All our contributors have taken part in the process, which has gone through several rounds of voting as the long list was chopped back to a top 10. It went right down to the wire as our writers debated which programmes stand head and shoulders above the rest. You may also like our Top 20 classic crime movies feature here. Uncompromising, gritty and a grim portrayal of the real life behind the glitz of Los Angeles. The title refers to the code names of the suspects in this espionage whodunit, which is all the better for its reliance on tense, talky scenes rather than elaborate action sequences. The drama about a cancer-stricken chemistry teacher who turns to dealing crystal meth is audacious, addictive TV. Partnering with a former pupil, Walter White Bryan Cranston uses his scientific expertise to develop an almost pure product. He likes drug dealing and is good at it. Walt even seems to be effective at motivating his dodgy lawyer, greedy drug kingpins and junkie associates. The problem is that his brother-in-law is a senior officer in the Drug Enforcement Administration. Over five series, this brilliant cat and mouse family crime drama will have you rooting for the bad guy all the way. Life on the Street Fans of television crime today may not realise the debt the genre owes to a show called Homicide: Life on the Street. As the edgy successor to Hill Street Blues, Homicide brought a new level of gritty, almost documentary realism shot on location on the mean streets of Baltimore. The show, which is a love letter to Baltimore, was developed by native son Barry Levinson. With its big team of detectives – all strong characters dealing with the job at hand – Homicide helped the cop show evolve as a serious dramatic medium. When the activist daughter of Yorkshire copper Ronald Craven Bob Peck is murdered, he sets out to discover why. He uncovers a conspiracy involving the nuclear industry and high level figures in the government. Written by Troy Kennedy-Martin, the six-episode drama, with its iconic theme music by Michael Kamen and Eric Clapton, mesmerised viewers. It echoed growing public concern about multinational corporate greed, the environment, and duplicitous politicians. Apparently Troy Kennedy Martin – creator of a police show Z-Cars and the screenwriter of The Italian Job – actually wanted Craven to transform into a tree at the end, but wiser heads prevailed. Edge of Darkness on DVD 15 – Columbo, Take an odd-looking man, a half smoked cigarillo and a dirty raincoat and what have you got? Discard any thoughts of sexual depravity – the man described is above reproach. Brilliantly played by Peter Falk, Columbo was a star of telly and well beyond. Behind the shambling, scruffy exterior was a mind as sharp as a razor. Viewers and smug murderers alike cringe time and again at his catch-phrase: Peter Falk passed away in but reruns of his cases are still being broadcast to this day. Created by Anthony Horowitz, it featured a taciturn English detective working in a south coast town. Driver Samantha Stewart Honeysuckle Weeks is straight out of Enid Blyton, and won the hearts of countless male viewers, while the dogged Sergeant Milner Anthony Howell overcomes his disability he lost a leg in the Noway Campaign to provide solid support for his boss. With near-faultless period detail the weekly crimes are nearly always related to wartime issues, such as desertion, the black market, and spying. Perhaps there was less need to pander to foreign expectations of Scandinavian doom and gloom, so it is a much more straightforward police procedural, with the Swedish Wallander able to inject a note of admittedly, fierce humour into the grim proceedings. It starred John Simm as Sam Tyler, a modern day Manchester police officer who is badly injured in a car accident and wakes to find himself back in 1953. How times have changed! Gone are the politically correct investigations of the early 21st century, to be replaced by the near the knuckle crime fighting of Gene Hunt, brilliantly played by Philip

Glenister. Their approach to police work is worlds apart, leading to some fine clashes of culture. And it was followed by another in the second series, *Ashes to Ashes*. He commands an extensive cast of detectives, usually working in teams and solving various crimes in parallel through each episode. These range from murders and drugs and gang crime, to accidental deaths and crimes of passion. Sunday nights were never quite the same again. Trading on the potent format of the mini-series "two or three long episodes on consecutive evenings" the stories featured DCI Jane Tennison, played by Helen Mirren, who was supported by a stellar cast of British character actors such as Tom Bell and Frank Finlay. Tennison has to battle not only her own personality problems, but sexist colleagues in the Metropolitan Police and some of the nastiest criminals ever to be beamed into our homes. Most of the series is set in London, but in the fifth season she heads to Manchester to break down a Northern gangster. The Final Act was the seventh and final season, and was broadcast in Lynda La Plante won an Edgar award for her work on *Prime Suspect*, and continues to be a successful crime novelist. All three series have been novelised by David Hewson. An American remake set in the Pacific Northwest lasted for three seasons as well. ## 2: The 30 Greatest Crime Fighters In Television

