OK, not to be overly technical, but not all of these creepy-crawlies are insects " some are arachnids, diplopods, or crustaceans. Author Jerry Palotta chose 26 subjects, including stinkbugs, pill bugs, and periodical cicadas. When Philip was five, his father was transferred to Reno, Nevada ; when Dorothy refused to move, she and Joseph divorced. Both parents fought for custody of Philip, which was awarded to the mother. Dorothy, determined to raise Philip alone, took a job in Washington, D. Philip was enrolled at John Eaton Elementary School , completing the second through fourth grades. His lowest grade was a "C" in Written Composition, although a teacher remarked that he "shows interest and ability in story telling". He was educated in Quaker schools. He and fellow science fiction author Ursula K. Le Guin were members of the same graduating class but did not know each other at the time. After graduation, he briefly attended the University of California, Berkeley , September to November 11, with an honorable dismissal granted January 1, Dick did not declare a major and took classes in history, psychology, philosophy, and zoology. Through his studies in philosophy, he believed that existence is based on internal human perception, which does not necessarily correspond to external reality; he described himself as "an acosmic pantheist ," believing in the universe only as an extension of God. This question from his early studies persisted as a theme in many of his novels. She also says he disliked the mandatory ROTC training. In he wrote that he was willing to "take twenty to thirty years to succeed as a literary writer". The dream of mainstream success formally died in January when the Scott Meredith Literary Agency returned all of his unsold mainstream novels. Even in his later years, he continued to have financial troubles. In the introduction to the short story collection *The Golden Man*, Dick wrote: Several years ago, when I was ill, Heinlein offered his help, anything he could do, and we had never met; he would phone me to cheer me up and see how I was doing. He wanted to buy me an electric typewriter , God bless him"one of the few true gentlemen in this world. I think a great deal of him and his wife; I dedicated a book to them in appreciation. Robert Heinlein is a fine-looking man, very impressive and very military in stance; you can tell he has a military background, even to the haircut. That is the best in humanity, there; that is who and what I love. Having struggled with amphetamine abuse for much of the past decade stemming in part from his need to maintain a prolific writing regimen due to the financial exigencies of the science fiction field , he allowed other drug users to move into the house. The police were unable to determine the culprit, and even suspected Dick of having done it himself. Within a day of arriving at the conference and giving his speech *The Android and the Human*, he informed people that he had fallen in love with a woman named Janis whom he had met there and announced that he would be remaining in Vancouver. On March 23, , Dick attempted suicide by taking an overdose of the sedative potassium bromide. During this period, Dick befriended a circle of Fullerton State students that encompassed several aspiring science fiction writers, including K. Jeter , James Blaylock and Tim Powers. Dick returned to the events of these months while writing his novel *A Scanner Darkly* , [22] which contains fictionalized depictions of the burglary of his home, his time using amphetamines and living with addicts, and his experiences of X-Kalay portrayed in the novel as "New-Path". Paranormal experiences[ edit ] On February 20, , while recovering from the effects of sodium pentothal administered for the extraction of an impacted wisdom tooth , Dick received a home delivery of Darvon from a young woman. When he opened the door, he was struck by the beauty of the dark-haired girl and was especially drawn to her golden necklace. He asked her about its curious fish-shaped design. Dick called the symbol the "vesicle pisces". This name seems to have been based on his conflation of two related symbols, the Christian ichthys symbol two intersecting arcs delineating a fish in profile which the woman was wearing, and the vesica piscis. He came to believe the beam imparted wisdom and clairvoyance, and also believed it to be intelligent. On one occasion, Dick was startled by a separate recurrence of the pink beam. It imparted the information to him that his infant son was ill. The Dicks rushed the child to the hospital, where his suspicion was confirmed by professional diagnosis. Although initially attributing them to side

