However, this cannot be done forever, and that donkey is already wheezy and thin. Meanwhile, those of us in the white coats and back offices are also getting fat off this system. This is why my upscale neighborhood is stuffed with well paid civil servants. I can lean over the back fence and admonish any number of medical specialists, judges, politicians, and police officers. My point is not that I know what service we should delist or who we should let go. In fact, it should be clear that I do not have the answers any more or less than my friend and neighbour. We are like so many others: Change, like charity and economy, should start at home, or in our case over the back fence. You are welcome to join our conversation; we could use any wisdom.