The country served as a buffer between the British and Russian Empires until it won independence from notional British control in . A brief experiment in democracy ended in a coup and a communist counter-coup. The Soviet Union invaded in to support the tottering Afghan communist regime, touching off a long and destructive war. The USSR withdrew in under relentless pressure by internationally supported anti-communist mujahidin rebels. A UN-sponsored Bonn Conference in established a process for political reconstruction that included the adoption of a new constitution, a presidential election in , and National Assembly elections in . Throughout the summer of , their campaigns disputed the results and traded accusations of fraud, leading to a US-led diplomatic intervention that included a full vote audit as well as political negotiations between the two camps. Despite gains toward building a stable central government, the Taliban remains a serious challenge for the Afghan Government in almost every province. The Taliban still considers itself the rightful government of Afghanistan, and it remains a capable and confident insurgent force despite its last two spiritual leaders being killed; it continues to declare that it will pursue a peace deal with Kabul only after foreign military forces depart.

Akrotiri By terms of the Treaty of Establishment that created the independent Republic of Cyprus, the UK retained full sovereignty and jurisdiction over two areas of almost square kilometers - Akrotiri and Dhekelia.

Albania Albania declared its independence from the Ottoman Empire in , but was conquered by Italy in and occupied by Germany in . Communist partisans took over the country in . In the early s, Albania ended 46 years of xenophobic communist rule and established a multiparty democracy. The transition has proven challenging as successive governments have tried to deal with high unemployment, widespread corruption, dilapidated infrastructure, powerful organized crime networks, and combative political opponents. Albania has made progress in its democratic development since first holding multiparty elections in , but deficiencies remain. Albania in April received a European Commission recommendation to open EU accession negotiations. A large informal economy and a weak energy and transportation infrastructure remain obstacles.

Algeria After more than a century of rule by France, Algerians fought through much of the s to achieve independence in . The Government of Algeria in instituted a multi-party system in response to public unrest, but the surprising first round success of the Islamic Salvation Front FIS in the December legislative elections led the Algerian army to intervene and postpone the second round of elections to prevent what the secular elite feared would be an extremist-led government from assuming power. Fighting escalated into an insurgency, which saw intense violence from , resulting in over , deaths - many attributed to indiscriminate massacres of villagers by extremists. Abdelaziz BOUTEFLIKA, with the backing of the military, won the presidency in in an election that was boycotted by several candidates protesting alleged fraud, and won subsequent elections in , , and .

American Samoa Settled as early as B. International rivalries in the latter half of the 19th century were settled by a treaty in which Germany and the US divided the Samoan archipelago. The US formally occupied its portion - a smaller group of eastern islands with the excellent harbor of Pago Pago - the following year.

Andorra The landlocked Principality of Andorra is one of the smallest states in Europe, nestled high in the Pyrenees between the French and Spanish borders. For years, from to , Andorrans lived under a unique coprincipality, ruled by French and Spanish leaders from onward, the French chief of state and the Bishop of Urgell. In , this feudal system was modified with the introduction of a modern constitution; the co-princes remained as titular heads of state, but the government transformed into a parliamentary democracy. Andorra has become a popular tourist destination visited by approximately 8 million people each year drawn by the winter sports, summer climate, and duty-free shopping. Andorra has also become a wealthy international commercial center because of its mature banking sector and low taxes. As part of its effort to modernize its economy, Andorra has opened to foreign investment, and engaged in other reforms, such as advancing tax initiatives aimed at supporting a broader infrastructure. Although not a member

