Description of Research Most of the projects in the laboratory trace back to an underlying focus on heritable and acquired diseases affecting muscle. A recent spin-off illustrates some of the excitement and unpredictability of basic research. An understanding of this protein, its evolutionary constraints, and its interaction with other key components of the contractile apparatus and cytoskeletal network is essential to the study of muscle disease. We have studied all of the human genes for conventional muscle myosins with the surprise finding that one of them has been mutated in a recent direct human ancestor. The temporal correlation of this mutation with the emergence of the genus Homo has provided fuel for a wide range of collaborative projects in integrative biology. Most of the mutations implicated in the human muscular dystrophies have been mapped to genes encoding proteins involved in adhesive links between the contractile apparatus and the extracellular matrix. The myosin motors are fine, but the myocytes degenerate because the dysfunctional adhesive link disrupts cellular homeostasis as the muscles generate force. Although the mechanisms are not fully understood, gene transfer technology has been essential for dissecting the components of this system. Through this process there have recently emerged a range of interesting opportunities for translational research directed at the goal of clinical therapy. Widespread gene delivery has been a rate-limiting step in this process. The lab has made substantial progress in this area by applying novel developments in microvascular physiology and endothelial cell biology to the problem at hand. Safety studies suggest a feasible pathway to clinical therapy for muscular dystrophies, with spin-offs relevant to a spectrum of cardiac muscle and non-muscle diseases. He studied theology, preached in a Presbyterian pulpit in New York, and in returned to Yale as tutor for two years, the second year as senior tutor and virtual head of the college, the rectorship then being vacant. In he succeeded his maternal grandfather as pastor at Northampton, Massachusetts, where his preaching brought remarkable religious revivals. He was dismissed in He moved to Stockbridge, Massachusetts, then a frontier settlement, where he ministered to a tiny congregation and served as missionary to the Housatonic Indians. There, having more time for study and writing, he completed his celebrated work, *The Freedom of the Will*. Edwards was elected president of Princeton September 29, , five days after the death of his son-in-law, Aaron Burr, Sr. He was a popular choice, for he had been a friend of the College since its inception and was the most eminent American philosopher-theologian of his time. He finally yielded when a group of ministers persuaded him that it was his duty to accept. The seniors spoke enthusiastically of the light and instruction which Mr. Edwards had three sons and eight daughters. The three sons were graduated from Princeton; one of them, Jonathan Edwards, Jr. Three daughters married Yale graduates; one was Burr; another was Timothy Dwight, forebear of three Yale presidents. God decided at the beginning of time on a small number of people who would be saved, not according to any thing about those people, but only because it pleased God to do so. Early America and Colonial Period to He is best known for his frightening, powerful sermon, "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God". It is the style of someone with dysphoric hypomania, a mild form of mania. It goes on and on, the length, the anger and the wording are excessive, it is imaginatively elaborate, and it conveys excessive and cold irritability and anger, and it may contain the odd fire and ice emotionality often seen with manic depression. Maybe one has to have experienced an emotional state in which fire and ice and often extreme fear are the same thing to be able to picture such a thing. He criticized some of its excesses, but supported it wholeheartedly, often preached in its style, thought it was "a genuine work of God, which needed to be

furthered and purified". Gracious affections are attended with evangelical humiliation. Evangelical humiliation is a sense that a Christian has of his own utter insufficiency, despicableness, and odiousness, with an answerable frame of heart. There is a distinction to be made between a legal and evangelical humiliation. The former is what men may be the subjects of, while they are yet in a state of nature, and have no gracious affections; the latter is peculiar to true saints: In a legal humiliation, men are made sensible that they are little and nothing before the great and terrible God, and that they are undone, and wholly insufficient to help themselves; as wicked men will be at the day of judgment: In legal humiliation, men are brought to despair of helping themselves; in evangelical, they are brought voluntarily to deny and renounce themselves: Legal humiliation has in it no spiritual good, nothing of the nature of true virtue; whereas evangelical humiliation is that wherein the excellent beauty of Christian grace does very much consist. Legal humiliation is useful, as a means in order to evangelical; as a common knowledge of the things of religion is a means requisite in order to spiritual knowledge. Men may be legally humbled and have no humility: This is a great and most essential thing in true religion. They that are destitute of this, have no true religion, whatever profession they may make, and how high soever their religious affections may be: God has abundantly manifested in his word, that this is what he has a peculiar respect to in his saints, and that nothing is acceptable to him without it. Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, the same is greatest in the kingdom of heaven.