effects from medication, he considered this explanation implausible after weeks of continued hallucinations. Aside from the "pink beam", Dick described the initial hallucinations as geometric patterns, and, occasionally, brief pictures of Jesus and ancient Rome. As the hallucinations increased in length and frequency, Dick claimed he began to live two parallel lives, one as himself, "Philip K. He believed that an episode in his novel *Flow My Tears, the Policeman Said* was a detailed retelling of a biblical story from the Book of Acts, which he had never read. The last novel Dick wrote was *The Transmigration of Timothy Archer*; it was published shortly after his death in 1982. Dick was married five times: The couple briefly befriended one of the FBI agents. After filing for divorce in 1971, he moved to Oakland to live with a fan, Grania Davis. Shortly after, he attempted suicide by driving off the road while she was a passenger. Death[ edit ] On February 17, 1982, after completing an interview, Dick contacted his therapist, complaining of failing eyesight, and was advised to go to a hospital immediately, but did not. The following day, he was found unconscious on the floor of his Santa Ana, California home, having suffered a stroke. On February 25, 1982, Dick suffered another stroke in the hospital, which led to brain death. Five days later, on March 2, 1982, he was disconnected from life support and died. Her tombstone had been inscribed with both of their names at the time of her death, 53 years earlier. One hardly sees critical mention of it, yet it is as integral to his body of work as oxygen is to water. His stories often become surreal fantasies, as the main characters slowly discover that their everyday world is actually an illusion assembled by powerful external entities, such as the suspended animation in *Ubik*, [36] vast political conspiracies or the vicissitudes of an unreliable narrator. The ground is liable to shift under your feet. Le Guin wrote, "but there are heroics. One is reminded of Dickens: The novel *Clans of the Alphane Moon* centers on an entire society made up of descendants of lunatic asylum inmates. In he wrote the essay titled "Schizophrenia and the Book of Changes". Dick himself was a drug user for much of his life. According to an interview in *Rolling Stone*, [40] Dick wrote all of his books published before while on amphetamines. He also experimented briefly with psychedelics, but wrote *The Three Stigmata of Palmer Eldritch*, which *Rolling Stone* dubs "the classic LSD novel of all time", before he had ever tried them. Despite his heavy amphetamine use, however, Dick later said that doctors told him the amphetamines never actually affected him, that his liver had processed them before they reached his brain. The protagonist desires to be the muse for fictional author Jack Dowland, considered the greatest science fiction author of the 20th century. The surname Dowland refers to Renaissance composer John Dowland, who is featured in several works. In the novel *The Divine Invasion*, the character Linda Fox, created specifically with Linda Ronstadt in mind, is an intergalactically famous singer whose entire body of work consists of recordings of John Dowland compositions. For complete bibliography, see Philip K. *The Man in the High Castle* is set in an alternate history in which the United States is ruled by the victorious Axis powers. It is the only Dick novel to win a Hugo Award. Most recently this has been adapted into a television series by Amazon Studios. *The Three Stigmata of Palmer Eldritch* utilizes an array of science fiction concepts and features several layers of reality and unreality. Life is physically daunting and psychologically monotonous for most colonists, so the UN must draft people to go to the colonies. Most entertain themselves using "Perky Pat" dolls and accessories manufactured by Earth-based "P. This recreational use of Can-D allows colonists to experience a few minutes of an idealized life on Earth by participating in a collective hallucination. *Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?* It occurs on a dying, poisoned Earth de-populated of almost all animals and all "successful" humans; the only remaining inhabitants of the planet are people with no prospects off-world. The novel is the literary source of the film *Blade Runner*. What is real, what is fake? What crucial factor defines humanity as distinctly "alive", versus those merely alive only in their outward appearance? *Ubik* employs extensive psychic telepathy and a suspended state after death in creating a state of eroding reality. Much of the following novel flicks between different equally plausible realities; the "real" reality, a state of half-life and psychically manipulated realities. After being attacked by an angry ex-girlfriend, Taverner awakens in a dingy Los Angeles hotel room. He still has his money in his wallet, but his identification cards are missing. This is no minor inconvenience, as security checkpoints manned by "pols" and "nats", the police and National Guard are set up throughout the city to stop

and arrest anyone without valid ID. Jason at first thinks that he was robbed, but soon discovers that his entire identity has been erased. There is no record of him in any official database, and even his closest associates do not recognize or remember him. For the first time in many years, Jason has no fame or reputation to rely on. He has only his innate charm and social graces to help him as he tries to find out what happened to his past while avoiding the attention of the cops. Dick novel nominated for both a Hugo and a Nebula Award. In an essay written two years before his death, Dick described how he learned from his Episcopal priest that an important scene in *Flow My Tears, the Policeman Said* "involving its other main character, the eponymous Police General Felix Buckman, was very similar to a scene