of the EU, Andorra enjoys a special relationship with the bloc that is governed by various customs and cooperation agreements and uses the euro as its national currency. Angola scores low on human development indexes despite using its large oil reserves to rebuild since the end of a year civil war in . Peace seemed imminent in when Angola held national elections, but fighting picked up again in . He pushed through a new constitution in . Anguilla Colonized by English settlers from Saint Kitts in , Anguilla was administered by Great Britain until the early 19th century, when the island - against the wishes of the inhabitants - was incorporated into a single British dependency along with Saint Kitts and Nevis. Several attempts at separation failed. In , two years after a revolt, Anguilla was finally allowed to secede; this arrangement was formally recognized in , with Anguilla becoming a separate British dependency. On 7 September , the island suffered extensive damage from Hurricane Irma, particularly to communications and residential and business infrastructure. Antarctica Speculation over the existence of a "southern land" was not confirmed until the early s when British and American commercial operators and British and Russian national expeditions began exploring the Antarctic Peninsula region and other areas south of the Antarctic Circle. Not until was it established that Antarctica was indeed a continent and not merely a group of islands or an area of ocean. Several exploration "firsts" were achieved in the early 20th century, but generally the area saw little human activity. Following World War II, however, the continent experienced an upsurge in scientific research. A number of countries have set up a range of year-round and seasonal stations, camps, and refuges to support scientific research in Antarctica. Seven have made territorial claims, but not all countries recognize these claims. In order to form a legal framework for the activities of nations on the continent, an Antarctic Treaty was negotiated that neither denies nor gives recognition to existing territorial claims; signed in , it entered into force in . Early Spanish and French settlements were succeeded by an English colony in . Slavery, established to run the sugar plantations on Antigua, was abolished in . The islands became an independent state within the British Commonwealth of Nations in . On 6 September , Hurricane Irma passed over the island of Barbuda devastating the island and forcing the evacuation of the population to Antigua. Almost all the structures on Barbuda were destroyed and the vegetation stripped, but Antigua was spared the worst. In recent years the polar ice pack has receded in the summer allowing for increased navigation and raising the possibility of future sovereignty and shipping disputes among the six countries bordering the Arctic Ocean Canada, Denmark Greenland , Iceland, Norway, Russia, US. After Bolivia, Paraguay, and Uruguay went their separate ways, the area that remained became Argentina. After World War II, an era of Peronist populism and direct and indirect military interference in subsequent governments was followed by a military junta that took power in . Democracy returned in after a failed bid to seize the Falkland Islands Islas Malvinas by force, and has persisted despite numerous challenges, the most formidable of which was a severe economic crisis in that led to violent public protests and the successive resignations of several presidents. Armenia Armenia prides itself on being the first nation to formally adopt Christianity early 4th century. Despite periods of autonomy, over the centuries Armenia came under the sway of various empires including the Roman, Byzantine, Arab, Persian, and Ottoman. During World War I in the western portion of Armenia, the Ottoman Empire instituted a policy of forced resettlement coupled with other harsh practices that resulted in at least 1 million Armenian deaths. The eastern area of Armenia was ceded by the Ottomans to Russia in ; this portion declared its independence in , but was conquered by the Soviet Red Army in . Armenian leaders remain preoccupied by the long conflict with Azerbaijan over Nagorno-Karabakh, a primarily Armenian-populated region, assigned to Soviet Azerbaijan in the s by Moscow. Armenia and Azerbaijan began fighting over the area in ; the struggle escalated after both countries attained independence from the Soviet Union in . The economies of both sides have been hurt by their inability to make substantial progress toward a peaceful resolution. Turkey closed the common border with Armenia in in support of Azerbaijan in its conflict with Armenia over control of Nagorno-Karabakh and surrounding areas, further hampering Armenian economic growth. In , Armenia and Turkey signed Protocols normalizing relations between the two countries, but neither country ratified the Protocols, and Armenia officially withdrew from the Protocols in March . Aruba Discovered and claimed for Spain in , Aruba was acquired by the Dutch in . A 19th century gold rush was followed by prosperity brought on by the opening in of an oil refinery. The last decades of the 20th century saw a boom in the tourism

