. Everyone haggled over prices in stores and hotels - even Princesses! The game was well known to Russians, who took it in stride as a part of everyday life. Tourists found it to be a nerve racking experience. This is the next stop on the travelogue.

Indigenous peoples[edit] Archaeological excavations at Pocahontas Island have found evidence of a prehistoric Native American settlement dated to BC. This is in the early third of the Archaic Period to BC. Succeeding cultures of indigenous peoples lived in the area for thousands of years prior to European exploration and colonization. When the English arrived in Virginia in , the region was occupied by the Appamatuck , a significant tribe of the Powhatan Confederacy. They were governed by a weroance , King Coquonosum, and by his sister, Queen Oppussoquionuske. Present-day Petersburg developed east of here. Founding[edit] Petersburg was founded at a strategic point at the fall line of the Appomattox River and settled by English colonists. By they had patented land along the south bank of the Appomattox River as far west as present-day Sycamore Street, and about 1 mile 1. In , the Virginia Colony established Fort Henry a short distance from the Appamatuck town, near the falls. It provided water power for mills and later industrialization. Abraham Wood sent several famous expeditions out from here in the following years to explore points to the west, as far as the Appalachian Mountains. The Bolling family , prominent tobacco planters and traders, also lived in the area from the early 18th century. Wittontown, north of the river, was settled in , and became incorporated as Pocahontas in . As the Americans retreated north across the Appomattox River, they took up the planks of the wooden Pocahontas bridge to delay the enemy. Although the British eventually drove the Americans from Blanford and Petersburg, they did not regain a strategic advantage in the war. After the war, in Petersburg annexed the adjacent towns of Blandford also called Blanford , Pocahontas and the outlying town of Ravenscroft, which became neighborhoods of the larger city. An area known as Gillfield was annexed in . Fourth President James Madison called Petersburg "Cockade of the Union" which later was applied to the town as a nickname "Cockade City" , in honor of the cockades which Volunteers wore on their caps. They established First Baptist and Gillfield Baptist Church , the first and second oldest black congregations in the city and two of the oldest in the nation. With access to waterways and a population sympathetic to refugee slaves, this neighborhood was an important site on the Underground Railroad. Antebellum Period[edit] During the Antebellum period the Port of Petersburg on the became renowned as a commercial center for processing cotton , tobacco and metal, then shipping products out of the region. The city became an important industrial center in a mostly agricultural state with few major cities. Flourishing businesses helped the city make improvements. Starting in , the city paved its streets. In the Upper Appomattox Canal Company completed the Upper Appomattox Canal Navigation System to bypass the Appomattox Falls, in order to promote traffic up and down river to Farmville and power cotton and flour mills. As early as , Petersburg had the City Point Railroad , which was linked to docks 8 miles away for transferring goods to large Chesapeake Bay and Norfolk -bound ships at City Point. As travel technology developed in the midth century, Petersburg became established as a railroad center. The last major line, the Norfolk and Petersburg Railroad , was completed in to the east, connecting to the Atlantic Ocean port of Norfolk. In the city introduced gaslights and by installed a new municipal water system. All these civic improvements helped attract and hold a substantial business community, based on manufacture of tobacco products, cotton and flour and banking. American Civil War[edit] U. Engineer Battalion, during the Siege of Petersburg, August At the time of the American Civil War , Petersburg was the second-largest city in Virginia after the capital, Richmond, and the seventh-largest city in the Confederacy. The city provided several infantry companies and artillery units to the Confederate Army, along with three troops of cavalry. In April more than free African Americans of Petersburg volunteered to work on the fortifications of Norfolk, Virginia under their own leader. Slaveholders also contributed the labor of numerous black slaves. Its numerous railroads made the city a lifeline for Richmond, the Confederate capital. On June 9, troops led by William F. Due to botched Union leadership and arrival of Confederate General William Mahone , the Union forces suffered a disastrous defeat at the Battle of the Crater , suffering over 4, casualties. In early April , Union troops finally