in *Acts of the Apostles* , [28] a book of the New Testament. Film director Richard Linklater discusses this novel in his film *Waking Life* , which begins with a scene reminiscent of another Dick novel, *Time Out of Joint*. *A Scanner Darkly* is a bleak mixture of science fiction and police procedural novels; in its story, an undercover narcotics police detective begins to lose touch with reality after falling victim to the same permanently mind-altering drug, Substance D, he was enlisted to help fight. Substance D is instantly addictive, beginning with a pleasant euphoria which is quickly replaced with increasing confusion, hallucinations and eventually total psychosis. In this novel, as with all Dick novels, there is an underlying thread of paranoia and dissociation with multiple realities perceived simultaneously. It was adapted to film by Richard Linklater. It may also be his most academically studied work, and was adapted as an opera by Tod Machover. Regardless of the feeling that he was somehow experiencing a divine communication, Dick was never fully able to rationalize the events. For the rest of his life, he struggled to comprehend what was occurring, questioning his own sanity and perception of reality. He transcribed what thoughts he could into an eight-thousand-page, one-million-word journal dubbed the *Exegesis*.

Defining "Science Fiction" What is science fiction Everyone has some notion of what they consider to be SF, but surveys of the general public reveal sometimes deep misunderstandings. This page provides an entree into answering these questions. Science fiction is the literature of the human species encountering change, whether it arrives via scientific discoveries, technological innovations, natural events, or societal shifts. Science fiction is the literature of ideas and philosophy, answering such questions as, "What if? It sometimes seeks to subvert the dominant paradigm, when the author sees the status quo as harmful, and is therefore sometimes considered subversive or transgressive. It explores possibilities and pushes boundaries. It asks the next question, and then the one after that. It is often epistemological - seeking to understand how we know things - ontological, metaphysical, or cosmological. It is concerned with all of us rather than individuals, and with how we got to be what we are, and what we might become. Science fiction is multi- and interdisciplinary, concerned not only with literary qualities but also exploring core values of diverse fields. To deeply grasp a work, those creating SF and scholars examining it must also possess a strong grasp of the relevant scientific or technological background, as well as the societal, historic, economic, and other implications. It embraces and serves every field of study, and provides a method for creative speculation in non-literary fields. Like the scientific method, science fiction provides an approach to understanding the universe we live in. It provides the tools, tropes, and cognitive framework within which we can explore ideas and safely run thought-experiments where we cannot or ought not in real-world experiments. By dramatizing such scenarios, populating them with believable characters, and providing the background necessary for the audience to willingly suspend disbelief, SF brings ideas to life. It depends on the fearless questioning of authority, and the open exchange of ideas The nature of scientific genius is to question what the rest of us take for granted, then do the experiment. Science fiction is also the literature of the Other, providing alternate points of view on familiar topics in order to give us a clearer perspective. Science fiction is a community of thinkers and creatives. It is a collaborative effort by people from creative fields; as well as experts in technical, scientific, and humanities fields; professionals in publishing and multimedia forms; plus scholars, critics, and fans - all coming together to better understand and share our individual visions of what it means to be human impacted by ever-accelerating change. At its noblest, SF actively welcomes people from all backgrounds regardless of age, culture, disability, ethnicity, gender, gender identity or expression, nationality, race, religion, sexual orientation, and marital, parental, and veteran status, encouraging its members to feel welcome, free, and safe to express themselves in the truest ways possible in our exploration of the human condition encountering change. Delaney, one of the most wide-ranging and masterful writers in the field, sees it as a countermeasure to the future shock that will become more intense with the passing years. It helps us avoid feeling quite so gob-smacked. Authors have explored these exact topics in incredible depth for decades, and I feel reading their writing can be just as important as reading research papers. Le Guin said, "Hard times are coming when we will be wanting the voices of writers who can see alternatives to how we live now and can see through our fear-stricken society and its obsessive technologies to other ways of being, and even imagine some real grounds for hope. We will need writers who can remember freedom. Poets, visionaries, the realists of a larger reality. Sometimes infographics are the best way to understand a topic.