industry. Aruba seceded from the Netherlands Antilles in and became a separate, autonomous member of the Kingdom of the Netherlands. Ashmore and Cartier Islands These uninhabited islands came under Australian authority in ; formal administration began two years later. Ashmore Reef supports a rich and diverse avian and marine habitat; in , it became a National Nature Reserve. Cartier Island, a former bombing range, became a marine reserve in The decision by the International Hydrographic Organization in the spring of to delimit a fifth world ocean, the Southern Ocean, removed the portion of the Atlantic Ocean south of 60 degrees south latitude. Australia Prehistoric settlers arrived on the continent from Southeast Asia at least 40, years before the first Europeans began exploration in the 17th century. No formal territorial claims were made until , when Capt. James COOK took possession of the east coast in the name of Great Britain all of Australia was claimed as British territory in with the creation of the colony of Western Australia. Six colonies were created in the late 18th and 19th centuries; they federated and became the Commonwealth of Australia in The new country took advantage of its natural resources to rapidly develop agricultural and manufacturing industries and to make a major contribution to the Allied effort in World Wars I and II. In recent decades, Australia has become an internationally competitive, advanced market economy due in large part to economic reforms adopted in the s and its location in one of the fastest growing regions of the world economy. Long-term concerns include an aging population, pressure on infrastructure, and environmental issues such as floods, droughts, and bushfires. Australia is the driest inhabited continent on earth, making it particularly vulnerable to the challenges of climate change. Azerbaijan Azerbaijan - a nation with a majority-Turkic and majority-Shia Muslim population - was briefly independent from to following the collapse of the Russian Empire; it was subsequently incorporated into the Soviet Union for seven decades. Armenia and Azerbaijan reignited their dispute over the area in ; the struggle escalated militarily after both countries attained independence from the Soviet Union in By May , when a cease-fire took hold, ethnic Armenian forces held not only Nagorno-Karabakh but also seven surrounding provinces in the territory of Azerbaijan. However, corruption in the country is widespread, and the government has been accused of authoritarianism. Following two national referendums in the past several years that eliminated presidential term limits and extended presidential terms from 5 to 7 years, President ALIYEV secured a fourth term as president in April in elections that international observers noted had serious shortcomings. British settlement of the islands began in ; the islands became a colony in Piracy thrived in the 17th and 18th centuries because of The Bahamas close proximity to shipping lanes. Since attaining independence from the UK in , The Bahamas has prospered through tourism, international banking, and investment management. Because of its location, the country is a major transshipment point for illegal drugs, particularly shipments to the US and Europe, and its territory is used for smuggling illegal migrants into the US. In order to secure these holdings, it entered into a series of treaties with the UK during the 19th century that made Bahrain a British protectorate. The archipelago attained its independence in A steady decline in oil production and reserves since prompted Bahrain to take steps to diversify its economy, in the process developing petroleum processing and refining, aluminum production, and hospitality and retail sectors. It has also endeavored to become a leading regional banking center, especially with respect to Islamic finance. The Sunni royal family has long struggled to manage relations with its large Shia-majority population. In early , amid Arab uprisings elsewhere in the region, the Bahraini Government confronted similar pro-democracy and reform protests at home with police and military action, including deploying Gulf Cooperation Council security forces to Bahrain. Political talks throughout between the government and opposition and loyalist political groups failed to reach an agreement, prompting opposition political societies to boycott legislative and municipal council elections in late Ongoing dissatisfaction with the political status quo continues to factor into sporadic clashes between demonstrators and security forces. Bangladesh The huge delta region formed at the confluence of the Ganges and Brahmaputra River systems - now referred to as Bangladesh - was a loosely incorporated outpost of various empires centered on the Gangetic plain for much of the first millennium A. Muslim conversions and settlement in the region began in the 10th century, primarily from Arab and Persian traders and preachers. Europeans established trading posts in the area in the 16th century. Eventually the area known as Bengal, primarily Hindu in the western section and mostly Muslim in the eastern half, became part of British India.

However, today I will turn away from my reviews of one forgotten TV series after another and focus on the most remembered. When Jack Webb brought his popular police radio show to TV it changed television. The series also benefits from an unforgettable theme song. But it was the unforgettable narration of Walter Winchell, Robert Stack as Eliot Ness and its high production values that should be remembered. Part of the 60s ITC British invasion of American television, the series was also noted for its surreal plots and modern fashion style of clothes. The series would live on with two successful theatrical films and a failed TV remake. People still can name you their favorite Angel. This series is remembered less as a PI show but as the perfect example of 70s TV, pretty, cheesy, mindless fun. This is an example of how opinions of TV series can change over time. A few years ago the answer here would have been Six Million Dollar Man ABC , but with the increase interest in supernatural fiction there has been a revival of interest in Kolchak. It would not be surprising if there are more people today aware of Kolchak: The Night Stalker than the number of people who watched it in the 70s. Michael Mann took this TV buddy cop show with Don Johnson and Philip Michael Thomas and made it the perfect visual representation of s pop culture. Bellisario and Glen Larson. As with many on this list it has survived cancellation with TV Movies. Currently survives in syndication and as a popular book series written by Donald Bain. This cop and lawyer series lasted twenty years, spawned several spin-offs and countless imitations. This science fiction mystery featured David Duchovny and Gillian Anderson as two FBI agents solving strange crimes and dealing with a possible alien conspiracy.