managed to push their left flank to the railroad to Weldon, North Carolina and the Southside Railroad. The fall of Petersburg meant that Richmond could no longer be defended. Lee attempted to lead his men south to join up with Confederate forces in North Carolina. Hopelessly outnumbered, he was surrounded and forced to surrender at Appomattox Court House, Virginia, on April 9. In the years after the Civil War, many freedmen migrated to Petersburg, founding numerous churches, businesses and institutions. Federal Government and the railroad companies repaired the damaged railroads to the city. In the General Assembly incorporated the Central Lunatic Asylum as an organized state institution, as part of an effort by the bi-racial Reconstruction-era legislature to increase public institutions for general welfare. Readjuster era[edit] During the s, a coalition of black Republicans and white Populists held power for several years in the state legislature. This resulted in two major public institutions in Petersburg, as the legislature invested for education and welfare. It was one of the first public fully state-supported four-year historically black colleges and universities HBCU in the Mid-Atlantic. This was part of a drive to improve public education that started with the Reconstruction legislature. In , the state legislature also authorized moving the mental asylum facility to the Mayfield Farm and developing a new campus there. This is the site of the present-day Central State Hospital, which provides a variety of mental health services. Other forces in the mid-th century, such as industrial and railroad restructuring, reduced the number of jobs in the city. In addition, suburban development attracted people to newer housing outside the city. World wars led to major federal institutions being constructed near Petersburg, which created local jobs. The facility was used again during World War II. In the camp was designated as Fort Lee, and additional buildings were constructed to house the U. Army Quartermaster Corps Center and School. In the postwar period, some of these installations have been reduced in size. In the s, Petersburg became the southern terminus of the Richmond-Petersburg Turnpike, predating the U. Since that time, Petersburg has struggled in competition with nearby Richmond, as the capital has grown to dominate the region in a changing economy as industries restructured. Those disfranchised suffered major losses in the ability to exercise their rights as citizens. The legislature also instituted Jim Crow laws, including imposing racial segregation. With many African Americans having served the nation and cause of freedom in WWII, in the postwar years they pressed for social justice, an end to segregation, and restoration of voting power. In Petersburg businessmen and politician, Remmie Arnold, the president and owner of the Arnold Pen Company, at the time one of the largest manufacturers of fountain pens, launched a campaign for Governor of Virginia. As a Petersburg city councilman, Arnold had pushed through a budgetary increase earmarked for equality and fair access for public housing and recreational facilities for everyone, including people of color, and increased budgetary considerations for the black schools in Petersburg. Unusually for a Democratic politician in the Jim Crow South, Arnold promised to "deal with all Virginians fairly", whatever their ethnicity. Arnold ultimately lost the Democratic primary to John S. Battle, who won the gubernatorial election. Under state segregation and Jim Crow laws, those citizens were barred from free use of public spaces and facilities. Martin Luther King, Jr. Beginning in the s African Americans in Petersburg struggled to desegregate public schools and facilities. It never re-opened to swimming. Board of Education that segregated public schools were unconstitutional. They initiated the program of Massive Resistance. For instance, rather than allow schools to be integrated, then Governor of Virginia, J. Lindsay Almond ordered the schools in several localities including Warren County, Charlottesville and Norfolk, to be closed. The school board of Prince Edward County closed the public schools for five years, starting in In Petersburg, the Bollingbrook School opened in as a segregation academy for white students. Late 20th-century economic decline[edit] Retail and industry prospered until about the late s. De-industrialization, restructuring of railroads, and related national structural economic changes cost many jobs in the city, as happened in numerous older industrial cities across the North and Midwest. The post-World War II national construction of highways encouraged development outside cities and suburbanization added to problems. In addition, reacting to racial integration of schools in the s, many middle-class families moved to newer housing in the predominantly white suburbs. They also moved to the Richmond metro area, where the economy was expanding with jobs in new fields of financial and retail services. Some companies shifted industrial jobs to states further south, where wages were lower, or overseas. The declining economy increased the pressure of competition and racial tensions in Petersburg. These flared

from until , when blacks on the City Council accused the white Mayor of racism over a re-districting plan which they and the ACLU alleged was designed to allow whites to maintain white supremacy in the city. For decades, the city government was run by a small group of white businessmen and bankers. Most were wealthy enough to own homes in the exclusive Walnut Hill neighborhood and their interrelated families had been established there for generations. In one black councilwoman described the Petersburg city government as "our own little version of the Byrd Machine ", comparing it to the political organization led by segregationist Democrat , Harry Flood Byrd , that controlled Virginia politics for decades. The annexation had been generally supported by the citizens of Petersburg, black and white alike, since the mids, as a necessary measure to allow the city of expand its tax base and its potential for growth and development. The city argued to the counties that it was better prepared to provide municipal-type services than the predominately rural counties and that the city needed more land for expected new development. The annexation was opposed by the county governments, who lost most of their commercial tax base, as well as the residents of the annexed suburban areas. Following the annexation, blacks realized that the annexations had added 8, new white residents. City council members were then elected at-large, requiring majority approval for each seat. Black civil rights organizations challenged the annexations in court, saying these were motivated to illegally dilute the voting power of blacks. A federal judge, citing provisions of the Voting Rights Act of , agreed and ordered the city to be divided into single-member districts , or wards, to enable blacks the opportunity to elect representatives of their choice. As residents of the city of Petersburg, their children would be required to attend the Petersburg City Schools, which had become predominately black due to whites sending their children to private schools or moving to suburbs. Projected industrial development of large tracts of vacant land in the annexed areas failed to take place. In Petersburg again sought to annex more land from Prince George County.

Most notably in October of while in command the 16th Infantry Division he successfully fought off several British attacks during the Battle of Passchendaele. He was also promoted Lieutenant-General in January, He seems to have left the army in May of and settled in Baden-Baden. He died on 6 May, in Baden-Baden. They had met while she was traveling in Europe several years earlier. She assumed the title of Baroness upon her marriage. He was born at Toulouse December 27, He was the son of an officer and was educated at La Fleche prior to entering the army in A general by he commanded the expeditionary force during the Moroccan Campaign of that year.
